

HEWITT, Mayor : SIR—Referring to your letter under date of January 12, requesting that the matter of the dredging of the Mott Haven Canal be investigated with a view of ascertaining whether, if the appropriation be turned over to this Department, anything can be done to improve the suniary condition of the canal, I have the honor to report that the subject has been carefully looked into by the Engineer of the Department, and it is found that owing to the many peculiar and difficult condi-tions surrounding the work, and also that the amount of work required has increased smee the matter was originally considered, the dredging cannot be done for the sum now available for the purpose, and may require an expenditure of 515,000. If, in your judgment, the work is of suffi-cient importance to justify this increased expenditure, I respectfully suggest that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be asked to appropriate the additional amount. If, however, it be thought proper to limit the expenditure at this time to the amount set apart for the purpose, \$3,750, work could be begun on the most obnoxious portion of the deposit and prosecuted to the extent of the appropriation and to a great mitigation of the evil complained of. Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor, and Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment : SIR—The estimate of this department for 1888 called for an appropriation of \$120,000 for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices." In the Final Estimate, your Board fixed the appro-priation at \$110,000, and set apart, of this sum, \$2,000 for restoration of pictures in the Governor's Room, leaving \$100,000 for the general purposes of the appropriation. The fixed and unavoidable demands on the appropriation for the whole year for wages of firemen and cleaners; for coal, wood and steam heating; for ice, and for necessary cleaners' supplies, together with the expenditures already made since January 1, would exceed the amount appropriated by nearly \$10,000. The Department is thus deprived of all means of honoring requisitions for office turaiture and supplies, many of which have already been presented and urgently pressed. In this exigency, and viewing together the respective necessities of the two appropriations for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices," and for "Public Buildings—Construction and Repairs," the sum of \$10,000 could now be spared from the latter appropriation for transfer to the former, and would cover the deficiency which would accrue during the year, from fixed charges, and leave a very small margin for new office fumilture, carpets, etc., which are absolutely needed. I, therefore, respectfully ask that the sum of \$10,000 cet transfer form the appropriation for "Public Buildings—Construction and Repairs," for 1888, to the appropriation for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices," for 1888. The longitudinal girders, five feet deep, on which above transverse girders rest, are spaced at intervals of ten feet eight inches, all inside girders being plate girders, while the extreme outside ones are double latticed. The transverse girders are six feet deep, with plate webs, between which are framed the longitudinal girders. HEWITT, Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: SIR--By your letter of the 1st instant, this Department was requested to furnish certain informa-tion with regard to the construction of a tunnel between the Boulevard and the elevated railroad station on Eighth avenue, and if the information could not be found in the records here, to supply the same. Accordingly, I directed a profile to be made of the ground between the two points, and requested Mr. Julius W. Adams, a Civil Engineer attached to this Department, to furnish the estimates, which I herewith submit in the form of a letter from him addressed to me. I desire to say that the project is feasible. However, I do not think that any communication can be made from the intersecting streets, owing to the difference of level to the bottom of the tunnel, which, at Tenth avenue would be about seventy fact, and more at the other intersecting streets.

tunnel, which, at lenth avenue would be about seventy list, and more at the other intersecting streets. The width of the tunnel cannot be fixed by any arbitrary rule, and there is an allowable differ-ence of opimon. The estimate of the tunnel proper, including the brick hining and pavement, and all the fixtures except the shaft, could be adapted to a small change of widths by making the estimate proportional to the width. This, of course, is approximate, but it is near enough to the truth for comparison.

MARCH 7, 1888. Gen. JOHN NEW 'ON, Commissioner of Public Works : SIR-I append an approximate estimate of the cost of a street tunnel between the intersection of the Bonlevard and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, on a descending grade of 4.6 per too toward the Eighth avenue railway station; length, including open cut approaches, 2,127 feet. Falling any borings in the locality, and guided by the known irregularity of geological formation on the island, I have assumed that the excavation may develop disintegrated rock, or even pockets of hard-pan or gravel, and have taken a price for tunneling of \$\$ per cubic yard, of which fifty cents is to cover the cost of the disposal of the material outside of the tunnel. For a similar reason, and in view of faults and slips, the lining of brick masonry has been taken as three feet in thickness, and the price per cubic pard at \$12, the latter to cover the cost of backfilling. The dimensions are shown on the accompanying cross-section.

CITY OF NEW YORK-HARLEM RIVER BRIDGE COMMISSION, COTTON EXCHANGE BUILDING, March 7, 1888.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York: GENTLEMEN-I am directed by the Harlem Bridge Commission to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of March 1, 1888, requesting "a detailed statement of the extra work done on Pier 2 of the Harlem River Bridge, together with the certificate of the Engineer, and the authoriza-tion by the sand Commission for the said extra work which increased the cost of the same," and to reply thereto as follows: You will observe, by reference to the provisions relating to foundations, found on page 17 of the printed contract and specifications, that the piers were required to be founded on solid rock, and that such means as the Engineer should direct should be used to lay the rock bare and visible. When the contract was made, the depth to which it would be necessary to sink. Pier 2 had not been determined, although it was known that it would exceed 22 feet ; nor had it then been decided other method. It was, therefore, left an open question, to be decided by the Engineer and the

whether the additional depth would be better reached by the process of compressed air or by some other method. It was, therefore, left an open question, to be decided by the Engineer, and the most convenient method of providing for it in the contract was to show a depth of twenty-two feet only on the plans, leaving the additional depth to come under the operation of the seventh clause of the contract and of Schedule "C," which provided that any additional depth should be paid for at \$45 per cubic yard of displacement, timber and masonry, if compressed air should be used, and at a cost of ten per cent. if any other process should be used. This additional depth, you will therefore see, was not extra work, but a part of the work originally contemplated by the contract. No authorization by the Commission beyond the contract provision was necessary. It being an engineering question, the right to determine the means was by the contract reserved to the Engineer of the Commission. The Engineer of the Commission, with the Consulting Engineers, being of the opinion that a caisson with compressed air was the safest and most certain way of founding said Pier 2, and at the same time of supporting the railroad tracks immediately alongside, which were in constant use by the trains of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad and the New York City and Northern Railroad, ordered the rock to be laid bare and visible by the means of a caisson and com-pressed air. So much of said foundation as was more than twenty-two feet below mean high water, viz. $^{AO20}_{AO20}$ fourbic yards actual displacement in place, thereby became payable for at the price for increased foundations below line, viz. $^{S}_{AS}$ per cubic yard, as per schedule. Thom month to month as the work progressed on said foundation, the Engineer certified the work to be done, and the amount due the contractor for so doing, and the Commission approved the same and certified the same for payment. 
