Minutes of Meeting Held Tuesday, May 10, 1910.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting Held Monday, April 4, 1910.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Monday, April 4, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present—President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

The minutes of the meeting held March 28 were approved.

James P. Gill, of No. 550 Leonard street, Brooklyn, appeared before the Commission relative to the statements in his experience paper in the examination for Police Doorman and Prison Keeper. The matter was laid over in order to admit of the furnishing of proof as to the candidate's employment during the years 1904 and 1905.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved:

George H. Shaw, Assistant Engineer, \$1,800 per annum, from the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission to the Board of Water Supply.

William A. Sherry, from the position of Transitman, at \$1,500 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, to a similar position, at a salary of \$1,650 per annum, in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx.

John J. Burke, from the position of Bookkeeper, at \$1,350 per annum, in the Department of Finance, to a similar position, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, in the Fire Department.

Frank A. Magee, from the position of Stationary Engineer in the Department of Docks and Ferries to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Reinstatements, the following reinstatements were approved:

David Karmiehl, in the position of Laboratory Assistant in the Department of Health, he having resigned from a similar position, without fault or delinquency, on October 16, 1909.

Francis A. Bain, in the position of Clerk, second grade, in the Tenement House Department, he having resigned from that position, without fault or delinquency, on March 7, 1910.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Mr. Francis S. Foote, Jr., be and he hereby is appointed an Engineering Examiner in the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, for a temporary period, with compensation at the rate of \$10 a day while employed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Mr. W. E. Mallahan be and he hereby is appointed an Expert Examiner, to conduct the forthcoming examination for promotion to Foreman in the Fire Department, with compensation at the rate of \$10 a day while employed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list resulting from the examination for Telephone Operator (male), held on the 23d day of December, 1909, be and the same hereby is established as of March 28, 1910, the date on which the rating of the papers was completed.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 23, submitting a report of Mr. Leonhard F. Fuld, Examiner, relative to James W. Donahue, a candidate for Disinfecter, and recommending, in view of such report, that the name of Mr. Donahue be placed on the blacklist. The Secretary was directed to summon Mr. Donahue before the Commission, to show cause why his name should not be placed on the blacklist for a false statement as to experience.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 31, relative to the examination papers of Thomas J. Kelly and Thomas P. White, candidates for promotion to fourth grade Clerk in the Bureau of Street Openings, Law Department. The report stated that both candidates had been marked ineligible, for the reason that the seniority memorandum supplied for the purpose of rating gave as the date of their promotion to the third grade June 12, 1907, from which it appeared that they had been less than three years in the grade on October 1, 1909, but that the date given was an error, as the candidates had been actually promoted to the third grade on January 15, 1906.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the records of Thomas J. Kelly and Thomas P. White, candidates for promotion to fourth grade Clerk in the Bureau of Street Openings of the Law Department, be rated, in accordance with Rule IX., paragraph 5, since it appears that a manifest error was made in the records as originally submitted to the Examiners.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 25, relative to the request of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that an examination be held by which Mr. Timothy Fitzgerald, a Foreman Bricklayer, might qualify for promotion to the position of Inspector of Masonry Construction, and recommending that the examination be granted in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 10, to be open to all persons in the Department who had served at least one year in the position of Foreman Bricklayer. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 30, relative to the request of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that a promotion examination be held by which Mr. John X. Ruddy might qualify for promotion from second to third grade Clerk. The report stated that Mr. Ruddy had filed an application for examination, which was refused on the ground that he was not eligible through length of service; that this ruling was afterwards shown to have been a mistake, but that in the meantime the examination had been held.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the application of John X. Ruddy for promotion from second to third grade Clerk in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity having been refused through an error for which the Commission is responsible, the Secretary is hereby directed to proceed with a special examination for the candidate, in accordance with Rule VII., paragraph 11.

A report was presented from Mr. Leonhard F. Fuld, Examiner, dated March 30, relative to certain false statements made by Louis H. Schultz, of No. 1355 Avenue A, Manhattan, applicant for Disinfecter, in his experience paper. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to summon Mr. Schultz before the Commission at the next meeting to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list, under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated March 31, with further reference to his request for approval of the change of title of the persons employed as Collectors in his Department to Clerk, and stating that it was his desire to eliminate the title of Collector for the reason that the same no longer appeared in the Civil Service classification, and for the further reason that the Collectors, who were not performing work of a strictly clerical nature, were doing work which was mostly clerical. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the change of title of the following named persons from Collector to Clerk be and the same hereby is approved, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 5 of Rule VI., to take effect April 1:

Walter S. Graham, Max Drucker, John T. O'Brien, Thomas E. Reynolds, Bernard P. Gibney, James McCabe.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, dated March 30, stating that he had reconsidered the case of Fred W. Wellbrook, of No. 155 West Tenth street, Manhattan, who had been formerly employed in the Department as a Clerk, and dismissed on April 6, 1909, for absence for more than five days without leave, and reinstated the said employee, it appearing that his absence had been due to illness. The Secretary was directed to note the reinstatement on the records.

A letter was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated April 1, stating that he had ordered that all books and papers pertaining to the roll of merit be turned over to the Chief of the Department, with instructions to inaugurate a proper system for the keeping of efficiency records. The letter was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated March 29, transmitting a supplementary payroll for the salary of Martin Barrett, Messenger, at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, from January 1 to March 31, 1910. It appeared that Mr. Barrett's salary had been fixed at \$1,200 per annum, to take effect January 1, 1910, provision having been made in the salary schedule of the Department, as fixed by the Budget for such position, but that under the Civil Service Rules Mr. Barrett had been obliged to qualify through a promotion examination to become eligible. After consideration of the matter, the increase in salary was approved as of January 1, 1910, in order to conform to the Budget.

A letter was presented from the Secretary to the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, dated March 29, notifying the Commission of the reassignment of Edgar T. Stephenson, Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, who had been on leave of absence since October 18, 1909, on account of illness. The Secretary was directed to note the reassignment on the records.

A letter was presented from the Secretary to the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Manhattan, dated March 29, with further reference to the proposed change of title of Dennis M. Sullivan from Foreman to Axeman, and stating that from the date of his appointment, September 27, 1893, Mr. Sullivan had performed the duties of Axeman, in which branch of the service he was thoroughly competent. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the change of title of Dennis M. Sullivan from Foreman to Axeman be and the same hereby is approved, it appearing that Mr. Sullivan was appointed an Axeman in the Department of Public Works on September 27, 1893, since which time his duties have not changed.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated March 26, transmitting the application of Arthur J. Taylor, Assistant Engineer, for promotion from Grade C to Grade D. The letter stated that Mr. Taylor had been recently transferred from one part of the work to another, and through an oversight at headquarters notice of the examination had been sent to his former location, for which reason he had been unable to get his application in by the 25th inst. The application was accepted.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated April 1, designating Mr. William W. Peabody, Division Engineer, as a member of the Board of Promotion for that Department, to take effect April 1, 1910, vice Mr. Frank E. Winsor, Division Engineer. The designation was approved.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, dated March 30, requesting that the Commission's regulations be modified so as to allow Miss Helen L. McDonough and Miss Nell B. Hall, graduates of the Domestic School of Science in Canada, to compete in the forthcoming examination for Dietitian. The Secretary stated that but seven applications had been received for the examination, although the receipt of applications would close on the 5th inst. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to extend the receipt of applications for an additional period of two weeks, and on motion, it was

Resolved, That the requirement of citizenship be waived so far as it applies to the forthcoming examination for Dietitian.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII, Dr. J. E. McNicol, of West New Brighton, S. I., be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to serve as Veterinarian at the Farm Colony, Department of Public Charities, from time to time during the year 1910, as his services may be required; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed seven hundred and fifty dollars.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Tuesday, April 5, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present—President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed suspension of paragraph 3 of clause 12 of Rule XIX. of the Municipal Civil Service Rules (with the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission), so far as the same applied to the case of William J. Boves, who had been employed as a Laborer in the Bureau of Sewers, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, until October 7, 1908, when he was dropped from the payroll on account of serious illness contracted through the peculiar nature of his duties.

Mr. Edward F. Cadley, Chief Clerk, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. There being no opposition, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

Under date of April 16, 1910, your committee received a communication from the Board of Superintendents containing a resolution requesting the organization of an evening elementary school in Public School 44, Borough of Queens, for the season of 1910-1911, for the following reasons:

"There is need of an evening school in Rockaway Beach; pupils living here are required to go to Far Rockaway, Evening School 39, a distance too great for them.

"Public School 44 is situated between Public School 42, at Arverne, and Public School 43, at Rockaway Park, and should be selected as the evening school."

Approving the recommendations contained in the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That the Board of Superintendents recommends to the Committee on Special Schools that the sessions of the evening elementary schools, except as herein after stated, be closed after April 21 for the present season.

"Resolved, That the Board of Superintendents recommends that Evening School 22, Manhattan, at Stanton and Sheriff streets, be continued as a summer evening school from and after May 2 next, with an intermission of one week previously, as said week is 'Passover Week,' during which the attendance would be so small as not to warrant keeping the school open."

Transmitting the following copy of minutes to the family of Mr. Jennings:

The Board of Education learns with great regret that Mr. Charles J. Jennings, Principal of the Jamaica High School, died on the 23d of April, in the prime of life and in the midst of a successful service which has been greatly beneficial to the work of public education. He was graduated from Yale in 1884 and in the same year was appointed Principal of the High School at Huntington, Long Island, where he served until 1898, when he was made Supervising Principal of the Elementary Schools and of the High School Department in the Jamaica system. From that date until his death he remained in charge of the Jamaica High School as Principal, and his duties were performed with a high degree of disciplinary ability, scholarship and executive skill. His personal character greatly endeared him to those who were associated with him as instructors, students and neighbors, and his loss is a serious one to them and to the system of public education. The members of the Board extend their sincere sympathy to his immediate family, deploring the death at the height of his usefulness of one whose character and attainments entitled him to be ranked as an exemplary citizen and as one of our most efficient public servants.

Whereas, A communication has been received from the Local School Board of District No. 10 in reference to a complaint made by the Principal of Public School 33, Borough of Manhattan, that ball-playing is permitted on a portion of Chelsea Park, which is bounded by West Twenty-seventh and West Twenty-eighth streets and Ninth and Tenth avenues, on which block Public School 33 is situated; and

Sir—I have the honor to submit to you herewith, in accordance with the provisions of section 1544 of the Charter, a quarterly report of the proceedings and finances of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, from January 1 to March 31, 1910, inclusive.

Statement of Work Performed by the Department of Parks of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens During the Three Months from January 1 to March 31, 1910.

Owing to the long and severe winter, the work in the parks and upon parkways under the jurisdiction of this Department was necessarily confined during the first two months of the year to the maintenance of same and the removal of snow and ice from, and the sanding of paths, gutters and roads.

During the month of March, the weather permitting, the parks received the customary spring cleaning. The lawns were freed from the accumulation of leaves, and the fertilizer deposited thereon in the fall and winter was raked up and removed. Trees and shrubbery were pruned, cleaned and generally overhauled.

Preparations were made for extensive planting of both parks and parkways during the coming spring and summer seasons.

Bids for three thousand nine hundred and fifty-three (3,953) trees, and three thousand eight hundred and fifty (3,850) shrubs were received, and the nursery stock offered was, in most cases, inspected at the various nurseries by employees of this Department before the orders were placed. Large quantities of young trees were likewise purchased for our own nurseries in Forest Park. It is the intention of the Department to stock these nurseries with seedlings or small trees from time to time, so that the needs of the Department may in the course of a few years be supplied from this source, since it is becoming more difficult from year to year to secure suitable trees from the nurseries in the East.

The roadways of the various parks and parkways were thoroughly repaired, scraped and covered with a thin layer of fine gravel.

The golf links in Forest Park received the customary attention incidental to the preparation for the season's games.

The parade ground used for baseball, football and other outdoor games was likewise put in good condition.

Preparations were made to lay out a number of baseball diamonds in McCarren Park, and it is contemplated to erect a temporary building on this site for the accommodation of ball players and the general public.

The contractor for the work of extending the Bay Ridge parkway from Fourth to Fort Hamilton avenue is making satisfactory progress, and it is expected that this important work will be completed by mid-summer.

Late last fall a contract was awarded for the rebuilding of the Terrace Bridge in Prospect Park. Owing to original faulty construction, this bridge, in the course of the twenty years of its existence, became unsafe. The work of rebuilding the abutments and making general repairs to the same, is now nearly completed.

A contract was entered into in November of last year for the construction of a granite archway to carry First avenue over the Shore road, and the contractor will soon begin work.

The contractor for the resurfacing of the Speedway on the Ocean parkway with loam, has the work under way, and expects to finish within two weeks.

I regret to state that the contractor who is building the comfort station in Fulton Park, and the tennis house in Prospect Park, failed to carry out his contracts, and the one for the erection of the Fulton Park shelter was, upon the recommendation of the architects, declared abandoned. It is expected that the completion of the above shelter will be advertised during the month of April. The tennis shelter in Prospect Park is being completed by the creditors of the former contractor.

The McKibben street playground, work on which was started last fall, is rapidly nearing completion, and will open this spring.

The mechanical force of the Department was engaged in repairing and replenishing rolling stock, apparatus, building fences, etc., and is making good progress.

The usual Easter exhibit of flowers and flowering shrubs was had at the green-houses and was attended by large numbers of visitors.

Skating.

There were fourteen (14) days of skating during the quarter just ended. On January 5 the lake was opened, there being about seven inches of substantial ice. Large crowds enjoyed the sport each day.

The skating as above stated began on January 5, and the lake was opened to the public on the following days: January 10, 11, 12, 13; February 8, 9, 11, 13, 14, 15, 20, 25 and 26. On the last mentioned date a thaw set in and it was decided as a matter of safety to stop skating, which was done.

Care of Trees.

The work during the past quarter was confined largely to the parks. Most of the parks in Brooklyn, including Prospect Park, have been thoroughly gone over, and all necessary attention given. The class of work was more varied than ever before, necessitating much skillful detail. It included the removal of useless and dangerous trees, the treatment of disease, scraping and washing for chewing and sucking insects, careful trimming and the thinning out of trees where overcrowded.

Considerable attention was also bestowed on the street trees, both in Brooklyn and Queens.

The thirty thousand seedling trees in the Forest Park nursery, recently purchased, were root-pruned and transplanted, and fifty thousand others are now being planted for the purpose of filling in vacant areas in Prospect and other parks and parkways. A thorough canvass was made of the trees necessary and suitable for the various localities, and a list made up accordingly.

None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
