PETITIONS.

By Alderman Kennefick— To the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned, tradesmen and property-owners on Fulton street, in the City of New York, between Broadway and Pearl street, most respectfully petition your Honorable Board to modify so much of the ordinance recently passed as relates to push-cart venders standing with their push-carts on Fulton street, between the points above mentioned, at any time between 10 A. M. and 6 P. M., for the following reasons :

First—The street is narrow and has a double-track surface railway running through it, which necessarily congests the space in the street.

Second—The delivery and shipping of merchandise from our stores and places of business is injuriously retarded by reason of the push-carts standing along the sidewalk and preventing ingress and egress across the sidewalk to our places of business. This is a most serious obstacle to our business, and also most injurious, because the push-cart men will not move unless forced to do so by the Police, and they are not readily on hand.

Third—Fulton street is a great thoroughfare and business mart ; the attention of people passing through the street is attracted to these push-carts and their trashy goods. This, necessarily, draws their attention from the show-windows of the business merchants along the street, which is a great detriment and serious loss to their business, more than can be readily estimated or approximated. The sidewalks are narrow and necessarily congested, and at times blocked by the assembling of people standing in front of the push-carts, so that the ingress and egress to our places of business is greatly blocked, as in the case of unloading and shipping goods.

Fourth—We, the undersigned, are taxpayers and large rent-payers, and the blocking up of the street in front of our premises affects our business most injuriously, and largely decreases our receipts.

We would most respectfully petition that your Honorable Body will relieve us in this matter and exclude these push-carts from in front of our stores and places of business between the hours above designated.

We would further respectfully request that an opportunity be afforded the undersigned to appear before your Committee on Streets and present our grievances, and explain more fully the inconvenience, injury and damage occasioned us by reason of the ordinance now in existence, permitting these push-cart men to stand in front of our premises between the hours above stated.

We would respectfully ask that this petition be given early consideration by your Honorable Body.

NEW YORK, January, 1897. To the Honorable President JEROLOMAN and Honorable Members of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

GENTLEMEN—The General Council of the United Bootblacks' Protective League of the State of New York, in special meeting assembled on the 2d of January, 1897, passed and adopted the following resolutions, which are respectfully submitted for your consideration :

Whereas, We have received several complaints from the Chairman and members of the Branches of the League, and from many other bootblacks, to the effect that they cannot obtain an application for a permit because they are not yet citizens of the United States ; and

Whereas, We have estimated that in the City of New York at least seventy-five per cent. of the bootblacks are not citizens of the United States, and the enforcement of this ordinance will deprive many a man of a means of earning a livelihood because he is not a citizen, leaving in a hopeless condition his family, and bring destitution to his door ; and

Whereas, We believe that each and every person, citizens or those who have declared their intention to become citizens before a Circuit or District Court of the United States, or before a District or Supreme Court of this County, and, if he should present satisfactory evidence that he has been within the State for five years, he should be protected and a permit granted to him ; it is accordingly

Resolved, In regard to the above-mentioned matter, to respectfully request your Honorable Board to amend subdivision 5 of section 1 of said ordinance to read as follows :

"5th. An annual license fee shall be charged on granting the permit by the Mayor for such stands as follows : Fruit stands and soda-water stands, ten dollars each ; movable stands or stands for the sale of newspapers, two dollars each ; stationery booths or stands for the sale of newspapers and periodicals, five dollars each ; bootblack stands, five dollars for each chair thereof ; such license fees, when paid, shall be deposited to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt.

"No bootblack stands shall consist of more than three chairs ; nor shall any person or persons have, receive or hold more than one permit for any stand, booth or bootblack stand ; nor shall such permit be assignable or transferable to any person or persons whomsoever, and no such permit shall be granted to any person who does not produce at least two recommendations to the Board or to the Mayor of his good, moral character ; that they are citizens of the United States,

and residents of the City of New York for one year; or, if not citizens, for no fault of their own, they must certify to the following facts: That their period of residence in this country has not been a sufficient length of time to become such; and if not able, in consequence, to secure naturalization papers, they must at least show that they have 'declared their intentions'; and anyone who cannot present satisfactory evidence as above required shall not be granted a permit, and anyone who, on presentation of 'first papers,' and otherwise complying with all requirements, obtains a license, shall at the proper time give full evidence of full citizenship, otherwise such licenses shall become null and void; and be it further

Resolved, That the Honorable Board of Aldermen be respectfully requested to concur in our members' requests; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and resolutions be forwarded to your Honorable Board, and that you be respectfully requested to take action thereon immediately.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS—COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, No. 150 NASSAU STREET, NEW YORK, December 29, 1896. Hon. JOHN JEROLOMAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

DEAR SIR—On the 8th inst. I addressed a letter to the Counsel to the Corporation, stating that experience had shown that the present system of controlling and securing the proper restoration of pavements over plumbers' excavations and making and repairing house-connections with sewer and water-mains, in accordance with sections 354 to 357 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, is inadequate, because it fails to provide for the necessary supervision over the work of refilling the excavations. I further pointed out that the proper replacement of the soil is essential to the stability of the pavements, and that the dilatory and indifferent manner in which this work had hitherto been performed resulted in injury to the pavements and to the adjacent underground conduits. I also showed that this evil could be obviated if the Commissioner of Public Works had the power to place inspectors over the work of refilling, and to compel plumbers to pay for the services of the inspectors.

I asked the Corporation Counsel to advise me whether such power exists under the present laws and ordinances, and, if not, to prepare such draft of law or ordinance as would answer the purpose. He has prepared amendments to the existing ordinances, which I herewith inclose, and respectfully request the adoption thereof by your Board.

Proposed Ordinance.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section three hundred and fifty-four of article thirty-seven of chapter eight of the Revised Ordinances of eighteen hundred and eighty is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 354. It is hereby made the duty of the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, and the Commissioner of Street Improvements in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, each in their respective jurisdictions, whenever granting a permit for any excavation, opening or disturbance of the pavement of the carriage-way of any street, avenue or public place in the City of New York, or sidewalk thereof, except in cases where such opening, excavation or disturbance shall be directly authorized by law, to require of the person or persons by whom, or for whose benefit, any excavation or opening is to be made, for any purpose whatever, a deposit of such sum as shall be deemed sufficient to cover and pay all the expenses on the part of the department granting the permit, as the case may be, of furnishing such material, doing such work and taking such means as shall be required to properly restore and secure against sinkage the street and sidewalk, pavement, curb and flagging necessary to be replaced in consequence of making such excavation, opening or disturbance, including the proper inspection of all work done in connection therewith, which deposit shall be a full discharge of all liability and claim against the person or persons making such deposit and payment for the work herein provided for and required of the department aforesaid.

Section 2. Section three hundred and fifty-six of article thirty-seven of chapter eight of the Revised Ordinances of eighteen hundred and eighty is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 356. Whenever any pavement, sidewalk, curb or gutter in any street, avenue or public place shall be taken up, it shall be the duty of the commissioner aforesaid, within whose jurisdiction said street or avenue is, to restore said pavement, sidewalk, curb or gutter to its proper condition as soon thereafter as is practicable, requiring the person or persons by whom or for whose benefit the same is removed to deposit the material composing the superstructure without breaking or injuring the same and in a manner which shall occasion the least inconvenience to the public, and to fill in any excavation made and to leave the same properly packed, rammed and repaired for the repaving required, to the satisfaction of said commissioners and subject to the supervision and direction of any inspector or inspectors acting on behalf of said commissioners. And the said commissioners are hereby authorized to establish such rules and regulations as, in their judgment, shall be deemed necessary for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. Section three hundred and fifty-seven of article thirty-seven of chapter eight of the Revised Ordinances of eighteen hundred and eighty is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 357. Such sums as shall be certified by the said commissioner or commissioners to have been necessarily expended by him or them for any repaving or the inspection of any work done pursuant to the foregoing ordinances, shall be paid from the special fund hereby created upon the requisition of said commissioner or commissioners, as the case may be, after examination, audit and allowance of accounts by the Finance Department, in the same manner that payments are or shall be required by law to be made from the City Treasury, provided that the amount so certified and paid shall not exceed the aggregate amount of such special fund.

Sullivan, being duly sworn, says that at the last general election in this city held on November 3, 1896, he was the candidate of the Republican Party for Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District, and that the regular Democratic candidate for that Assembly District was one Otto Kempner; that the votes cast at that election and counted showed deponent to have been elected by a plurality of three votes over the said Kempner, the final canvass as made by the said Board of Canvassers above mentioned being as follows, to wit: Jeremiah J. Sullivan, 3,482 votes; Otto Kempner, 3,479 votes; Christian H. Loos; George Sieberg; William Retzloff.
 That at the time of the canvass of the votes by the said Board, deponent examined all of the so-called defective or void ballots returned by the different Boards of Election in each Election District of said Assembly District, and also all the ballots which were marked for identification and returned by the said Inspectors of Election, and he charges and alleges that votes were counted against him as void which were, in fact, legal votes, and that votes which were actually void and defective were counted for his opponent, Kempner.
 That hereto annexed, marked "Exhibit A," is a schedule showing the ballots which were not counted for the reason that they were alleged to have been void and which should have been counted for deponent.
 That hereto annexed, marked "Schedule B," is a list of ballots which were as a matter of fact and law void and which were counted for the said Kempner and should not have been counted for him.
 Deponent therefore asks that a writ of mandamus issue to the Board of Canvassers directing them to count for deponent the ballots not counted as void in said schedule, and take from the count of the said Kempner the ballots counted for the said Kempner and which were void and should not have been counted as aforesaid, and that a like mandamus issue, if necessary, to the Board of Election Officers in each of the Election Districts mentioned in said schedules, and deponent makes a part of this affidavit all of the statements made in said schedules.
 He further says that no previous application whatever for an order to show cause has been made herein, and he asks for an order to show cause so that the motion may be heard before the result is finally certified by the Board of County Canvassers.

Sullivan alleges that four ballots which were, as a matter of fact, void as against Kempner were counted for him, and appear to his credit in the final statement of canvass, and that by examining the box containing the counted ballots this count will appear.
 Thirteenth Election District, Tenth Assembly District.—Three ballots which were, as a matter of law, defective in this district were wrongly counted for the said Kempner, and are contained in the box of voted ballots.
 Alderman Goodwin offered the following:
 Resolved, That the Chairman of this Board of County Canvassers be and he is hereby instructed to appear on behalf of this Board before the Justice of the Supreme Court in the County Court-house, at Part I. thereof, in the proceedings entitled The People, etc., on the relation of Jeremiah Sullivan, under the order of said Court for this Board to show cause, and that said Chairman submit to said Court for its inspection and further order all the election district returns on file with the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen of this City, or in the office of the Clerk of the County of New York, and specifically referred to and mentioned in Exhibit "A" and "B," attached to said order to show cause.

City and County of New York, ss.: Otto Kempner, being duly sworn, deposes and says: That, at the last general election in this city, held on November 3, 1896, he was the candidate of the Democratic party for Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District, and that his opponent, on the part of the Republican party, was Jeremiah J. Sullivan; that said Sullivan has applied for a mandamus, as deponent is informed and believes, to be issued to the Board of County Canvassers, requiring a proper return of the vote cast for Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District, at the last general election, that, in the order to show cause granted by this court in the premises, certain election district officers therein enumerated are required to show cause why certain alleged irregularities in the count for Member of Assembly should not be corrected, but deponent is informed and believes that, besides the election districts thus enumerated there are several others which require an inspection as to the count of certain ballots, and that such election districts are the following: Eighteenth Election District, Thirty-eighth Election District.

Deponent further states, that, at the time of the canvass of the votes by the said Board of Canvassers, he examined all of the ballots returned in said district as protested or void, and deponent further charges and alleges that a certain number of proper and legal ballots that were cast for him were excluded from the count, and that a certain number which were actually void were counted for said Sullivan.

That hereto annexed, marked Schedule "A," is a schedule showing the ballots which were not counted for deponent, on the alleged ground that they were void, but which should have been counted for him as proper and legal ballots.

That hereto annexed, marked "Schedule B," is a list of ballots which were actually void, but were counted for said Sullivan and should not have been counted for him.

Deponent therefore asks that, in the writ of mandamus to be issued, if any, to the Board of Canvassers, the said Board be directed to include in the count for deponent the ballots not counted for him in "Schedule A," and to take from the count of the said Sullivan the ballots counted for him and which were void, as shown by "Schedule B," and deponent makes the statements contained in said schedules a part of this affidavit.

Your deponent further prays, that pending the consideration of said disputed ballots and the decision thereon, that this Board order all proceedings on the part of said Board of Canvassers in making a statement of canvass or in declaring the vote for the office of Member of Assembly in the said Tenth Assembly District to be stayed, and that said Board be enjoined against granting any certificate of election to either said Sullivan or this deponent until the further order of this Court.

Fourteenth Election District—One Democratic ballot properly marked in circle, but bottom of ballot torn off.

Eighteenth Election District—One Democratic ballot properly marked in circle and proper cross for Coroner in Socialistic column, but a lead pencil dot in Republican circle. Ballot slightly torn.

Twenty-third Election District—One Democratic ballot, properly crossed before each Democratic candidate, but marked with one superfluous cross on top.

One Democratic ballot, properly marked in circle, but with proper cross marks in National Democratic column before electors only.

One Democratic ballot, the mark in circle resembling a square.

Twenty-fifth Election District—One Democratic ballot properly marked in circle, with little ends to make it an X as in the printed statute.

Twenty-sixth Election District—One Democratic ballot properly marked in circle and properly marked before Kempner, but a short tear on right hand side of ballot.

One Democratic ballot properly marked in circle and properly marked before Sulzer, but torn on side up to name of W. R. Hearst.

Twenty-eighth Election District—One Democratic ballot properly marked in circle and no other mark on face, but on the outside there is an "S."

One Democratic ballot properly marked in circle, but marked by short pencil mark in Republican circle, which the voter evidently tried to cross out again.

One Democratic ballot with proper crosses in both Democratic and People's party columns.

One Democratic ballot properly marked in columns and for Kempner. In Prohibition column there are erasure marks opposite the name of Wheeler.

Schedule of ballots that were in fact void, but were counted for Sullivan, and should be deducted from his count:

Nineteenth Election District—One ballot crossed in Republican circle and crosses before the names of Bush and Wood, Democratic electors. A piece of ballot torn out in Socialistic column.

Twenty-first Election District—One ballot with crosses in Republican circle and also marked with lead pencil in another circle.

Thirty-eighth Election District—One ballot marked in Republican circle and a cross under the name of Hobart.

One ballot with cross in circle of National Democratic party and blurred scratches opposite Sulzer and Kempner, also crosses before Eideman and Sullivan.

Alderman Olcott offered the following:

Resolved, That in obedience to an order made by Justice Abram R. The following opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation was read in relation to the contest in the Tenth Assembly District:

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, November 19, 1896. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, Esq., Clerk of the Board of Aldermen and Secretary of the Board of the County Canvassers:

SIR—Answering the question submitted by you on behalf of the Board of County Canvassers, I have to say:

It appears that in proceedings instituted upon the relation of Otto Kempner, a candidate for Member of Assembly at the late election in the Tenth Assembly District of the City of New York, an order was made by Mr. Justice Lawrence on November 18, 1896, which provided as follows:

"Ordered, That all proceedings on the part of said Board of Aldermen, constituting the Board of County Canvassers of the City and County of New York, in making a statement of canvass or in declaring the vote for the office of Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District, of the City of New York, be stayed, and that said Board is hereby enjoined against granting any certificate of election to any candidate in said district for Member of Assembly until the further order of this Court."

Following said order appears the following stipulation:

"It is stipulated, in open court, that the above order, Court consenting, be modified to continue until November 22, 1896, inclusive, subject to any further orders of the Court on due application.

"Dated November 18, 1896. ASA BIRD GARDINER, Attorney for Otto Kempner; ABRAHAM GRUBER, Attorney for J. J. Sullivan."

It appears that the work of the Board of County Canvassers, with the exception of the final tabulation, the preparation of the statements, and declarations had been completed prior to the making and serving of said order, and that the Board had adjourned to Saturday, November 21, when their work was to be continued.

I am asked: First—Whether, at its meeting, on Saturday, the Board may proceed to make the statements and declarations based upon its canvass in all other cases than for Member of Assembly for the Tenth Assembly District.

My answer to that question is in the affirmative, as the stay is confined to the specific matter of the Member of Assembly for that District.

Second—That inasmuch as the final statements and declarations should be filed with the County Clerk by Monday, the 23d, that the power and duty of the Board would be in case no further order in the premises should be made.

To this my answer is, that by the terms of the stipulation, entered into in open court, with the consent of the Court, the stay is to continue only until the 22d of November, inclusive, that if the Board at its meeting on the 21st should adjourn over until the 23d, and if up to the time of its meeting on that day no further order of the Court should be made in the premises, the order under consideration would, by its own limitations, have lapsed, and the Board, being no longer under a stay, might proceed with its business.

Alderman Muh, Chairman of the Committee on Corrected Returns, offered the following report:

To the Board of County Canvassers of the City and County of New York:

Your Committee appointed upon corrected returns do most respectfully report that, during the canvass, a large number of the certified copies of the returns of the Inspectors of Election of the result of the canvass of the several election districts were referred to your Committee, that in each instance the Inspectors were summoned to appear before your Committee, and in all cases they promptly attended the summons, and the returns in which it was claimed that errors existed, hearings were had in explanation of these errors.

In nearly every instance satisfactory explanation was given as to the cause of the errors, and we found in no instance errors of sufficient gravity to affect the result of the votes in any districts, except possibly the Tenth Assembly District, which is hereinafter referred to.

Numerous errors occurred in consequence of ballots being delivered to the wrong election districts and which were not counted by the Inspectors of Election, and was therefore apparently not accounted for.

The Inspectors were justified under the law in refusing to count such ballots in consequence of the improper official indorsement of the same.

Your Committee begs to say, however, that the ballots above referred to were ballots intended to be voted upon the constitutional amendments.

There is a contest pending in the Supreme Court as to the action of Inspectors in certain election districts of the Tenth Assembly District with reference to the rejection of certain ballots cast for candidates for Member of Assembly in said assembly district.

With reference to those districts in said assembly districts in which errors claim to exist in the returns of the inspectors, your Committee are of the opinion that it is not in the power of your Committee or the Board of Canvassers to require the Inspectors to correct manifest errors which will change the decision of the Inspectors which were made and certified as the result of their canvass of the votes cast at the election.

The power to compel the count of votes improperly rejected or improperly counted is vested now in the Supreme Court, and the decision of the Court on the question now pending with reference to the Tenth Assembly District, we are informed, will not be reached until the end of this week.

The Chairman announced that he had received information that the matter of contest for Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District, now pending in the Supreme Court, in which matter this Board is restrained, had been adjourned until Wednesday, December 23, 1896.

Alderman Marshall moved that the Board take a recess subject to the call of the Chair.
Which was carried.

MONDAY, January 4, 1897.

Alderman Oakley in the chair.

On roll call it appeared that a quorum was present, consisting of the Chairman, the Vice-President of the Board of Aldermen, Aldermen Campbell, Goetz, Goodman, Goodwin, Hackett, Hall, Kennefick, Lantry, Marshall, Muh, Murphy, Noonan, O'Brien, Parker, Randall, Robinson, Schilling, School, Tait, Wines, Woodward, Wund—24.

The Chairman presented an order of the Supreme Court, setting aside the order of said Court restraining the Board of County Canvassers in the matter of contest in the Tenth Assembly District, which was read, and is as follows:

At a Special Term of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, held at the County Court-house in the City of New York, on the 31st day of December, 1896.

Present—Honorable Frederick Smyth, Justice.

The People of the State of New York, upon the relation of Jeremiah J. Sullivan, against The City and County Board of Canvassers of the City and County of New York.

An application under section 114 of chapter 909, Laws of 1896, for a writ of mandamus, having been made to this Court on November 16, 1896, by Jeremiah J. Sullivan, Esq., a candidate for the Member of Assembly for the Tenth Assembly District of the City of New York, requiring the City and County Board of Canvassers of the City and County of New York upon a recount of the votes cast in the said Tenth Assembly District, to add to the total of the votes cast for said Sullivan the votes on certain ballots returned by the Inspectors of Election of the various election districts in said assembly district, and not heretofore counted for said Sullivan, and to exclude from the count the votes for Otto Kempner, Esq., on certain ballots, said votes having already been counted for said Kempner and the said Kempner having petitioned in this proceeding that the City and County Board of Canvassers of the City and County of New York, upon a recount of the votes in the said Tenth Assembly District add to the total of the votes cast for said Kempner, the votes on certain ballots returned by the Inspectors of Election of the various election districts of the said Tenth Assembly District not heretofore counted for said Kempner and to exclude from the count the votes for said Sullivan on certain ballots, said votes having already been counted for the said Sullivan and the matter now coming on to be heard and Abraham Gruber, Esq., and Armitage Mathews, Esq., appearing for said Sullivan, and Asa Bird Gardiner, Esq., appearing for said Kempner, and certain ballots having been submitted to the Court for decision thereon and the Court having rendered its decision and the Court finding that certain questions of fact were involved and the attorneys for the respective parties herein having consented, a reference was ordered to Edward L. Patterson, Esq., Counsellor-at-Law, to hear testimony and report to this Court whether the votes on certain ballots were counted or not counted for Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District, the said report having been filed in this Court; now, upon reading and filing the petitions of said Sullivan and Kempner and the report of said Edward L. Patterson, Esq., heretofore filed, and upon motion of Abraham Gruber, Esq., it is

Ordered, That the ballots marked Exhibits 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 13, 14, 15, M, O, DD, EE, FF are valid and that the ballots marked Exhibits 5, 6, 7, 8, 11, 12, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L, N, P, Q, R, S, T, U, V, W, X, Y, Z, AA, BB, CC, GG, HH, II, JJ, KK, LL, MM are invalid; and it is further

Ordered, That the report of Edward L. Patterson, Esq., the referee appointed herein, be and the same hereby is in all respects confirmed; and it is further

Ordered, That the City and County Board of Canvassers of the City and County of New York recount the votes on such ballots marked as exhibits by adding to the total votes cast for Jeremiah J. Sullivan, the votes for said Jeremiah J. Sullivan on certain ballots marked Exhibits M, O, and by taking from his count a ballot marked Exhibit 101, and by adding to the total vote cast for Otto Kempner, Esq., the votes for said Kempner and ballots marked Exhibits 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 13, 18, and that they exclude upon the recount of such votes the votes previously counted for said Kempner on ballots marked Exhibits BB, CC, GG, HH, II, JJ; and it is further

Ordered, That the stay of proceedings heretofore granted by Mr. Justice Lawrence restraining the City and County Board of Canvassers of the City and County of New York from issuing a certificate of the votes cast for Jeremiah J. Sullivan, Esq., and Otto Kempner, Esq., candidates for Member of Assembly of the Tenth Assembly District of the City of New York, be vacated; and it is further

Ordered, That the County Clerk of the City and County of New York immediately transmit to the Secretary of State of the State of New York the statement as to the election of Member of Assembly for the Tenth Assembly District of the City of New York, as required by section 137, chapter 909 of the Laws of 1896.

Alderman Noonan moved that the vote for Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District be recounted pursuant to the above-mentioned order of the Supreme Court.

Which was carried.

On motion of Alderman Marshall, the Board proceeded to recount the vote for Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District in accordance with the order of the Supreme Court, above referred to, "by adding" to the vote of Otto Kempner in the First Election District, Exhibit No. 1; in the Second Election District, Exhibit Nos. 2, 3 and 4; in the Eighteenth Election District, Exhibit No. 9; in the Twenty-third Election District, Exhibit No. 10; in the Twenty-fifth Election District, Exhibit No. 13; in the Twenty-eighth Election District, Exhibit No. 18; and "by deducting" from the vote of Otto Kempner, in the Nineteenth Election District, Exhibits BB and CC; in the Twenty-first Election District, Exhibits GG and HH; in the Twenty-sixth Election District, Exhibits II and JJ; and "by adding" to the vote of Jeremiah J. Sullivan in the Ninth Election District, Exhibit M; and in the Eleventh Election District, Exhibit O; and "by deducting" from the vote of Jeremiah J. Sullivan, in the Nineteenth Election District, Exhibit No. 101.

Alderman Marshall moved that inasmuch as the Greater New York Commission had announced a public hearing in the Aldermanic Chamber this day at 1 o'clock P. M., and inasmuch as it is now long past that hour, the Board of County Canvassers adjourn to Room No. 13 in this building, which was carried, and the Board immediately continued its session in said Room No. 13.

The Chairman then presented an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation bearing upon the filing of the statement by election districts of the Board of County Canvassers, which was read and is as follows:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, December 23, 1896. WILLIAM TEN EYCK, Esq., Clerk, Board of Aldermen:

DEAR SIR—Section 137 of chapter 909 of the Laws of 1896 provides:

"The county clerk of each county shall transmit to the secretary of state * * * on or before the 15th day of December in each year, a certified copy of the official canvass of the votes cast in each said county by election districts at the last preceding general election."

Section 68 of the Consolidation Act provides:

"The detailed canvass of votes at every election shall be published in the CITY RECORD."

Under certain provisions of chapter 909 of the Laws of 1896 an application has heretofore been made to the Supreme Court for its decision upon certain disputed ballots cast at the late election for Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District in this city, which ballots in some instances were counted by the inspectors and in some not.

In such proceeding an injunction was issued out of the Supreme Court addressed to the Board of County Canvassers forbidding it, until the further order of the Court, to canvass or declare the result of the election for Assemblyman in said assembly district.

The Board has obeyed such order and has therefore not been able to complete its official canvass by election districts of the City and County of New York for the last election, and accordingly has not been able to file, as required by law, certified copy of such canvass with the County Clerk, nor has the County Clerk been able, as required by the section first hereinbefore cited, to forward the certified copy thereof to the Secretary of State within the time limited by law, and you now inform me that the Secretary of State has forwarded an inquiry as to why the law has not been obeyed in this matter and ask for my advice in the premises.

I beg herewith to advise you that the provisions requiring the filing and forwarding within the time limited of a certified copy of the canvass by election districts is directory, and as the completion of such canvass and the filing of certified copies thereof has been prevented only by order of the Court, which the County Board of Canvassers was obliged to obey, the spirit and purpose of the law will be entirely complied with, in my judgment, if the Board will file its canvass and the County Clerk shall forward certified copy thereof as soon as the Court shall have acted in the matters now under consideration before it and a copy of its final order shall be served upon the Board.

As the statute permits decision of these cases to be taken into Court, of course, all provisions as to filing within limited time of certified copies must depend upon the action of the Court in the premises. The injunction must be observed.

On motion of Alderman Goodman, the opinion was made a part of the record of the Board, and ordered on file.

The Chairman then presented the following communication from the County Clerk, which was read, and on motion, made a part of the record of the Board and ordered on file :

COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE, NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE, NEW YORK, December 22, 1896. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, Esq., Clerk, Board of County Canvassers :

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to inform you that the "corrected returns" sent me by the Board of County Canvassers on December 16, and forwarded by me to the Secretary of State on the same day, have been returned by the Secretary of State to this office, and are now on file therein.

Very respectfully, HENRY D. PURROY, County Clerk. Alderman Marshall having signed the sheet for Member of Assembly for the Tenth Assembly District, the Secretary proceeded with the reading of the official statement of votes cast at the General Election for such office held in the City of New York on the 3d day of November, 1896.

The reading of the official statement being completed, the Secretary proceeded with the reading of the official declaration.

The reading of the official declaration being completed, Alderman Goodwin moved that the statement and declaration of the Board of County Canvassers in relation to Member of Assembly in the Tenth Assembly District, as read by the Secretary, be confirmed. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Goodman moved that a vote of thanks be tendered to Alderman Oakley for the able, efficient, and impartial manner in which he had presided over the deliberations of the Board of County Canvassers, and that a vote of thanks be tendered Mr. Ten Eyck for the efficient manner in which he had performed his duties as Secretary. Which was unanimously adopted.

The minutes of the meetings not heretofore approved were then read and, on motion, adopted. There being no further business, the Board of County Canvassers, on motion of Alderman Goodwin, adjourned sine die.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT.

Rules and Regulations for Plumbing, Drainage, Water Supply and Ventilation of Buildings.

Drawings and triplicate descriptions on forms furnished by the Department of Buildings for all plumbing and drainage shall be filled in with ink and filed by the owner, architect or plumber in the said Department.

And the said plumbing and drainage shall not be commenced or proceeded with until said drawings and descriptions shall have been so filed and approved by the Superintendent of Buildings.

No modification of the approved drawings and descriptions will be permitted unless either amended drawings and triplicate descriptions, or an amendment to the original drawings and descriptions, covering the proposed change or changes, are so filed and approved by the Superintendent of Buildings.

It shall not be lawful to do said plumbing and drainage except pursuant to said approved drawings and descriptions or approved amendments thereof.

Repairs or alterations of plumbing and drainage may be made without the filing and approval of drawings and descriptions in the Department of Buildings. But said repairs or alterations shall not be construed to include cases where new vertical and horizontal lines of soil, waste, vent or leader pipes are proposed to be used.

Notice of said repairs or alterations shall be given to the said Department, before the same are commenced, in all cases except where leaks are stopped or obstructions are removed.

Said notice shall consist of a description in writing of the work to be done, of the location of the property where the same is executed, and of the names and addresses of the owner and of the plumber.

Said notice shall not, however, be required when repairs or alterations are ordered by the Board of Health for sanitary reasons.

Said repairs and alterations shall comply in all respects with the weight, quality, arrangement and venting of the rest of the work in the building.

The plans must be drawn to scale in ink on cloth, or they must be cloth prints of such scale drawings, and shall consist of such floor plans and sections as may be necessary to show clearly all plumbing work to be done, and must show partitions and the method of ventilating water-closet apartments.

Written notice must be given to the Department of Buildings by the plumber when any work is begun, and from time to time when any work is ready for inspection. No part of the work shall be covered until it has been examined, tested and approved by the Inspector.

Definition of Terms—The term "private sewer" is applied to main sewers that are not constructed by and under the supervision of the Department of Public Works or the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The term "house sewer" is applied to that part of the main drain or sewer extending from a point two feet outside of the outer face of the outer front vault or area wall to its connection with the public sewer, private sewer, or cesspool.

The term "house drain" is applied to that part of the main horizontal drain and its branches inside the walls of the building and extending to and connecting with the house sewer.

The term "soil pipe" is applied to any vertical line of pipe, extending through roof, receiving the discharge of one or more water-closets, with or without other fixtures.

The term "waste pipe" is applied to any pipe, extending through roof, receiving the discharge from any fixtures except water-closets.

The term "vent pipe" is applied to any special pipe provided to ventilate the system of piping and to prevent trap syphonage and back pressure.

I. Materials and Workmanship—All materials must be of the best quality free from defects, and all work must be executed in a thorough workmanlike manner.

All cast iron pipes and fittings must be uncoated, sound, cylindrical and smooth, free from cracks, sand holes and other defects, and of uniform thickness and of the grade known in commerce as extra heavy.

Pipe including the hub shall weigh not less than the following average weights per lineal foot :

Table with 4 columns: DIAMETERS., WEIGHTS PER LINEAL FOOT., DIAMETERS., WEIGHTS PER LINEAL FOOT. Rows include diameters from 2 inches to 12 inches with corresponding weights.

The size, weight and maker's name must be cast on each length of the pipe.

All joints must be made with picked oakum and molten lead and be made gas-tight. Twelve (12) ounces of fine, soft pig lead must be used at each joint for each inch in the diameter of the pipe.

All wrought iron and steel pipe must be equal in quality to "Standard," and be properly tested by the manufacturer. All pipe must be lap welded. No plain black or uncoated pipe will be permitted.

After January 1, 1897, wrought iron and steel pipe must be galvanized, and each length must have the weight per foot and maker's name stamped on it.

Fittings for vent pipes on wrought iron or steel pipes may be the ordinary cast or malleable steam and water fittings.

Fittings for waste or soil pipes must be the special, extra heavy cast-iron recessed and threaded drainage fittings, with smooth interior water-way and threads tapped, so as to give a uniform grade to branches of not less than 1/4 of an inch per foot.

All joints to be screwed joints made up with red lead, and the burr formed in cutting must be carefully reamed out.

Short nipples on wrought iron or steel pipe where the unthreaded part of the pipe is less than one and one-half (1 1/2) inches long must be of the thickness and weight known as "extra heavy" or "extra strong."

The pipe shall be not less than the following average thickness and weight per lineal foot :

Table with 6 columns: DIAMETERS., THICKNESSES., WEIGHTS PER LINEAL FOOT., DIAMETERS., THICKNESSES., WEIGHTS PER LINEAL FOOT. Rows include diameters from 1 1/2 inches to 5 inches with corresponding thicknesses and weights.

All brass pipe for soil, waste, and vent pipes and solder nipples must be thoroughly annealed seamless drawn brass tubing of standard iron pipe gauge. Connections on brass pipe and between brass pipe and traps or iron pipe must not be made with slip joints or couplings. Threaded connections on brass pipe must be of the same size as iron pipe threads for same size of pipe and be tapered.

The following average thicknesses and weights per lineal foot will be required :

Table with 6 columns: DIAMETERS., THICKNESSES., WEIGHTS PER LINEAL FOOT., DIAMETERS., THICKNESSES., WEIGHTS PER LINEAL FOOT. Rows include diameters from 1 1/2 inches to 6 inches with corresponding thicknesses and weights.

Brass ferrules must be best quality, bell-shaped, extra heavy cast brass, not less than four inches long and two and one-quarter inches, three and one-half inches and four and one-half inches in diameter, and not less than the following weights :

Table with 4 columns: DIAMETERS., WEIGHTS., DIAMETERS., WEIGHTS. Rows include diameters of 2 1/4 inches and 3 1/2 inches with weights of 1 pound 0 ounces and 1 pound 12 ounces.

One and one-half inch ferrules are not permitted. Soldering nipples must be heavy cast brass or of brass pipe, iron pipe size. When cast, they must be not less than the following weights :

Table with 4 columns: DIAMETERS., WEIGHTS., DIAMETERS., WEIGHTS. Rows include diameters of 1 1/2 inches, 2 inches, and 2 1/2 inches with weights of 0 pounds 8 ounces, 0 pounds 14 ounces, and 1 pound 6 ounces.

Brass screw caps for cleanouts must be extra heavy, not less than one-eighth of an inch thick, and must have a flange of not less than three-sixteenths of an inch thick. The screw cap must have a solid square or hexagonal nut not less than one (1) inch high, with a least diameter of one and one-half (1 1/2) inches. The body of the cleanout ferrule must at least equal in weight and thickness the caulking ferrule for the same size of pipe. Where cleanouts are required by rules and by the approved plans the screw cap must be of brass. The engaging parts must have not less than six (6) threads of iron pipe size and tapered. Cleanouts must be of full size of the trap up to four (4) inches in diameter and not less than four (4) inches for large traps.

The use of lead pipe is restricted to the short branches of the soil, waste and vent pipes, bends and traps, roof connection of inside leaders and flush pipes.

All lead, waste, soil, vent and flush pipes must be of the best quality drawn pipe of the quality known in commerce as "D," and of not less than the following weights per lineal foot :

Table with 4 columns: DIAMETERS., WEIGHTS PER LINEAL FOOT., DIAMETERS., WEIGHTS PER LINEAL FOOT. Rows include diameters of 1 1/4 inch, 1 1/2 inches, and 2 inches with weights of 2 1/2 pounds, 3 pounds, and 4 pounds.

All lead traps and bends must be of the same weights and thicknesses as their corresponding pipe branches. Sheet lead for roof flashings must be six-pound lead and must extend not less than six (6) inches from the pipe and the joint made water tight. Copper tubing when used for inside leader roof connections must be seamless drawn tubing not less than 22 gauge, and when used for roof flashings must be not less than 18 gauge.

II. General plan of plumbing and drainage approved by the Superintendent of Buildings.—Each building must be separately and independently connected with the public or a private sewer.

The entire plumbing and drainage system of every building must be entirely separate and independent of that of any other building.

Every building must have its sewer connections directly in front of the building unless permission is otherwise granted by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Where there is no sewer in the street or avenue, and it is possible to construct a private sewer to connect with a sewer in an adjacent street or avenue a private sewer must be constructed.

It must be laid outside the curb under the roadway of the street.

Cesspools and privy vaults will be permitted only after it has been shown to the satisfaction of the Superintendent of Buildings that their use is absolutely necessary.

When allowed they must be constructed strictly in accordance with the terms of the permit issued by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Cesspools will not be permitted under any circumstances for tenement and lodging houses. Cesspools will not be allowed outside the frame building district. As soon as it is possible to connect with a public sewer the owner must have the cesspool and privy vault emptied, cleaned and disinfected and filled with fresh earth and have a sewer connection made in the manner herein prescribed.

Old house sewers can be used in connection with the new buildings or new plumbing, only when they are found on examination by the Plumbing Inspector to conform in all respects to the requirements governing new sewers.

When a proper foundation consisting of a natural bed of earth, rock, etc., can be obtained, the house sewer can be of earthenware pipe.

Where the ground is made or filled in or where the pipes are less than three feet deep, or in any case where there is danger of settlement by frost or from any other cause, and when cess-pools are used, the house sewer must be of extra heavy cast-iron pipe with lead-caulked joints.

The house sewer and house drain must be at least 4 inches in diameter where water-closets discharge into them.

Where rain water discharges into them, the house sewer and the house drain up to the leader connections must be in accordance with the following table :

Table with 3 columns: DIAMETER., FALL 1/4-INCH PER FOOT., FALL 1/2-INCH PER FOOT. Rows include diameters from 6 inches to 9 inches with corresponding fall rates and drainage areas.

No steam exhaust, boiler blow-off or drip-pipe shall be connected with the house drain or sewer. Such pipes must first discharge into a proper condensing tank and from this a proper outlet to the house sewer outside the building must be provided. In low pressure steam systems the condensing tank may be omitted but the waste connection must be otherwise as above required.

The house drain and its branches must be of extra heavy cast-iron, when under ground, and of extra heavy cast-iron or galvanized tarred or asphalted wrought iron or steel when above ground.

The house drain must properly connect with the house sewer at a point two feet outside of the outer front vault or area wall of the building. An arched or other proper opening must be provided for the drain in the wall to prevent damage by settlement.

The house drain and sewer must be run as direct as possible, with a fall of at least one-quarter inch per foot, all changes in direction made with proper fittings, and all connections made with Y branches and one-eighth and one-sixteenth bends.

If possible the house drain must be above the cellar floor. The house drain must be supported at intervals of 10 feet by 8 inch brick piers or suspended from the floor beams or be otherwise properly supported by heavy iron pipe hangers at intervals of not more than 10 feet.

The use of pipe hooks for supporting drains is prohibited.

An iron running trap must be placed on the house drain near the wall of the house, and on the sewer side of all connections, except a drip pipe where one is used. If placed outside the house or below the cellar floor it must be made accessible in a brick manhole, the walls of which must be 8 inches thick, with an iron or flagstone cover. When outside the house it must never be less than 3 feet below the surface of the ground. The house-trap must have two cleanouts with brass screw cap ferrules calked in.

A fresh air inlet must be connected with the house drain just inside of the house trap. The fresh air inlet will be of extra heavy cast-iron where under ground. Where possible it will extend to the outer air and finish with a return bend at least one foot above grade, and 15 feet away from any window or furnace cold air box. When this arrangement is not possible, the fresh air inlet must open into the side of a box not less than 18 inches square placed below the sidewalk, at the curb. The bottom of the box must be 18 inches below the under side of the fresh air inlet pipe. The box may be of cast-iron or it may be constructed with 8-inch walls of brick or flagstone laid in hydraulic cement. The box must be covered by a flagstone fitted with removable metal grating, leaded into the stone, having openings equal in area to the area of the fresh air inlet and not less than one-half inch in their least dimension. The fresh air inlet must be of the same size as the drain up to four (4) inches ; for five (5) inch and six (6) inch drains it must be not less than four (4) inches in diameter ; for seven (7) inch and eight (8) inch drains not less than six (6) inches in diameter, and for larger drains not less than eight inches in diameter.

All yards, courts, and areas must be drained. Tenement-houses and lodging-houses must have their yards, areas and courts drained into the sewer.

These drains when sewer connected must have connections not less than three inches in diameter. They should if possible be controlled by one trap—the leader trap if possible. Leader pipes must be sewer connected if possible.

All buildings shall be kept provided with proper metallic leaders for conducting water from the roofs in such manner as shall protect the walls and foundations of said buildings from injury. In no case shall the water from the said leaders be allowed to flow upon the sidewalk, but the same shall be conducted by pipe or pipes to the sewer. If there be no sewer in the street upon which such buildings front, then the water from said leader shall be conducted by proper pipe or pipes, below the surface of the sidewalk to the street gutter.

Inside leaders must be made of cast-iron, wrought-iron, or steel, with roof connections made gas and water tight by means of a heavy lead or copper drawn tubing wiped or soldered to a brass ferrule or nipple calked or screwed into the pipe.

Outside leaders may be of sheet metal, but they must connect with the house drain by means of a cast-iron pipe extending vertically five feet above the grade level.

Leaders must be trapped with cast-iron running traps, so placed as to prevent freezing. Rain-water leaders must not be used as soil, waste or vent pipes, nor shall any such pipe be used as a leader.

Cellar drains will be permitted only where they can be connected to a trap with a permanent water seal.

Subsoil drains should discharge into a sump or receiving tank, the contents of which must be lifted and discharged into the drainage system above the cellar bottom by some approved method.

Where directly sewer connected they must be cut off from the rest of the plumbing system by a brass flap valve on the inlet to the catch basin and the trap on the drain from the catch basin must be water supplied as required for cellar drains.

Foundation walls must, where required, be rendered impervious to dampness by the use of coal tar, pitch or asphaltum.

Full size Y and T branch fittings for hand-hole cleanouts must be provided where required on house drain and its branches.

All iron traps for house drain, yard and other drains and leaders, must be running traps with hand-hole cleanouts of full size of the traps when same are less than five (5) inches. All traps under ground must be made accessible by brick manholes with proper covers.

SOIL AND WASTE PIPE LINES.

All main soil, waste or vent pipes must be of iron, steel or brass. When they receive the discharge of fixtures on any floor above the first they must be extended in full calibre at least one foot above the roof coping, and well away from all shafts, windows, chimneys, or other ventilating openings. When less than four inches in diameter, they must be enlarged to four inches at a point not less than one foot below the roof surface by an increaser not less than nine (9) inches long.

No caps, cowls or bends shall be affixed to the top of such pipe.

In tenement-houses and lodging-houses wire baskets must be securely fastened into the opening of each pipe that is in an accessible position.

All pipes issuing from extensions or elsewhere, which would otherwise open within 30 feet of the window of any building, must be extended above the highest roof and well away from and above all windows.

The arrangement of all pipe lines must be as straight and direct as possible. Offsets will be permitted only when unavoidable.

Necessary offsets above the highest fixture branch must not be made at an angle of less than 45 degrees to the horizontal.

All pipe lines must be supported at the base on brick piers or by heavy iron hangers from the cellar ceiling beams and along the line by heavy iron hangers at intervals of not more than ten feet.

All pipes and traps should, where possible, be exposed to view. They should always be readily accessible for inspection and repairing.

No trap shall be placed at the foot of main soil and waste pipe lines.

The sizes of soil and waste pipes must be not less than those given in the following table:

Main soil pipe, 4 inches in diameter; main waste pipe, 2 inches in diameter; branch soil pipe, 4 inches in diameter; branch waste for laundry tubs, 2 inches in diameter; branch waste for kitchen sink, 2 inches in diameter; soil pipe for water-closets on five or more floors, 5 inches in diameter; waste pipes for kitchen sinks on five or more floors, 3 inches in diameter; main soil pipe for three family tenement-houses exceeding three stories, 4 inches in diameter.

In every building where there is a leader connected to the drain, if there are any plumbing fixtures, there must be at least one four (4) inch pipe extending above the roof for ventilation.

Soil and waste pipes must have proper Y branches for all fixture connections.

Branch soil and waste pipe must have a fall of at least one-quarter inch per foot. Short T Y branches will be permitted on vertical lines only. Long one-quarter bends and long T Y's are permitted. Short one-quarter bends and double hubs, short roof increasers and common offsets are prohibited.

All traps must be protected from syphonage and back pressure, and the drainage system ventilated by special lines of vent pipes.

All vent pipe lines and main branches must be of iron, steel or brass. They must be increased in diameter and extended above the roof as required for waste pipes. They may be connected with the adjoining soil or waste line well above the highest fixture, but this will not be permitted when there are fixtures on more than six floors.

All offsets must be made at an angle of not less than forty-five degrees to the horizontal, and all lines must be connected at the bottom with a soil or waste-pipe or the drain in such a manner as to prevent the accumulation of rust scale.

Branch vent pipes should be kept above the top of all connecting fixtures, to prevent the use of vent pipes as soil or waste pipes. They will not be permitted lower than the outlet of the highest fixture in the group. Branch vent pipes should be connected as near to the crown of the trap as possible.

The sizes of vent pipes throughout must not be less than the following:

For main vents and long branches, two inches in diameter; for water-closets on three or more floors, three inches in diameter; for other fixtures on less than seven floors, two inches in diameter; three-inch vent pipe will be permitted for less than nine stories; for more than eight and less than sixteen stories, four inches in diameter; for more than fifteen and less than twenty-two stories, five inches in diameter; for more than twenty-one stories, six inches in diameter; branch vents for traps larger than two inches, 2 inches in diameter; branch vents for traps two inches or less, one and one-half inches in diameter.

For fixtures other than water-closets and slop sinks and for more than eight (8) stories, vent pipes may be one (1) inch smaller than above stated.

No sheet metal, brick or other flue shall be used as a vent pipe.

Earthenware traps for water-closets and slop sinks, must be ventilated from the branch soil or waste pipe just below the trap, and this branch vent pipe must be so connected as to prevent obstruction, and no waste pipe connected between it and the fixture. Earthenware traps must have no vent horns.

Every fixture must be separately trapped by a water-sealing trap placed as close to the fixture outlet as possible.

A set of wash trays may connect with a single trap, or into the trap of an adjoining sink, provided both sink and tub-waste outlets are on the same side of the waste line, and the sink is nearest the line. When so connected the waste pipe from the wash trays must be branched in below the water seal.

The discharge from any fixture must not pass through more than one trap before reaching the house drain.

All traps must be well supported and set true with respect to their water levels.

All traps must have a water seal of at least one and one-half inches.

No masons, cesspool, bell, pot, bottle or D trap will be permitted, nor any form of trap that is not self-cleaning, nor that has interior chamber or mechanism, nor any trap, except earthenware ones that depend upon interior partitions for a seal.

All fixtures, other than water-closet and urinals must have strong metallic strainers or bars over the outlets to prevent obstruction of the waste-pipe.

All exposed or accessible traps, except water-closet traps, must have brass trap screws for cleaning the trap, placed on the inlet side, or below the water level.

Traps for water-closets must not be less than four inches in diameter; traps for slop sinks must not be less than two inches in diameter; traps for kitchen sinks must not be less than two inches in diameter; traps for wash trays must not be less than two inches in diameter; traps for urinals must not be less than two inches in diameter; traps for other fixtures must not be less than one and one-half inches in diameter.

Overflow pipes from fixtures must in all cases be connected on the inlet side of traps. All earthenware traps must have heavy brass floor plates soldered to the lead bends and bolted to the trap flange, and the joint made gas tight with red or white lead. The use of rubber washers for floor connections is prohibited.

Earthenware water-closets must be set on marble or slate in all new work, and when it is not impossible to use it because of water-pipes or other obstructions in all alterations of old work.

Safe and refrigerator waste-pipes must be of galvanized iron, and be not less than one (1) inch in diameter with lead branches of the same size with strainers over the inlets secured by a bar soldered to the lead branch.

Safe waste-pipes must not connect directly with any part of the plumbing system.

Safe waste-pipes must either discharge over an open, water supplied, publicly placed, ordinarily used sink, placed not more than three and one-half feet above the cellar floor, or they may discharge upon the cellar floor.

The safe waste-pipe from a refrigerator cannot discharge upon the ground or floor. It must discharge over an ordinary portable pan, or over some properly trapped water-supplied sink, as above.

The branches on vertical lines must be made by Y fittings and be carried up to the safe with as much pitch as possible.

Lead safes must be graded and neatly turned over bevel strips at their edges.

Where there is an offset on a refrigerator waste-pipe in the cellar, there must be cleanouts to control the horizontal part of the pipe.

In tenement-houses and lodging-houses the refrigerator waste-pipes must extend above the roof and must not be larger than one and one-half inches, nor the branches smaller than one and one-quarter inches. These branches must have full size accessible traps.

Refrigerator waste-pipes, except in tenement-houses, and all safe waste-pipes, must have brass flap valves at their lower ends.

Fixtures—In tenement-houses, lodging-houses, factories and workshops the water-closets must be set on marble, slate or tile and the back and ends of the water-closet apartment must be made water-proof with some similar non-absorbent material.

The closets must be set open and free from all inclosing woodwork.

Where water-closets will not support a rim seat, the seat must be supported on galvanized-iron legs, and a drip tray must be used.

The general water-closet accommodations for a tenement or lodging house cannot be placed in the cellar and no water-closet can be placed outside of the building.

In tenement-houses and lodging-houses there must be one water-closet on each floor, and when there is more than one family on a floor there will be one additional water-closet for every two additional families.

In lodging-houses where there are more than 15 persons on any floor there must be an additional water-closet on that floor for every 15 additional persons or fraction thereof.

In all other sewer-connected occupied buildings there must be at least one water-closet, and there must be additional closets so that there will never be more than 15 persons per closet.

In tenement-houses and lodging-houses the water closet and urinal apartments must have a window opening to the outer air, or to a ventilating shaft, not less than 10 square feet in area.

In all buildings the outside partition of such apartment must extend to the ceiling or be independently ceiled over, and these partitions must be airtight, except at the bottom of the door, which must be cut away or provided with openings to promote ventilation. The outside partitions must include a window opening to outer air on the lot whereon the building is situated, or some other approved means of ventilation must be provided. When necessary to properly light such apartments the upper part of the partitions must be made of glass. The interior partitions of such apartments must be dwarf partitions.

Pan, valve, plunger and other water-closets having an unventilated space, or whose walls are not thoroughly washed at each discharge, will not be permitted.

All water-closets must have earthenware flushing rim bowls. "Pipe wash" bowls or hoppers will not be permitted.

Long hoppers will not be permitted except where there is an exposure to frost.

Where water-closet or other fixture traps are of iron they must be porcelain lined.

Drip trays must be enameled on both sides and secured in place.

Water-closets and urinals must never be connected directly with or flushed from the water supply pipes.

Water-closets and urinals must be flushed from a separate cistern, the water from which is used for no other purpose.

The overflow of cisterns may discharge into the bowls of the closet, but in no case connect with any part of the drainage system.

Iron water-closet cisterns and automatic urinal cisterns are prohibited.

The copper lining of water-closet and urinal cisterns must be not lighter than ten (10) ounce copper.

Water-closet flush pipes must not be less than one and one-fourth inches and urinal flush pipes one (1) inch in diameter, and if of lead must not weigh less than two and one-half pounds and two pounds per lineal foot. Flush couplings must be of full size of the pipe.

Latrines' trough water-closets and similar appliances may be used only on written permit from the Superintendent of Buildings, and must be set and arranged as may be required by the terms of the permit.

All urinals must be constructed of materials impervious to moisture that will not corrode under the action of urine. The floor and walls of the urinal apartments must be lined with similar non-absorbent and non-corrosive material.

The platforms or treads of urinal stalls must never be connected independently to the plumbing system, nor can they be connected to any safe waste pipe.

Iron troughs or urinals must be enameled or galvanized. In tenement-houses and lodging-houses sinks must be entirely open on iron legs or brackets without any inclosing woodwork. Wooden and cement washtrubs are prohibited.

All water-closets and other plumbing fixtures must be provided with a sufficient supply of water for flushing, to keep them in a proper and cleanly condition.

When the water-pressure is not sufficient to supply freely and continuously all fixtures, a house-supply tank must be provided, of sufficient size to afford an ample supply of water to all fixtures at all times. Such tanks must be supplied from the pressure or by pumps, as may be necessary; when from the pressure ball-cocks must be provided.

If water-pressure is not sufficient to fill house-tank, power-pumps must be provided for filling them in tenement-houses, lodging-houses, factories and workshops.

Tanks must be covered so as to exclude dust, and must be so located as to prevent water contamination by gases and odors from plumbing fixtures.

House supply-tanks must be of wood or iron or of wood lined with tinned and planished copper.

House-tanks must be supported on iron beams.

The overflow pipe should discharge upon the roof where possible, and in such cases should be brought down to within six (6) inches of the roof, or it must be trapped and discharged over an open and water-supplied sink not in the same room, not over 3½ feet above the floor. In no case shall the overflow be connected with any part of the plumbing system.

Emptying-pipes for such tanks must be provided and be discharged in the manner required for overflow-pipes, and may be branched into overflow pipes.

No service-pipes or supplying-pipes should be run, and no tanks, flushing-cisterns or water-supplied fixtures should be placed where they will be exposed to frost.

Where so placed they shall be properly packed and boxed in such a manner as to prevent freezing and to the satisfaction of the plumbing inspector.

The entire plumbing and drainage system within the building must be tested by the plumber, in the presence of a plumbing inspector, under a water or air test, as directed. All pipes must remain uncovered in every part until they have successfully passed the test. The plumber must securely close all openings as directed by the inspector of plumbing. The use of wooden plugs for this purpose is prohibited.

The water test will be applied by closing the lower end of the main house drain and filling the pipes to the highest opening above the roof with water. If the drain or any part of the system is to be tested separately, there must be a head of water at least six (6) feet above all parts of the work so tested, and special provision must be made for including all joints and connections in at least one test.

The air test will be applied with a force-pump and mercury column under ten pounds pressure equal to 20 inches of mercury. The use of spring gauges is prohibited.

After the completion of the work, when the water has been turned on and the traps filled, the plumber must make a peppermint or smoke test in the presence of a plumbing inspector and as directed by him.

The material and labor for the tests must be furnished by the plumber. Where the peppermint test is used two ounces of oil of peppermint must be provided for each line up to five stories and basement in height, and for each additional five stories or fraction thereof one additional ounce of peppermint must be provided for each line.
