

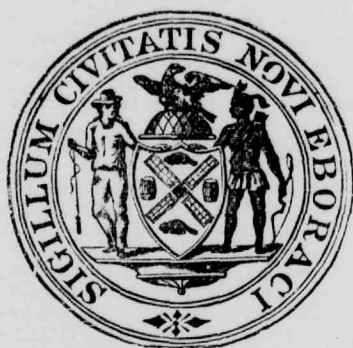

### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, }  
October 11, 1880. }

Present—President Vincent C. King, Commissioners John J. Gorman and Cornelius Van Cott.

The following resolution was, on motion, adopted:

Resolved, That a test be made on Tuesday, November 9, 1880, of the engines last furnished by the Manchester Locomotive Works, of Manchester, N. H.; the Ahrens Manufacturing Co., of Cincinnati, Ohio, and the Clapp & Jones Manufacturing Co., of Hudson, N. Y., under the following conditions:

The engines to be run for twelve (12) consecutive hours, with not less than two cocks of water, the steam pressure to be limited to one hundred (100) pounds, and an accurate record of the steam and water pressure, as well as of the distance water is thrown by each engine, is to be kept by Assistant Chief of Department Charles O. Shay.

Time of stopping, if any, of either engine during the test, with the cause of the same, is also to be noted, but the test is to proceed with the others nevertheless.

Cannel coal, furnished by the Department, to be used, and a record of the quantity consumed to be kept.

The builders of the engines to have the privilege of running their own engine and of having them put in thorough order at the Repair Shops of the Department before the trial.

In case the privilege of running their own engine is declined by either of the parties, the test will proceed under the directions of this Department.

Whereas, It is and is declared to be the opinion of the Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York, that the protection of the public health requires the drainage by means other than sewers of the lands hereinafter described; and

Whereas, The drainage of such lands is, in the opinion of said Board, in a condition or in effect dangerous to life and health; therefore

Resolved, That the report of the Sanitary Superintendent upon such lands be filed among the records of this Board, and that the said lands, situate, lying and being between and bounded as follows: On the east by Seventh avenue, on the south by One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, on the west by Eighth avenue, and on the north by One Hundred and Fiftieth street, in the City of New York, be and are hereby declared a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health by reason of the defective drainage thereof, and be and are hereby ordered and directed to be properly drained by the Commissioners of the Public Parks of the City of New York, and that the construction of proper drains for such purpose be said Commissioners be and is hereby directed.

Resolved, That a map be made by the Sanitary Superintendent whereon shall be shown the location of such proposed drains, and the lands required for the construction thereof, and that such maps shall be filed in this Department, and a copy thereof in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and that the Secretary of this Board be and is hereby directed to deliver to the said Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks another and further copy of said map, together with a copy of these resolutions, as provided by chapter 360, of the Laws of 1880.

## Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 413-3) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house on the southeast corner of First avenue and Sixth street, submitted to this Board by Charles Lindner, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that above the first story a space of 10 feet is left between the rear of the house and the back line of the lot, except that the wall of the extension fronting on Sixth street may stand as at present constructed, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 637-2) for light and ventilation of eight tenement-houses, each four stories high, on the east side of Third avenue, to occupy the whole of the block between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets, each corner house and the house immediately adjoining to be 20 feet by 68 feet, and the four remaining houses of the block to be each 30 feet by 68 feet, and each of the eight lots being 80 feet deep and of the width of the houses respectively; also of two tenement-houses each four stories high and 20 feet by 70 feet, proposed to be built on lots each 20 feet by 100, one on the north side of Sixty-ninth street, and the other on the south side of Seventieth street, each 80 feet east of Third avenue, which said plan has been submitted to this Board by Hugo Kafka, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that the water-closets in each house be ventilated in the manner shown on the plan as amended, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 653-2) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house, 25 feet 1 inch by 50 feet, proposed to be built on the front of the lot 25 feet 1 inch by 106 feet, on the west side of Avenue A, 50 feet south of Sixtieth street, submitted to this Board by Fr. S. Barus, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 701) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 72 Forsyth street on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet 6 inches, submitted to this Board by William Graul, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that the middle rooms in the rear section of said house be omitted and the depth of the house shortened accordingly, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 702) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house, 25 feet by 25 feet, on the rear of the lot No. 365 West Thirty-fifth street, the said house to have 10 feet of the lot clear in the rear and 25 feet between it and the front house, submitted to this Board by J. H. Slocum, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 703) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house, 25 feet by 60 feet, proposed to be built on a lot 25 feet by 99 feet 11 inches, submitted to this Board by J. H. Valentine, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the windows opening to shafts from habitable rooms be made at least 12 square feet in area, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 704) for light and ventilation of the two tenement-houses, each 29 feet 4 inches by 86 feet, proposed to be built on lots each 29 feet 4 inches by 100 feet, at Nos. 229 and 231 West Sixteenth street, submitted to this Board by William H. Hume, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 705) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house, 25 feet by 60 feet, proposed to be built on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of Seventy-eighth street, 100 feet east of Second avenue, submitted to this Board by John E. Hoffmire, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the windows opening on shafts from habitable rooms be made not less than 12 square feet in area, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 706) for light and ventilation of four tenement-houses, each four stories high and 18 feet 9 inches by 56 feet 6 inches, with an extension 9 feet 6 inches wide by 13 feet 6 inches deep, proposed to be built on lots each 18 feet 9 inches by 84 feet, submitted to this Board by Thom & Wilson, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 707) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house, 30 feet by 65 feet, proposed to be built on a lot 35 feet by 75 feet 2 inches, on the north side of Sixty-second street, 65 feet west of Ninth avenue, submitted to this Board by Thom & Wilson, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the windows opening on the light shafts for habitable rooms be made at least 12 square feet in area, and that the open space of 5 feet in width by the full depth of the lot, on the east side of said house, be left clear and unobstructed, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 708) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house, 22 feet by 70 feet, proposed to be built on a lot 22 feet by 100 feet, on the northeast corner of Pleasant avenue and One Hundred and Fifteenth street, submitted to this Board by Charles Baxter, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that the bedroom on the first floor be omitted and the space added to the store, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 709) for light and ventilation of the four tenement-houses, each 25 feet by 60 feet, with an extension 5 feet deep, proposed to be built on lots each 25 feet by 80 feet, on the north side of Eighty-sixth street, beginning on the northwest corner of Avenue A, submitted to this Board by John Sedgwick, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that the water-closets under the stairs on the second floor be omitted, and that all windows opening on light shafts from habitable rooms have an area of not less than 12 square feet each, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 710) for light and ventilation of the two tenement-houses, each four stories high and 25 feet by 60 feet, with an extension 5 feet deep, proposed to be built on lots each 25 feet by 100 feet, on the west side of Avenue A, beginning 80 feet north of Eighty sixth street, submitted to this Board by Charles Baxter, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 711) for light and ventilation of the three tenement-houses, each four stories high, and 18 feet by 60 feet proposed to be built on lots each 18 feet by 100 feet, on the east side of Pleasant avenue, beginning 22 feet north of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, submitted to this Board by Charles Baxter, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 9, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,522, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 788 tenement-houses, 68 private dwellings, 54 other dwellings, 12 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 30 stables, 36 slaughter-houses, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 6 lodging houses, 1 pier, 2 public sewers, 11 sunken and vacant lots, 2 lard-rendering establishments, 2 smoke houses, 1 market, 1 dyeing establishment, 1 sausage factory, 40 yards, courts and areas, 51 cellars and basements, 140 waste-pipes and drains, 128 privies and water-closets, 18 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 5 cisterns and cesspools, 14 other nuisances, together with 79 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 590.

During the past week 168 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 100 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

127 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 89 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 86 houses, 86 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of contagious disease was removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The certificates of 522 births, 58 still-births, 161 marriages, and 588 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 9, 1880; this shows a decrease of 75 births and 17 marriages, and an increase of 16 still-births and 59 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 1 birth, 14 still-births, and 95 deaths, and a decrease of 99 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 5; whooping cough, 3; typhoid fever, 5; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; cancer, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 1; suicide, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 1; diphtheria, 11; croup, 7; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; inanition, 4; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 11; bronchitis, 7; heart diseases, 8; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; apoplexy, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; premature and preterm births, 2; and drowning, 6. The number of deaths from erysipelas, pneumonia, cirrhosis and hepatitis, and cyanosis and atelectasis, was the same in the two succeeding weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 109 were in institutions, 323 in tenement houses, 141 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 105 on the first, 144 on the second, 112 on the third, 74 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 4 on the sixth; 583 were stated to be residents of New York City and 5 non-residents; 92 were stated to be single, 141 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 301 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week was as follows, viz.: City deaths, 588; still-births, 58; bodies in transit, 32; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 63 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 522 births, 161 marriages, 58 still-births, 588 deaths, 32 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 71 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 8 transcript of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 44 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 9, 1880, was 58.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.009, the mean humidity was 76, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 954, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.62 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 2, 1880, was 577; this is 65 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 59.8 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.61 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,218,902.

SIR—There were 588 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 9, 1880, which is an increase of 59, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 95 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending October 2, 1880, was 577, which is 59.8 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.61 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,218,902.

### CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Section 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Section 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Section 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Section 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## ARREARS OF TAXES.

### NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. ### CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
