REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending July 26, 1884, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending July 19, 1884.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were S88 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 26, 1884, which is an increase of 18, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 112 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending July 19, 1884, was 867, which is 2.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 33.15 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,357,837.
