The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging West One Hundred and Ninety-third street, from Audubon avenue to Fort George avenue, and objections of Morgenthau Realty Company and Louis A. Cef, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, and of Henry Morgenthau, filed by Harry G. Smith, attorney, and applications for awards for damages, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of July 26, 1906.
