

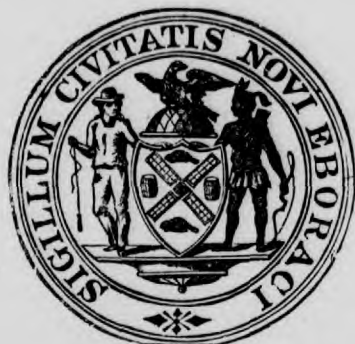
THE CITY RECORD.

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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held March 5, 1881:

Present—Hon. William R. Grace, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. Allan Campbell, Comptroller, and J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain, and Joseph J. McAvoy, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the application of Amos Woodruff's Sons, for return of amount overpaid on account of street vaults in front of premises Nos. 102 and 104 Greene street; whereupon the following resolution was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant payable from the Sinking Fund for Redemption of the City Debt, be drawn in favor of Amos Woodruff's Sons, for eighteen 75-100 dollars (\$18.75), refunding them this amount overpaid on vaults under sidewalk 102 and 104 Greene street, as per certificate from Department of Public Works herewith.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred a communication from the Commissioners of Docks, in relation to alteration of proposed new Pier No. 25, North river, submitted the following report, viz.:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Comptroller, to whom was referred February 18, 1881, a communication from the Commissioners of Docks relative to an alteration in change in the dimensions and location of the proposed new Pier No. 25, North river, from the lines therefor as laid down upon the plans adopted by the Department of Docks, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 27, 1871, respectfully

REPORTS:

That there appears to be no objection to the said alteration and change and submits a resolution of consent and approval thereof.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon them by chapter 738, Laws 1872, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby consent to and approve of an alteration and change in the width, length, and location of a proposed new Pier No. 25 N. R., as requested by a resolution of the Commissioners of the Department of Docks, adopted February 9, 1881, "from the lines therefor as laid down on the plans adopted by the Department of Docks, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 27, 1871, so as to establish the northerly line of said pier 54 feet northwardly of the northerly line therefor as now established on the established bulkhead line, and on the established exterior pier line 66 feet northwardly of the point now established therefor; and to make the width of said Pier, new 25, 75 feet instead of 80 feet, and its length 558 feet instead of 560 feet; the said northerly line hereby adopted, on the established bulkhead line, being 156 feet 8 inches southwardly of the southerly line established for Pier, new 26, N. R., by the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on June 3, 1879."

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted.

The Comptroller submitted the following report and statement on communications from several Departments of the City Government, in relation to the leasing of premises to be occupied by them respectively, viz.:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I present communications from the Law Department, the Police Department, the Department of Public Parks, the Board of Excise, and District Courts, requesting that certain premises occupied or required for their use shall be leased by the city.

After making due inquiry and being satisfied that the rent of the premises proposed to be leased is in each case fair and reasonable, I respectfully submit a statement of the facts relating thereto, and also a resolution to authorize leases to be made for the purposes specified.

Statement Relating to Premises Proposed to be Leased to the City for Public Purposes.

FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT.

1. Buildings Nos. 52 and 54 New street, for the use of the First Precinct Police, for which they are required.
For one year from May 1, 1881. Taxes to be paid by the city, at a yearly rent of \$4,500.

2. Rooms 1 and 2, Parepa Hall, corner Third avenue and Eighty-sixth street.
For Inspector's Office, Third District, for one year from May 1, 1881, at the yearly rent of \$480, for which purpose the premises are required.

3. First story of building, No. 112 West Fourteenth street.
For Inspector's Office, Second District, for one year from May 1, 1881, at the yearly rent of \$900, for which purpose the premises are required.

4. Building, One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street and Eighth avenue. For Thirtieth Precinct Police, for one year from May 1, 1881, at the yearly rent of \$750, for which purpose the premises are required.

5. Building, Nos. 339, 341, and 343 East Fourth street, formerly the Dry Dock Savings Bank. For station-house, etc., Eleventh Precinct Police, for one year from May, 1881, with privilege and option of renewal of lease from year to year, at the same rental, for a period of six years, at the yearly rent of \$2,500, for which purpose the premises are required.

FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

The premises at 36 Union square, now occupied as offices by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, for the term of three years from the first day of January, 1881, at the yearly rent of \$2,500, for which purposes the premises are required.

FOR THE LAW DEPARTMENT.

The premises now occupied by the Law Department in the Staats Zeitung building for the term of five years from May 1, 1881, at a yearly rent of \$7,500, for which purpose the premises are required.

FOR THE BOARD OF EXCISE.

The second floor and a room on the third floor of the building known as the German Exchange Bank, at the corner of Bond street and the Bowery, for the offices of the Board of Excise for the term of three years from May 1, 1881, at a yearly rent of \$2,100, for which purpose the premises are required. The lessor will fit up the rooms for offices at his own expense.

FOR THE CIVIL AND POLICE COURTS.

The building on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and Third avenue, three stories, basement, and sub-cellar, for the use of the Sixth District Police and Tenth District Civil Courts, for the period of five years from May 1, 1881, at the yearly rent of \$2,000, for which purpose the premises are required. The lessor will fit it up at his own cost, in such manner as may be necessary for the accommodation of both courts, on or before the first day of May, 1881.

FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

Front room, third story, No. 27 Chambers street, for the office of the Surveyor of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, and his Deputy, at the yearly rent of \$750, for the term of one year and four months from January 1, 1881, to May 1, 1882, for which purpose the premises are required.

Whereas, Section 1 of chapter 461 of the Laws of 1880, requires that all applications to lease any real estate for the purposes of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, must be presented to and passed upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and

Whereas, Applications have been made for leases for various public purposes, as reported by the Comptroller, at yearly rents which are deemed fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the city that leases of the premises designated and for the purposes specified should be made; therefore,

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be requested and directed to prepare leases to the city of the premises described in the report thereon submitted by the Comptroller, for the purposes specified, and at the yearly rent, and for such a period as is set forth in each case, with the usual and such other special covenants as have been agreed on by the Comptroller, with the respective lessors, and the Comptroller is hereby authorized to enter into and execute all such leases when so prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by chapter 461, Laws 1880.

On motion of the Recorder the question was taken on the following items of the report, viz.:

For Police Department, for the Department of Public Parks, for the Law Department, and for the Department of Taxes and Assessments, which were respectively adopted.

The Comptroller moved that the item for the Board of Excise be adopted.

On motion of the Recorder, Charles H. Bailey, counsel for the present lessee, was heard on the subject. After brief discussion and explanation, the motion of the Comptroller was adopted.

The Recorder stated that there were several parties present from the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards who wished to be heard in relation to the item for the Civil and Police Courts, and moved that they now be heard, which was carried.

John B. Haskin spoke in favor of the present location, Ambrose H. Purdy in favor of the location recommended in the report, and Charles P. Miller in favor of Morrisania Hall, corner of Cortlandt and Third avenues.

The Comptroller briefly stated the considerations which led him to the selection of the premises recommended in the report.

On motion of the Recorder, the item under consideration was amended by adding "and that the Comptroller consult with the Counsel to the Corporation as to the power to change the location of said courts," which was adopted.

On motion of the Recorder, the original resolution as amended, was adopted.

The Comptroller submitted the following report in relation to the leasing of ferries, viz.:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT, }
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, March 4, 1881. }

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—In pursuance of a resolution adopted January 22, 1881, directing the Comptroller to have an appraisal made of the rental value of the franchises of certain ferries to be leased, and also of the wharf property belonging to the city, required for ferry purposes, I respectfully

REPORT:

That I requested the Department of Docks to furnish a statement of the upset prices or yearly rent value of such wharf property as is used or required for certain ferries, and the reply received is herewith submitted.

I have also had an appraisal made of the rental value of the ferry franchises, and present a resolution for the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, fixing the minimum rental value of the franchises of certain ferries to be leased from May 1, 1881, and the wharf property belonging to the city, if any, required for ferry purposes, at rates predicated on the upset prices stated by the Department of Docks, to be the yearly rental values of such wharf property; also a resolution, authorizing the Comptroller to lease such ferry franchises and wharf property to the highest bidders at a public auction as provided by law; and also a resolution requesting the Counsel to the Corporation to prepare leases therefor, according to the provisions of law and ordinances in relation to ferries.

The report was accepted, and the resolution submitted with the report, in relation to the appraisal of the rental value of the franchises of the ferries, was laid over for consideration.

The following resolutions, also submitted with the report, were, on motion adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 498, Laws of 1880, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and empowered to take the necessary means to advertise and sell at public auction and lease the franchises of the ferries referred to in the report submitted by him, along with such wharf property belonging to the city, as may be used or required for ferry purposes, according to the requirements of law and ordinances of the Common Council in relation to the sale of ferry franchises as follows, to wit:

Ferry from Pine street, New York, to Hunter's Point, Long Island.

Ferry from One Hundred and Thirtieth street, N. R., New York, to Fort Lee, New Jersey.

Ferry from Forty-second street, N. R., to Weehawken, New Jersey.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare a form of ferry lease containing the usual covenants and conditions, conformable in all respects to existing laws and ordinances relating to ferries, and which may be necessary to secure the rights and interests of the city in its wharf property and ferry franchises, and when such ferry franchises are sold, also to prepare the leases therefor accordingly.

The application of James B. Johnson to purchase property in Old Slip, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

Application of Lawrence S. Kane for release of the rights, title, and interest of the city in and to a strip of land on Fifty-second street near Third avenue, for reasons as set forth in said application, was received, and on motion referred to the Comptroller.

Notice of application to the Commissioners of the Land Office of the State of New York by John H. Cheever, of the city of New York, and Henry F. Durant, of Boston, Mass., for a grant in perpetuity, of land under water in Harlem river, adjacent to and in front of the premises belonging to the said John H. Cheever and Henry F. Durant, was received, and on motion referred to the Comptroller.

Application of John Gillon, policeman, in relation to pension, was received and, on motion, laid on the table.

The following preamble and resolutions were submitted by the Comptroller, and on motion adopted, viz.:

Whereas, One or more bills have been introduced in the Legislature, and are now pending to establish and operate one or more ferries between the cities of New York and Brooklyn; and,

Whereas, The exclusive right to establish ferries and grant ferry franchises, between Manhattan Island and Long Island and other opposite shores, and the right and title to the property therein,

were solely vested by the Colonial Charters of Governor Dongan, Lord Cornbury, and Governor Montgomerie, in the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, and have been confirmed by subsequent acts of the Legislature, and decrees of the courts, of the State of New York; and

Whereas, Whenever the public interests require the establishment of such ferries and the granting of such franchises, they are always established by the Common Council of the City of New York upon proper application, and the franchises sold and granted upon fair and reasonable terms to those persons who wish to operate the same, with due regard for the convenience and safety of passengers and just ferry charges; and

Whereas, The revenues arising from the sale of ferry franchises and rights have been sacredly pledged by law to the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt; and

Whereas, The passage of such bills would take away or impair the vested rights of the city to these ferry franchises and interfere with the revenues pledged to the creditors of the city; and

Whereas, If such a bill passed, it might seriously affect the future sales of ferry franchises by the City of New York; therefore,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund petition and request the Legislature not to pass the bill known as the Brooklyn City Ferry Bill, or any like measure which would so seriously impair the chartered rights of the city, and injure the revenues pledged for the redemption of the City Debt.

Resolved further, That a copy of this resolution be sent by the Secretary to the Legislature.

On motion of the Recorder, the report of the Comptroller in relation to the leasing of premises for the use of the Tenth District Civil Court, and the Sixth District Police Court, submitted at the last meeting, and laid over to the next meeting, was taken up for consideration; whereupon the Recorder moved that the resolution submitted with the report and adopted, be rescinded; which, on motion, was carried.

The following resolution of the Common Council was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller:

"Resolved, That a ferry be and is hereby established from the foot of Market street, New York, to the foot of Bridge street, Brooklyn, L. I., and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby authorized and directed to sell at public auction to the highest responsible bidder or bidders, the right to operate the ferry hereby established, on such terms and conditions, and subject to such restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by said Commissioners."

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 1, 1881.

Approved by the Mayor, March 3, 1881.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, February 19, 1881.

The Board met this day.

Resolution.

Resolved, That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of February, 1881, when approved by the Finance Committee, shall be duly signed by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Action of the Board on Tenement House Plans.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement houses were approved by the Board on the conditions specified in the several permits granted:

Plan No. 811-2 for a five-story tenement, 25 feet 10 inches, by 42 feet 10 inches, on a lot 25 feet 10 inches, by 54 feet 3 inches, at Nos. 58 and 58½ Division street, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 843-2 for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 85 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 103 feet 6 inches, at No. 535 East Thirteenth street, to be occupied by seventeen families.

Plan No. 844 for two six-story tenements, one 32 feet by 124 feet, on a lot 32 feet by 150 feet, on the southwest corner of Broadway and Seventeenth street, to be occupied by four families; and one 25 feet by 79 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 92 feet, on the south side of Seventeenth street, to be occupied by five families.

Plan Disapproved.

Plan No. 811, for light and ventilation of the two five-story tenement-houses proposed to be built at No. 11 Bayard street, and Nos. 58 and 58½ Division street, respectively.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 19, 1881. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,692, as follows, viz.:

2 public buildings, 771 tenement houses, 107 private dwellings, 117 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 21 stores and warehouses, 32 stables, 15 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 48 yards, courts, and areas, 97 cellars and basements, 221 waste pipes and drains, 188 privies and water-closets, 7 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 16 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 11 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 582.

During the past week 166 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 58 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

89 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 169 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 169 houses, 169 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

12 cases of contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a comparative statement of cases of contagious disease reported at this Bureau for the two weeks ending February 19, 1881:

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 560 births, 45 still-births, 160 marriages, and 683 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 19, 1881; this shows a decrease of 40 births, 15 still-births, 10 marriages, and 26 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 45 births, 3 still-births, and 164 deaths, and a decrease of 22 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 4; diphtheria, 3; whooping cough, 5; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 2; inanition, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; heart diseases, 5; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 14; convulsions, 10; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 12; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 8; croup, 17; erysipelas, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 1; bronchitis, 10; pneumonia, 11; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; premature and preterm births, 5; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever, rheumatism, gout, and cirrhosis and hepatitis, was the same in the two succeeding weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 145 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 202 under two years; 296 under five years, and 40 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 22 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 43.34 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending February 19, 1881, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending February 12, 1881.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., *Sanitary Superintendent and Register:*

SIR—There were 683 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 19, 1881, which is a decrease of 26, as compared with the number reported in the preceding week, and 164 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending February 12, 1881, was 679, which is 153.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.26 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,206,577.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 101 were in institutions, 375 in tenement-houses, 197 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 139 on the first, 174 on the second, 147 on the third, 80 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 676 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 7 non-residents. 63 were stated to be single, 168 married, 64 widowed, and the condition of 388 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 683; still-births, 45; bodies in transit, 26. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 55 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 560 births, 160 marriages, 45 still-births, 683 deaths, 26 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 47 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 28 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 19, 1881, was 31.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.084, the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,544, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.27 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 642 deaths and still-births, or 88.19 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 24; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 267; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 49; Greenwood (undenominational), 48; Lutheran, (undenominational), 110; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 27; Evergreen (undenominational), 46; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending February 12, 1881, was 679; this is 153 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1880, and 153.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.26 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the United States Census of 1880, being 1,206,577.

Resolved, That the following-named persons be and they are hereby respectively appointed Commissioners of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 544, Laws of 1880:

Whereas, Chapter 353 of the Laws of 1880, entitled “An act in relation to runners or solicitors of passengers or patronage for steamers, steamboats, ships, vessels, hotels, railroads, or transportation companies in the city of New York,” provides that said act shall take effect on the first day of July, 1881; and

Whereas, Article XXXII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 31, 1880, provides that every license for a steamboat runner, railroad runner, and hotel runner, shall be for one year from the date thereof, at a fee of twenty dollars for each license and twelve and a half dollars for each renewal, and no provision is made for obtaining a license or renewal for less than a year or on payment of less than the full annual fee; and

Whereas, All steamboat, railroad, or hotel runners' licenses now outstanding, or hereafter granted under the existing ordinance will terminate on July 1, 1881; therefore

Resolved, That article XXXII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances be amended by adding at the end of section 296 the following: “On or after the first day of February, 1881, and up to the thirtieth day of June, 1881, such licenses may be renewed for a less term than one year on payment of a fee at the rate of two dollars per month for each license and one dollar per month for each renewal, but all licenses and renewals so granted shall expire on the first day of July, 1881, and none shall be granted for a less fee than two dollars for a license and one dollar for a renewal.”

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the fourth day of March, 1881, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section and amendments of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 205. That the owner, lessee, tenant, or occupant of any building or premises, or of any part thereof, where there shall be a nuisance, or a violation of any ordinance or section of the Sanitary Code, shall be jointly and severally liable therefor, and each of them may be required to abate the nuisance or comply with the order of the Board of Health in respect to the premises, or the part thereof of which such person is owner or occupant.

Resolved, That section 17 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 17. That no person shall hereafter erect, or cause to be erected, or converted to a new purpose by alteration, any building or structure, or change the construction of any part of any building, by addition or otherwise, so that it, or any part thereof, shall be inadequate or defective in respect to strength, ventilation, light, sewerage, or of any other useful, proper, or necessary provision or precaution for the security of life and health; and no person shall make or use a smoke house or room or apparatus for smoking meat in any tenement or lodging house without a permit, in writing, from the Board of Health, and subject to the conditions thereof; nor shall the builder, lessee, tenant, or occupant of any such, or of any other building or structure, cause or allow any matter or thing to be or to be done, in or about any such building or structure, dangerous or prejudicial to life or health.

Resolved, That section 19 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 19. That no person, having the right and power to prevent the same, shall knowingly cause or permit any person to sleep or remain in any cellar, or in any bathroom, or in any room where there is a water-closet, or in any place dangerous or prejudicial to life or health by reason of a want of ventilation or drainage, or by reason of the presence of any poisonous, noxious, or offensive substance or otherwise.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau or the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
