BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, January 26, 1894. }

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 P.M., at the office of the Mayor.
Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works and Colonel William Seward.

The minutes of a meeting held January 4, 1894, were read and approved.
A lien for the sum of \$8,829.21 was filed by M. Flaherty & Son, on the money payable on contract for work done by P. Gallagher, on the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, and the Secretary requested to notify the Comptroller of the same.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented the forms of contracts and specifications, and drawings prepared by the Clerk of the Works, under the resolution of the Armory Board of November 8, 1893, for the work required to finish and furnish ready for occupancy the armory building for the Seventy-first Regiment and Second Battery, N. G., S. N. Y., and recommended that the work be done under five separate contracts for different kinds of work and material at public letting and stated the cost had been estimated at \$65,000, and offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the forms of specifications for contracts for the completion of the armory at Thirty-fourth street and Park avenue, as this day submitted by the Clerk of the Works, be and the same are hereby approved, and that the Secretary be directed to have the contracts for the same prepared, and, after approval of form by the Corporation Counsel, that advertisements be inserted in the CITY RECORD, inviting proposals for doing the work.

Which was adopted by the following vote:
Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works and Colonel William Seward.

Resolved, That the sum of sixty-five thousand (65,000) dollars be and the same is hereby deemed necessary and appropriated, for the payment for work and materials necessary in the armory building to be occupied and used by the Seventy-first Regiment, Second Battery, Brigade Headquarters and quarters for the Signal Corps, at Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets and Park avenue, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be respectfully requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:
Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works and Colonel William Seward.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments stated that the owner of the premises now occupied by the First Battery had consented to a renewal of the lease of the same, for the same rental and on the same terms as heretofore, for a term of three years, and offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That, with the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller be requested to renew for three years the lease of the premises now occupied by the First Battery, N. G., S. N. Y., located at Nos. 334 to 340 West Forty-fifth street, and owned by Catharine Schmuck, at an annual rental of \$2,750.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments stated that he had written to the executor of the estate of Paran Stevens, in reference to the renewal of the lease of the premises now occupied by the Ninth Regiment, but, as yet, had no reply. The matter was laid over until the next meeting.

A communication was received from the Superintendent of the Building Department in reference to the asphalt of the walls of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory. The Architect and Contractor appeared before the Board in reference to the same. Debate was had thereon, when, on motion of the Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments was requested to communicate with the Corporation Counsel, in view of the communications from the Contractor and Superintendent of the Building Department, as to the liability of the Architect or Contractor, and as to the proper action for this Board to take.

Captain Wilson of the First Battery appeared and made objection to the proposed arrangement for the removal of ashes in the Seventy-first Regiment Armory through the Battery Drill-room. The Architect appeared and debate was had thereon, when the matter was referred to the Clerk of the Works for examination and report.

On motion, adjourned.

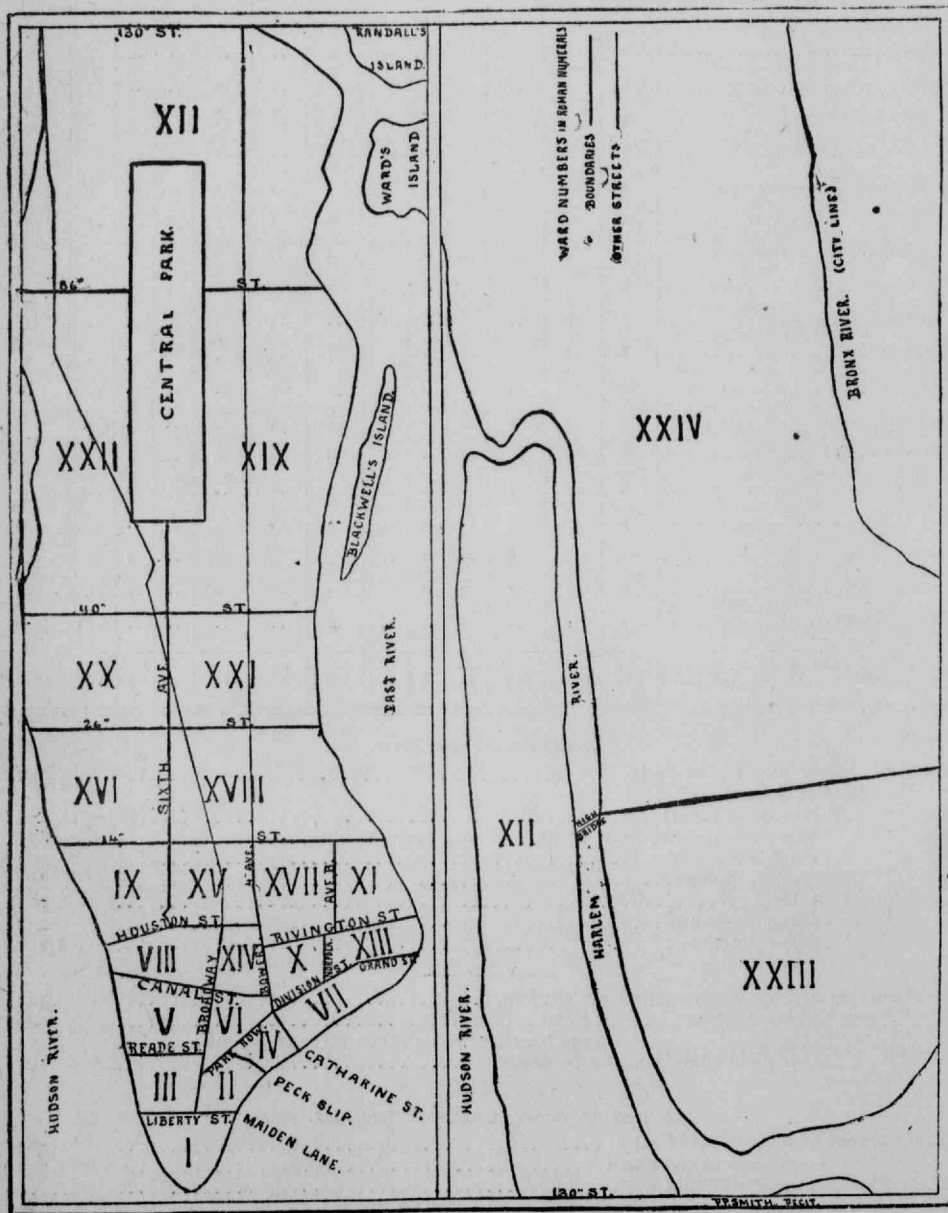

The 878 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.79 against 22.34 for the previous week, and 23.56 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a very great increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 210, 392, 106, 8 and 11 against 187, 292, 117, 8 and 14 for the previous week, a total of 727 against 618. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Ninth, Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventeenth Ward. The increase of measles was most marked in the Twelfth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards, i. e., above Twenty-sixth street, and the decrease in the Seventh, Fifteenth, Sixteenth and Seventeenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Seventeenth, Twentieth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth, Eleventh, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. The 8 cases of typhoid fever were well scattered throughout the City. Nine of the 11 cases of small-pox were above Fortieth street, and the remaining 2 were below Canal street.

The 878 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.79 against 22.34 for the previous week, and 23.56 for the corresponding week of 1893.

The increase of 54 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 4 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 6 from measles, of 5 from heart diseases, of 16 from diseases of the respiratory organs, and of 14 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, while the deaths from scarlet fever were pretty well scattered throughout the city.

By a concurrent vote of the three officers, the Supervisor was instructed to procure by direct order, that is, without contract let after advertisement, the articles called for by the requisitions allowed, that course being deemed to be for the best interests of the City.

The Supervisor of the City Record reported that he had inquired into the cost of the books asked for by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, and had found it would be about \$400, as all the books were very big, and with great differences in printing, ruling, etc. On motion of the Mayor the matter was laid over.

The Supervisor of the City Record presented a request from the Commissioner of Street Improvements for authority to advertise, twice a week for three successive weeks, in two daily newspapers, a notice of a hearing respecting a contemplated change and revision of maps, etc., of

the areas bounded by East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, Marion avenue, Bainbridge avenue, Suburban street, and the New York and Harlem Railroad, etc. On motion of the Mayor, and by a concurrent vote of the three officers, the authority was granted, and the "Sun" and "Daily News" were designated as the newspapers in which the advertisement should be published.

The Supervisor of the City Record stated that the special purpose of the meeting was to open bids for stationery. He said that he had received half the preliminary security on a bid from the L. W. Ahrens Stationery and Printing Company, the Manhattan Supply Company, Ferdinand Hayman, and Charles Dougherty. The estimate box was then opened and the bids of the persons and firms named were taken from it. After they were read they were referred to the Supervisor for tabulation. The bid of Ferdinand Hayman was declared informal, because one of the sureties proposed did not sign an affidavit as to his financial standing.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such

covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
