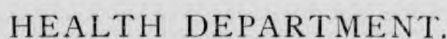

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of proceedings for the week ending March 10, 1877.

MEETING, WEDNESDAY, MARCH 7.

The following proposals for the delivery of 1,000 cubic yards of broken stone on the roads in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards were received and opened, the Comptroller being present, viz.:

The Superintendent of Parks reported that the gale of last week tore off a large portion of the tin covering of the roof of the centre platform on East River Park.

That to repair the damage will cost from \$125 to \$150.

That to remove the platform will cost from \$75 to \$100.

The Superintendent was directed to remove said platform, and to lay down the roadway which will pass over the place now occupied by it with gravel.

The operation of the preambles and resolutions adopted by the Board on the 18th October, 1876, notifying Messrs. James Hall and Michael O'Neill, contractors for regulating and grading Elton avenue, from Third avenue to Brook avenue, to discontinue all work on said avenue, was suspended until April 15, 1877.

The Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards was authorized to employ John Meehan as night watchman of the said steam roller when required, at twenty-three cents per hour, when employed.

The Treasurer was authorized to purchase screened gravel, of the kind approved by the Board, from such parties as he may select, for the use of the roads and walks of the park.

A petition protesting against the passage of a bill introduced in the Legislature authorizing the First Division of the National Guard of the State to use the lawns in Central Park, during certain portions of the year, as a parade ground, was presented, ordered engrossed, signed by the Commissioners and transmitted to the Legislature.

The Civil and Topographical Engineer was directed to perform the work of monumenting the district of the Twenty-fourth Ward west of Riverdale road, the map of which was adopted by the Board on the 28th ultimo, with the force now employed.

The Mayor, Comptroller, and residents of the district principally affected by the construction of the proposed bridge over Harlem river, at Madison avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, were requested to meet with the Commissioners of this Department on Saturday, the 10th inst., at 9:30 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of considering the question whether said bridge should be constructed at a height thirty feet above high water mark, or at a height of only about ten or twelve feet.

The communication of the Superintending Architect, submitting the preliminary study for a "Refreshment Pavilion" on the Battery Park, was called up, and the plan of said pavilion, as submitted by the Superintending Architect, approved and adopted.

The following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That Mr. John Mahoney be and hereby is notified and directed to complete the work of plastering the Museum of Natural History building, in accordance with the terms of his contract therefor, without further delay; and that, in case he does not proceed to do so on or before Monday, the 12th inst., that the Department will employ workmen and materials for the purpose, and will thereupon complete the work and deduct the expense thereof from the amount remaining due to said contractor on account of his said contract.

MEETING, SATURDAY, MARCH 10.

The opening of the proposals received for the construction of the iron bridge over Harlem river, at One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street and Madison avenue, was adjourned until 9:30 o'clock A. M., on Thursday, the 15th inst., at this office.

The meeting was then opened to the public, and the President announced to those present the time and place of such adjournment.

In response to invitations as directed at last meeting, the following-named persons attended for the purpose of considering the question of constructing the bridge at Madison avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, over the Harlem river, at a height of thirty feet, or at a height of ten or twelve feet above high water mark, viz.:

His Honor the Mayor, the Comptroller of the City, Hon. H. D. Purroy, President of the Board of Aldermen; Hon. S. H. Wales, President of the Dock Department; and the following, with other owners of property and residents: Joseph H. Goodwin, J. L. Mott, L. G. Morris, B. G. Arnold, Henry L. Morris, Thomas Rae, J. B. Devlin, J. J. Crane, H. A. Cram, Wm. Cauldwell, S. R. Filley, Alonzo Carr, Theodore H. Conkling, Henry P. McGowan, James Manchester, George P. Webster, and Walter S. Cowles.

The four last named gentlemen, as a committee from the "Citizens Tax Payers' Protective Union of the Twelfth Ward," presented a petition against the construction of any bridge across the Harlem river.

The following gentlemen then spoke in favor of constructing a high bridge, viz.: L. G. Morris, B. G. Arnold, J. J. Crane, Wm. Cauldwell, and Alonzo Carr.

Mr. J. L. Mott favored the construction of a low bridge, but said a rise of no more than about four feet to one hundred in the approaches to the bridge, would remove his objections to a high bridge.

Mr. Cram opposed the construction of any bridge.

The Mayor, the Comptroller and the other gentlemen present, then retired.

The President was then requested to obtain the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, as to whether this Department has the authority to construct the approaches to said bridge on both sides of the Harlem river.

The following laborers, heretofore employed in the Menagerie, were restored from March 1, 1877, viz.: Peter Shannon and Philip Holmes; and the following Division Gardeners and Gardeners were restored from date, viz.: Division Gardeners John Johnson, William Werner, and James Donally; Gardeners Conrad Doerner, George Kugler, E.
