AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of the Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 78 Tribune Building, Wednesday, August 27, 1884, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioner Dowd.

Also Chief Engineer Church, and E. Henry Lacombe, Esq., Counsel to the Corporation. The minutes of the adjourned stated meeting of Friday, August 22, were read and approved. The property maps for the lands in Westchester County (marked Exhibits "X," "Z," "Z 2," and "A A," respectively), heretofore submitted by the Department of Public Works and approved by the Commissioners, were again submitted by the Department of Public Works for approval, with the modified grade line (adopted on August 22, inst.) shown thereon, in compliance with the request of the Aqueduct Commissioners of the 22d inst.

Commissioner Dowd then offered the following resolution: Resolved, That the property maps heretofore adopted by this Commission on the 6th day of June, 1884, marked Exhibit "X," on the 6th day of July, 1884, marked Exhibits "Z" and "Z 2," and on the 16th day of July, 1884, marked Exhibit "A A," and now resubmitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners by the Commissioner of Public Works, with the modified grade line of the Aqueduct delineated thereon, are hereby approved.

Resolved, That the approval of the same, as now amended, be duly certified thereon by the Aqueduct Commissioners, as required by section 4, chapter 490, Laws of 1883; and that said maps, so certified, be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation with the request that he cause the same to be filed in the office of the Register of the County of Westchester, and the Register of the City and County of New York, respectively, as required by section 5 of said act.

Commissioner Thompson stated that had he been able to attend the meeting of the 22d inst., when the raised grade line of the new Aqueduct was adopted, he should have voted against such modification; and he now wished to be recorded as opposed to it; but as the Commissioners had then adopted the modification and requested the same to be shown upon the property maps heretofore submitted by him, their request had been complied with; and that being informed that it was essential that all present should unite in approving and certifying the said maps as now amended, he would concur with his associate Commissioners in so doing, in order that the legal proceedings to acquire the right to the lands might not be delayed.

The above-named resolution of Commissioner Dowd was then adopted by the affirmative vote of the Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioner Dowd.

And the Secretary was directed to have the said maps duly certified and transmitted at once to the Counsel to the Corporation for filing. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of the bills included in vouchers Nos. 300 to 310 inclusive; which vouchers were, on motion of the Comptroller, approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee also reported the following recommendations, viz.: First—That Charles C. Manning be appointed Assistant Draftsman in this Commission, at a compensation of \$100 per month, to commence when released from duty in the Department of Public Works and entrance on his duty under this Commission.

Second—That Charles G. Gustafson be appointed as Temporary Assistant Draftsman, at a compensation of \$75 per month, to date from his entrance upon the discharge of his duties.

On motion of the Mayor, both of the said recommendations were approved.

Commissioner Thompson called up the application of Evelyn P. Roberts for the position of Assistant Engineer, and offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That Evelyn P. Roberts be and he is hereby appointed to the position of Assistant Engineer in this Commission, at a compensation of \$150 per month, to date from his entrance upon the discharge of his duties as such Assistant.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

On motion of the Comptroller, it was

Resolved, That the compensation of Charles S. Gowen, Assistant Engineer, be increased to the rate of \$150 per month, to date from the 1st of September next.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, it was

Resolved, That Arthur H. Grant be promoted from the position of Woodman to that of Chain man and Rodman, at a compensation of \$60 per month, to date from the 1st of September next.

The stated meeting was then adjourned.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to The Commercial Cable Company to use the streets within the City of New York for the purpose of constructing and laying lines of electrical conductors underground, from time to time, in tubes or otherwise, and for constructing, maintaining and using in such streets, from time to time, upon and below the surface of the ground, boxes, vaults or other fixtures suitable for distributing and testing, from time to time, the wires and insulators of said lines and for access thereto, and for laying, maintaining and using, underground in said streets, the pneumatic tubes necessary or proper to be used in transmission of communications between the Company's several offices or stations, or in making delivery of communications received by the Company by telegraph. All excavations in streets, removals and replacements of

pavements or sidewalks, shall be done under and according to the directions of the Commissioner of Public Works. The said Company, in acting under this permission, shall be subject to so much of the provisions of article XXI. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 as requires that one wire in each route shall be reserved for the use of the police and one for the fire-alarm telegraph, without charge to the City and County of New York. For each street opened and used by the Company, under this permission, for the purpose of laying therein its lines of electrical conductors or pneumatic tubes, it shall pay to the city a sum equal to one cent for each lineal foot of such street occupied.

Water from wells in the City of New York shall not be used for drink, in any tenement or lodging house, hotel, manufactory or building in which persons are living or employed, or in which there are offices, restaurants or saloons, except under and pursuant to the conditions of a permit, in writing, from the Health Department.

It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
