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## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

### MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF MORRISANIA, TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the members of the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-second District, Borough of The Bronx, met in the office of the said President on Thursday, January 16, 1908, at 1 p. m., in the Municipal Building, Tremont avenue and Third avenue.

Present—President of the Borough of The Bronx, and Alderman Brown.

Matters Advertised for Public Hearing on This Date.

No. 8. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Concord avenue between One Hundred and Forty-seventh street (Dater street) and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street.

Petition signed by Daniel J. Dillon and three others, representing 559 feet frontage. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer as to the estimated cost of the proposed work, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment.

No. 9. Discontinuing on the final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, Edgewater road, from Tiffany street to the "Ship Basin."

Petition signed by Elizabeth de Talleyrand Perigord by L. J. Hunt, attorney in fact, and by Mary J. Rukote by L. J. Hunt, attorney in fact. Also a petition in favor signed by J. Samuel Pize, also a petition in favor by Geo. W. L. Curtis by A. G. Todd, attorney in fact. Also a petition in favor by East Bay Land and Improvement Company, by Charles H. Patrick, president.

No one appeared in opposition.

Mr. Chas. H. Patrick appeared in favor.

On motion duly seconded, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, on August 2, 1906, recommended to the favorable consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the extension to the bulkhead line of Bryant street, Faile street and Coster street; also the closing of Edgewater road from Coster street to Bryant street or the Ship Basin, also the widening of Coster street to 100 feet, and a public park within the boundaries of Coster street, Viele avenue, Tiffany street and the East River, and

Whereas, Under date of December 14, 1907, the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment reported in general on the laying out of public parks and acquiring title to the same, which report read in part as follows:

"Should the Board conclude to adopt the policy of treating proceedings for acquiring parks as assessable upon the property benefited, it would appear proper before considering such propositions, to require the presentation of a Local Board resolution providing for the purchase and without limitation as to the distribution of the expense. If this view is adopted I would recommend that the projects described in the accompanying list be referred to the Presidents of the interested boroughs, each to be withheld until such time as a Local Board resolution has been adopted for acquiring it;" and

Whereas, At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on the 20th day of December, 1907, the resolution adopted by the Local Board of Morris-

ania on August 2, 1906, and hereinbefore referred to, was referred back to the President of the Borough of The Bronx; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-second District, does hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the closing and discontinuance of Edgewater road, from Tiffany street to the "Ship Basin;" and be it further

Resolved, That this Local Board does hereby also recommend the extension of Bryant street, Faile street, Coster street, Manida street and Ryawa avenue to the bulkhead line of the East River; and be it further

Resolved, That the Local Board resolution adopted on August 2, 1906, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 3 (1906). Edgewater road, regulating, grading, etc., from Garrison avenue (Mohawk avenue) to Seneca avenue.

No title.

Damage map sent September 14, 1907.

Laid over awaiting report until February 13, 1908, 1 p. m.

No. 533 (1907). Paving with asphalt blocks on concrete foundation, Whittier street from Seneca avenue to Ludlow avenue, and setting curb where necessary.

Estimated cost, \$13,500; assessed value of real estate within probable area of assessment, \$24,440.

Laid over until January 30, 1908, for new report as to assessed valuation.

No. 670. Acquiring title to Faile street, between Aldus street and Garrison avenue. In Local Board on August 22, 1907.

Laid over several times awaiting communication from J. Cowden Meyers.

Laid over until February 13, 1908, and request petition from "Garrison avenue to Westchester avenue," which would then take in the entire length of street where title has not yet been acquired.

No. 701. Regulating, grading, etc., Longfellow avenue, from Lafayette avenue to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad.

Presented to Local Board September 26, 1907, and on October 31, 1907.

Estimated cost, \$32,000; assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$36,900.

Title vested January 14, 1906; ceded October 24, 1895.

Grades legally established.

Referred to Chief Engineer for further report as to assessed valuation, and laid over until January 30, 1908.

No. 763. Randall avenue, sewer, etc., between Tiffany street and Coster street.

Presented to Local Board December 5, 1907.

No. 773. Randall avenue sewer, etc., between Tiffany street and Manida street, and in Manida street between Randall avenue and Spofford avenue.

The above two works were embraced in one report of estimated cost by the Engineer in Charge of Sewers (report January 16, 1908), as follows:

Total estimated cost of sewers and appurtenances to be constructed in Randall avenue, between Tiffany street and Coster street; and in Manida street, between Randall avenue and Spofford avenue, \$19,500; assessed valuation of the real estate, with improvements, included within the probable area of assessment is \$135,200.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for constructing sewers and appurtenances in Randall avenue, between Tiffany street and Coster street; and in Manida street, between Randall avenue and Spofford avenue.

Unanimously adopted.

On motion, seconded, the Board adjourned.

Estimated cost, \$2,250; assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, \$121,750.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for paving with asphalt blocks One Hundred and Fifty-second street (Rose street), between Bergen avenue and Brook avenue.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 765. Fencing of premises on the northwest corner of East One Hundred and Eightieth street and Bryant avenue (old West Farms Presbyterian Cemetery).

Estimated cost, \$220; assessed value of real estate within area of assessment is \$31,000.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for the said improvement.

Adopted.

To be forwarded to the Chief Engineer of the Borough for execution.

No. 555. Regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Stebbins avenue and Rogers place.

President Haffen informed the Board that this title was wrong and that it should read "One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, from Hall place to Rogers place."

Engineers reported grade to be about 20 per cent.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
