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BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

STATED MEETING.

TUESDAY, February 9, 1897, 2 o'clock P.M.

The Board met in Room 16, City Hall.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The Vice-President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

NEW YORK, February 9, 1897. To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

It is estimated that the population of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards is now about 200,000. The assessed valuation of these two wards, exclusive of park lands, in 1890 was \$44,448,914, and their present assessed valuation, exclusive of park lands, is \$69,546,809. This does not include the new section, the valuation of which, according to the figures of the Tax Department, is \$15,033,200, making a total valuation of \$84,580,009 for this section of the City.

The development and growth of so large a territory is of great moment, not only to the inhabitants of that locality, but to those residing south of the Harlem river as well. The laying out, grading and paving of streets will not only increase the value of property and the amount of taxes received therefrom, but will also furnish homes and residences for many who are unable to purchase in other parts of the city where property is at present more valuable. In time the territory in the city limits north of the Harlem river should furnish homes for a large portion of our citizens. The street lines and grades in these wards have been finally established and building and property development stimulated thereby.

The topographical survey of the locality annexed to the city in 1895 is progressing and will be completed in about two years, by which time the work of laying out the streets in this section will be begun.

In the Final Estimates for 1896, \$633,000 were appropriated for the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and in the Final Estimates for 1897, \$779,750 were appropriated, an increase of \$146,750. Of this latter amount \$100,000 is made up of an increase devoted to the item of maintenance and government of streets, roads and avenues, including supplies, salaries and wages of all persons employed on the work. There was an increase of \$10,000 also in the item for rebuilding, cleaning and repairing sewers and drains, as ordered by the Board of Health, and an increase of \$14,500 in the item for surveying, laying out maps, plans, etc., and an increase of \$5,000 over the previous year's appropriation for the surveying and mapping of the new part of the Twenty-fourth Ward. It is readily seen, therefore, that the appropriations thus made are not only necessary for the maintenance of the ordinary work of this district, but are rendered imperatively necessary by the increased demands upon this Department owing to the addition to the city's territory.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The operations of the Department of Public Works affect the general public in so many ways and are so frequently discussed in the public prints that I only attempt herewith to make some general references to it. The management of the Department is clean, honest and intelligent.

This city is fortunate in its water supply and its means for storing the same. The storage capacity of the Croton water-shed has been increased from 17,579,000,000 gallons, in 1894, to nearly 30,000,000,000 gallons in 1896. The daily consumption of water in this city averages about 225,000,000 gallons, showing that the city can always have on hand a supply for at least 150 days. Any comparison drawn with other large cities must be greatly in favor of New York. The means of water distribution throughout the city, however, are not satisfactory. At present there is not sufficient pressure to force the supply to the upper floors of ordinary residences in some localities without the employment of auxiliary force, much less to supply the very high buildings in the lower part of the city. During the past year 20 miles of water-mains have been constructed averaging 12 inches in diameter, and work is in progress on Fifth avenue laying a water-main capable of carrying 50,000,000 gallons of water daily from the Central Park Reservoir to the lower part of the city. This work is being done under the authority of chapter 699 of the Laws of 1896, which authorized a special appropriation of a million of dollars for laying large water-mains to increase the supply and pressure in the lower and business parts of the city, and collaterally throughout the city. Measures for preventing the pollution of the water in the streams, lakes, ponds and rivers from which the city receives its water-supply have been vigorously prosecuted, and, with the co-operation of the Aqueduct Commissioners, the water-sheds are constantly and effectively patrolled to prevent willful and malicious pollution thereto. The distributing system now includes 757.76 miles of water-mains and 10,407 fire-hydrants. Under a special appropriation, providing for an issue of bonds, for additional fire-hydrants to increase the efficiency in extinguishing fires in the wholesale business districts, 291 fire-hydrants were placed at points designated by the Fire Department.

For the first time in the history of the city the revenue collected last year from water rents was more than enough to reimburse the city for the entire outlay of the Department of Public Works, which is taken from taxation. To express it in another way, our water rents paid for road pavements, street lighting, care of and repairs to the entire water system, care of and repairs to public buildings, salaries, wages and all other administrative expenses.

The Bureau of the Water Register during the year 1896 collected \$3,734,594.22, which with \$409,462.62, the amount of the water rents returned in arrears as liens on property, makes the total revenue from the water service \$4,144,056.84. The increase in the cash collections over 1895 is \$187,204.48, and the total revenue \$172,003.01. The increase in the cash collections over 1894 is \$347,786.56, and the total revenue \$439,442.01.

The favor with which asphalt pavements have been received has led to their substitution for worn-out granite pavements wherever the appropriations made therefor permitted. During the last year 20.48 miles of asphalt pavement were laid. The pavement repair force took up and relaid last year 247,371 square yards of stone pavement, and 13,638 square yards were relaid under contract. There are now 81,767 square yards of asphalt on which the contractor's guarantee of maintenance has expired and the cost for maintenance of which will devolve upon the city. Contracts running for ten years have been made by public letting at an average price of nine cents per square yard per year. This is exclusive of Eighth avenue, which was badly constructed in 1890 and as to which the contractor defaulted in his obligation of maintenance and repair.

Truckmen frequently complain of asphalt pavements, but such complaints are contradicted by the use of asphalt pavements in driveways parallel with stone pavements. For instance, there is heavy hauling on the Boulevard, while Eighth avenue is little used for trucking, and Chambers street is much used, while there is little traffic on Reade street. The demand for asphalt pavements by property-owners is far in excess of the appropriations available for repaving.

The proper maintenance of the city's pavements is rendered extremely difficult by reason of the enormous extent and frequency of openings made therein for the placing and repairing of underground structures. I quote the following from a communication received from the Commissioner of Public Works:

"The surface railroads and the attitude of the railroad companies in respect to their obligations to the public are another obstacle to the further improvement of the pavements. They either refuse absolutely to join the Department, or they delay in joining it, in the laying of new pavements by paving their own share within and between their tracks, as the amended General Railroad Act requires them to do. They claim exemption from this duty under the very lax conditions of old railroad franchises. The result is that on some miles of streets the Department has laid new pavements on each side of the car tracks, while the most valuable space for traffic, that occupied by the tracks, remains in the old dilapidated condition. From 1889 to 1895 the City expended \$703,878 in repaving within and between rail tracks, and holds that amount of claims against railroad companies. That sum would pay for 256,000 square yards, or 14½ miles of new asphalt pavements, which are very much needed for the benefit of the public at large."

The existing sewer system of New York, comprising the new territory with the old, is inadequate to the growing requirements of the city. This is a subject which should have serious consideration, as in the near future it will be necessary to consider the construction of a comprehensive sewer system which will be entirely adequate to the needs of the city.

For a number of years the charge for occupying space under the sidewalks, and in many cases beyond the curb-line, for vaults in front of buildings, remained fixed at seventy-five cents per superficial square foot. On August 4 last, acting under the authority of the City Ordinances, the Commissioner of Public Works established the charge at two dollars per square foot. The object

of such a charge was to insure proper compensation to the City, commensurate with the value of the privilege, and to discourage encroachments into and under the public sidewalks and streets by vault constructions.

Special attention has been given to the thorough cleaning, repair and maintenance of all the City buildings.

It is interesting to note that the attendance at the fifteen floating free baths during the season of 1896 exceeded that in the preceding year. For the first time in the existence of the city, the public floating baths were kept open throughout the night during the extreme heat of the last two weeks of last August, for the relief of the suffering people in the crowded districts, and several streets were flushed with water to relieve the suffering incident to the heated term.

The question of street obstruction is one constantly before the Department of Public Works and one difficult of solution. Much has been done to clear the streets and sidewalks of permanent encroachment except where sanctioned by statute or ordinance. Temporary obstructions are of daily occurrence and engage the constant attention of the Bureau of Incumbrances. During the past year 4,017 complaints were received and promptly attended to. 1,329 seizures were made and the articles removed to the Corporation Yards. A strict enforcement of the ordinance relative to the obstruction of the streets by building and other materials has resulted in much benefit to pedestrians and vehicles.

The appropriation for the Department of Public Works for 1896 was \$3,270,530.66, and the appropriation for 1897 was \$3,519,555.66, an increase of \$249,025. The main items, with the amounts of each, of this increase are as follows:

\$20,000 for the maintenance of boulevards, roads and avenues.
\$5,755 for the maintenance and repair of the Bronx River Works.
\$3,680 for free floating baths.
\$137,500 for lamps, gas and electric lights.
\$10,000 for laying Croton water-pipes.
\$8,900 for the maintenance and repair of the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct.
\$10,000 for repairs and renewal of pavements and regrading.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

The work of the Department of Street Cleaning is known and seen of all men. I shall make no extended review of it. It is sufficient to say that since the appointment of the present Commissioner of Street Cleaning the streets have been kept clean and the trucks removed therefrom. No more marked or beneficial change in the appearance of the streets of New York was ever brought about than by the removal of these trucks. They were a public nuisance, facilitated the commission of crime, were detrimental to health and prevented the cleaning of the streets.

A proper administration of the Street Cleaning Department contributes not only to the comfort but to the health of the city. As dirt makes disease, cleanliness insures health. The successful cleaning of the streets, therefore, furnishes valuable assistance to the work of the Health Department. To show the physical labor performed in this Department during the past year, I would state that 1,745,923 cartloads of material of all kinds were collected, of which 1,677,391 loads were finally disposed of by dumping at sea and behind bulkheads, the balance being disposed of by filling-in lots.

Practically all the snow last year was removed after January 1, to which must be added the large amount of snow removed during the last two snowstorms which occurred within the calendar year 1896, so that the grand total of cubic yards of snow removed from the streets of New York during the year 1896 was 809,449. The total cost of removing the snow for 1896 was \$424,000. Of this amount \$200,000 was paid by the sale of bonds and the balance out of the regular appropriation for the Department.

The number of incumbrances seized by the Department during 1896 was 4,427, and the amount received by the Department for the redemption of incumbrances during that year and from the proceeds of the sale of incumbrances was \$6,526.48. \$40,691.33 were received from public sales, fines and scow trimming privileges. The number of miles of paved streets cleaned is now 432.66.

The expenditure of the Street Cleaning Department for Administration, Sweeping, Carting, Final Disposition, Rents and Contingencies in 1892 was \$1,890,376.46; in 1893 it was \$2,036,812.81, an increase of over seven per cent.; in 1894 it was \$2,366,419.49, an increase of over sixteen per cent., and in 1895 it was \$2,538,799.26, an increase of over seven per cent. The last-mentioned increase should be considered with the fact in mind that a large area of territory in the annexed district was added to the jurisdiction of the Department of Street Cleaning and that there has been a constant growth of the city. The expenses for the Street Cleaning Department for the year 1896 for the accounts above named will be about \$2,787,058.62, as against \$2,704,577.26 actually expended in 1895, which latter includes amounts not included in the statement for 1895 made up of administration, etc., and shows an increase for 1896 over 1895 of \$82,481.36, or a little over three per cent.

The amount appropriated for 1896 for the Department of Street Cleaning was \$3,020,700, and for 1897 it was \$2,999,002.40. Of the amounts appropriated to the various accounts in the Department of Street Cleaning there was a reduction in the estimates for 1897 over those for 1896 of \$40,871 for sweeping and \$5,167 for carting, and the increase in the estimates for 1897 over those for 1896 was \$24,340.40 in the item of rents and contingencies, including repairs to stables and gas.

The expenditures for this Department therefore have not been inconsistent with the growth of the city. The increase of 1896 over 1895 has been reduced four per cent., while the rate of increase of 1895 over 1894 was about one-half the rate of increase of 1894 over 1893. The results obtained are the justification for the expenditures made.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The work and discipline of the Police Department have had my constant thought and attention. The peace and comfort of our citizens depend as much upon the intelligent and consistent conduct of the police force as upon any agency in the city government. A proper enforcement of the law, an assurance to each citizen of his rights thereunder and the detection of crime should be cardinal propositions in the management of the Police Department in this city. These results can only be obtained when rewards and punishments are meted out to members of the force upon the sole consideration of the merits of the actual cases, and when the members of the force themselves perform their duty regardless of any consideration of influence or favor. Whatever good results may have been accomplished, and I think they have been many, I have sought to have them worked out upon these lines and shall continue in that endeavor so long as I am in office.

In order that your Honorable Body may know and draw your own conclusions of the work performed by the Police Department under the present Commissioners, I have had a summary made showing the work done from November 1, 1893, to May 31, 1895, and also a summary of the work performed from June 1, 1895, to December 31, 1896.

As the statement just submitted speaks for itself, I shall add but few general remarks. While it is true that in the nineteen months prior to May 31, 1895, there appear to have been more arrests for excise violations than in the last nineteen months, it is a fact that during the period last mentioned the Excise Law has been more thoroughly and impartially enforced than ever before in the history of the Police Department. Licensed places which for years had been enabled to do business on Sunday and during other prohibited hours, have been forced to close, or to conform to the requirements of the new law.

Public gambling in the city has been practically suppressed, and where endeavor is made to carry it on under the protection of a club, such clubs are subject to strict police surveillance, are visited at irregular hours by officers of the department, and where there exists reasonable suspicion that in spite of the efforts of the police gambling is carried on in such places, policemen are stationed before the doors with instructions to notify persons entering that such places are reputed gambling houses.

The falling off in the number of complaints made to the Corporation Attorney for violations of the Corporation Ordinances indicates a much improved condition, and the results are apparent to anyone passing through the streets.

At present all the precincts of the city except eight are supplied with patrol-wagon service, and with one or two exceptions this provision has been made since May 1, 1895.

In the Second Precinct the station-house at the corner of Church and Liberty streets is in a wretched condition. The plumbing is defective, the wall of the Church street side is out of plumb and the building has been condemned. The property is valuable, and I think the City should sell it. The proceeds to be derived therefrom should be sufficient to purchase new ground and erect a new station-house with all modern improvements. In the Thirty-first Precinct the building used as a station-house, located at High Bridge, is not fit for such purpose. It is old, dilapidated and unsanitary. Steps should be taken by the City for the erection of a new station-house in this precinct.

On December 12, 1895, a Bicycle Squad was organized for the better protection of pedestrians against careless bicycle riders, and since its inauguration it is believed that many accidents have been averted by the activity of the police in this direction.

Increased protection to property has resulted from the fact that the number of detectives in the different precincts has been increased from two to four. Of this number two are on duty from 8 A.M. to 10 P.M., and two from 10 P.M. to 8 A.M.

In the summer of 1895 several large strikes occurred in the city which fully taxed the resources of the police force. These strikes were participated in by many persons, who, on account of their short residence in this country, were not thoroughly conversant with our institutions and easily yielded to the designs of unprincipled agitators. With few exceptions, however, no acts of violence were committed, and the police were able to insure proper protection to citizens and property.

During the past nineteen months there have been larger assemblages of people in this city at one time than ever before, or perhaps than ever, in any other city in the world. These crowds have been handled intelligently, wisely and without accident.

The efficiency of the river patrol service has been increased by the substitution of several naphtha launches for the oldtime and less useful rowboats.

The appropriation for the Police Department for 1896 was \$5,925,410.30, and for 1897 it was \$6,983,939.08, an increase of \$1,058,528.78. In the estimate for 1896, \$4,596,652.30 were appropriated for the salaries of 3,537 Patrolmen, this increase being authorized under the provisions of chapter 673 of the Laws of 1896. This one item alone would account for an increase in the appropriation of \$1,033,286.78.

It is unnecessary for me to add that the increase in the police force was necessary on account of the growth of the city and the additional territory which came under the control of the department by reason of the recent additions to the city's limits.

The amount appropriated for the Bureau of Elections in 1896 was \$515,294, and for 1897 it was \$323,500.

In the year 1896, 1,295 Patrolmen were appointed, as many as during the five years from 1890 to 1894, inclusive, and nearly three times as many as were appointed before in any one year. For the first time in many years the ranks of the department are now filled.

An important reform has been instituted in the abolition of the Police Station Lodging-houses, which previously had been effective agencies in the spread of disease.

It will take wise administration and benevolent legislation to render the police force what the citizens have a right to demand that it should be. I am sure that much progress has been accomplished during the past nineteen months in the work of reorganization and eradicating the evils disclosed by the Lexow Investigating Committee.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The recent large additions to the city's territory and the continued erection of high buildings in the lower part of the city have greatly increased the responsibilities of the Fire Department. I believe, however, that during the past year the Fire Commissioners have done everything in their power to meet the demands made upon that Department, and that the work of the Firemen has proved more efficient than at any time in the history of the Department.

The entire personnel of the Fire Department on the 1st day of January, 1897, numbered 1,370, and the active force for extinguishing fires numbered 1,169, divided into 86 companies.

When the extent of the city's territory and the peculiar shape of Manhattan Island are considered, it will be readily understood that only the most careful attention and the strictest discipline can accomplish for the city the best results.

Since January 1, 1896, five new engine companies have been added to the force, four of them in the new territory beyond the Bronx river, where buildings are so scattered that it is especially necessary that there should be facilities for an immediate response to an alarm. The Department has introduced the so-called chemical engines, which is a new departure, and the results attained are encouraging, showing that in many instances small fires were entirely extinguished without other assistance.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment allowed \$50,000 for the construction of a new fire-boat, which it is believed will be in service before the beginning of next winter. This will afford additional protection to the water-front, as well as to the charitable and penal institutions situated on Blackwell's, Ward's and Randall's Islands.

For the first time in many years the entire force of the repair shops of the Department has been kept at work throughout the year, without a single day's suspension to keep within the limits of the appropriation therefor. To obtain better accommodations for the repair shops the Board of Fire Commissioners applied for the lot in the rear connecting with the present site at No. 130 West Third street, in the meantime increasing the facilities in the present building by providing a more powerful boiler and a freight elevator.

The increase in the growth of the city makes necessary the acquirement of new sites and the erection of new engine-houses. By condemnation proceedings a new site has been obtained for another engine company on Twelfth street, just west of University place, and a fire-house will be erected thereon as soon as funds are available. Condemnation proceedings have been begun for the acquisition of the following sites:

Seventy-fourth street, near Amsterdam avenue, for a new truck company;

Mott street, near Grand, and

Great Jones street, between Lafayette place and the Bowery. (These last two being for Engine Companies Nos. 55 and 33, respectively, whose houses will be taken by the Elm street widening and extension), and on

City Island, for a new engine company.

Plans have been selected and specifications are under way for a new fire-house on Forty-third street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, upon a lot acquired last fall. Arrangements are also being made for new houses upon the following sites:

One Hundred and Fortieth street, near Amsterdam avenue, new engine company.

One Hundred and Seventieth street, near Amsterdam avenue, new engine company.

Forest avenue, near Clifton street, new engine company.

Grand avenue, Woodlawn Heights, new engine company.

Ogden avenue, for Hook and Ladder Company No. 19, now occupying these premises.

I call your attention particularly to these facts as showing exactly the steps being taken by the Department to meet the requirements made upon it.

An appropriation was recently made for a new site and building for Engine Company No. 61 in Westchester, and for a building for a new company on City Island.

The continued erection of high buildings, particularly in the lower part of the city, is a matter to which the Department and myself have given considerable attention. The opinion of the Board of Commissioners and the Chief of the Department is that these buildings are a menace to life and property. The height to which our engines can throw water through hose is stated by the Chief to be about 125 feet, so that all stories above this point must depend for protection from fire on the means adopted in the building for that purpose. It can readily be seen that in order to cope with fires in these buildings the Department feels it necessary to have the most powerful engines and the best of equipment at hand in these localities. The work of the Fire Department will be facilitated by laying the additional water-main down Fifth avenue, now in course of construction, and for which the last Legislature appropriated a million dollars.

During the year 1896 \$48,000, the amount of the appropriation, was spent by the Fire Department in repairs upon the fifty-six buildings in the Department.

Under a more rigid supervision of the system of purchases an average saving of about ten per cent. has been effected in the prices paid for articles of supply and materials.

The Bureau of the Fire Marshal has to deal with questions relating to the origin of fires and the detection of incendiaries, and during the past year it has secured the conviction of several notorious offenders to whom have been meted out sentences for a long term of years.

The receipts of the Bureau of Combustibles from permits and licenses for the sale of kerosene, gunpowder and other combustibles for the year 1896 amounted to \$52,638.55, exceeding the amount received for the last two preceding years and exceeding the collections for 1894 by \$5,426.55.

During the year 1896 there were 4,360 telegraphic alarms of fire and 3,890 actual fires, resulting in an estimated loss of \$3,492,604, being an average loss per fire of \$897.84. With the exception of 1895 this is the smallest average loss in the history of the Fire Department.

A reference to the work of the Fire Department would be incomplete without mention being made of the meritorious services performed by the officers and members of the uniformed force.

During the year 1896 thirty-nine officers and men were specially commended by their superiors for bravery in the performance of duty, and of that number sixteen were particularly commended, because of the "personal risk" incurred in this service. At least thirty-six lives were saved by our firemen in this manner.

With the exception of an allowance of a little over an hour for each meal each day and three days' rest in a month, the firemen are on duty every hour, day and night. That the devotion and faithfulness of the firemen are not unappreciated by our citizens is evidenced by the many commendatory letters received and by the contributions to the Department Relief Fund. These contributions amounted during the past year to \$1,223.

As each year makes larger demands upon the Department, and necessarily calls for larger appropriations to meet these demands, it is worthy of notice that, for the coming year, the increase in the appropriations is almost entirely applied to bettering the apparatus of the Department, and not to salaries. The amount allowed in the Final Estimates for 1896 was \$2,345,355, and the amount allowed for 1897, in the Final Estimates, was \$2,435,926. The total increase in the appropriations over last year, including the appropriation for the new fire-boat and new boilers for one of the other fire-boats, is \$90,571, of which sum only \$5,571 is for salaries.

I consider the discipline of the Fire Department to be excellent, and believe the officers and men to be working in hearty accord for the best interests of the service.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

An investigation by the present Dock Commissioners, who assumed control about May 1, 1895, disclosed the fact that there were then on file applications for dock facilities from every class of shipping. Some of these applications had been before the Department for many years, and notwithstanding the fact that applicants were willing to pay high rentals, they were unable to secure suitable accommodations. At that time also the Counsel to the Corporation had been requested to acquire by condemnation twenty-eight parcels of property, and proceedings were commenced in thirteen cases. Agreements had been entered into between owners and the Dock Department for the acquisition of four other parcels, which agreements were under consideration by the Sinking Fund. Of these thirty-two cases only four were between West Eleventh and West Twenty-third streets, where the greatest necessity for the acquisition and improvement of property existed. It was estimated that the amount of money required for the acquisition of these parcels of property, including the cost of improving the same, would have exceeded twenty million dollars, while the expenditures of the department for such purposes were limited by statute to three millions of dollars per annum, and as the result of an examination as to the properties most needed for commercial purposes fourteen condemnation proceedings were discontinued and the agreements to purchase allowed to lapse. A further investigation showed that the most urgent applications for wharfage accommodations related to property between the Battery and West Twenty-third street. As all the property owned by the City within this section was fully occupied, it was decided that relief could only be afforded by acquiring the rights of private owners between West Eleventh and West Twenty-third streets, consisting of a tract of land which had been filled in years ago and upon which had been erected buildings for dwelling, manufacturing and commercial purposes. The Board therefore decided to concentrate its first efforts upon the improvement of the water-front between West Eleventh and Gansevoort streets. Condemnation proceedings had been commenced by the Counsel to the Corporation for the acquisition of the two blocks between West Eleventh and Bethune streets, constituting about one-third of this territory, but as the proceedings were long and tedious, it was evident that the desired property between Bethune and Gansevoort street could not be acquired for several years.

During the session of 1896 an act was passed by the Legislature providing that title to the property between Bethune and Gansevoort streets should vest in the City four months from the date the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment filed their oaths of office, and under this statute title to the last parcel of property in that section vested in the city November 9, 1896. Since that time the work has been pushed rapidly, the buildings have been nearly all removed, and a contract for dredging awarded. The construction of the bulkhead or river wall between Charles and West Eleventh streets is well under way, and the Commissioners are prepared with plans and specifications to proceed with the improvement upon the removal of the remaining buildings and to push the work as rapidly as possible. The Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed by the Supreme Court in one of the condemnation proceedings have awarded for the northerly half of the block between Bank and Bethune streets the sum of \$581,000. This is the only case in which an award has been made within the territory mentioned, and, taking this as a basis, it is estimated that the value of the entire property to be acquired will approximate the sum of five and a half millions of dollars.

Recognizing that the cost of these improvements would exceed the amount of Dock Bonds authorized to be issued in any one year, the Legislature of 1896 empowered the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the issuance of six million dollars of additional Dock Bonds, not more than two millions of which were to be issued in any one year, making five millions available in each year for the purposes of the Dock Department for the next three years.

Experience has proven that the plans determined upon by the Dock Commissioners in 1894, and afterward approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, would be entirely inadequate to meet the present demands of commerce, as such plans provided for piers eighty feet wide with slips two hundred and twenty-five feet in width, whereas the great trans-Atlantic steamship lines require piers one hundred and twenty-five feet wide, with slips two hundred and fifty feet in width on either side. The present Board, therefore, has determined upon new plans providing for the construction of three new piers, each one hundred and twenty-five feet in width, with slips two hundred and fifty feet wide; one pier one hundred feet in width, with a two-hundred-and-fifty-foot slip, and one pier seventy feet wide, with a slip two hundred and fifty feet in width. This improvement creates over a mile of new wharfage-room in the most congested section of the water-front.

Negotiations are now in progress and nearly consummated for the leasing of all this property on a basis which will be profitable to the City and not burdensome to the occupants, and will be the means of bringing to the City one and, perhaps three, steamship lines now accommodated at other places.

During the year 1896 over seven hundred feet of bulkhead or river-wall has been completed. An equal length of cribwork has been built, and seven hundred and sixty-seven feet of additional cribwork is in course of construction. The work of repairs and maintenance has been large, amounting to \$221,636.56. This is chiefly due to the rebuilding of a large pier (No. 43) on the North river, and to the necessity of dredging to a greater depth than has heretofore been necessary, on account of the increased size and draught of the ocean-going steamers.

Complying with the wishes of your Honorable Body, and acting under the provisions of chapter 298 of the Laws of 1892, the Dock Commissioners have decided to construct a recreation building on the Pier at the foot of East Third street. Contracts for the foundation of this structure have already been awarded and plans for the building, which is to be constructed chiefly of steel, approved. The proposed building will be about three hundred feet long and fifty-two feet in width, and will afford ample facilities for recreation to the residents of the densely populated district in the neighborhood of East Third street.

By resolution passed November 14, 1895, the present Dock Commissioners appropriated to the sole use of canal boats on and after March 15, 1896, the half of the piers at the foot of West Fifty-second and West Fifty-fourth streets. Seven hundred and fifty feet of the new bulkhead at Sherman's creek has been set apart for this purpose, which will afford this class of commerce one-half mile of additional wharfage room.

Seventeen miles of water front of that portion of Westchester County annexed in 1895 have

been surveyed and correct maps made thereof, the work including four thousand soundings and three thousand elevations of levels.

The revenue of the Dock Department in 1894 from dock and slip rent and wharfage collected amounted to \$1,903,095.30, and in 1896 to \$2,048,411.23, showing an increase in 1896 over 1894 of \$145,315.93. An important reform has been instituted in the manner of collecting and accounting for wharfage which went into effect January 1, 1896, materially increasing the revenue from that source. The change consisted in the use of triplicate tickets, the date, amount of wharfage, designation of rig, etc., being punched in triplicate simultaneously in the presence of the person receiving the same; one ticket being delivered to the master of the vessel, or to the person paying the wharfage, another sent to the Treasurer of this Department, and the third retained by the Dock Master. Cash payments are required, except in cases where responsible parties apply for credit, when collections are made at the end of each month.

During the fifteen years ending December 31, 1895, the uncollected wharfage account amounted to \$44,581.17, being a loss of \$2,972.08 per annum. Under the present system there are no uncollectible accounts.

The work now under way for the improvement of the water-front of the city is the largest in its history, and will be of the greatest benefit to its commerce.

Shortly after entering upon their duties the present Dock Commissioners advocated the construction by the City of a Graving dock of sufficient capacity to accommodate the largest ocean steamer engaged in our foreign commerce. Graving docks, in which the largest ocean-going vessels could be docked for the purpose of being scraped, painted and repaired, are essential conditions to the best development of maritime commerce. It is necessary that the chief commercial entrepôt of the Western continent should have the best facilities for commerce. I believe it to be of the utmost importance that at this great port of entry there should be a graving dock sufficient in size and accommodations to meet the requirements of the largest vessels that enter this port. The reason why the construction of a large graving dock has not already been undertaken is that the money available for the improvement of the water front by the Dock Department has been necessarily employed in meeting the great demands for wharfage facilities, and because the Dock Commissioners felt that they might not have authority for such construction, as the law now stands.

By the Act of January 6, 1895, annexing new territory to the City of New York, the harbor of New York received twenty-seven additional miles of water front.

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

As the work of this Department is of a technical and scientific nature, I shall attempt no general review thereof, nor indulge in any discussion regarding its management. It is proper, however, that your Honorable Body should be informed of the work performed in this Department, and I accordingly present some figures summarizing what has been accomplished.

JURORS.

During the year 1896 several legislative enactments effected radical changes in the method of drawing jurors. The territorial limits marking the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Jurors have been largely extended and an entirely new jury department has been established for the trial of criminal cases. To meet the complaints of citizens who were called to serve as jurors and were compelled to serve each year, a bill was prepared and passed by the Legislature of 1896, providing that where a juror serves a term he is relieved from jury duty until the second jury year. Under the provisions of the statute amended he would have been liable to be called each year. To avoid the possibility of error in too frequently drawing the same person to act as juror, chapter 874 of the Laws of 1896 provides that the ballots for trial jurors shall be returned by the County Clerk to the Commissioner of Jurors on the last day of the month or immediately after the term of Court for which they have been drawn. By a further act of the Legislature of 1896 the Commissioner of Jurors is charged with the notification of jurors to attend at Court. This change was made with a view to prove personal service on jurors, to avoid the continued claims of non-service and the remission of fines imposed for not serving as jurors. In connection with such service the Commissioner of Jurors prepared a notice with coupon attached requiring the signature of the juror drawn to be made thereon. As the law does not compel such signature, there have been many refusals to sign, and a bill has been prepared by the Commissioner to be presented to the Legislature covering that provision. By the addition of a portion of Westchester County to New York County about twenty-eight square miles of territory were added to the city limits. To deliver jury notices personally in this district entailed added expense both in clerical service and in time consumed, and a small additional appropriation was therefore necessary.

The consolidation of the Superior, Common Pleas and Oyer and Terminer Courts with the Supreme Court requires the drawing of more jurors than heretofore. A new part has been added to the Court of General Sessions. In 1894, 27,370 jurors were drawn; in 1896, 32,182 jurors were drawn, showing a remarkable increase of 4,812. Two new Civil District Courts were established by the Legislature of 1896, making a further demand upon the present jury system.

In May, 1896, a new statute went into effect requiring the establishment of a special list of four thousand names for service in the Criminal Courts. These names are taken from the lists of trial jurors, causing extra effort not only to get new names in place of those thus taken, but to make sure that the average of the trial list is not lowered.

It has been the purpose of the Commissioner of Jurors not only to enforce the law, but in the administration of his department to accomplish two specific results in the drawing of jurors; first, to select the most intelligent jurors possible, consistent with the many exemptions provided by law, and second, to see that as many men as possible are drawn for jury duty, so that those who are drawn may not be compelled to serve any oftener than may be absolutely necessary.

The administration of the present Commissioner has received many commendations from the judges, and the juries now drawn represent a higher average of intelligence than ever before.

BOARD OF ELECTRICAL CONTROL.

I submit herewith a summary of the subways constructed in and through various streets and avenues of the City during the year 1896.

Such construction has been conducted in accordance with the requirements of chapter 263 of the Laws of 1892, relating to electrical subways in the City of New York.

In addition to the foregoing and for the purpose of ventilating these subways, there has been laid 4.85 miles of six inch ventilating pipe in the trenches above mentioned. When the subways

were first built no provision was made for ventilation, and the necessity for it was not then understood, but after they were put in operation frequent explosions at points where manholes were placed caused a careful investigation to be made to ascertain the cause therefor. It was discovered that illuminating gas, which escaped from leaking and worn out gas-mains, collected in the subways and was held there by their practically air-tight condition. In consequence of this condition the subway companies provided a system of blowers at various points by which the gas was forced out by air driven under pressure through ventilating pipes placed parallel with the subways and having apertures at the manholes. By this system, the resistance of air being greater than the pressure of gas, the entrance of the latter was prevented. The results of this method have proved satisfactory.

During the year 1896, 223 telegraph poles have been removed from the City's streets with 1,635 miles of wire. The total number of removals of poles and wires since the creation of the Board of Electrical Control is 20,377 poles and 29,802 miles of wire. Such removals have been accomplished without expense to the City. Very respectfully, W. L. STRONG, Mayor.

That your petitioner proposes to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad for public use in the City of New York, with double tracks connecting with the tracks of said company, already constructed, and as branches or extensions thereof, upon or along the surface of streets, avenues and highways in the City of New York, as follows:

From the junction of Third avenue and East Ninety-ninth street, connecting there by suitable curves, switches and appliances with the railroad of this company on Third avenue, running thence easterly through, upon and along said East Ninety-ninth street to the ferry landing at the foot of East Ninety-ninth street for the purpose of connecting with said ferry.

That your petitioner now owns and is operating in the City of New York as a part of one system fourteen and twenty-five-one-hundredths miles of railroad, or thereabouts.

That said proposed extension or branch will not be more than one-half mile in length, and will become and be a part of said system, and connected therewith.

That the construction of said railroad will greatly accommodate the public and promote the convenience thereof, and will afford additional and much needed facilities for travel to the territory through which said railroad will extend, and will enable your petitioner to transport persons from all points on its system over this extension as a part of a continuous line to their destination for one fare.

That the railroad proposed to be constructed, extended, maintained and operated by your petitioner, as hereinbefore set forth, is intended to be operated by any motive power other than steam locomotive power, which now or hereafter may be lawfully used or employed on its route.

That, pursuant to the laws of this State, it is necessary for it to obtain the consent of the Common Council of the City of New York, to enable it to construct, maintain and operate the railroad aforesaid, and accordingly your petitioner now applies to your Honorable Body for such consent.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays and makes application to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent and permission to be granted to your petitioner, its successors, successor, lessees and assigns, to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad for public use, through, upon and along the avenues, streets and highways above set forth and described, together with all necessary connections, switches, sidings, turnouts, turntables, crossovers and suitable stands for the convenient working of said railroad, and for the accommodation of the company's cars which may be run over said railroad by your petitioner, its successors, successor, lessees and assigns.

That your petitioner proposes to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad for public use in the City of New York, with double tracks, connecting with the tracks of said company already constructed, and as branches or extensions thereof, upon and along the surface of streets, avenues and highways in the City of New York, as follows:

From the junction of Amsterdam avenue and West Ninety-sixth street, connecting there by suitable curves, switches and appliances with the railroad of this company upon said Amsterdam avenue; running thence, with double tracks, easterly through, upon and along said West Ninety-sixth street to the easterly side of Central Park, West, or Eighth avenue; running thence easterly through, upon and along the Transverse road through Central Park, at Ninety-seventh street, upon obtaining the consent of the Department of Public Parks, to Fifth avenue; running thence easterly across said Fifth avenue and through, upon and along East Ninety-seventh street to the intersection of said East Ninety-seventh street with Park avenue; running thence southerly through, upon and along said Park avenue to the intersection of said Park avenue with East Ninety-sixth street; running thence easterly through, upon and along said East Ninety-sixth street to the intersection of said East Ninety-sixth street with Third avenue.

Also from the junction of Amsterdam avenue and West Ninety-seventh street, connecting there by suitable curves, switches and appliances with the railroad of this company on said Amsterdam avenue; running thence, with double tracks, easterly through, upon and along said West Ninety-seventh street to the easterly side of Central Park, West, or Eighth avenue; running thence easterly through, upon and along the Transverse road through Central Park, at Ninety-seventh street, upon obtaining the consent of the Department of Public Parks, to Fifth avenue; running thence easterly across said Fifth avenue and through, upon and along East Ninety-seventh street to the intersection of said East Ninety-seventh street with Park avenue; running thence southerly through, upon and along said Park avenue to the intersection of said Park avenue with East Ninety-sixth street; running thence easterly through, upon and along said East Ninety-sixth street to the intersection of said East Ninety-sixth street with Third avenue.

That the railroad proposed to be constructed, extended, maintained and operated by your petitioner, as hereinbefore set forth, is intended to be operated by any motive power other than steam locomotive power, which now or hereafter may be lawfully used or employed on its route.

That, pursuant to the laws of this State, it is necessary for it to obtain the consent of the Common Council of the City of New York to enable it to construct, maintain and operate the railroad aforesaid, and accordingly your petitioner now applies to your Honorable Body for such consent.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays and makes application to the Common Council of the City

Twenty-fifth street, running thence southerly or southeasterly, with double tracks, through, upon and along private property to the junction of East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street and Pleasant avenue; thence southerly through, upon and along said Pleasant avenue to said point of union; and by the construction, maintenance and operation of an extension or branch of the railroad of the said Forty-second Street, Manhattanville and St. Nicholas Avenue Railway Company, commencing at the intersection of East One Hundred and Tenth street and Pleasant avenue, connecting there by suitable curves, switches and appliances with the railroad of the said Forty-second, Manhattanville and St. Nicholas Avenue Railway Company, and running thence, with double tracks northerly through, upon and along said Pleasant avenue to said point of union, and the same to be operated by any motive power which is now or may at any time lawfully be used on either of the routes connected thereby.

III.—That by the construction of such connection your petitioners will be able and hereby offers to establish and maintain a new continuous route for public travel over the existing tracks or roads and said connection.

And, provided that the local authorities of the City of New York will consent to the construction of said connection and to the establishment, maintenance and operation of said new route for public travel, your petitioners hereby consent and agree (the requisite consents of property owners or the lawful substitute therefor having been first obtained) to construct said connection and to maintain and operate the same as a part of said continuous route for one fare.

IV.—That said connection cannot be operated as an independent railroad without inconvenience to the public, but it is to the public advantage that the same should be operated as a continuous line or route with said existing railroads respectively.

The petition of the Forty-second Street, Manhattanville and St. Nicholas Avenue Railway Company, respectfully shows:

That said railroad company is a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, and for many years owning and operating a street surface railroad on Forty-second street, from the Hudson river to East river, and to Thirty-fourth Street Ferry, and upon Tenth avenue, the Boulevard and Manhattan street to Fort Lee Ferry, and also upon St. Nicholas avenue from Manhattan street to One Hundred and Tenth street, and along One Hundred and Tenth street to the easterly terminus thereof. That said company also transfers passengers with the Third Avenue Railroad Company, and also with the Second Avenue Railroad Company, at One Hundred and Tenth street, and at Forty-second street, thereby enabling passengers, by means of these two great railroad lines of the east side of the city, to reach the Grand Central Depot and the central and upper western portions of the city, and to the Fort Lee Ferry at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, by one continuous ride, if so desired, from the City Hall and from Fulton and Peck Slip Ferries.

PROPERTY OWNERS' UNION OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, No. 78 EAST NINETY-SIXTH STREET, NEW YORK, February 8, 1897. To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—It seems necessary that an ordinance should be passed to compel the railroads in the City transferring passengers, to give transfers to passengers in the cars before the points of transfer are reached.

At present at many points of transfer, passengers must chase after transfer agents from one corner to another, and at times it is ridiculous in the extreme to see ladies and gentlemen follow the transfer agent from one side of the street to the other in rain and mud, like chasing the elusive butterfly, in order to get a transfer.

At the same time transfer checks should more plainly state, and in larger type, the line transferred to, as at present it is extremely difficult for a passenger to tell whether he has received a correct and desired transfer, and mistakes of conductors cannot be rectified after leaving the car.

We respectfully ask your Honorable Body to pass such ordinances as will remedy the evils complained of.

GENTLEMEN—I observed in to-day's "Sun" that you are considering the matter of numbering houses in this city. I would respectfully suggest that the Philadelphia or central system be adopted for both avenues and streets. The numbering on the streets to commence with 0 at Avenue A instead as now at Fifth avenue. All east of Avenue A would be east, and all west of that avenue would be west.

For instance: No. 562 West Twenty-third street would come between Fifth and Sixth avenues, and No. 102 East Fourteenth street would come between Avenues B and C.

The numbers on the avenues and Broadway to commence with 100 at First street or, if thought better, commence with 1400 at Fourteenth street, since Fourteenth street runs from river to river. The present numbers south of Fourteenth street to be as they are now. With the suffix S added for south, No. 250 Broadway, S, would be somewhere south of Fourteenth street; No. 4827 Broadway would be between Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets; No. 6346 Ninth avenue would be between Sixty-third and Sixty-fourth streets.

Every avenue and Broadway would commence with No. 2300 on Twenty-third street.
