And Whereas, It has been found that between the time the paid vouchers and requisition for a further draft are sent to the Finance Department a week or more elapses before a further draft is received, and in consequence the Chief Clerk of the Law Department is required to advance large sums from his own personal resources; therefore

Resolved, That the aforesaid resolution be amended as follows:

That, for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Law Department, office of the Corporation Counsel, the Corporation Counsel may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars. The Corporation Counsel may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for the supplies and contingencies of the Law Department, office of the Corporation Counsel, but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Corporation Counsel, covering the expenditure of money paid thereon.

Provided, however, that upon the receipt of vouchers showing the payment of moneys upon the said draft, to the extent of five hundred dollars, the Comptroller may draw his warrant to the order of the Corporation Counsel for the sum of five hundred dollars in part disbursement of the advance of one thousand dollars.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
