

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1.748, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 823 tenement-houses, 89 private dwellings, 42 other dwellings, 17 manufactories and work shops, 16 stores and warehouses, 44 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 lodging-house, 5 other buildings, 1 coal yard, 10 sunken and vacant lots, 69 yards, courts, and areas, 100 cellars and basements, 262 waste pipes and drains, 161 privies and water-closets, 12, streets, gutters and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 1 cesspool, and 23 other puisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 385.

During the past week 145 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

52 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

51 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 82 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 78 houses, 78 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

2 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 585 births, 54 still-births, 202 marriages, and 622 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 20, 1883. This shows an increase of 39 births, and 2 marriages, and a decrease of 7 still-births and 61 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1882, there was an increase of 84 births and 3 still-births, and a decrease of 36 marriages and 195 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 5; scarlatina, 1; croup, 3; whooping cough, 5; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 5; diarrhceal diseases, 1; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 18; pneumonia, 18; heart diseases, 11; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 2; apoplexy, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; premature and preternatural births, 7; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 3; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 5; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 6; bronchitis, 4; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3. The number of deaths from erysipelas, and enteritis, gastritis, gastro enteritis, and peritonitis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 140 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 179 under two years; 236 under five years; and 43 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was the same as the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 37.94 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 135 were in institutions, 327 in tenement-bouses, 146 in houses containing three families or less, 11 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 103 on the first, 158 on the second, 118 on the third, 65 on the fourth, 28 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 612 were stated to be residents of New York City and 10 non-residents; 58 were stated to be single, 173 married, 81 widowed, and the condition of 310 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 622; still-births, 54; bodies in transitu, 13. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 73 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 585 births, 203 marriages, 54 still-births, 622 deaths, 13 applications for transit permits, were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 104 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 56 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 20, 1883, was 28.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.119, the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,364, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.43 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 58, article V. chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, as amended by resolution, approved December 30, 1882.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:
Section I.
