

SIR—In the matter of Public Parks : SIR—In the matter of the application of the President of the Department of Public Parks for the gratuitous removal by the Board of Police of the refuse and dirt collected from the avenues and streets in the public parks, I beg to submit the following : The creating statute (chapter 771, Laws 1857) conferred, in plenary iterms, upon the Board of Commissioners of Central Park "the exclusive control and management" of the Central Park, with "all the power and authority" then possessed by the Common Council in respect to the public Squares and places, and which, like the streets, were then cleaned under contract with the Common Council. These "full and evaluation powers" with the

Council. These "full and exclusive powers," with their correlative duties, were affirmed and continued without abridgment, so far as the present question is concerned, by subsequent acts, to the Central Park Commission and to its several successors. They were expressly devolved upon the Department of Public Parks by the present Charter (§ 83, chap. 335, Laws 1873). To meet the expenses requisite "for the maintenance and government" of the public parks, extended provisions have been made in repeated legislative acts, wherein certain discretionary powers are charged upon the fiscal authorities of the municipality. The like is true respecting the Police Department. It is a presumption, both natural and legal, that as well the municipal fiscal authorities as the Legislature have acted with just regard to the respective requirements of the Department of Public Parks and of the Police Depart-ment, apportioning the public money to be expended by each, with a strict consideration for their several necessities. several necessities

several necessities. In view of these circumstances, it appears conclusive, that if the Department of Public Parks be relieved of any of its duties by the Police Department, the latter is entitled to reimbursement for an additional outlay incurred thereby. I am, therefore, respectfully, of opinion, that the above-mentioned application of the President of the Department of Public Parks should not be complied with. I am, sir, your obedient servant, CHS. 
