Complaints to the number of 305 were received and, upon investigation, were remedied, except in 239 instances where complaints were unfounded, and in 66 cases notices were issued. Passenger elevators to the number of 108 were investigated and 2 were found not to be in compliance with the law. The Building Bureau reports that during the quarter plans and specifications were filed to the number of 207 for 314 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$5,331,625. Of the number of applications received, 67 were for other than frame dwelling houses, to cost less than \$20,000 each, estimated at a total of \$385,100; 74 for frame dwellings, estimated at a total of \$320,600; 16 stores, at an estimated cost of less than \$15,000 each, to cost about \$96,600; 74 tenement houses, over \$15,000 each, to cost in the aggregate \$3,308,000, and 3 tenement houses, costing less than \$15,000 each, to be built for \$36,500. |

The total mileage of pavements in the Borough on December 31, 1911, was 143.998 miles, of which 0.282 miles were medina block, 39.383 miles granite block, 41.775 miles sheet asphalt, 56.243 miles asphalt block, 3.626 miles wood block, and 0.492 miles brick; 1.545 miles iron slag pavement, and 0.167 trap.

The total amount paved during the question ording December 31, 1011, was 3.185.

During the quarter ending December 31, 1911, 13,174.2 feet of vitrified pipe sewers from 12 inches to 30 inches in diameter, or 2.5 miles; 3,052.38 linear feet of concrete sewer 33 inches in diameter, to 13 feet by 8 inches double, or .58 miles, making a total of 16,226.58 linear feet built during the quarter, thus making the mileage of the sewerage system 304.237 miles; 33 basins were also built, which makes a total of 3,469 basins connected with the sewerage system.

During the quarter ending December 31, 1911, there were entered into 49 contracts, amounting to \$723,980.05.

There were 40 contracts completed during the quarter, to the amount of \$658,427.54, and work is going on in connection with 84 contracts, amounting to \$3,420,055.78, on which \$915,530.33 in payments have been made.

There are 3 contracts, representing an estimated cost of \$89,561.25, either executed or being advertised.

A total of 36 plans and specifications were prepared during the quarter for contract construction work, consisting of regulating, grading, paving, repaving, sewers and receiving basins. Thirty-nine assessment lists were prepared and forwarded to the Board of As-

sessors during the quarter. The work in the Division of Subsurface Records of the Bureau of Design consisted in locating existing subsurface structures, to the number of 1,074, and measur-

ing 297.010 linear feet of transit and offset lines. Permits for openings in streets to the number of 2,507 were issued, and 567 permits for openings other than streets; number of permits renewed, 937, and 24 were revoked.

The total number of contracts entered into during the quarter was 49, apportioned among the Bureaus as follows: Bureau of Highways, 36, \$523,039.55; Bureau of Sewers, 13, \$200,940.50.

The Topographical Bureau reports for the quarter the preparation of 6 rule maps for 10 streets, 6 damage maps for 10 streets, embracing 399 plots, covering 960,961.73 square feet, or 384.3846 city lots; 2 benefit maps, covering 177 plots, and 60 final damage and benefit maps.

The Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices expended \$4,319.41 on supplies furnished to the several public buildings of the Bureau for the quarter.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law, confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within three (3) months from the date of filing within three (3) months from the date of hing such consents or the date of such order; other-wise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; pro-vided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall

be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a

party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is here-by agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equip-ment, including rolling stock and railway appur-tenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board, within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, main-

tained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been ob-

tained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be operated by underground electric power substantially similar to the system of underground electric power now used by the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or by electric storage battery power; provided, that any other power may be used, except locomotive steam power, horse power or overhead electric power, which may be law-fully used, approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the

State of New York.

Twelfth—No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits underneath or along the side of the railway. When such conduits are constructed the Company shall provide two (2) conduits not less than three (3) inches in diameter each for the exclusive use of the City. The Company hereby agrees that such conduits shall be used only by the Company and the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform. in full uniform.

Fourteenth-No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said rail-

way.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and

wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by

at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes
both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keen the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, or either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part there-of, to clean an equivalent amount of street surfrom house line to house line.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited.
