## Fire Department.

Summary of Report for the Year and Quarter Ending December 31, 1909. Headquarters, Fire Department, City of New York, 157 and 159 E. 67th st., Borough of Manhattan, March 15, 1910. Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor.

City of New York, City Hall, N. Y.: Sir-In compliance with the requirements of section 1544 of the amended Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith the annual report of the Fire Department for the year 1909, which includes that of the last quarter of said year.

Uniformed Force. On December 31, 1909, the uniformed force numbered 4,350 officers and men, an increase during the year of 106. There were in service on that date 172 engine companies, 73 hook and ladder companies and 8 hose wagons, a total of 253; also 4 water towers and 3 searchlight engines. On October 15, 1909, Hose Company No. 7, of the paid system, Jamaica, Borough of Queens, was disbanded and replaced by Engine Co. 175.

During the year 1909 there were 230 appointments in the uniformed force, 13 resignations, 18 dismissals, 17 reinstatements, 53 retirements on application, 31 for disability, 26 deaths of officers and men on the active list and 25 on the retired list.

The number of alarms responded to was 14,800, an increase of 507 over the total for 1908.

High Pressure Service. The success of the high pressure sys-

to justify the wisdom of its adoption. The system covers important business sections in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, and during the year 1909 was further extended at Coney Island.

Fireboats.

The fireboat fleet successfully protects the 153 miles of the City's water-front. There are ten of these boats, namely, "The New Yorker," "James Duane" and "Thomas Willett," berthed on the North River shore of Manhatan; the "William "Manhatan" and "Challes". L. Strong" and "George B. McClellan" on the East River shore; the "Abram S. Hewitt," "David A. Boody" and "Seth Low," on the Brooklyn shore of that river; the "Cornelius W. Lawrence" on the Harlem River, and the "Zophar Mills" at St. George, Staten Island.

Apparatus, Hose and Equipment. During the year 1909 there were received for use in the Borough of Manhattan one first size steam fire engine, two 65-foct and one 75-foot aerial hook and ladder trucks, eight first size hose wagons, three high-pressure service wagons and ten chief officers' wagons. There were received for the Borough of The Bronx two third size steam fire engines and two 65-foot aerial hook and ladder trucks, also one automobile roadster for the official use of the Deputy Chief of Department, assigned to that Borough. Four third size steam fire engines and ten chief officers' wagons were acquired for use in the Borough of Brooklyn. During the year 1908 the only apparatus procured were three high-pressure hose wagons for use in the Borough of Manhattan. During the year 1909, 71,960 feet of hose were purchased for use in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, as against 224,-200 feet during the preceding year. A considerable amount of repair work was made at the Repair Shops, Manhattan and Brocklyn.

Fires and Their Investigation. In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond the total number of fires was 8,132; estimated loss, \$5,388,-390; average loss per fire, \$662.61. There was a decrease, as compared with 1908, of 510 fires; \$809,503 in the amount of total loss, and of \$54.57 in the average loss per fire. There were 44 arrests in these Borcughs for arson and suspected incendiarism, and 8 pending from 1908, a total of 52. There were 7 convictions and 1 committal to an insane asylum. Of the remaining 44 cases, 22 of those arrested were discharged by magistrates, 9 acquitted by juries, one was discharged by the Court of Special Sessions, and the indictments against two prisoners were dismissed by the Court of General Sessions, leaving 10 cases pending at the close of the year. During the year 1908 the number of convictions was 39 and of acquit-

In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens the number of fires for 1909 was 4,309, as against 4,397 for 1908, a decrease of 90, with a total estimated loss of \$2,-043,245, as against \$3,063,185 for 1908, a decrease of \$1,019,940. The average loss per fire was \$474.18, as against \$696.65 for 1908, a decrease of \$222.47. There were 44 arrests in these Boroughs for arson or suspected incendiarism, which, with one pending from 1907 and 10 from 1908, made a total of 55 to be disposed of. There were 15 convictions and three committals to insane asylums. Of the remaining 37 cases, 7 were discharged by magistrates; in four cases the Grand Jury failed to indict, and in another the indictment was dismissed, and 25 indictments have been had and the cases now await trial. The large number of indictments awaiting trial is due to the crowded condition of the calendar of the County and Kempster B. Miller, submitted their Court, there being but two judges for the trial of civil and criminal actions in said Court. In 1908 the number of arrests was 65, of which 28 resulted in convictions.

Fire Prevention. During the year 1909 there were 2.483 inspections by the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances of office buildings, as against 2.053 for 1908. There were also 753 inspections at the request of the Police Department, and of the Bureau of Licenses, Mayor's office, in matter of applications for concert and common show licenses in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, as against 533 for 1908. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens 863 inspections of office buildings were made, as against 608 for 1908, and 648 inspections of concert and common show premises, as against 390 for 1908. The receipts for licenses, permits and penalties for 1909, Bureau of Combustibles, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, amounted to \$52,745.50. This was an increase of \$2,735 over the amount for the preceding year. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens the receipts were \$52,049.50, as against \$51,294 for 1908, an increase of \$755.50. Thirty thousand and twelve inspections, as against 28,967 for 1908, were made of premises to determine their fitness for the storage, sale and use of combustibles,

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment in 1906 authorized a bond issue appropriation of \$25,000 for report, and their plans and estimate of cost were transmitted by the Fire Commissioner to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 25, 1907, for the technical opinion of its Chief Engineer. The estimate called for an expenditure of \$2,680,000. The Chief Engineer approved the plans and estimate, but thought that certain additional subways required should be built at the expense of the Empire City Subway Company, Ltd., under the existing contract between it and the City. The Fire Commissioner inquired of the Corporation Counsel on December 8, 1908, whether it were practicable for an arrangement to this end to be made, but the head of the Law Department replied on April 28, 1909, that the company refused to assent and that he did not see how it could be compelled to do so under the then status of a litigation pending between the paring of the new system, should it ultisubways should be built by the company, or of \$2,680,000, if required to be built by the City. Sanitary Statistics. The report of the Board of Medical Officers shows that the number of cases of illness during 1909 in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was 1,072, and the time lost thereby 10,434 days. These figures show a decrease of 255 cases and 5,929 days, respectively. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens these totals were 494 and 6,007, respectively, showing decrease of 84 cases of illness and 3,563 days lost thereby. Volunteer System.

The Volunteer System in the Borough of Richmond consists of 13 companies, with a membership of 388, and in the Borough of Queens of 41, with a membership of 1,700. There was no further extension of the paid system into volunteer territory during the year 1909. Since consolidation in 1898, 44 volunteer companies have been disbanded in Richmond and 35 in Queens. These companies have been superseded respectively by 14 and 23 companies of the paid system.



#### CHANGES IN DEPARTMENTS, ETC.

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Merchants' Refrigerating Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be here-by introduced and entered in the minutes of this

Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Merchants' Refrigerating Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, em-bodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this day of
19, by and between The City of New York
(hereinafter called the City), party of the first
part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and
in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Merchants' Refrigerating Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain conduits with the necessary branches and extensions therefrom, leading directly into private property, for the sole purpose of supplying re-frigeration to consumers, provided that no conduit be of a greater outside diameter than twelve (12) inches, including insulation or other covering; the same to be constructed and operated only beneath the surface of such of the streets, avenues and highways situate within the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as are included within the districts bounded and described as follows:

District Number 1.

Bounded on the north by the centre line of Beach street; on the west by the centre line of Hudson street; on the south by the centre line of Franklin street, and on the east by the centre line of Varick street.

District Number 2.

Bounded on the north by the centre line of Harrison street, between Greenwich and Washington streets; on the west by an irregular line formed by the centre lines of Washington street and Jay street, the westerly line of West street and the centre lines of Duane street, Wash-ington street, Warren street and Greenwich street; on the south by the centre line of Murray street, between Greenwich street and West Broadway, and on the east by an irregular line formed by the centre line of West Broadway, the centre line of Hudson street, the centre line of Duane street, prolonged in a straight line to the centre line of Hudson street, and the centre line of Greenwich street.

Provided, however, that upon written appli-cation to the Board by the Company, the Board may, by resolution, extend the lines of either of the districts hereinabove described to all or any part of a district bounded and described as fol-

#### District Number 3.

Rounded on the north by the centre line of Hubert street; on the west by the westerly line of West street; on the south by the centre line of Murray street; on the east by an irregular line formed by the centre lines of West Broadway, Franklin street, Varick street, Beach street

and Hudson street. All of which districts being more particularly shown-Districts Numbers 1 and 2 by full red lines, and District Number 3 by dashed red lines on a map entitled

"Map showing districts applied for by the Merchants' Refrigerating Company to accompany petition dated January 27, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York. -signed by Frank A. Horne, Secretary, a copy of which is hereto annexed and made a part of this contract.

Should either of the districts known as District Number 1 and District Number 2 be extended as hereinbefore provided, then the terms and conditions of this contract shall apply to such extended districts.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be com-plied with by the Company:

First-The said right to construct, maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of

such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determina-tion of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach year before the expiration of the original term of nis contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall determined by three disinterested freeholders

selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract.

If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new working plan of construction to the said President rate shall be determined, and shall then make and to the said Commissioner, which shall include annual rate. The compensation and expenses appurtenances and the mode of protection of all of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by subsurface construction under the streets and

the City and the Company each paying one-half avenues in which the Company is hereby authorthereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following

sums of money:
(a) The sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) n cash within one (1) month after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and

(b) During the first term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than eight hundred dollars (\$800), and which shall be conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800).

During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

(c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents (\$0.25) for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or clusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor. All annual charges as above shall be paid into

the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following shall

bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for

the year ending December 31 next preceding.

(d) Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company and within one (1) month from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to the City the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500); said amount being due the City by reason of the unauthorized occupation of the streets by the Company or its predecessors.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

The annual charges or payments Thirdcontinue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for pay-ments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this

Fourth-Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, or within the districts hereinbefore

described. Fifth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions such agreement on or before the day one (1) of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or

consents. Sixth-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to his contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh-The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is

hereby authorized to operate. (b) During the first term of five years, an angranted shall not be in preference or in hindrance whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh-The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth-The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by highway, excepting, however, such conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300)

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch. A certificate showing that such a test has been

made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet; Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts:

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over. (b) Consumers making yearly contracts: Fifteen (15) cents per year per cubic foot of

the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be

reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within Districts Numbers 1 and 2, or if such districts be extended as hereinbefore provided, then within such extended districts, shall extend its conduits such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. The Company shall

Nineteenth-The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending De-cember 31 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report; and may examine its officers under oath. Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as

follows: The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the

Twenty-fourth-The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have

been given at the time of delivery or mailing.
Twenty-fifth—The words "streets or avenues"
and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City as title or over which the public has an easement," included in the districts hereinabove described, and under the surface of, or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct or maintain its conduits.

Twenty-sixth-If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein re-served to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this day of 19, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City). party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth: In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto

do hereby covenant and agree as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate two (2) additional tracks, together with the necessary bridge or viaduct therefor over and across Western avenue. Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, said tracks to be constructed immediately to the south of the present track of the Company crossing over and above such avenue, all as shown on a

map entitled:

"Map Showing Proposed Tracks Over and Across Western Avenue in the Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, City of New York. To Accompany Petition of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Co. To the Board of Estimate

and Apportionment."
—signed by Geo. H. Campbell, Vice-President, and Wm. B. Redgrave, Division Engineer, attached to this contract and made a part hereof. Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railroad tracks shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which

enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until October 28, 1934, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such

right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the tracks and bridge or viaduct herein authorized to

Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following man-

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inmiries and investigation, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined, shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and he Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second-The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following

sums of money:
(a) The sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) From the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor until October 28, 1914, the annual sum of one hundred and fifty dollars

(c) During the succeeding term of ten (10) the annual sum of two hundred dollars (\$200).

(d) During the last term of ten (10) years the annual sum of three hundred dollars (\$300). The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the

Mayor. All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that portion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third-The annual charges or payments herein provided for shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any railroad or railway company providing for payment for railroad or railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth-The consent hereby given shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of the said grantee, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, without the consent in writing of the City, acting by the Board, or its suc-

cessors in authority.

Fifth—Upon the termina ion of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then upon the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the street shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to the Company or any other company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract,

as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said street shall be restored to its original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall commence and com-plete the construction of the tracks and appurtenances herein authorized within three (3) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor; otherwise the rights herein granted

be constructed, and in addition shall pay the fol-

lowing:

(a) The cost of the protection of all surface

Eighth-Before the construction shall be begun

the Company shall obtain permits to do the work from the President of the Borough of Richmond and from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The Company shall perform all the duties which may be imposed upon it by these officials, as conditions of such permits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent with the provisions of this consent. The Company shall submit to these officials working plans, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said railroad tracks and the bridge or viaduct, and the mode of protection or changes in all subsurface structures required by the construction of the same. Ninth—The bridge or viaduct to be constructed under this contract shall, subject to the approval of the President of the Borough of Richmond, be constructed in a single span from house-line to house-line, and there shall not be any supporting columns erected in the street. Such viaduct or bridge shall have a vertical clearance of not less than sixteen (16) feet above the centre of the street, and shall have drip pans placed under the same for the entire width of the street. The said tracks and bridge or viaduct shall be constructed, maintained and operated at the expense of the Company, subject to the super-vision, control and inspection of the proper authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction over such matters under the Char-

ter of the City or by this contract.

Tenth—The Company shall be liable for all damages to persons or property, including the street and subsurface structures therein, by reason of the construction and operation or maintenance of said railroad tracks and appurtenances, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either person or property on account of this

Eleventh-Free and uninterrupted access to and passage over the street shall be maintained at all times, both during construction and thereafter, and no cars shall be allowed to stand said railroad tracks within the limits of said street.

Twelfth-This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly complied with.

Thirteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights hereby conferred, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the privileges hereby granted, and the proper construction, maintenance and operation of the structures hereby au-thorized, and in case of default in the perform-ance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal pro-ceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the other terms and conditions of this contract, the Company shall pay a penalty of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each day of violation.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants
