The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Monday, January 25, 1892, at 2 o'clock P.M., pursuant to the following notice:

SIR—You are respectfully requested to attend a special meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, to be held in the Mayor's office, at the City Hall, on Monday, January 25, 1892, at 2 o'clock P.M., at which it is proposed to consider unfinished business, with such other matters as may be brought before the Board.

The Board having been called to order,

The roll was called, and all the members were present and answered to their names:

On motion, the Mayor was elected Chairman of the Board.

The minutes of the meeting held November 6, 1891, were read and approved.

The Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards submitted a map or plan for the change of the location of Dawson street, westerly of Prospect avenue, and the discontinuance of Hewitt place, from Robbins avenue to Prospect avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York.

On motion, the matter was laid over until a more comprehensive map or plan of that section of the Twenty-third Ward should be prepared.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, relating to a change of grade of Willow street, was read:

SIR—I transmit herewith three similar plans and profiles for approval, entitled "Plan and profile showing change of grade of Willow avenue, between Long Island Sound and East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, established by the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, under chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, dated New York, April 16, 1891."

I also enclose form of resolution to be adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement.

Whereupon, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards offered the following preamble and resolutions:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York has prepared, adopted, established and submitted to this Board for its concurrence and approval, a map or plan showing change of grade of Willow avenue, between Long Island Sound and East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York,

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, this Board does hereby give its concurrence and approval to the change of grade of Willow avenue, between Long Island Sound and East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, as shown on a map entitled, "Plan and profile showing change of grade of Willow avenue, between Long Island Sound and East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, established by the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, under authority of chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, dated New York, April 16, 1891, and signed L. A. Risse, Chief Engineer," the same being deemed of the proper extent in order to show the change, alteration, amendment and modification of maps and plans heretofore adopted and filed by the Department of Public Parks.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards be and he is hereby designated and directed to cause three similar maps or plans to be made, to be certified by him, and to cause the same to be filed in the manner now prescribed by law, one in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of New York, one in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and one in the office of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—6.

On motion, it was ordered that the above-named map or plan, submitted by the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and approved of by this Board, be placed on file in the office of this Board.

The park could be laid out in the same manner that it is proposed to lay out Rutgers Park, viz.: by surrounding it with a neat fence, laying out grass plots and walks inside, and furnishing sufficient benches.

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a resolution of your Board, passed October 16, 1891, relating to the opening of Twenty-seventh street, between Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues.

Your resolution directs that said street be declared opened, provided the owners of the property lying on both sides of the street should cede to the City the land lying within said streets.

Upon examination I find that the title of the owners of the land on both sides of Twenty-seventh street is derived from grants of land under water executed by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and recorded in the Comptroller's Office in Liber H, page 121, in Liber I, page 234, and Liber K, page 75.

In these grants the corporation expressly excepts and reserves out of the land granted so much thereof as will be necessary to make the northerly half of Twenty-sixth street, the whole of Twenty-seventh street, and the southerly half of Twenty-eighth street, from the line of high water to Eleventh avenue to be and remain public streets.

From the above facts, I am of the opinion that the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York are the owners in fee of the lands lying within the lines of Twenty-seventh street, between Eleventh avenue and the Hudson river, and a cession from the owners of property fronting on said street is not necessary to enable your Board to declare said street legally opened.

By a concurrent vote of the three members of the Board, the Supervisor was directed to fill the requisitions by direct orders, that is, without contracts, let after advertisement, that course being deemed by them to be for the best interests of the City.
