Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 185a, water meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-free passed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, actoris, manufactories, public editices, at wharves, fery-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1852, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \*

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and it the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-alloons, confectionerse or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, count-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited.
