Resolutions.

Resolved, That the Commission of the Dock Department be respectfully requested to permit this Board to occupy a portion of the pier between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, on the East river, according to the plan herewith presented.

Resolved, That all owners and occupants of premises be and are hereby directed to clean at least once a week and to keep clean at all times the street gutter beneath the bridges used by carts to cross the gutters in front of their premises.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer the sum of \$3,000 from the Fund for Small-pox Hospital and Contagious Diseases to a Fund for Fruit Inspection.

Resolved, That the temporary permit granted to James Brooks, foot of West Fifty-fifth street, to burn shell lime be revoked, it appearing to this Board that the proposed improvements in the method of conducting said business are ineffective.

Resolved, That a permit be and is hereby granted to the Police Department to deposit ashes and street dirt on the marsh lands situated on the westerly bank of the Harlem river on either side of the terminus of Eighth avenue, provided the same be entirely free from garbage.

Resolved, That the Police Department be and is hereby respectfully requested to arrest all persons found carrying bones into 47 Crosby street in violation of section 199 of the Sanitary Code.

Resolved, That the application of J. J. Connaughton for extension of time in which to comply with order on premises 68 West Thirty-ninth street be and is hereby denied, and the order be enforced.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to cancel the record of a still-birth of a female child of George and Lisette Mueger, on July 4, 1878, and to register the birth of a female child of said parents, born July 4, 1878; satisfactory evidence having been presented by the attending physician of his error.

The President presented a report from the Sanitary Architect, in respect to plans of tenement houses on file at the Department of Buildings, which was referred to the Sanitary Committee.

The Secretary was directed to notify Lombard & Ayres to appear at the next meeting of the Board, the Board deeming it necessary to take action in respect to complaints and reports in respect to their oil refinery at the foot of West Sixtieth street.

The President was authorized to make the necessary arrangements for the use of a telephone line by this Department, at an expense not to exceed \$375 for the erection of the line and \$200 per annum for the use of the telephones.

The Secretary was directed to invite Commissioner Adams of the Building Department to meet with this Board at its next meeting for conference in respect to the enforcement of the Tenement House Act so far as it relates to the erection and alteration of buildings.

Sanitary Bureau.

I have the honor to submit the following report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 13, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,681, as follows, viz.: 1 public buildings, 663 tenement houses, 162 private dwellings, 47 other dwellings, 23 manufactories and workshops, 21 stores and warehouses, 46 stables, 45 slaughter-houses, 17 fat-rendering establishments, 1 mill, 1 fat-house, 1 tripe house, 3 soap factories, 11 manure dumps, 6 lard-rendering establishments, 28 sunken and vacant lots, 2 public sewers, 2 lime kilns, 6 docks, 1 garbage dump, 1 oil works, 1 foundry, 56 yards, courts, and areas, 47 cellars and basements, 115 waste pipes and drains, 207 privies and water closets, 54 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 8 cesspools, 3 piggeries, 26 other nuisances, together with 70 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 787.

During the past week 264 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 84 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

161 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 24 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 24 houses, 24 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 1,880 privies, 76 yards, courts, and areas, 106 cellars, 34 garbage boxes, and 62¾ miles of street gutters.

741 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 13, 1878. This is an increase of 76 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 90 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending July 6, was 671, as follows:

This represents an annual death-rate of 32.20 in every 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,083,565.

The mortality for the week compared with that of the week previous showed an increase of 32 deaths of children under 1, 46 under 2, and 49 under 5 years, and an increase of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases of 97. The mortality in tenement houses increased 45; in houses containing 3 families and less, 15; and in institutions, 7. A comparison of the mortality reported for the past four weeks is as follows:

The deaths of children under five years of age during the week was 449, of this number 273 were in tenement-houses, and 23 in institutions. The principal increase in the deaths of children during the week was among those of German parentage, the increase in the number of deaths of children who had German fathers was 39 and German mothers, 47, while the increase in the deaths of Irish fathers was 4, and there was a decrease of 8 of Irish mothers, the increase of the deaths of children whose fathers were born in the United States was but 1, while those whose mothers were born in the United States increased 4, the increase of those whose fathers were born in England was 4, while of the mothers born in England it was 8. Compared with the preceding week diphtheria increased 5, whooping cough, 2; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fever, 7; alcoholism, 3; pneumonia, 4; heart disease, 1; aneurism, 3; marasmus and scrofula, 5; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; suicide 4, and drowning, 5; while measles decreased 2; scarlatina, 10; cancer, 5; erysipelas, 3; puerperal diseases, 7; inanition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 2; bronchitis, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 7.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 91 were in institutions, 412 in tenement-houses, 212 in houses containing 3 families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 22 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 158 on the first, 200 on the second, 163 on the third, 69 on the fourth, 28 on the fifth; 739 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents; 88 were stated to be single, 108 married, 59 widowed, and the condition of 486 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 725 deaths and still-births, or 91.65 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 17; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 312; City (Pauper burial ground, undenominational), 91; Greenwood (undenominational), 35; Lutheran (undenominational), 121; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 28; Evergreen (undenominational), 53; Woodlawn (undenominational), 22; St. Michaels (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 8; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 1; St. Raymond's, (Roman Catholic), 8; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending July 6, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 11; Second, 2; Third, 4; Fourth, 16; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 17; Seventh, 27; Eighth, 22; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 34; Eleventh, 42; Twelfth, 50; Thirteenth, 26; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 26; Seventeenth, 44; Eighteenth, 31; Nineteenth, 88; Twentieth, 62; Twenty-first, 36; Twenty-second, 65; Twenty-third, 8; Twenty-fourth, 6.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 13, was 77.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.926, the mean humidity was 70, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 726, and the total amount of rain-fall was 2.74 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

During the week ending July 13, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 741 burial permits for city deaths, 34 for bodies in transit, and 52 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 741 deaths, 150 marriages, 480 births, 52 still-births, 34 applications for transit permits, and 98 returns from coroners. There were 30 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth-record, 5 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau.
