# DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending June 27, 1885.

FRIDAY, JUNE 26, 1885 .- ADJOURNED MEETING-10 A. M.

Present-Commissioners Crimmins (President), Powers, Beekman, and Borden.

The Hon. James Oliver and Mr. Sullivan, President of the Sullivan Club, appeared before the Board, and stated that the residents in the vicinity of Paradise Park were desirous of having music at that point one evening each week, and requesting that this Board provide a music-stand, to be erected over the fountain basin.

On motion, the whole subject of providing facilities for music at Paradise Park was referred to the President, with power.

The following communications were received:
From the Superintendent of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, applying for a permit to lay car-tracks through that portion of Madison avenue fronting Mount Morris Park.
On motion, the matter was referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, with the request that he furnish this Board with his opinion as to whether this Department has authority to grant the application of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, and, if so, whether it is obligatory on this Department to issue the permit asked for.

Department to issue the permit asked for. From the Engineer of Construction:

order of the Board, as to the the overflow of the drinking fountain in Madison Square, at Twenty-third street, for filling the fountain basin in the Square, and stating that, upon examination, it was found to be impracticable. Ordered filed.

2d. Reporting upon a communication from the Health Department respecting the sanitary condition of Washington avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and Brook avenue, and recommending that the flow line of the sewer, as adopted in the sewerage system, being of an unnecessary depth, be modified and brought nearer to the surface.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth

Wards to provide temporary means of relief.

From the Engineer in charge of Sewers of the Department of Public Works, in relation to the proposed change in the grade of the Kingsbridge road, and the filing of grade maps of streets already laid out. Laid over.

From Jefferson M. Levy, calling attention to the defective drainage of the tract of land situate between Lafayette place, Central avenue, Locust avenue and Quarry road, caused by the choking up of the drain under the road-bed of Locust avenue. Referred to the Superintendent Twenty-third and

From the Police Surgeon, submitting a report upon the physical condition of the members of the Police force of the Department. Laid over.

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting the suspension of the following persons on account of the lack of tunds:

Peter J. Connolly, Double Team. John Joseph Kelly, Laborer. Gottlieb Schmidt, Laborer. Terrence Masterson, Laborer. John Nesbit, Laborer. Thomas Connolly, Laborer. Discharged.

James Meehan, Double Team. James Larkin, Laborer. Patrick Feeley, Laborer. Lawrence Skelly, Laborer. Terrence Curry, Laborer.

From E. B. Southwick, reporting in relation to the work of destroying insects on the trees in the parks. Ordered filed.

The Treasurer presented a report of the auction sale of sheep on 24th inst., showing a total amount of \$599, which was ordered filed.

Commissioner Powers, to whom was referred the application of John C. Cornett for permission to moor a float and let boats at the Third Avenue Bridge, reported that he had issued a permit to Mr. Cornett to moor a float at the steps on the east side of the northend of the bridge upon his paying to the Department for the privilege the sum of \$100 per annum from May 1, 1885. On motion, the action of Commissioner Powers was approved.

The President stated that the Comptroller had indorsed his certificate on the contract of Michael McGrath for granite and other work on Morningside Park, and that it would be necessary for the Board to appoint a suitable person to superintend the work, and as Julius Munckwitz would sever his connection with this Department as its architect on the 1st of July, next, that he would undertake the work of superintending this work at a compensation of one per cent. on the gross amount to be paid to the contractor, and as Mr. Munckwitz is familiar with all the plans and the work previously done, recommended that he be employed.

On motion, the President was authorized to make arrangements with Julius Munckwitz for his services as Architect to inspect materials and work to be done under the agreement with Michael McGrath for the erection of granite steps, platforms, brick arches, iron beams, etc., at the four octagonal bays, and two entrances, Morningside Park, at a compensation of one per cent. on the total amount paid said contractor for doing the work, in accordance with the provisions of the contract for such payments.

The Police Surgeon having stated in his report that "the muscles of the chest and upper extremities of nearly all the force, including the latest appointments, are in a very weak condition for the want of proper means of exercise and development," and that "a few minutes' exercise daily in a gymnasium would soon remedy this defect," the Superintendent of Parks was directed to fit up, under the direction of the President, a suitable gymnasium for such purpose.

SIR—There were 678 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 27, 1885, which is an increase of 16, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 93 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending June 20, 1885, was 698, which is 53.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.99 per 1,000 persons hving, the population estimated at 1,396,286.

Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
