SIR—The Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York respectfully submits the following report of the transactions of the Police Department and force for the year ending December 31, 1890:

THE POLICE FORCE.

In the foregoing table there are included one Sergeant, two Roundsmen and forty-two Patrolmen detailed to the service of the Health Department; also one Sergeant, two Roundsmen and fifty-seven Patrolmen detailed to the service of the Department of Street Cleaning, pursuant to law.

During the past year the total force has been increased one hundred and four, as appears by the table, which does not include eighteen men now serving on probation preliminary to their appointment as Patrolmen. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in its appropriation for the year 1891, has allowed for one hundred additional Patrolmen, and that number will be appointed during the course of the year, in addition to filling vacancies as they may occur.

The estimate of the city's population made last year proved to be only fifty thousand greater than the police census showed. Assuming the population to be one million seven hundred thousand, we have one Policeman to each four hundred and eighty-two of the population, or one Patrolman to each five hundred and sixty of the population. Compared with European cities, the Police force of our city is much smaller relatively to population. London has one to each three hundred and twelve, Paris one to each two hundred and eighty-three, and Berlin one to each three hundred and twenty-two.

In the reports of this Board for the five years last past much has been said in advocacy of a largely increased Police force, and though efforts have been made to comply with the requirements of the Department, the rate of increase is so small that at least ten years must pass, if that rate is maintained, before the city has the protection its present population demands. The city north of the Harlem river has grown so rapidly that an increase of force there is imperatively necessary, and with such an increase provision must be made for more commodious station-house accommodation.

STATION-HOUSES.

The condition of Station-houses, their location, and the boundaries of Precincts remain the same as at last report. A new Station-house is in course of erection on West Sixty-eighth street, the Precinct for which will be made up of territory now included in the Twenty-second and Twenty-sixth Precincts. Lots for the location of a Station-house on the east side for a Precinct to be made up from portions of the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth Precincts, are now being negotiated for, and when the purchase is completed plans and specifications for the erection of a new Station-house will be at once prepared.

The purchase of lots in the present Eighth Precinct is under contemplation, and when completed, the construction of a new house will be undertaken when an appropriation has been made therefor.

The remarks in the report of last year relative to the insufficiency of several Station-houses, particularly those of the annexed district, are worthy of attention at this time. Increased accommodations for the Police force of the Thirty-first, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Precincts are urgently needed, as no increase of force can well be made without, notwithstanding the existing necessity for such increase.

Board of Surgeons.

The following tables show the sick time of the Police force by Precincts and Squads during the year, and other results of the labor of the Surgeons of the Department.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disabilities and injuries during the year is shown by the first table, from which it will be seen that the time actually lost was 38,633

days—3.08 per cent. of the total day's time of the force. This shows an increase of 5,481 days over the record for 1889, and a corresponding increase of percentage. The amount paid for sick time lost was \$63,626.24 (an increase of \$9,068.37), which does not include allowances of full pay for disabilities incurred by the force while in the actual performance of duty, and which allowances were made by the Board some time subsequent to recovery from the disability. These additional amounts aggregate the sum of \$1,089.71, which, added to the amount above stated, makes the total sum paid for sick time lost \$64,715.95, an increase of \$8,468.10 over the preceding year. The epidemic of influenza, which had the effect to largely increase the sick rate in 1889, was carried over into the year 1890, and caused the greater increase in the latter year. Attention is called to the large per cent. of sick time in the Second, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth, Sixteenth, Eighteenth, Twenty-ninth and Thirty-fifth Precincts, all far above the average.

The second table shows the number of the force on the sick-list each day during the year, from which it will be seen that there was a daily average of nearly 108 men sick each day, an increase of 15 over the year 1889. In the month of January there was an average of 240 men sick each day, and during the month no less than 917 individuals were at some time on the sick-list. 26.65 per cent. of the total force, an increase of 201 over the last month in the year 1889. The prevailing influenza seems to have reached its greatest height on January 5, for from that date the sick rate rapidly fell off.

Applicants for Appointment.

From the following table it will be seen that the examination of applicants for appointment as Patrolmen is a very important part of the labors of the Surgeons. The number examined during the year just closed was 110 less than in 1889, and 66 greater than in 1888. These examinations are held at the Central Department on Monday of each week by a changing committee of Surgeons, selected by the Chief Clerk, and are very thorough and satisfactory. Every physical defect liable to render the applicant unfit for the performance of the arduous duties of a Patrolman is deemed good cause for rejection.

In addition to the duties above enumerated, the Surgeons are required to attend numerous meetings of the Board of Surgeons during the year. These meetings are held pursuant to the regulations of the Department, for the purpose of specially examining such cases as are referred to them as a Board by the Board of Police. All cases of mental and physical incapacity, permanent or temporary, and the causes and probable duration of each are minutely inquired into and report duly made thereupon. Every Surgeon is expected to be present at these meetings.

A rule of the Department requires the Surgeons of Police to take medical and surgical charge of the pensioners of the Police Pension Fund and their families, giving them without charge the same care and attention as patients in their private practice. The resident pensioners avail themselves of the privileges granted by this rule. No record, however, is kept of the visits made to them, the ailments treated or the duration of sickness. It is believed that at least two thousand visits are made by the Surgeons to this class of patients during the course of each year.

From the above it will be seen that more than one-fourth (25.54 per cent.) of the total number of arrests were made in the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh Precincts, a decrease as compared with the reports for the two years last past. There appears to be a considerable decrease in the number arrested in the Eleventh Precinct, to which special attention has been frequently called, such decrease being 1,405, as compared with the report of last year. The increase in the three other Precincts named, however, aggregates 533. The per cent. of arrests in the Eleventh Precinct is 11.84. It will be noticed that the arrests in the Fifteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-second, Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth Precincts have largely increased. There has been a slight falling off in the arrests in the Precincts composing the annexed district.

The following table of arrests for gambling shows a very considerable increase over the number arrested for the same offense in 1889, an increase of \$2,585 in the amount of fines imposed, and an increase of \$5,355.45 in the amount of cash seized. The quantities of gambling materials seized will also be found to have been larger in nearly every item. Figures of arrest and material seized during the year 1889 are placed beside those of 1890 for purposes of ready comparison.

It will be noticed in the schedule of offenses that ninety persons were arrested for violation of the pool law. This is an increase of fifty-six over the number arrested for the same offense in 1889, and an increase of thirty-one over those arrested in 1888. The same difficulties in securing convictions for this offense that have existed during the five years past still exist, and this Department is hindered and delayed in the enforcement of the law by conflicting decisions and numerous suits. There is little difficulty in securing evidence that pools are sold within the city, but the testimony has heretofore been held as insufficient in face of the assertions of the pool-sellers that they act merely as agents for the buyers, and that the money received is lawfully wagered at the race-tracks in the vicinity. Until the law is so amended as to make clear every point in a pool transaction the police will be unable to act as efficiently as the law was intended to demand.

During the year 4,743 persons were arrested for violation of the excise law, as against 5,231 for the year 1889. The average arrests for the past six years has been 4,350. It will, therefore, be seen that the arrests for 1890 were 393 above the average.

The following table of arrests on Sunday for violation of the excise laws, shows a decrease of 235 as compared with 1889, and is less than in any year since 1886. Attention is called to the remarks in the report for 1889, on the excise question.

The above indicates that a trifle over 36 per cent. of the total arrests were of persons between twenty and thirty years of age, one per cent. less than last year; about 24 per cent. were of persons between thirty and forty years of age; 66.55 per cent. were single. There has been a considerable increase in the percentage of arrests of persons with no education. An examination of the table of nativities will show a very large increase in the number of Italians arrested—an increase of about 75 per cent. There was an increase of over 100 per cent. of the Chinese, while there was a decrease of about 81 per cent. of the colored people.

HOUSE OF DETENTION FOR WITNESSES.

The number of persons committed to, detained in and discharged from the House of Detention for Witnesses during the year 1890 will be found in the following table. Compared with the report for 1889 there will be found a decrease of 32 in the number of persons committed, and a very large decrease in the number of days' confinement. The average time of confinement was 15 4-10 days, a decrease of more than four days. The average cost of maintenance (meals alone) was \$11.54, a decrease of \$3.12. This exhibit is very gratifying in view of the remarks made in former years with regard to the injustice of committing innocent persons to this or any other prison. That 346 unfortunate witnesses of crimes should be confined within the walls of a prison for no other offense than that of seeing a crime committed, and too poor and friendless to furnish security for their presence at the legal proceedings following such crimes is, by inference, an equal number of offenses against justice and right, which should be remedied as soon as possible by the adoption of measures heretofore suggested in these reports.

SANITARY COMPANY.

Bureau of Steam-boiler Inspection and Engineers.

The report of this Bureau shows the number of steam boilers examined, tested hydrostatically and their condition, together with the number of applicants examined as to their qualification as engineers to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam boilers and engines in the City of New York; also the amount of money paid to the Treasurer of the Police Pension Fund, collected from owners of steam boilers for certificates of inspection, as provided by chapter 437 of the Laws of 1885.

For the year there have been 6,271 applicants examined for engineer's certificates, to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam boilers and engines. Each applicant has been examined as to his experience, qualification and knowledge of steam boilers and engines. Of this number 5,854 passed a satisfactory examination and have been granted certificates, and 417 have been rejected.

From the above comparative statement the gradual increase of the work of this Bureau is readily seen. The details of this work are thoroughly carried out in every particular, and its value is attested by the record of accidents from defective steam-boilers, or inefficient engineers in this city. In the report for 1889 only three accidents were recorded, none of them resulting in loss of life. In 1890 there was but one accident. This is very gratifying testimony of the efficiency and faithfulness of the officers and men of the Sanitary Company, and shows that their work has been performed with great care.

Steam-boiler Casualties during 1890.

The only accident occurring during the year was the explosion of a portable-boiler No. 3332, owned by James Edwards, contractor, and engaged in taking out rock at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Eagle avenue.

This boiler was an exceptionally good one, built in 1884, and was last tested by this Department, August 12, 1889; it exploded on July 21, 1890.

The boiler was situated upon a bluff upwards of seventy-five feet from the level of the street, and was dependent for its water-supply upon the force of the Croton from the street pipes. The appearance of the iron of the boiler indicated that it had been intensely hot, and with the feed open a probable flush of water entered the boiler coming in contact with the overheated iron caused the collapse. The fragments of iron flew in all directions, one portion striking an Italian laborer, named Nicholas Lillo, fracturing his skull; another piece struck Mrs. Annie Gittings, of No. 889 East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, spraining her ankle. William Hurligan, the engineer in charge, was arrested and held for trial on a charge of criminal negligence, and upon the trial of the case in the Court of Special Sessions he was discharged.

TENEMENT-HOUSE SQUAD.

This squad consists of one Sergeant, two Roundsmen and forty-two Patrolmen, detailed, pursuant to law, to the service of the Health Department in this city. The following schedule shows the specific duties assigned this squad by the Board of Health, in addition to which the Police force of the squad is expected to make arrests for offenses, and are subject to the orders of the Superintendent in all emergencies requiring the services of the entire force of the Department. This squad made 126 arrests during the year just closed:

HARBOR POLICE.

In the report for 1889 there appeared a very full statement of the importance of the service rendered the city by the Harbor Police, together with a description of the boats and other appurtenances of the force. Reference is hereby made to that report, and the recommendations therein contained as to the means by which this particular branch of the service could be made far more effective.

TWENTY-EIGHTH PRECINCT.

The Police force of this Precinct is employed along the water-front of the city, including the piers and bulkheads from Gouverneur slip, East river, to Fourteenth street, North river, and is commonly called the Steamboat Squad. The following tabulated statement will furnish an idea of the immense traffic, passengers and freight, that is managed along the water-front of this district, and the great value of the service of the police in maintaining order and regularity in transacting the business involved. The regulation of trucks constantly loading and unloading upon the narrow piers, and the constant arrival and departure of passengers, demand of the police a patience and labor that can hardly be estimated from the figures here given. None but tried and experienced officers are assigned to this squad for duty :

From the above it will be seen that the total number of messages transmitted over the Police telegraph lines was 346,671, being an increase of 28,931 messages over the preceding year. There is a steady increase in this branch of the service, and when it is borne in mind that a very large percentage of messages are received orally at the telegraph office, either by speaking tube or telephone, the operators being required to write them out on paper before transmission, some idea may be had of the nature, as well as the labor and importance, of the work performed by the attaches thereof. The Police Station-houses are connected by telegraph with Headquarters on five circuits, viz. : North, South, East, West and Central. The stations on these circuits transmit and receive messages with one another ; consequently, the number transmitted in this manner is not included in this report, but a record of them is made at each station. It is estimated that 25,000 messages are thus transmitted annually.

The Telephone Exchange System at these Headquarters, connecting the offices of the chief officers of the Department and with the General Exchange System, has worked satisfactorily during the past year. By means of this system a great many messages are transmitted, the nature of which does not require that record be kept of them ; the connections are all made at the telegraph office.

The Eighth, Ninth, Nineteenth and Twenty-eighth Precincts (Piers A and 41, North river), have been connected by telephone for several years. The telephones were originally placed at these stations to ascertain their adaptability for use in the Department.

Since the establishment of the Police Telegraph System, more than thirty years ago, the Dial telegraph instruments have been in constant use. A number of these instruments are in very bad condition. It will be necessary, during the present year, to give them a general overhauling. Some of them have been repaired so often as to be unfit for further use ; in such cases it will be necessary to furnish new instruments.

POLICE SIGNAL BOX SYSTEM.

The signal box system in operation in the Nineteenth, Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Precincts has given much satisfaction during the past year.

The Patrolmen are required to report at the boxes on their posts three times during each tour of duty, and to transmit signals to show that they are regularly patrolling, and to receive from the Station-house any instructions the Captain or Sergeants may have for them. Responsible citizens residing in the vicinity of these boxes are furnished with keys to them ; they are used only in cases of extreme emergency, such as ambulance calls, fires, burglaries, etc.

In this Precinct for the present only "Emergency Signals" are transmitted, namely : Call for Policemen, ambulance and fire alarm. A record of them is kept in the desk (telegraph) blotter. The officers in this Precinct are not required to transmit the regular patrol signals.

During the past year a small pocket signal book, containing the signal code for the operation of Police signal boxes, was adopted and with the approval of the Board of Police. One thousand copies of the same were printed. These books are now in the possession of the officers, and have proven of great advantage.

Additional signal boxes should be placed in each of the following Precincts, Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Precincts, as they are needed to make service effective. At present Patrolmen are obliged to go to posts adjoining theirs to transmit signals.

During the past year 35 miles of aerial wires were removed at the request of the Board of Electrical Control to places designated by said Board.

From the above it appears that the lodgings furnished has decreased somewhat, owing, it is understood, to the rigid and systematic examination made by the Health Department from time to time. Adding the Station-house lodgers (150,240) for 1890, to the total above given, we find a grand total of 4,973,835, or an average of 13,627 persons lodged nightly. The district comprising the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh Precincts, to which attention has been called in previous reports, shows a falling off in lodgings of 372,865, while the decrease on the total is 150,430. The lodgings furnished in this district (3,241,990), is 67.00 per cent. of the total in the City. These figures are very suggestive in view of the comparatively small portion of the city covered by these Precincts, and the large proportion of arrests made there. Some of the up-town Precincts have an equally large number of liquor and beer saloons (one a greater number than the Eleventh), yet the number of arrests is much less, while the per cent. of cheap lodgings is very small. The causes of this condition are worth study by those who take an interest in criminal statistics and have heretofore been referred to.

The capital of the Police Pension Fund, which amounted to \$299,873.48 on the first day of January, 1881, has gradually decreased until at the date of this report there is nothing remaining except a very insignificant balance after paying the pensions due on January 1, 1891. The amount paid to pensioners in the year 1881 was \$105,183.85; in the year 1890 there was paid to pensioners the aggregate sum of \$451,993.58, an increase in ten years of \$346,809.73. From these figures the necessity for augmenting the income of the fund may readily be seen. The provisions of the law are such that little discretion is left to the Board of Police with regard to the retirement of members of the force, while the sources of income are limited to items which cannot lawfully be increased either in number or amount receivable therefrom. Already the anxiety and embarrassment predicted in the report of last year has been experienced by this Department, and unless the Legislature comes to its aid the Trustees will be compelled to suspend payment of the pensions granted pursuant to law. It is suggested that more liberal provision ought to be made in behalf of the fund, or that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be vested with authority to appropriate sufficient money to meet the deficiencies which must certainly follow a failure of the Legislature to enact the measures necessary to continue the disbursements it has made mandatory.

APPROPRIATIONS.

The appropriations for 1890 and 1891, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of conducting the business of the Police Department, are given, so that information can be had at a moment's notice by all interested in the matter.

Salaries are paid monthly to the members of the force at the following rates per annum, subject to deductions for lost time by reason of sickness, absence, with or without leave and fines.

Tours of Police Duty.

Frequent inquiries having been made of this Department as to the division of patrol service among the Patrolmen of the force. A schedule was published in the report for 1889, to which attention is called.

BUREAU OF ELECTIONS.

As will be seen by the following tables, the work of the Bureau of Elections has largely increased, aside from the additional number of election officers appointed under the new Ballot Reform law, and this, too, notwithstanding the material decrease in the number of election districts. The number of persons under consideration for the different official positions in 1889 was 6,231. During the year 1890 no less than 10,751 persons were under consideration, an increase of 4,520. When it is considered that a careful investigation is made as to the character and qualifications of each individual of the large army (7,576) of election officers; that they must be sworn into office and instructed as to their respective duties; that stationery and blanks must be furnished them at the several polling places, and all the details preliminary to casting of the vote on election day, the gigantic task can be better understood.

The new election law, fixing upon the Board of Police the responsibility of printing over 15,000,000 of ballots, of several hundred differing forms as to names, entailed a labor that can hardly be explained. That it was performed in the limited time allowed by the law, and with little complaint from organizations and interested individuals, is generally admitted. That there were delays and some little confusion, owing to a division of authority, was unavoidable. It is hoped that familiarity with the law itself, and the experience of one year in its operation, all delay and confusion will be avoided. It is understood that several amendments, with a view to simplification, will be offered in the Legislature of 1891, and should they be enacted, there is little doubt that the machinery at hand will be amply sufficient to render every portion of the work preparatory to election smooth and effective.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

Fourth—That our report amended, corrected and revised herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers street, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the twenty-second day of July, 1891, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
