## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Monday, June 4, 1900, at two o'clock p. m. Present—The full Board.

A representative of the laborers employed by the Department appeared and protested against the reduction in the amount of wages received by them under the Eight Hour Law of 1899. Commissioner Meyer moved that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to what action the Board should take in the matter, the law stating that a uniform rate of wages should be paid for eight hours' work, upon which motion Commissioner Meyer voted in the affirmative, and Commissioners Cram and Murphy in the negative. The President then moved that the Engineer-in-Chief be directed to prepare a schedule of wages to be paid to laborers, classifying them with reference to the work performed, and to report said classification to the Board with the view of fixing the rate of wages for each class, which was adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief recommending that a shed be constructed on the new pier at the foot of Pike 41st, East river, was again tabled for one month.

The communication from the Board of Army Commissioners requesting a lease of the premises between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, westerly from First avenue to the post-headline in the Borough of Brooklyn, to be used as quarters for the Second Naval Battalion, was taken from the table, and together with the communication from the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, requesting that said application be granted, were placed on

file, and the Secretary directed to notify the Army Board that all the property east of the high-water mark thereof has been transferred to the Department of Finance, and that if permit is obtained from the Comptroller for the use of said land, the Board of Docks will grant permission for the use of the land under water in front thereof now under its jurisdiction.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

No. 19848. Submitting cost of repairing Pier, new 54, North river, where damaged by the ferry boat "Philadelphia," amounting to \$264.50, for collection from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

No. 20015. Submitting cost of repairing the extension now being constructed to Pier, new 41, North river, where damaged by the steamship "La Touraine," amounting to \$55.49, for collection from the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique.

The following communications were also referred to the Treasurer:

From George W. Beebe—Requesting permission to land the steamer "Belle Horton" at the Battery Landing and at the Pier foot of South Fifth street, Brooklyn.

From Joseph Levy—Requesting permission to sell steamer chairs on the new-made land between Forty and West Eleventh streets, North river.

From Al Foster—Requesting permission to berth the steamer "Angler" at the foot of Twenty-second street, East river.

From J. B. & J. M. Cornell—Requesting a lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 57 and 58, North river.

From James Vetch—Requesting the Board to reconsider its action in revoking his permit to maintain a boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Sixty-second street, North river.

The application from John J. Reilly for permission to use and occupy 125 feet of the north side of the Pier at the foot of West Fifty-first street, North river, with the privilege of maintaining ice bridge, billy-house and scales thereat was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Protective League of Salt Water Fishermen, to maintain a bulletin board at the Battery Landing.

Green & Fleming, to use and occupy berth for loading stone at the bulkhead between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-first streets, North river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master.

London Cementing Company, to use and occupy berth for loading stone at the bulkhead between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-first streets, North river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master.

August Olson, to maintain two floating bolls between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, East river, compensation therefor to be paid to the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Benjamin Gage, to run a water pipe through the bulkhead between Piers, old 57 and 48, North river, to the steamer "Win. V. Whelan," all payment to be taken up and relaid by the force of the Department at the cost and expense of the applicant.

Long Valley Railroad Company, to repair Pier, new 56, North river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Charles Stark and Market Company, to repair the Pier foot of West Fifty-ninth street, the work to be kept within existing lines.

T. A. S. Sheridan, to repair the dumping-board at the foot of West Ninety-sixth street, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Long Island Railroad Company, to repair Pier 48, East river, where damaged by its freight cars.

Seaboard and Southern Company, to drive beams and tender piles at the Pier foot of Forty-ninth street, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Young Men's Christian Association, to drive retaining piles for box-house at the foot of Bryan street, Borough of The Bronx.

Gas Engine and Tower Company and Charles T. Sealbury & Company, Consolidated, to fill in and reconstruct a retaining levee on the property of Mary and Lucy Christie adjoining their own property at Morris Heights, Harlem river, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended, the sum of said owners having been obtained.

Standard Oil Company, to dredge in the dip at the foot of North Tenth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Henry Day Building and Improvement Company, to construct a board walk at North Beach, Borough of The Bronx, in accordance with plans submitted.

Alexander M. White, to construct an extension to the existing shed on the Pier foot of Twenty-ninth street, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

Amos Young, to construct a jerry on his property at the foot of Twentieth avenue, Bath Beach, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans submitted.

S. N. Haxson, Esq., to repair the pier at New Brighton, Staten Island, and to drive spring piles and place girders and bolting thereat, the work to be kept within existing lines.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Corporation Counsel—Advising that the franchise to the Narrows Ferry Company for the ferry between Cliff street, Brooklyn, and Staten Island, granted by the County Judge of Kings County July 12, 1897, is valid, and that the City of New York cannot compel said company to obtain a new franchise therefor until the expiration of the term for which it was granted.

From the Department of Highways—Transmitting communication from William Garrison in relation to the condition of the pavement at the foot of North Moore street, North river. Secretary directed to state that the premises in question are within the lines of the area which should be repaired by the Department of Highways.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Anything that permits must be obtained by all cartmen employed in dumping refuse and other material at the dumping yards of said Department.

From the Manhattan Railway Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted May 11, 1900, agreeing to lease to said company the bulkhead to be built between Twenty-ninth and Seventy-fifth streets, East river.

On motion, the communication from the Corporation Counsel transmitting approved form of lease of said bulkhead was placed on file and the Commissioners authorized to execute said lease.

From Charles Hart—Accepting the terms and conditions of the permit granted May 25, 1900, to fill in between Eleventh and Nineteenth streets, Coney Island creek, Borough of Brooklyn.

From the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York—Stating that it will accept a ten years' lease of the ferry from Forty-second street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Broad way, Borough of Brooklyn, at an annual rental of \$10,000. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare a form of advertisement for the sale at public auction of the franchise of said ferry, the lease thereof to commence July 1, 1900.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted May 18, 1900, agreeing to lease to said company a shedded pier to be constructed at the foot of West Fifty-ninth street, North river.

From the Panama Railroad Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted April 27, 1900, granting permission for the assignment of the lease of Pier, new 57, North river. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare a form of lease and bond to be executed by said company.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting that crosswalks be laid across the new-made land leading to the ferry at the foot of Desbrosses street, North river. Secretary directed to state that the necessary crosswalks will be laid thereat.

From John A. Butler—In relation to the suspension of permit to use the dumping-board at the foot of Fourteenth street, East river.

From Frank Shelly—Requesting permission to run a water-pipe through the bulkhead at the foot of Forty-ninth street, North river. Application denied.

From the Consolidated Gas Company—Requesting a lease of the bulkheads to be built between Twentieth and Twenty-second streets, East river, with the privilege of erecting dumps and other structures thereon.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let to the Consolidated Gas Company of New York, all and singular, the wharfrage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of all that certain wharf property situated on the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, and known and described as follows, to wit: The bulkhead to be built in accordance with the new plan between the northerly side of East Twentieth street and the southerly side of East Twenty-first street and between the northerly side of East Twenty-first street and the southerly side of East Twenty-second street. The lease to be for a term of ten years from the date said bulkhead is completed and ready for occupancy, at an annual rental of five per centum on the cost of the improvement of the premises in question under the new plan



as shown on the books of the Department of Docks and Ferries, said cost to include the amount paid for the property acquired, the building of the bulkhead wall and marginal street, and all other expenses incidental to or connected with said work, said rental to be paid quarterly in advance to the treasurer of this Department. The said lessee shall have the right to erect and maintain, during the term of said lease, such derricks, hoists or other structures as may be required for the trans-shipment over, upon or under the said marginal street of supplies necessary for the carrying on of the business of the said Gas Company; and to place and maintain through the new bulkhead wall and under the said marginal street to the property of said company, such pipes as may be required in its business; and shall also have the right to erect and maintain a shed or sheds upon said marginal street, of such size and dimensions as shall be approved by the Board of Docks; all the work done by said company under this resolution to be done in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and under his direction and supervision. The work of filling in behind the bulkhead wall shall be done by this Department.

It is understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Consolidated Gas Company shall, within ten days after receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions hereof, and shall agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.
