MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of a Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Wednesday, Oct. 31, 1917, at 10 A. M.

Present—Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. Commissioner James presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class under the heading "Court of Special Sessions," the following: Clerk of the Children's Court, Manhattan; Deputy Clerk of the Children's Court, Manhattan; Clerk of the Children's Court, The Bronx; Deputy Clerk of the Children's Court, The Bronx; Clerk of the Children's Court, Brooklyn; Deputy Clerk of the Children's Court, Brooklyn; Clerk of the Children's Court, Queens; Clerk of the Children's Court, Richmond. Adolphus Ragan, Chief Clerk of the Children's Court, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. George T. Keyes, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also addressed the Commission. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and, on motion, the matter of the foregoing amendment was laid over.

F. M. Fiske, Third Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, and Alfred E. Shipley, Secretary of the Department of Health, appeared relative to the action of the Commission in ordering that the payrolls of all employees of the City who are not citizens of the United States be not certified in accordance with the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the matter of Hellyer vs. Prendergast. In this connection the Commission considered a communication dated Oct. 27, from the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities. The Secretary was instructed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Commission as to whether it could legally certify the payrolls of non-citizens employed in the Department of Public Charities, Department of Health and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

James McGinley, Chief of Staff, Office of the Commissioner of Accounts, appeared in connection with his requests under date of Oct. 26, 29 and 30 for authority to employ Louis F. Rebori as a special investigator in connection with the milk investigation by the Mayor's Committee on Milk, under the provisions of Clause 6 of Rule XII; Herbert B. Hawkins as expert on milk production and distribution, under the provisions of Clause 8 of Rule XII; and the Inventories Computing Company, Incorporated, in connection with the analyses and accounting work performed by the Office of the Commissioner of Accounts in cooperation with the Mayor's Committee on Milk, under the provisions of Clause 8 of Rule XII.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of Clause 6a of Rule XII of the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Louis F. Rebori, 409 E. 136th st., be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to be employed in the Office of the Commissioner of Accounts as a special investigator in connection with the milk investigation by the Mayor's Committee on Milk, for a period of one year with compensation at the rate of \$8 a day; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$750.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of Clause 8 of Rule XII of the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Herbert B. Hawkins, 198 Broadway, Manhattan, be and he hereby is excepted from examination to be employed in the Office of the Commissioner of Accounts as an expert on milk production and distribution, with compensation at the rate of \$50 a day.



Beginning at a point on the bulkhead line of the East River where it is intersected by a line midway between Steinway avenue and Theodore street, running thence southeastwardly along the said bulkhead line to the intersection with a line midway between Theodore street and 13th avenue; thence southwestwardly along the said line midway between Theodore street and 15th avenue to the intersection with the center line of Berrian avenue; thence northwestwardly along the center line of Berrian avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Theodore street and 11th avenue; thence northeastwardly along the said line midway between Theodore street and 11th avenue and along the prolongations of the said line to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Astoria avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Astoria avenue; thence westwardly along the said line parallel with Astoria avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Theodore street and 11th avenue; thence northeastwardly along the said line midway between Steinway avenue and Theodore street, to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth.—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit, together with the damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of the City of New York, in the Municipal Building, Court House Square, in the Borough of Queens, in said City, there to remain until the 14th day of January, 1918.

Fifth.—In case, however, objections are filed to any of said abstracts of estimate and assessment, the notice of motion to confirm our supplemental and amended final report herein will stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified, and of which notice will be given to all those who have theretofore appeared in this proceeding, as well as by publication in the "City Record" pursuant to Sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walls, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furlings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.
