DEAR SIR—In reply to your note, dated December 5, 1874, in reference to Commissioner Laimbeer's statement in his letter of resignation, as to finding Mr. Tweed at my house at a late hour on the evening of December 2d, permit me to state, that on the morning of that day I had taken Mr. Tweed to the City, in obedience to a writ issued by Judge Barrett. After this writ had been dismissed, I noticed that Mr. Tweed's feelings had become very much depressed, but knowing that for several days previously he had complained of not feeling well, complaining particularly of his head and throat, and to such an extent, that while in the city, I permitted him to call on his physician, Dr. Schirmer, who made an examination and prescribed for him—the prescription being purchased at a drug store, and used by him, while in the city, on that day. On arriving at the Penitentiary, on our return, and learning of the excitement that his presence in the city had caused, and after becoming aware that Commissioner Laimbeer had called at the prison, laboring under a great excitement, in company with President Bowen, in anticipation of finding that Mr. Tweed was not there, but had effected his escape, he became still more depressed and complaining. About seven P. M., or just previous to my leavwas not there, but had effected his escape, he be-came still more depressed and complaining. About seven P. M., or just previous to my leav-ing the prison for the night, I visited him, as I always made a practice of doing, before leaving for my house. I found him very much excited and complaining, saying that the room was too close— that he could not get air enough—constantly walk-ing the floor, and telling me that he might as well be dead as alive.

I talked with him a short time and left him. I talked with him a short time and left him. Fearing the possibility of an apopletic stroke, as often indicated to me by a former Chief of Staff, under a certain state of excitement and want of sufficient air, and for the circulation and driving the blood from the head, I particularly directed the Hall-keeper, Mr. McDonald, prior to Mr. Tweed's retiring for the night, to walk him from the prison to my house, as I wished to see what change, if any, this walk had produced. On Mr. Tweed's reaching the house with the keeper, I found him so much exhausted, and so weak, I asked him to come into the kitchen. After taking a gargle, which was part of the prescription which his physician had ordered, I gave him a cup of tea and some toast, knowing that he had not eaten a morsel since morning, and I was preparing to return with him and keeper to prison, when Commissioner Laimbeer rang the bell. He was invited into my parlor, but he preferred to remain outside. I then received a message that he was at the door desiring to see me. Upon my going out and after hidding him good evening, he said outside. I then received a message that he was at the door desiring to see me. Upon my going out and after bidding him good evening, he said to me, "Liscomb, where is Tweed?" I replied, "He is here." "Where?" "Here, in my house." "I want to see him." "Certainly, you can." Then I gave him a full statement of why he was at my house, which was precisely the same as I now give, but which, for some reason, does not appear in his letter of resignation. We left the house together, walked to the prison, and to Mr. Tweed's room. Taking a seat, Commissioner Laimbeer entered into a very friendly conver atton with Mr. Tweed, who also explained to the Commissioner about his trouble with his head and throat.

Leaving the room and going to the office, after which I walked with Mr. Laimbeer to Charity Hospital, where Mr. Thomas Acton was waiting for his return, I left them there, and returned to the Prison.

It appears from the tone of Commissioner Laimbeer's letter of resignation, that he was surprised to know that Tweed, being a prisoner, should be found at my house. Perhaps he is not aware that a number of prisoners are employed at my house daily, and do not see the inside of the Prison from 4 o'clock A. M. until night; who also take all their meals there, and from my own also take all their meals there, and from my own table, virtually serving out their term at my house, except only, that they sleep at the Prison; and I take this opportunity to state, that it is almost a daily occurrence, that prisoners working about the grounds in the vicinity of my house, becoming sick or exhausted, are often taken into my kitchen, and there refreshed by giving them a cup of tea and other nourishment. Common cup of tea and other nourishment. humanity dictates that to me; besides, I feel the responsibility of guarding their health, as well as their safe custody; and while I am desirous of strictly enforcing the rules and regulations adopted, and eager to carry out all instructions of your Honora-ble Board, I am somtimes compelled to exercise my discretion for the best interests of the institution.

roadway, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 57 cellars and basements, 33 waste pipes and drains, 103 privies and water closets, 29 street gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 1 piggery, 2 dangerous chimneys, 12 other nuisances, together with 78 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received the Inspectors was 478.

During the past week 60 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 86 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 86 houses, 86 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

35 cases of small-pox were removed to the ospital, and I dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits were granted to consignees of 46 ves to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

Eighty-three permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious disease were reported during the week ending December 5, 1874: Typhus fever, 4; typhoid fever, 14; scarlet fever, 58; measles, 2; diphtheria, 140; small-pox, 75; and cerebro-spinal 194 loads of night-soil were removed by the cavengers from the privy-vaults of the City.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as being unfit for human food: Cattle, I carcass; calves (bob), 25 carcasses; sheep, 2 carcasses; hogs, 30 carcasses; beef, 287 pounds; veal, 40 pounds; poultry, 357 pounds; and fish, 3,140 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending December 5, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 521 burial permits for city deaths, 23 for bodies in transitu, and 45 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 521 deaths, 203 marriages, 520 births, 45 still-births, 23 applications for transit permits, and 40 returns from Coroners. There were 21 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths; and I transcript of birth record, 6 of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau.

The last week in November was more favorable to life than any period since the last week in June. The total number of deaths in the seven days ending November 28 was 486, and the equivalent of the death-rate was 24-30 per 1,000 inhabitants an-nually. The last mortality occurred on the 26th,

when the total was only 50 deaths, and when only I person over 70 years of age, and 19 children under 5, died. Diphtheria was charged with 49 deaths, small-pox with 23, diarrhœal diseases with 11, bronchitis and pneumonia with 69, phthisis with 73, and the class of constitutional diseases, altogether, with 97 deaths.

In the succeeding week, ending on Saturday, December 5, there were 521 deaths reported, 126 of which were of the constitutional, and 163 of the zymotic classes respectively. The temperature last week was at 36.8 degreees Fahrenheit, and in the previous week at 40.4 degrees.

Diphtheria continues its unequal prevalence. In the central district of the city, between the Fourth and the Seventh avenues, from One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street to the Battery, and in all south of Broome street, this disease makes no mark as an epidemic; only two fatal cases have occurred in the entire district south of Canal, Mulberry, and James streets during the past three weeks; while in the region of the Twentieth Ward, in which it has been most widely distributed and fatal for the past sixteen months, its greatest fatality is still witnessed. But the diminished mortality by this disease is noticeable, and the precautionary measures and sanitary cleansing which the Board and its Inspectors are urging, will greatly diminish the fatality and hasten the extermination of this malady. It is a duty to the public health in every city and village, and every school and public institution in the State, to make known the precautionary measures for the prevention of destructive diseases. The full application of these precautions is everywhere required, and especially of vaccination and revaccinnation. The latter duty is most urgent in all the public charities and asylums in the State.
