

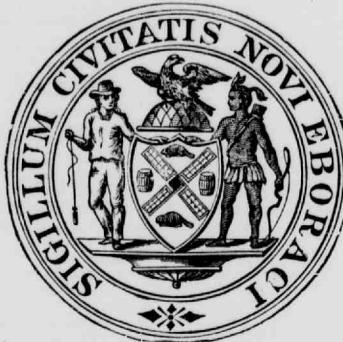

Hon. SMITH ELY, Jr., *Mayor of the City of New York*:

SIR—In compliance with section 27 of the Charter, I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Public Works for the quarter ending March 31, 1877.

The financial statements "A" and "B," hereto annexed, show in detail the expenditures of the Department, and the condition of its appropriations.

The reports of the several Bureaus, which are also appended, give an account of their respective operations and expenditures.

The expenditures for the first quarter cannot be taken as a standard for the whole year, out-door work being prosecuted to a limited extent only during the winter season; but a comparison of expenditures for corresponding quarters for several years is proper, as the partial suspension of out-door work recurs with every winter, and varies in extent only according to the severity of the season, or the exercise of the discretion vested in the Department.

During a great part of the past quarter the temperature was sufficiently high to permit the prosecution of masonry and other work which cannot be carried on properly in very cold weather; but the previous severe cold, and the large quantity, had reduced the ground to such condition that it was deemed prudent to await the permanent opening of spring before resuming work on pavements, sewers, water-pipes, and embankments, and to permit only rock and earth excavation to be continued, together with the necessary labor for the care of the improvements and property under the control of the Department.

CROTON WATER SUPPLY.

Progress on the new Storage Reservoir has necessarily been slow, but the contractors have been notified that the work must be completed by the close of the present year, and all possible means will be used to accomplish such result.

The surveys for sites for additional storage reservoirs, and to determine accurately the area and capacity of the natural lakes in the Croton basin, are still in progress.

The total rain-fall for the quarter at the reservoir at Boyd's Corners was 11 14-100 inches, being 1 52-100 inches less than for the first quarter of last year.

In consequence of the freezing of the streams in December last, the draft on the reservoir and lakes was continued until January 8, since which time the natural flow of the Croton river has been far above the capacity of the aqueduct.

A total of 134,000,000 gallons of water was drawn from the reservoir and lakes from the 1st to the 8th of January. Since that time the reservoir, lakes, and ponds have rapidly refilled, so that at the present time they are fully or nearly up to high-water mark.

In making repairs on the line of the aqueduct, 100 rods of new fence have been constructed, 480 cubic yards of retaining wall rebuilt, 100 cubic yards rock excavated, and 200 cubic yards of embankment put in to protect the structure.

The repairs to the old pumping engine at Highbridge have been completed, and it is now in operation in conjunction with the new engine.

During the quarter there were laid—

Preparations have been made for the purchase of pipes and special castings to continue the 48-inch main on First avenue to the lower part of the city, and to prosecute the laying of smaller mains now under contract.

Satisfactory progress has been made in the inspection of houses to detect waste of Croton water. Up to the end of the quarter the Inspectors had visited 42,169 houses, and had found 6,068 cases where waste occurred from defective plumbing or willful negligence.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS AND REPAIRS.

As above stated, this class of work has been generally suspended during the quarter, excepting the excavations on a few regulating and grading and sewer contracts, the necessary work to maintain the Boulevard roadways, the repairing and cleaning of sewers and basins, and some indispensable repairs to pavements.

Every preparation has been made to make the best possible use of the appropriations for repaving and repairs of pavements.

On the 15th of March I certified to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the Law of 1875,

that the following streets required repaving, to be paid out of the appropriation of \$200,000, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for that purpose:

West Broadway, from Chambers to Canal street.
College place, from Chambers to Barclay street.
Ferry street, from Gold street to Peck slip.
Spruce street, from Nassau to Gold street.
John street, from Broadway to Water street.
Warren street, from Broadway to West street.
Maiden lane, from Broadway to South street.
Nassau street, from Spruce to Wall street.
Franklin street, from West Broadway to Centre street.
Dey street, from Broadway to West street.
Cortlandt street, from Broadway to West street.
Wall street, from William to Hanover street.
Liberty street, from Maiden lane to West street.
Rector street, from Broadway to West street.
Washington street, from Battery place to Liberty street.
Pearl street, from Coenties slip to Fulton street.

For all of these streets I approved of and recommended the granite-block pavement, except for Washington and Pearl streets, which I recommended to be paved with trap-blocks.

The specifications for those pavements have been somewhat altered from the usual form, so as to secure a substantial and durable pavement, adapted for the heavy traffic which passes through these streets, which, as will be observed, are all-important commercial thoroughfares in the lower part of the city.

Ample time is thus afforded for the necessary preliminary measures, consisting of the affirmative action of the Board of Aldermen, the approval of the Mayor, advertising for proposals, opening bids and awarding contracts, approval of sureties, and signing of contracts, so that, if no delay is incurred, this necessary work can be under way early in the summer.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

The question of lighting the public lamps for the present year, which, as mentioned in my last report, had presented a serious difficulty in the advance of the prices asked by the gas companies at the letting, in December last, has come to a satisfactory conclusion.

In December the New York, Manhattan, Metropolitan, and New York Mutual Gas-light Companies each asked or bid \$36 per lamp for the year 1877.

At the letting, on the 5th of March, for the nine months ending December 31, these companies bid as follows:

The New York.....	\$12 40 per lamp for nine months.
The Manhattan.....	12 40 "
The Metropolitan.....	21 00 "
The New York Mutual.....	22 25 "

The Harlem Gas-light Company bid at the same rate as in December last, being about \$2.60 per lamp less than the rate paid to it for 1876.

A proposal was also received from the New York and New Jersey Globe Gas-light Company for lighting two thousand lamps in the Harlem Company's district, at the rate of \$20 per lamp for the nine months, or \$4.75 per lamp less than the bid of the Harlem Company, and this bid was accepted. The illuminating material furnished by this new company is gas generated from naphtha, and in my next report I will be able to state to you how far it answers the purpose of lighting the streets.

With this exception, the bids of the old companies were accepted.

Under the contracts thus made for the year 1876—for the three months ending March 31, and for the nine months ending December 31—there will be a reduction in the cost of lighting the public lamps, as follows:

On the 1st of January ult., the official term of the Commissioners for the erection of the Third District Court-house expired, and it became the duty of this Department to assume charge of the building. Work for its completion was then, and is still, in progress under several contracts.

The Department was advised by the Counsel to the Corporation, that without additional legislation, it had no control of the balance of the fund appropriated by law for the erection of the building, but that it was proper to assume the supervision of the work, and to permit or require the completion of existing contracts.

On the 21st of March an act was passed by the Legislature, conferring upon the Department the necessary power to complete the building. It will be ready on or about the first of May for occupancy by the Third District Civil Court and the Second District Police Court, for which it was designed.

Attention has been given to the various other duties of the Department, with regard to the care of public buildings and property, the supplying and cleaning of public offices, the removal of obstructions in the streets, and other matters coming under the jurisdiction of the Department.

A short time since my attention was called by Comptroller Kelly to the question whether the old distributing reservoir at Forty-second street and Fifth avenue could be dispensed with, and the valuable ground which it occupies be made otherwise available to the city.

It appears that the Department has had this matter under consideration at different times during past years, without taking definite action thereon.

In consultation with the Chief Engineer I have investigated the subject, and have come to the conclusion that this old reservoir is no longer necessary as a part of our water system. Its capacity is only twenty millions of gallons, while the reservoirs in the Central Park hold twelve hundred and fifty millions of gallons. The abandonment of the Forty-second street reservoir will merely require the rearrangement of certain pipes at a cost of about ten thousand dollars, while a saving of twenty-five hundred dollars a year will be effected in superintendence and maintenance.

This reservoir occupies a space four hundred and fifty feet wide on Fifth avenue, by five hundred feet deep, measured on Fortieth and Forty-second streets, or about five and a quarter acres. If Forty-first street should be opened westerly from Fifth avenue to Reservoir square, there would remain eighty lots of twenty-five by one hundred feet belonging to the city and available for building purposes, which may be valued at \$1,500,000.

Should it be decided to remove the reservoir, the ground should, in my opinion, be added to Reservoir square, and the whole plat reserved as a public park. The dimensions of such a park would be 920 feet by 455 feet, having an area of nearly ten acres. It is situated on elevated ground, about midway between Madison square and the Central Park, and would become an appropriate and conspicuous place for the erection of monuments and statuary. Unfortunately some of the parks in the lower part of the city have been built upon, thereby destroying their usefulness in the promotion of health and pleasure. While opportunity offers, it is well to increase rather than to diminish these green spots, the lungs of the city, and once having been set apart for such use, to preserve them with jealous care for all future time.

SIR.—I have the honor to report that during the quarter ending March 31, 1877, there has been expended in this Bureau for work done and materials furnished, and for which bills have been transmitted, as follows:

STORAGE RESERVOIRS.

Very little work has been done during the last quarter in building the Storage Reservoir in the town of South East, Putnam County, the weather being unsuitable for laying masonry or putting in a watertight embankment. A small force has been kept on the roads and in taking out rock in the overfall. The contractors commenced work, by instructions from the Department, on the land of Frederick Knox, but two days after such commencement were enjoined, which injunction has not yet been removed. They are at work on the land of Messrs. Kirkham and Kneffin by the permission of these gentlemen.

The awards for the land to be overflowed and for highways rendered necessary by the overflowing of the present roads have been confirmed, and in a few days the necessary searches of title and for liens will be completed, when the amounts awarded by the Commission will be paid to the parties from whom these lands have been taken.

The cold weather in December, 1876, having frozen up the streams feeding the Croton river, it was necessary to continue drawing from the stored water in the Boyd's Corners Reservoir and lakes in Putnam County until the 8th of January, 1877.

Since which time the Croton river has furnished a full supply of water to the Aqueduct. The gates of the Boyd's Corners Reservoir were closed on the 7th January, and on the 23d of March this reservoir had again filled. Many of the lakes drawn from during the drouth of 1876 have again been filled.

LAKE MAHOPAC.

No water was drawn from this lake after the 16th November, when the outlet was closed. The water had risen in this lake, on the 1st of April, two feet eight inches, and this lake will be filled to high water in a few days.

KIRK LAKE

Was drawn down sixteen feet four inches. The gates were closed on the 8th of January, and on the 1st of April it was again full.

LAKE GLENEIDA

Was drawn down three feet eleven inches. The gates were closed November 16, and on the 1st of April had filled two feet one inch.

BARRETT'S POND

Was drawn down eight feet. It was again filled on the 1st of April six feet.

CHINA POND.

Six and one-half feet of water was drawn off. It had again filled four feet two inches on the 1st of April.

WHITE POND.

Three feet six inches was drawn, which has again filled.

PINE POND.

Three feet was drawn from this pond. The gates were closed on the 5th of January, and on the 5th of March it was again full.

LONG POND.

Four feet was drawn. On the 8th of January the outlet was closed, and on the 5th of March this pond was again filled.

PEACH POND.

Three feet of water was drawn from this pond. The gates were closed on the 8th of January, and on the 5th of March this pond was again filled.

LAKE WACCABUC.

Three feet of water was drawn from this lake. The gates were closed on the 5th of January, and on the 5th of March the lake was again filled.

CROSS POND.

This pond was lowered five feet. The gates were closed on the 5th of January, and on the 15th of March the pond was again filled.

LAKE GILEAD.

This lake was lowered ten feet nine and one-half inches. The outlet was closed on the 1st of December, 1876, and on the 1st of April had filled three feet nine inches.

Careful surveys are being made of the several sites for storage reservoirs in the Croton basin, and estimates made of the costs of the same preparatory to selecting a site for another reservoir, and surveys have also been made to determine accurately the area of the several ponds and lakes in the water-shed of the Croton.

The rain-fall at Boyd's Corners Reservoir has been—in January, 2 68-100 inches; February, 80-100 inches, and March, 7 66-100 inches. This shows 1 52-100 inches rain-fall less than we had in the same months last year.

AQUEDUCT REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE.

During the last three months the culverts, drains, and ditches have been kept clear of ice and snow and the daily examinations of the whole line of the Aqueduct continued. One hundred rods of new fence built, and the whole kept in order.

Four hundred and eighty (480) cubic yards of retaining wall taken down and rebuilt, and one hundred (100) cubic yards of rock quarried to continue the same.

Two hundred (200) cubic yards embankment placed as additional covering over Aqueduct, where needed, and the necessary painting, cleaning, and whitewashing has been done.

The Aqueduct has furnished an uninterrupted supply to the city, and, since the 9th of January, has been carrying seven feet four inches of water, that being as much as can be carried with safety.

The pumping engine and boiler first erected at Highbridge has been put in good order, and is now used, as required, with the new pumping engine and boiler put in last year.

LAYING WATER PIPES.

The weather has delayed the completion of several contracts entered into last year for the laying of water pipes, and this work has only been prosecuted where there was rock excavation. One contract was made in March for laying water pipes, which includes all the small pipe to be laid under the resolutions of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor, up to March 1, 1877.

Bids have been received for 48-inch pipe, to extend the large main on First avenue down town, and for 6-inch pipe and special castings for work under contract, and for placing large hydrants on Broadway, as called for by the Fire Department.

WASTE OF WATER.

Inspectors were appointed in the latter part of December, 1876, to examine each building where Croton water is used.

The results thus far are very satisfactory, and much waste of water has been checked.

Owing to the severity of the weather it has been impossible to prosecute the work of repairs until recently. Early in March two companies were placed on the work, and have been employed at points most requiring attention.

SIR—In accordance with the provisions of section 110, chapter 335, of Laws of 1873, I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the three months ending March 31, 1877.

In Exhibit "A" will be found an abstract of all vouchers certified by me during the quarter. In Exhibit "B" is a statement showing the amounts paid for gas to the several public markets, offices, etc., and for fitting up, repairing, and lighting the public lamps, etc. Exhibit "C" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Gas" for 1877, showing an expenditure during the quarter of one hundred and thirty thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and fifty-three cents (\$130,413.53), with liabilities against the appropriation of sixty-one thousand four hundred and sixty-three dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$61,463.87), leaving an available balance of five hundred and thirty-three thousand and twenty-one dollars and sixty cents (\$533,021.60). These liabilities, as will be seen, consist principally of the bills for lighting the public lamps for month of March, and vouchers for the same will be transmitted when made out. Exhibit "D" is a summary of the Lamp Account, and shows the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted, and number discontinued by each gas company during the quarter, and the total number of lamps burning under the supervision of this Department to be twenty thousand four hundred and thirty-eight (20,438).

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: On and after the fifth day of May, 1877, no cattle, swine, pigs, calves, or sheep shall be driven on or between Eleventh and Second avenues south of Sixtieth street, nor on any other streets or avenues, except as hereinafter mentioned.

1st. On First avenue, and the cross streets east of First avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-eighth streets, inclusive.

2d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, between Thirty-ninth and Forty-third streets, inclusive.

3d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, between Forty-fifth and Forty-ninth streets, inclusive.

4th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, thence through Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth avenue to Ninety-seventh street, Ninety-seventh street to Fifth avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street, One Hundred and Eighth street to Second avenue, Second avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, One Hundred and Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to Second avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to the slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

6th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to Sixty-fifth street, through Central Park by transverse road to Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue to Sixty-seventh street, through Sixty-seventh street to Fourth avenue, on Fourth avenue to Sixty-eighth street, through Sixty-eighth street to First avenue and down First avenue to slaughter-houses, upon the express condition, however, that the cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after 5 o'clock A. M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet, and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of any of the foregoing conditions.

7th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases, with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits to drive animals on other routes than those herein designated.
