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## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTERS.)

Minutes of meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment of City of New York, held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, March 13, 1908.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; Timothy P. Sullivan, Acting President, Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan; Bird S. The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

The minutes of the meeting held February 14, 1908, were approved as printed.

WIDENING AND EXTENDING TERRACE PLACE, CHANGING THE LINES OF SHERMAN STREET, DISCONTINUING SHERMAN STREET, CHANGE OF GRADES AND ESTABLISHING GRADES IN TERRACE PLACE, ESTABLISHING GRADES IN SHERMAN STREET, AND CHANGING GRADES IN SEVENTEENTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed widening of Terrace place, from Seventeenth street to Prospect avenue, extending Terrace place, from Prospect avenue to Coney Island avenue, changing the lines of Sherman street, between Seeley street and Terrace place; discontinuing Sherman street, between Reeve place and Terrace place; discontinuing Sherman street, between the old City line and Terrace place; changing the grades of Terrace place, from Eighteenth street to Prospect avenue; establishing grades in Terrace place, from Prospect avenue to Coney Island avenue; establishing grades in Sherman street, from Seeley street to Terrace place, and changing the grades of Seventeenth street, from Eleventh avenue to Terrace place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, affidavits of publication were presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in favor of or in opposition to the proposed changes, the hearing was closed.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 14th day of February, 1908, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to widen Terrace place, between Seventeenth street and Prospect avenue; extend Terrace place, from Prospect avenue to Coney Island avenue; change the lines of Sherman street, between Seeley street and Terrace place; discontinue Sherman street, between Reeve place and Terrace place; discontinue Sherman street, between the old City line and Terrace place; change the grades of Terrace place, from Eighteenth street to Prospect avenue; establish grades in Terrace place, between Prospect avenue and Coney Island avenue; establish grades in Sherman street, between Seeley street and Terrace place, and change the grades of Seventeenth street, between Eleventh avenue and Terrace place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 13th day of

March, 1908, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 13th day of March, 1908; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 13th day of March, 1908; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by widening Terrace place, between Seventeenth street and Prospect avenue; extending Terrace place, from Prospect avenue to Coney Island avenue; changing the lines of Sherman street, between Seeley street and Terrace place; discontinuing Sherman street, between Reeve place and Terrace place; discontinuing Sherman street, between the old City line and Terrace place; changing the grades of Terrace place, from Eighteenth street to Prospect avenue; establishing grades in Terrace place, between Prospect avenue and Coney Island avenue; establishing grades in Sherman street, between Seeley street and Terrace place, and changing the grades of Seventeenth street, between Eleventh avenue and Terrace place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to make the aforesaid changes as follows:

#### Terrace Place.

1. The northerly line of Terrace place, between Seventeenth street and Windsor place, is to be a straight prolongation of the northerly line of Terrace place, as now laid out between Eleventh avenue and Seventeenth street.

2. The southerly line of Terrace place, between Prospect avenue and Coney Island avenue, is to be 80 feet distant from and parallel with the said northerly line.

#### Sherman Street.

1. The easterly line of Sherman street is to begin at a point on the southerly line of Terrace place, extended as hereinbefore described, distant 214.33 feet westerly from the intersection with the westerly line of Coney Island avenue and is to extend southwardly to a point on the northerly line of Seeley street, distant 162 feet westerly from the intersection with the westerly line of Coney Island avenue.

2. The westerly line of Sherman street is to be distant 60 feet westerly from and parallel with the said easterly line.

3. The lines of Sherman street as at present laid out between the northerly line of Reeve place and the old City line are hereby discontinued and closed.

4. The lines of Sherman street as at present laid out between the northerly line of Terrace place, extended as hereinbefore described, and the old City line are hereby discontinued and closed.

#### GRADES.

##### Terrace Place, Northerly Curb Line.

1. The elevation at the intersection with the easterly curb line of Eighteenth street to be 122 feet, as heretofore established.

2. The elevation at the intersection with the westerly curb line of Seventeenth street to be 112.35 feet.

3. The elevation at the intersection with the easterly curb line of Seventeenth street to be 111.52 feet.

4. The elevation at a point distant 14 feet westerly from the intersection with the westerly curb line of Prospect avenue to be 104.08 feet.

5. The elevation at the intersection with the westerly curb line of Prospect avenue to be 104.08 feet, as in use and improved.

6. The elevation at the intersection with the easterly curb line of Prospect avenue to be 104.72 feet, as in use and improved.

7. The elevation at the intersection with the southwesterly curb line of Sherman street to be 100.3 feet.

8. The elevation at the intersection with the northeasterly curb line of Sherman street to be 99.9 feet.

9. The elevation at a point distant 123 feet easterly from the intersection with the easterly curb line of Sherman street to be 100.4 feet.

10. The elevation at a point distant 21 feet westerly from the intersection with the westerly curb line of Windsor place to be 99.9 feet.

11. The elevation at the intersection with the westerly curb line of Windsor place to be 99.9 feet, as in use and improved.

##### Terrace Place, Southerly Curb Line.

1. The elevation at the intersection with the easterly curb line of Eighteenth street to be 122.0 feet, as heretofore established.

2. The elevation at a point distant 208 feet easterly from the intersection with the easterly curb line of Eighteenth street to be 110.52 feet.

3. The elevation at the intersection with the westerly curb line of Prospect avenue to be 102.03 feet, as in use and improved.

4. The elevation at the intersection with the easterly curb line of Prospect avenue to be 102.68 feet as in use and improved.

5. The elevation at a point distant 92 feet easterly from the intersection with the easterly curb line of Prospect avenue to be 103.5 feet.

6. The elevation at the intersection with the westerly curb line of Sherman place to be 99.5 feet.

7. The elevation at the intersection with the easterly curb line of Sherman street to be 99.5 feet.

8. The elevation at a point distant 98 feet easterly from the intersection with the easterly curb line of Sherman street to be 99.9 feet.

9. The elevation at the intersection with the westerly curb line of Coney Island avenue to be 98.16 feet, as in use and improved.

##### Seventeenth Street.

1. The elevation at Eleventh avenue to be 126.75 feet, as heretofore established.

2. The elevation at the northwesterly curb intersection at Terrace place to be 112.35 feet.



3. The elevation at the northeasterly curb intersection at Terrace place to be 111.52 feet.

*Sherman Street.*

1. The elevation at Seeley street to be 93.28 feet, as in use and improved.
2. The elevation at the southeasterly and southwesterly curb line intersections at Terrace place to be 99.5 feet.
3. The elevation at the northwesterly curb line intersection at Terrace place to be 100.3 feet.
4. The elevation at the northeasterly curb intersection at Terrace place to be 99.9 feet.
5. The elevation at Eleventh avenue to be 123.0 feet, as heretofore established.

All elevations are referred to mean high water datum, as established in the Borough of Brooklyn.

**CLOSING AND DISCONTINUING JOHNSONS LANE, BROOKLYN.**

In the matter of the proposed closing and discontinuing of Johnsons lane, from East Twelfth street and Avenue S to East Fifteenth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, affidavits of publication were presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in favor of, or in opposition to the proposed change, the hearing was closed.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 14th day of February, 1908, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to close and discontinue Johnsons lane, from East Twelfth street and Avenue S to East Fifteenth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 13th day of March, 1908, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered to be published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 13th day of March, 1908; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 13th day of March, 1908; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing Johnsons lane, from East Twelfth street and Avenue S to East Fifteenth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to make the aforesaid change as follows:

*Parcel "A."*

The northern line of Johnsons lane as herewith closed begins at a point on the southern line of Avenue S, distant 10.03 feet easterly from the intersection of the eastern line of East Twelfth street with the southerly line of Avenue S, as the same are laid out on the map of the City.

1. Thence easterly deflecting from the southern line of Avenue S 44 degrees 56 minutes 29 seconds to the right 63.2 feet.
2. Thence easterly 137.64 feet to a point on the southern line of Avenue S, distant 154.74 feet westerly from the intersection of the southern line of Avenue S with the western line of East Thirteenth street.

The southern line of Johnsons lane as herewith closed is 16.49 feet from and parallel with the above described line.

*Parcel "B."*

The southern line of Johnsons lane as herewith closed begins at a point on the northern line of Avenue S, distant 130.60 feet westerly from the intersection of the northern line of Avenue S with the western line of East Fourteenth street, as the same are laid out on the map of the City.

Thence easterly 138.06 feet to a point on the western line of East Fourteenth street, distant 44.78 feet northerly from the intersection of the western line of East Fourteenth street with the northern line of Avenue S.

The northern line of Johnsons lane as herewith closed is 16.49 feet from and parallel with the above described line.

*Parcel "C."*

The southern line of Johnsons lane as herewith closed begins at a point on the eastern line of East Fourteenth street, distant 65.35 feet northerly from the intersection of the northern line of Avenue S with the eastern line of East Fourteenth street, as the same are laid out on the map of the City.

Thence easterly 211.43 feet to a point on the western line of East Fifteenth street, distant 133.93 feet northerly from the intersection of the northern line of Avenue S with the western line of East Fifteenth street.

The northern line of Johnsons lane as herewith closed is 16.49 feet from and parallel with the above described line.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond—15.

**CHANGING THE LINE OF WEST ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTIETH STREET, DISCONTINUING OSBORNE PLACE, LORING PLACE AND ANDREWS AVENUE, EXTENDING ANDREWS AVENUE AND WIEGAND PLACE, CHANGING THE GRADE OF WEST ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTIETH STREET, OSBORNE PLACE, LORING PLACE, ANDREWS AVENUE AND WIEGAND PLACE, THE BRONX.**

In the matter of the proposed change of line of West One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Osborne place and Aqueduct avenue, discontinuing a portion of Osborne place at West One Hundred and Eightieth street, discontinuing a portion of Loring place at West One Hundred and Eightieth street, and of Andrews avenue at West One Hundred and Eightieth street, extending Andrews avenue at West One Hundred and

Eightieth street, and Wiegand place at West One Hundred and Eightieth street, changing the grade of West One Hundred and Eightieth street between Osborne place and Aqueduct avenue, changing the grade of Osborne place between West One Hundred and Seventy-ninth and West One Hundred and Eightieth streets, changing the grade of Loring place between West One Hundred and Seventy-ninth and West One Hundred and Eightieth streets, changing the grade of Andrews avenue between West One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and the property of the University of The City of New York, and changing the grade of Wiegand place between West One Hundred and Eightieth street and the property of the University of The City of New York, in the Borough of The Bronx, affidavit of publication was presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

After hearing Mr. Forbes J. Hennessey in opposition to the proposed changes, nobody appearing in favor thereof, the hearing was closed.

On motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen the matter was referred to a Committee consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

**TENTATIVE STREET SYSTEM FOR TERRITORY BOUNDED BY BOWERY BAY, FLUSHING BAY, FLUSHING RIVER, RIVERSIDE AVENUE, UNION TURNPIKE, FOREST PARK, MYRTLE AVENUE, OLMSTEAD PLACE, CENTRAL AVENUE, PROCTOR STREET, COOK STREET, MORTON AVENUE, METROPOLITAN AVENUE, VAN DUSEN STREET, SATTERLEE AVENUE, THEW AVENUE, PENELOPE AVENUE, FLORENCE AVENUE, CORINTH STREET, LOCUST AVENUE, BROWN PLACE, MUELLER STREET, JAY AVENUE, CARROLL PLACE, GARFIELD STREET, COLUMBIA AVENUE, LONG ISLAND RAILROAD, GROUT AVENUE, SIXTH STREET, POLK AVENUE, NEW STREET, WOODSIDE AVENUE, NEWTOWN ROAD, NINETEENTH, GRAND AND SEVENTEENTH AVENUES, IN THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS.**

In the matter of the proposed laying out of a tentative street system for the area bounded by Bowery Bay, Flushing Bay, Flushing River, Riverside avenue, Union turnpike, Forest Park, Myrtle avenue, Olmstead place, Central avenue, Proctor street, Cook street, Morton avenue, Metropolitan avenue, Van Dusen street, Satterlee avenue, Thew avenue, Penelope avenue, Florence avenue, Corinth street, Locust avenue, Brown place, Mueller street, Jay avenue, Carroll place, Garfield street, Columbia avenue, main line of the Long Island Railroad, Grout avenue, Sixth street, Polk avenue, New street, Woodside avenue, Newtown road, Nineteenth avenue, Grand avenue and Seventeenth avenue, in the First, Second, Third and Fourth Wards of the Borough of Queens, affidavits of publication were presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised and that the railroad companies had been duly notified.

After hearing Mr. E. L. Baylies, Hon. Morgan J. O'Brien, Hon. P. Henry Dugro, Mr. William Heiman, Rev. E. M. McGuffey, Mr. L. J. Carruthers, representing the Long Island Railroad Company, in opposition to the proposed street system, and Mr. Philip Hughes, Mr. F. G. Randall and Hon. Jos. Flanagan in favor thereof, the hearing was closed.

The following report of the Chief Engineer was presented:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on February 14, 1908, March 13 was fixed as the date for a public hearing in the matter of the approval of a map providing for laying out a street system within the territory bounded by Bowery Bay, Flushing Bay, Flushing River, Riverside avenue, Union turnpike, Forest Park, Myrtle avenue, Olmstead place, Central avenue, Proctor street, Cook street, Morton avenue, Metropolitan avenue, Van Dusen street, Satterlee avenue, Thew avenue, Penelope avenue, Florence avenue, Corinth street, Locust avenue, Brown place, Mueller street, Jay avenue, Carroll place, Garfield street, Columbia avenue, main line of the Long Island Railroad, Grout avenue, Sixth street, Polk avenue, New street, Woodside avenue, Newtown road, Nineteenth avenue, Grand avenue and Seventeenth avenue, in the Borough of Queens.

This map affects an area of about 9,000 acres located within the limits of the First, Second, Third and Fourth wards, comprising, in general, that portion of the Borough bounded on the north by Flushing Bay, on the east by Flushing Creek, on the south by Forest Park and Myrtle avenue, and on the west by the proposed line of the New York Connecting Railroad and the easterly boundary line of the First Ward, or Long Island City. Tentative maps have already been approved for several sections within the area described, these including about 465 acres located in the Maspeth section, of which a tentative map was approved on November 13, 1903; about 1,800 acres comprised within the limits of a tentative map adopted on December 29, 1905; about 125 acres, shown on the Elmhurst map, adopted by the Board of Public Improvements on May 9, 1900; about 150 acres located within the limits of the First Ward, which was placed on the City map under the Consolidation Act, and about 300 acres within the limits of Forest Park. The map therefore relates to about 6,160 acres of heretofore unmapped territory.

Queens Boulevard, having a width of 200 feet, from the crossing of the main line of the Long Island Railroad, near Woodside, eastwardly to Union turnpike, is the principal highway provided by this map. The easterly half of its length is shown upon the map previously referred to as having been adopted on December 29, 1905, while a small portion at the westerly end, near Woodside, was shown upon the Maspeth map. In the latter the width was originally indicated as only 100 feet, and the street was then described as Thomson avenue.

There is a conspicuous omission of park areas, as it is evidently believed that this great pleasure driveway leading eastwardly through the Borough, will more adequately express the need of the territory.

Jackson avenue, an important highway, intended to connect Long Island City with Flushing and the adjoining sections to the north, is to have a width of 150 feet. The width fixed for the remaining avenues generally ranges from 70 feet to 100 feet, probably averaging about 80 feet. The minimum width shown for new streets is 60 feet, with the exception of those proposed as marginal streets adjoining railroad land, and where sidewalks will be required only on one side; in these cases it is generally proposed to adopt a width of 45 feet. A few modifications are also indicated in that portion of the area where a street system has already been laid out, by increasing the street width from 50 feet to 60 feet where such changes have been found practicable.

In general, a successful effort seems to have been made to perpetuate streets now in use or which have been laid out upon property maps.

The most important feature of the map consists of the proposed removal of grade crossings at all of the railroad intersections, these including branches of the Long Island Railroad, known as the Main Line, Northside Division, Whitestone Branch, Montauk Division and Rockaway Beach Branch. The elimination has been accomplished after a careful study of the topography and by radical changes proposed in the railroad grades. It is not expected that the railroad changes as a whole will be carried out at once, or even in the near future, but it is believed that if the street system can be planned to meet the ultimate treatment of the railroad, very large damage claims by reason of changes in the grade will be avoided. The treatment planned will therefore be mutually advantageous to both the railroad and the City, and has been insisted upon as a necessary feature of the plan.



The map includes a considerable length of the line of the New York Connecting Railroad, for which a franchise was granted under a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of March 8, 1907, and also the area traversed by the proposed connection between the main line and the Rockaway Beach and Montauk branches of the Long Island Railroad, known as the Glendale cut-off, for which a franchise was granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 8, 1907. The arrangement of the railroad crossings has been studied in connection with the New York Connecting Railroad, but the Glendale cut-off is omitted from the map, and no consideration has apparently been given to it.

Within the limits covered by the map thirty railroad crossings are in use at the present time, of which number twenty-two are at grade. Under the plan submitted one hundred and twenty-eight crossings are provided, none of which are at grade; of this number forty-two are located along the lines proposed for the New York Connecting Railroad, and the remaining eighty-six are located along the various divisions of the Long Island Railroad already referred to. In fourteen of these cases the highway is to be carried over the railroad and in the remaining one hundred and fourteen the relationship is to be reversed. Profiles have been prepared along the lines of each of these railroads, showing the position of each with respect to the proposed street system, and they indicate that ample clearance has generally been provided between the highway and the railroad.

The profile of the New York Connecting Railroad indicates a proposed change in the grade fixed by the certificate which has been granted, this evidently having been made partly for the purpose of carrying Broadway under the railroad and partly to permit of carrying the railroad over the North Side Division of the Long Island Railroad. The former treatment will necessitate a large amount of excavation in the vicinity to make the area available for development, and although it appears to have been consented to by the railroad company the owner of the property most affected has informally made a strong protest against the plan. Limiting the grades of Broadway and each of the adjoining avenues intersected to the maximum provided elsewhere in their length, it seems probable that it would be possible to retain the original elevations called for by the certificate granted to the Connecting Railroad Company, and at the same time to very largely diminish the amount of excavation required to conform with the City plan, and I would suggest that a further study of the treatment best adapted to meet the needs of this section be made by the Borough authorities. As already noted, a modification will be required in the profile of the Connecting Railroad at the intersection with the North Side Division of the Long Island Railroad. The latter is to be carried over the Queens boulevard, and will also have to pass under the Connecting Road, requiring an increased elevation for the latter at this intersection and to not less than about 61 feet. I believe that the change in the railroad profile might properly be limited to this section.

The map indicates that the main line of the Long Island Railroad is to be retained in its present position, and the profile is based on this treatment. The railroad company have already indicated to the Board a desire to change the alignment between a point near Fifth street and Silvia avenue, and I am informally advised that a definite proposition in the matter of this change will shortly be submitted for consideration. It would therefore appear unwise to attempt to deal at this time with the adjustment of street lines and grades in the vicinity. It also appears that the railroad company has acquired a large area located at the point where the North Side Division leaves this line, and bounded approximately by Monroe street, Nestor street, the Main Line Division and Silvia avenue. The map shows a street system for this area, but if it is to be devoted entirely to railroad use the lines proposed will be impracticable.

The profile of the North Side Division shows that a lowering of about 1 foot will be required in the grade proposed for the Queens boulevard to permit of carrying it under this division and at the same time carry the latter under the New York Connecting Railroad, as already noted and for the same reason it will be necessary to lower the grade of Nestor street at the intersection with this railroad about 2 feet. A number of marginal streets are located along the land owned by the railroad and extending through a considerable portion of its length; if these streets are placed upon the City map, and title to them is acquired it would prevent the Railroad Company from purchasing the additional land which would be needed for placing the road on an embankment, thereby making the work of elevating the tracks when grade crossings are removed much more costly, and correspondingly increasing the amount which the City will probably be obliged to contribute. I would suggest that where the location is such as to ultimately require the acquisition of an additional width for the railroad right of way, and where practicable, these marginal streets be given a width of 65 feet, with the understanding that 20 feet of this width is intended to be used in connection with the railroad improvement. In this case the City could properly assume the corresponding share of the cost of the opening proceeding and remunerate itself at a later date when a contract is entered into with the railroad company for the removal of grade crossings. The railroad company is particularly desirous of excluding the marginal streets shown as extending through the block between Tiemann avenue and Pear Tree avenue, where all of the adjoining property is owned by them and will be required for the location of a freight yard; this request appears to be a reasonable one and in the interest of a large adjoining area. For the purpose of securing sufficient head room slight changes in the proposed street grade will be required at Broadway, Pan place, Louona avenue and Luna street; in the cases of Broadway, Louona avenue and Luna street the grades shown are evidently intended to coincide with that of the railroad as now in use, making it possible to utilize grade crossings until such time as the elevation of the railroad is actually changed. To make the grades of the street system permanent ones I would suggest that they be fixed at the required elevation on each side of the railroad property and without change in the street elevation. Under this treatment the grade at the actual intersection of the street with the tracks could be fixed to agree with the present conditions and as shown on the map.

The profile of the Montauk Division also shows an insufficient clearance between the railroad and the street surface as proposed at Proctor street, Central avenue and Weiss avenue. The grades indicated are evidently intended to secure conformity with the present elevation of the railroad, and it is suggested that they be considered as tentative ones and that elevations be fixed immediately adjoining the railroad land in such a way as to meet the railroad plan for the removal of grade crossings, treating each of the cases in a manner similar to that suggested for streets crossing the North Side Division. In the case of Ford street an increased clearance of one foot is requested by the Long Island Railroad Company, this requiring a lowering of the street grade one foot. Between Central avenue and Delia street a marginal street is indicated on the southerly side of the railroad right-of-way. The railroad officials advise that this section is likely to be devoted largely to manufacturing, and that the laying out of a street separating factories from the railroad land would prove detrimental to such a development. It seems probable that the street system here might be revised in such a way as to overcome the objection noted.

As already stated, the map fails to show the Glendale cut-off for which a certificate has already been granted to the Long Island Railroad Company and a profile approved. The street plan in this vicinity does not conform in direction with that of the railroad, and the diagonal crossings make an awkward and undesirable division of each block on the line. The street grades as proposed in many instances are such as to make a crossing impracticable, although the map shows an unbroken street line across the railroad property. I am informally advised by representatives of the railroad company that they would consent to a modification of the profile heretofore agreed upon, under which the grade of one of the connections provided under their franchise would be changed and the branch converted from an elevated to a depressed road. This change would materially increase the cost of railroad construction, but would make possible the provision of street crossings which probably could not otherwise be obtained. A modification in the approved profile of this railroad will also be required to permit of connecting it with the Montauk and Rockaway Beach divisions when the grades later are changed as contemplated. None of the streets near this railroad between Metropolitan avenue and the point where it leaves the main line have yet been improved, and I am informed that practically all of the area is either owned by the railroad or by allied corporations. If this is the case it should be possible to rearrange the entire street system in the vicinity and in such a way that the railroad line would approximately parallel the proposed streets. Such treatment would undoubtedly make the land much more available for development and would probably add to its value.

The map shows a proposed location for the bulkhead line of Flushing Bay and Flushing Creek. This particular will require consideration on the part of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

I would recommend that the map be referred back to the President of the Borough of Queens, with the suggestion that the plan be modified where it adjoins the railroads now in use and those for which franchises have been granted along the lines herein noted and in so far as such revision appears practicable, and with the further suggestion that the area affected by the proposed change in line of the Long Island Railroad in the vicinity of Woodside be excluded from present consideration.

I would also suggest that the Borough President's attention be called to the accompanying communication, bearing date of April 6, 1907, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting the laying out of a public park having a frontage upon Flushing Bay and within the limits comprised within the area under consideration, and that his attention be also called to the accompanying request addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of October 9, 1907, by John H. Innes, requesting a modification in the proposed lines of Hillcrest avenue.

I would also recommend that a copy of the map be sent to the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries and that he be formally requested to fix the position of the bulkhead line within the limits covered by it, and that if he concurs in the location suggested he request its approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in the manner provided by section 817 of the Charter.

Nobody appearing in favor of or in opposition to the proposed layout and grades, the hearing was closed.

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 14th day of February, 1908, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to lay out and fix grades for Heberton avenue, between Ann street and Richmond terrace, in the Third Ward, in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 13th day of March, 1908, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 13th day of March, 1908; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 13th day of March, 1908; and

Whereas, at the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out and fixing grades for Heberton avenue, between Ann street and Richmond terrace, in the Third Ward, in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to make the aforesaid changes as follows:

#### Lines.

A. The northwesterly line of the street is to begin at the intersection of the north-easterly line of Ann street with the northwesterly line of Heberton avenue, as the said streets are now in use.

1. Thence northeastwardly along the line of Heberton avenue, as now in use, a distance of 195.71 feet, forming an angle with Ann street in the northerly quadrant of the intersection of 89 degrees 59 minutes 58 seconds.

2. Thence northeastwardly, curving to the right on the arc of a circle of 198.19 feet radius, tangent to the preceding course, 130.10 feet.

3. Thence eastwardly and tangent to the preceding course 136.77 feet to the line of Richmond terrace.

B. The southeasterly line of the street is to be 65 feet southeasterly from and parallel with the above described northwesterly line.

#### Grades.

1. The grade of the northwesterly curb line on the northeasterly curb line of Ann street is to be 21.6 feet.

2. The grade of the southeasterly curb line at the northeasterly curb line of Ann street is to be 21.2 feet.

3. The street grade at the intersection of the centre line with the radial line passing through the southerly points of curvature described in the alignment is to be 19.3 feet.

4. The grade of the northerly curb line at its intersection with the westerly curb line of Richmond terrace is to be 9 feet.

5. The grade of the southerly curb line at its intersection with the westerly curb line of Richmond terrace is to be 8.65 feet.

The above elevations refer to Richmond high-water datum.

Thence southerly to a point distant 130.0 feet northerly from the intersection of the centre line of Thirty-fifth street and Fourth avenue, the elevation to be 19.90 feet;

Thence southerly to the intersection of Thirty-fifth street and Fourth avenue, the elevation to be 21.76 feet;

Thence southerly to a point distant 120.0 feet southerly from the intersection of the centre lines of Thirty-fifth street and Fourth avenue, the elevation to be 23.60 feet;

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on October 31, 1907, recommending a change in the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of Fourth avenue, between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-sixth streets, and of Thirty-fifth street, between Third and Fourth avenues.

The change proposed consists of raising the grade of Thirty-fifth street at its intersection with Fourth avenue 1.7 feet, the change extending along Thirty-fifth street a distance of 150 feet westwardly from Fourth avenue, and along Fourth avenue from Thirty-fourth street to Thirty-sixth street.

This change appears to be required to permit of constructing the proposed Fourth avenue subway. A station is to be located at Thirty-fifth street and the street grade heretofore fixed gives insufficient headroom. At the office of the Public Service Commission I am advised that the proposed elevation for the base of rail at this point is 4 feet below datum, and that if the present grade is retained it will be necessary to correspondingly depress the subway construction thereby greatly increasing the cost of the work which, as already planned, is very much below the subsurface water level, and that it will also result in an objectionable railroad grade.

The abutting property on the westerly side of Fourth avenue has been fully improved by the erection of three-story frame dwellings, of which about ten will be damaged by the proposed change. The Greenwood Cemetery is located on the easterly side of the street. Notwithstanding the damage claims which will undoubtedly be made when the change is carried out it seems probable that it will result in an ultimate saving. It is evident that the change will not be required until the subway work is placed under construction, but for the purpose of enabling the Commission to prepare their plans in conformity with the street grades I would recommend that the resolution providing for the change be adopted with the understanding that it will not be signed by the Mayor until such time as the Public Service Commission advise that they are prepared to proceed with the work.

##### *Metropolitan Avenue.*

Beginning at the easterly end of the Grand street bridge over English Kills Creek, the elevation to be 10.30 feet, the present elevation of bridge as now in use;

Thence easterly to the centre line of Varick avenue, the elevation to be 7.81 feet, as heretofore;

Thence easterly to a summit distant 293 feet from the last mentioned point, the elevation to be 9.27 feet;

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bushwick District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on December 12, 1907, recommending a change in the grade of the following streets:

Metropolitan avenue, between Grand street and the bridge at Newtown Creek.

Gardner avenue, between Meadow street and Grand street.

Ten Eyck street, between Stewart avenue and Newtown Creek.

Grand street, between the bridge over English Kills Creek and Varick avenue.

This map appears to have been adopted at the request of owners of property in the immediate vicinity and provides for raising the elevations of the streets named,

excepting only at the terminals of the change, to a minimum of about 9 feet above mean high-water datum. Under the plan heretofore adopted the grades back of the waterfront are generally low with a minimum of about 6 feet. From the papers accompanying the resolution it appears that the change in grade of Metropolitan avenue at the Scott avenue intersection is intended to conform with a change required in the latter street to permit of the construction of a sewer which has already been authorized by the Board. No provision, however, is made for the corresponding changes in this street nor for the adjacent area where similar conditions obtain to those described in the streets affected by the resolution and where similar changes are necessary.

On November 22, 1907, the attention of the Board of Estimate was called to the necessity of revising the grade map of that portion of the Borough of Brooklyn adjoining Newtown Creek and including the section affected by the map now submitted; at this time the matter was referred back to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for consideration. In my judgment it would be unwise to attempt to fix grades for the small group of streets affected by this resolution, and the change should include the entire area where the grades as now established are too low to permit of the construction of sewers or to secure surface drainage.

I would therefore recommend that the matter be referred back to the President of the Borough and that his attention be again called to the need for revising the street grades in the vicinity of the Newtown Creek Canal.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Van Cortlandt District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on January 30, 1908, recommending a change in the City map by removing from it the extension of West One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, between Summit avenue and Lind avenue, which was laid out under a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 19, 1907.

This resolution affects one block of the street which was incorporated upon the City map less than a year ago and at the request of property owners in the vicinity. Owing to the great difference in elevation between Summit avenue and Lind avenue, the street could only be of use for foot traffic and it was evidently originally intended



to construct a flight of steps for this purpose, these occupying a strip 20 feet wide comprising the entire width of the street. When the change was made it was shown that the street would subdivide a block having a length of about 1,400 feet and that it would probably afford an outlet to Sedgwick avenue for a large area east of Summit avenue.

A Local Board resolution for acquiring title to the street was presented at the meeting of the Board held on September 27, 1907, and at the request of the President of the Borough it was referred back to him for further consideration. On December 26 following a new resolution was adopted by the Morrisania Local Board favoring the proceeding and requesting that it be again considered by the Board of Estimate. The resolution now submitted providing for the removal of the street from the map, is also accompanied by a recommendation that no action be taken upon the resolution providing for the acquisition of title.

The street can only be of local benefit and I am of the opinion that the views of those who will be called upon to pay the cost of opening and improving it in case it is retained upon the City map should govern the treatment of the case, and would therefore recommend that a public hearing be given in the matter and that the views of the majority should be followed.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Chester District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted November 14, 1907, recommending a change in the City map by increasing the width of Bronx boulevard between Nereid avenue and Two Hundred and Forty-second street.

Bronx boulevard, having a width of 60 feet where it adjoins Bronx Park, and also through the section between Nereid avenue and Two Hundred and Forty-second street, and a width of 100 feet through the intervening section, was placed upon the map of the City on December 23, 1904, and after a careful study of the probable needs of the territory. It was understood at this time that the traffic along the street between Nereid avenue and Two Hundred and Forty-second street would be largely of a local character, and that the natural outlet to Mount Vernon and to Yonkers would be along Webster avenue in the latter case and White Plains road in the former, these streets being reached by way of Nereid avenue.

On June 23, 1905, a resolution providing for increasing the width of the portion between Nereid avenue and Two Hundred and Forty-first street to 100 feet was laid on the table after a public hearing had been given at which no one appeared in favor of the change.

On October 12, 1905, an opening proceeding affecting the entire length of the street was begun, and this is now well advanced. The Local Board does not show any reason for again opening this case, which seems already to have been twice disposed of by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I would recommend that the resolution be disapproved.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Chester District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on December 26, 1907, recommending a change in the map by reducing the width of Melville (Hancock) street between Morris Park avenue and the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, from 60 feet to 50 feet, and also recommending that the general ordinances relating to the encroachment of stoops and areas upon street lines shall not apply to the street.

On November 22, 1907, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment providing for the acquisition of title to Melville street between the limits named in this resolution, and the proceeding was merged with similar resolutions relating to Van Buren street and Adams street, immediately adjoining. In the report upon the opening it was shown that the street was in use and that the dedication of a lesser width than that shown upon the map had been recognized in 1903, when the construction of sewers was authorized. The Local Board resolution is accompanied by a petition signed by a large number of owners of property fronting upon the street, but no reason for the change is set forth in their petition, and the report of the Topographical Engineer of the Borough, which is also presented, recommends that it be denied.

The atlas indicates that a building located at the northwest corner of Columbus avenue encroaches upon the street as now mapped, and it seems probable that the request has been based upon a desire to avoid the expense which would be occasioned in making the award for damage to it. If the ordinances could be amended as recommended by the Local Board the effect would be to create a street of the same width, in so far as public use is concerned, as would be the case if the encroachment of stoops and areas is permitted and the increased width retained, but the exclusion of this street from the provisions of the ordinance can only be accomplished by an ordinance of the Board of Aldermen. I would therefore recommend that the resolution be referred back to the President of the Borough, with the suggestion that before it is again presented a special ordinance be adopted by the Board of Aldermen relative to the roadway and sidewalk width for this street.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith are transmitted two resolutions of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, providing for the acquisition of title to Avenue X, between Ocean parkway and Ocean avenue, and to Avenue Y, between Gravesend Basin and Ocean avenue. Both of these resolutions provide for the exclusion of lands of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad and of the Long Island Railroad, and the latter also excludes the lands of the Prospect Park and Coney Island Railroad. The former resolution was adopted by the Local Board on July 2, 1906, and the latter on April 3, 1907. The streets have been laid out to have a width of 80 feet, and the resolution relating to Avenue X includes a length of 4,000 feet, while the one for Avenue Y includes a length of about 7,000 feet. A roadway is in use through the four blocks of Avenue X between East Twelfth street and East Fifteenth street, and several buildings have been erected upon the abutting property. A similar development exists through the block of Avenue Y between East Thirteenth street and East Fourteenth street. Aside from these sections neither street is in use at the present time. The grades fixed by the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission for the improvement of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad and for the Long Island Railroad will permit of carrying both Avenue X and Avenue Y under the railroad if a crossing should ever be required.

From information furnished by the railroad companies, it appears that almost all of the land lying within the lines of Avenue X east of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad has already been acquired by the railroad companies, and that it is intended to utilize the same as a terminal. It would therefore appear that the easterly terminal of the opening proceeding for this street would be located at the railroad property line between East Fifteenth street and East Sixteenth street. The street grade of Avenue Y at the intersection with the tracks of the Prospect Park and Coney Island Railroad probably agrees approximately with that of the railroad. The elevation of the entire adjoining area is low, and I think that there is no question but that when the time arrives for the elimination of grade crossings along this line it will be accomplished by the elevation of the railroad.

The streets are adjoining and parallel and I would recommend that the resolutions be approved and made the subject of one proceeding. It is also recommended that title to the streets be acquired in fee; that all of the cost of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited, and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

Beginning at a point on the line midway between Avenue W and Avenue X distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Ocean parkway, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Ocean parkway, and running thence eastwardly along the said line midway between Avenue W and Avenue X and the prolongation thereof to a point distant 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of Ocean avenue; thence southwardly and parallel with Ocean avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Avenue Y and Avenue Z; thence westwardly along the said line midway between Avenue Y and Avenue Z and the prolongation thereof to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the easterly bulkhead line of Gravesend Basin; thence northwardly and parallel with the said bulkhead line to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Avenue X and Avenue Y; thence eastwardly along the said line midway between Avenue X and Avenue Y to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Ocean parkway, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Ocean parkway; thence northwardly and parallel with Ocean parkway to the point or place of beginning.

I believe that buildings encroach upon the land to be acquired within the lines of both streets.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On April 6, 1906, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment providing for the acquisition of title to Robinson street, between Rogers avenue and New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn. The Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in this proceeding had not been appointed on the date when the new street opening law became effective, and on April 5, 1907, the resolution was again approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

On January 30, 1907, a new resolution was adopted by the Local Board of the Flatbush District, providing for opening that portion of the street between Bedford avenue and New York avenue, a length of three blocks, which included the two blocks for which proceedings had already been begun. The resolution, however, was not received in this office until June 18 following, or about ten weeks after the original proceeding had been approved. I find that the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have not yet been appointed and I am also advised that the owner of the property between Bedford avenue and Flatbush avenue is now grading it and will probably cede it to the City. Under these conditions it would seem desirable to discontinue the proceeding heretofore authorized and to adopt the new resolution which has been presented, as by so doing the street will be given a much needed outlet into Flatbush avenue.

The street has a width of 60 feet, and is in use between Nostrand avenue and Rogers avenue, and through an adjoining section west of Rogers avenue where a public school is located on the northerly side. Through its remaining length it is not in use at the present time.

There has also been received a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, adopted on July 10, 1907, providing for the acquisition of title to Winthrop street, between Nostrand avenue and Remsen avenue. This street is parallel with and at its westerly end adjoins Robinson street. I see no reason why the two resolutions should not be merged into a single proceeding, and would recommend such treatment. This resolution affects a total length of a little over 6,000 feet, and the street as laid out has a width of 60 feet at its westerly end, while through the remainder and greater portion of its length it has a width of 70 feet. It has been approximately graded between Nostrand avenue and New York avenue and between New York avenue and Albany avenue a narrow roadway is in use adjoining the County buildings, which occupy the entire frontage upon the southerly side. Through the three short blocks between Utica avenue and East Fifty-third street the street has been graded and flagged. Through the remainder of its length it is not in use at the present time.

I would recommend the approval of the resolutions; that title to the streets be acquired in fee; that all of the cost of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

Beginning at a point on a line midway between Robinson street and Clarkson avenue distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Bedford avenue, and running thence northwardly and parallel with Bedford avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Winthrop street and Robinson street; thence eastwardly along the said line midway between Winthrop street and Robinson street to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Nostrand avenue; thence northwardly and parallel with Nostrand avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Hawthorne street and Winthrop street; thence eastwardly along the said line midway between Hawthorne street and Winthrop street to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of New York avenue; thence northwardly and parallel with New York avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Fenimore street and Hawthorne street; thence eastwardly along the said line midway between Fenimore street and Hawthorne street, and the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with the southwesterly line of Remsen avenue; thence northeastwardly at right angles to the line of Remsen avenue a distance of 200 feet; thence southeastwardly and parallel with Remsen avenue to the intersection with a line at right angles to Remsen avenue and passing through a point on the southwesterly line of Remsen avenue where it is intersected by the prolongation of a line midway between Winthrop street and Clarkson avenue; thence southwestwardly along the said line at right angles to Remsen avenue to the southwesterly line of Remsen avenue; thence westwardly along the said line midway between Winthrop street and Clarkson avenue, and the prolongation of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of New York avenue; thence southwardly and parallel with New York avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Robinson street and Clarkson avenue; thence

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bushwick District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on May 15, 1907, initiating proceedings for the acquisition of title to that portion of Force Tube avenue, between Fulton street and Dinsmore place, which has not yet been acquired by the City.

Local Board resolutions have also been adopted providing for a grading improvement and for the construction of a sewer between the same limits, these comprising one short block. From information furnished by the Borough authorities, it appears that Force Tube avenue has been laid out between Dinsmore place and Jamaica avenue to have a width of 60 feet, and that through the block described in the resolution now presented the City owns a strip of land 45 feet wide, which was purchased for the construction of the force mains leading from the Ridgewood pumping station of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to the Ridgewood Reservoir, and that this ownership includes a strip 42½ feet wide located on the westerly side of the street. It is therefore proposed in the opening proceeding to acquire title to a strip 17½ feet wide located on the easterly side of the street, and in case the proceeding is authorized the property owners on the westerly side would be deprived of frontage upon the street by an intervening strip having a width of 2½ feet, which is used by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The attention of the petitioner for this proceeding has already been called to the desirability of first changing the map of the City in such a way as to throw all of the City property within the street lines, and also to the fact that the proceeding should be made to include the entire length of the street as laid out, but no new petition seems to have been presented to the Local Board to accomplish this.

I would therefore recommend that the resolution be disapproved and that the attention of the Borough President be called to the desirability of amending the map of this street.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on April 3, 1907, initiating proceedings for the acquisition of title to Avenue Z, between Jerome avenue and the bulkhead line.

This resolution affects fifteen short blocks of Avenue Z, or a total length of a little less than 4,000 feet. The street as laid out upon the map has a width of 80 feet. A roadway is in use through the three blocks between East Twenty-sixth street and East Twenty-ninth street, and a public school building has recently been erected upon the abutting property. Near Ford street an old street system is in use which does not conform with the lines laid out upon the City map, and one or more buildings in the vicinity probably encroach upon the land to be acquired.

I see no reason why the resolution should not be approved and would recommend such action. It is also recommended that title to the land be acquired in fee, that all of the cost of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

#### *The Board of Estimate and Appropriation:*

GENTLEMEN—I have received, under date December 24, 1907, a communication signed by your Secretary transmitting copy of a communication from the Chief Engineer in the matter of the proceedings proposed for acquiring title to Ralph avenue, from Eastern parkway to East Ninety-eighth street, Borough of Brooklyn, in which he says:

"An unusual condition is presented in the case of Ralph avenue. The Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, or one of its subsidiary companies, has secured from the abutting owners along Ralph avenue and East Ninety-eighth street the right to construct and operate a surface railroad, which railroad has been built and is now in operation. The consents granting such right or easement have been recorded in the office of the Register of Kings County. Before recommending the initiation of proceedings to acquire title to Ralph avenue it would, in my judgment, be wise to secure the advice of the Corporation Counsel as to the effect of the existence of this railroad line now in operation upon the street to be opened, and I would suggest that the Corporation Counsel be asked to advise the Board upon the following points:

"1. Do the consents of the abutting owners and the fact of operation constitute a sufficient right to the continued operation of this railroad without the securing of any franchise from the City or the payment to the City of any compensation for the right?

"2. If the City acquires the land within the lines of this street for street purposes, will it be required to make an award for the physical property of the railroad company and its right to operate its line in the street?

"3. Should the proceedings to acquire title provide for the acquisition of the fee subject to the easement or right already granted by the owners to build and operate a railroad thereon?"

In answer to the first question, I would say that the Constitution of the State of New York prohibits the Legislature from passing private or local bills granting to any corporation, association or individual the right to lay down railroad tracks, and limits the scope of general laws for that purpose by providing that "no law shall authorize the construction or operation of a street railroad except upon the condition that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on, and the consent also of the local authorities having the control of that portion of a street or highway upon which it is proposed to construct or operate such railroad be first obtained." (Const., Art. III., sec. 18.)

In accordance with this mandate of the fundamental law of the State, general laws in relation to the construction and operation of street railroads have been enacted containing the limitation fixed by the Constitution.

The fact that proceedings are about to be taken to open the portion of Ralph avenue to which reference is made in your communication shows that heretofore such street has merely existed on the map of the City and that no jurisdiction in relation thereto has been vested in the City or in any officer, board or department thereof.

It follows, then, that no consent of the local authorities, as required by the statute, could have been given for the operation of this railroad, and that the consents given by the property owners cannot be construed as consents given under the statute, but simply permission upon the part of the owners to the operation of a railroad over their private lands.

My answer to your first question, then, must be no.

In regard to your second question, I would say that in any proceeding to acquire the land in question for street purposes no award should be made for the right of the railroad to operate its line thereon.

As regards an award for the physical property of the railroad company upon the proposed street, this would depend upon the nature of the relations between the railroad company and the property owners, and this question may safely be left for consideration to the Commissioners appointed in the condemnation proceedings.

As to your third question, I would answer no, for the reasons given in my answer to the first question.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith are transmitted five resolutions adopted by the Local Boards of the Flatbush and Bushwick Districts of the Borough of Brooklyn, initiating proceedings for the acquisition of title to the following streets:

Ralph avenue, between Eastern Parkway and East Ninety-eighth street.

Union street, between East New York avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Tapscott street, between East New York avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Howard avenue, between East New York avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Grafton street, between Sutter avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

The resolutions relating to Ralph avenue and to Union street were adopted on May 31, 1906, and those relating to the other three streets named were adopted on June 28 following. These resolutions affect lengths of the streets of from about 1,400 feet to about 2,500 feet. Ralph avenue and Howard avenue have been laid out with a width of 80 feet, and each of the three other streets has a width of 60 feet.

A trolley line operated by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Railroad Company has recently been built within the lines of Ralph avenue, the consents to the construction of the road having been executed by the owners of the abutting property. The attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was called to the situation in a report presented at the meeting held on December 20, 1907, at which time the Board requested the Corporation Counsel to submit an opinion as to the franchise rights of the railroad company, as to the necessity of making an award to the railroad company for the physical property owned by it and located within the street lines, and as to whether the title should be taken subject to the easements already referred to.

Under date of February 25, 1908, the Corporation Counsel has forwarded a communication in response to the request of the Board, advising that the consents cannot be construed as constituting a franchise; that no awards would be made to the railroad company for the right to operate its line in the street, and that the question of awards for its physical property would depend upon the nature of the agreement between the railroad company and the property owners, and might properly be left for the consideration of the Commissioners of Estimate; and that it would be proper to acquire title to the street in fee.

Neither Union street nor Tapscott street is in use at the present time, but through a portion of the length of each the roadway has been partially graded. Howard avenue, through the two blocks between Blake avenue and East New York avenue, includes a portion of the old Hunterfly road, which has been in use for a great many years, and which is probably owned by the City. Through the greater portion of the distance between Sutter avenue and Livonia avenue Grafton street has been graded and partially curbed.

I see no reason why these resolutions should not be combined and made the subject of a single proceeding, such action being recommended. It is also recommended that title to the streets be acquired in fee; that all of the cost of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited, and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

Beginning at a point on the southwesterly line of East Ninety-eighth street where it is intersected by a line distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Ralph avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Ralph avenue, and running thence northwardly along the said line parallel with Ralph avenue to the intersection with a line which bisects the angle formed between the centre lines of East Ninety-eighth street and Ralph avenue, as these streets are laid out south of East New York avenue; thence northwestwardly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with a line midway between Union street and President street; thence westwardly along the said line midway between Union street and President street to the intersection with a line midway between Ralph avenue and Buffalo avenue, as these streets are laid out north of East New York avenue; thence north-



wardly along the said line midway between Ralph avenue and Buffalo avenue to a point distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Eastern Parkway; thence eastwardly along a line parallel with Eastern Parkway to the intersection with a line midway between Ralph avenue and Howard avenue as the said streets are laid out north of Eastern parkway; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Ralph avenue and Howard avenue to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northwesterly from and parallel with the northwesterly line of East New York avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of East New York avenue; thence northeastwardly along the said line parallel with East New York avenue to the intersection with a line at right angles to East New York avenue, passing through a point on the southerly line of Pitkin avenue midway between Grafton street and Barrett street; thence southeastwardly along the said line at right angles to East New York avenue to the southerly line of Pitkin avenue; thence southwardly along a line midway between Grafton street and Barrett street to the northeasterly line of East Ninety-eighth street; thence southwestwardly at right angles to East Ninety-eighth street to a point distant 100 feet southwesterly from the southwesterly line of East Ninety-eighth street; thence northwestwardly along a line parallel with East Ninety-eighth street and always distant 100 feet therefrom to the intersection with a line at right angles to East Ninety-eighth street, passing through the point of beginning; thence northeastwardly along the said line at right angles to East Ninety-eighth street to the point or place of beginning.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,  
March 4, 1908.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On February 10, 1905, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved a change in the map of the City by laying out extensions of Grand street and of Bedford avenue as approaches to the Williamsburg Bridge, and at the same time provided for widening Roebbling street northwardly to Union avenue and southwardly between South Eighth street and Lee avenue. On March 3 following, resolutions were adopted by the Board of Estimate for acquiring title to Roebbling street as widened, and to the Grand street extension, and on April 14 a similar proceeding was begun for acquiring the Bedford avenue extension.

The map changes and the opening proceedings were initiated by the Board of Estimate for the purpose of providing what were deemed to be necessary lines for traffic to the Williamsburg Bridge, and this procedure was followed for the reason that the Local Boards had refused to take the initiative. All of the improvements were regarded as of benefit to a large area, and owing to the belief which then existed that an assessable proceeding must be made the subject of a Local Board resolution, it was decided to place the entire cost of the opening proceedings upon the City at large. The proceedings relating to the Grand street extension and to the widening of Roebbling street north of the bridge plaza have both been advanced, title to the land has been vested in the City, and surface improvements have been authorized.

For the purpose of securing a more adequate connection between Roebbling street south of South Eighth street and the bridge plaza, a further change was made in the map on September 29, 1905, by extending the widening northwardly to Broadway, and on October 19, 1906, a second resolution was adopted providing for the acquisition of title to this extension and, following the procedure originally adopted, the entire cost was placed upon the property benefited. For the purpose of combining both the resolutions into a single proceeding, they were rescinded on November 2, 1906, and a new resolution was adopted for acquiring title to Roebbling street as widened between Broadway and Lee avenue, or to a strip 20 feet wide located on the westerly side of the street.

A vigorous protest was made by the property owners in this vicinity against the extension of Bedford avenue, and in response to their request the Board adopted on January 11, 1907, a map providing for the discontinuance of the street, and as a substitute for it it was decided to provide a further widening of Roebbling street by taking an additional strip 20 feet wide on the westerly side of the street, giving it a total width of 100 feet. This also provided for extending the street to Lee avenue and for securing an adequate connection with Bedford avenue as heretofore laid out by widening Taylor street from 70 feet to 100 feet.

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on April 19, 1907, a request was presented from the Borough President to acquire title to Roebbling street as finally widened between Broadway and Lee avenue, and to the Taylor street widening between Lee avenue and Bedford avenue. The attention of the Board was called at this time to the large obligations which had been assumed by the City by reason of relieving property owners from assessment in proceedings where there was an unquestioned local benefit, and it was suggested that the matter be referred back to the President of the Borough for the purpose of securing a Local Board resolution initiating the proceeding so that at least a portion of the cost could be placed upon the property in the vicinity.

At a subsequent date the results of an investigation of the method previously followed by the Board in relieving property from assessment in street and park opening proceedings were presented and showed that the expense assumed by the City for this purpose during the last six years would probably amount to about \$40,000,000, and it was recommended that thereafter the cost of such proceedings be placed upon the district benefited in so far as such benefit could be established.

On May 27, 1907, the Local Boards of the Bedford and Williamsburg Districts, acting on the recommendation made on April 19, adopted a resolution initiating proceedings for the acquisition of title to the widening of Roebbling street and Taylor street and to the public place located at their intersection, this including all of the land required to connect the bridge plaza with Bedford avenue under the plan adopted by the Board of Estimate on January 11, 1907.

Both of the streets named as well as the public place are comprised wholly within the limits of the Bedford District, and the papers submitted indicate that two of the Local Board members of this district voted in favor of the resolution. It is evident that no action was required by the Local Board members of the Williamsburg District, but I do not understand that their participation in the matter in any way affects the legality of the resolution.

The proceeding affects a little over two short blocks of Roebbling street, one long block of Taylor street and the triangular area located at the southeasterly intersection of Lee avenue with Division avenue, having a frontage upon the former street of about 250 feet and on the latter of about 185 feet. All of the land to be taken has been improved, and the books of the Department of Taxes and Assessments show that the assessed valuation of the property for the year 1907 aggregates about \$308,000, of which amount \$140,000 is charged to land and \$168,000 to buildings. By reason of the rapidly increasing values in this section it seems probable that the cost of the proceeding will aggregate about \$1,000,000.

The new connection with the Williamsburg Bridge, which will be made available under this proceeding, will unquestionably benefit a very large area and one which may be bounded approximately by Washington avenue on the west, Eastern parkway on the south, Throop avenue on the east, and by the land adjoining the bridge plaza on the north. The accompanying technical description clearly defining this area, which probably comprises about 28,000 City lots, has been prepared for use in case the Board should deem it proper to place the entire cost of the proceeding upon the property benefited.

In view, however, of the fact that the approaches which have already been provided to this bridge from the east and north have been acquired entirely at the expense of the City, it may be deemed advisable to at least partially relieve the property owners from the cost of the proceedings for the provision of the southerly approach, and particularly since only a very small area adjoining the easterly and northerly approaches could be construed as falling within the district of benefit. A second district of assessment is, therefore, suggested for use in case the Board should decide to place 25 per cent. of the cost of the proceedings upon the City at large, this district being bounded approximately on the south by Fulton street, the northerly, easterly and westerly boundaries remaining as before described. It is estimated that this area contains about 21,000 City lots. Should a further relief be deemed proper or to the extent of say about 50 per cent., a third district of assessment is suggested, the southerly boundary being located in the vicinity of DeKalb avenue, the other boundaries remaining unchanged. This district contains about 12,000 City lots, each 20 by 100 feet.

I would recommend the approval of the resolution that title to the streets be acquired in fee, and that a public hearing be given as to the three districts of assessment suggested, it being understood that in case the larger one is adopted the entire



expense of the proceeding will be placed upon the property benefited, and that if No. 2 is accepted 25 per cent. of the cost will be assumed by the City at large; while if Plan No. 3 is favored the expense will be shared between the City and the property owners.

#### Technical Description of District No. 1.

Beginning at a point on the prolongation of a line midway between South Eighth street and South Ninth street where it intersects the bulkhead of the East River as constructed, and running thence eastwardly along the said line midway between South Eighth street and South Ninth street to the intersection with a line midway between Berry street and Bedford avenue; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Berry street and Bedford avenue to the intersection with the centre line of South Fifth street; thence eastwardly along the centre line of South Fifth street to the intersection with a line midway between Bedford avenue and Driggs avenue; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Bedford avenue and Driggs avenue to the intersection with a line midway between South Second street and South Third street; thence eastwardly along the said line midway between South Second street and South Third street to the intersection with a line midway between Marcy avenue and Rodney street; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Marcy avenue and Rodney street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Harrison avenue and Marcy avenue; thence southeastwardly along the said line midway between Harrison avenue and Marcy avenue to a point distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Flushing avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Flushing avenue; thence eastwardly and parallel with Flushing avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Throop avenue and Tompkins avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Throop avenue and Tompkins avenue to the intersection with the centre line of Fulton street; thence westwardly along the centre line of Fulton street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Kingston avenue and Brooklyn avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Kingston avenue and Brooklyn avenue and the prolongation thereof to a point distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Eastern parkway; thence westwardly and always 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Eastern parkway to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Washington avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Washington avenue; thence northwardly and parallel with Washington avenue to a point distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Atlantic avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Atlantic avenue; thence westwardly and parallel with Atlantic avenue to the intersection with the centre line of Vanderbilt avenue; thence northwardly along the centre line of Vanderbilt avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Clinton avenue and Vanderbilt avenue; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Clinton avenue and Vanderbilt avenue to the intersection with the centre line of Flushing avenue; thence eastwardly along the centre line of Flushing avenue to the intersection with the centre line of Clinton avenue as laid out northerly from Flushing avenue; thence northwardly along the said centre line of Clinton avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of the southerly bulkhead of the Wallabout Basin as constructed; thence eastwardly along the said southerly bulkhead of Wallabout Basin and the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the easterly bulkhead of Wallabout Basin as constructed; thence northwardly and always along the bulkhead as constructed to the point or place of beginning.

#### Technical Description of District No. 2.

This district is to comprise all of the area described in District No. 1, with the exception of the portion south of a line 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Fulton street, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Fulton street.

#### Technical Description of District No. 3.

This district is to comprise all of the area described in District No. 1, with the exception of the portion south of a line located midway between DeKalb avenue and Willoughby avenue.

I would also recommend that the resolution of November 2, 1906, providing for the acquisition of title to Roebing street, between Broadway and Lee avenue, be rescinded.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith are transmitted seven resolutions of the Local Boards of the Flatbush and Bushwick Districts, Borough of Brooklyn, initiating proceedings for the acquisition of title to the following streets:

Saratoga avenue, between Pitkin avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Douglass street, between Sutter avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Ames street, between Sutter avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Amboy street, between Blake avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Hopkinson avenue, between Blake avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Bristol street, between a point about 125 feet south of Blake avenue and Dumont avenue.

Bristol street, between a point about 260 feet north of Newport avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

Chester street, between Riverdale avenue and East Ninety-eighth street.

These resolutions in the order named, those relating to Ames street and Douglass street being treated as one, were adopted at meetings of the Local Boards held on June 28, 1906, February 4, 1907, May 31, 1906, February 4, 1907, July 10, 1907, November 1, 1906, and January 30, 1907, respectively. They affect lengths ranging from about 3,300 feet to about 4,500 feet of the seven streets named, of which Saratoga avenue and Hopkinson avenue have been mapped to have a width of eighty feet, while each of the five remaining streets has a width of sixty feet. The portion of Bristol street between Dumont avenue and a point about 260 feet north of Newport avenue is excluded from the proceeding for the reason that the street is here evidently dedicated to public use, it having already been graded, curbed, flagged and paved. A considerable portion of Amboy street and Hopkinson avenue has already been graded and a part of a block of the latter street, as well as a part of a block of Chester street, have been paved. One or more blocks of each of the other streets named have been partially improved.

I am informally advised that deeds of cession to the City have been executed or are about to be executed to nearly all of those portions of Douglass street and Ames street and to several blocks of Amboy street and Hopkinson avenue which are affected by these resolutions. If they are accepted by the City it would remove the need for including them in the resolutions now presented, but the failure to omit them does not, in my judgment, constitute a serious defect and I believe that it will not result in placing any burden upon the owners of the land other than that which they would be called upon to bear in assuming a portion of the costs of the proceeding relating to the adjoining streets.

Chester street crosses the Manhattan Beach branch of the Long Island Railroad at a point about midway between Stanley avenue and East Ninety-eighth street. Under the improvements now being carried out by the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission the railroad will be placed on an embankment and at an elevation of 33.72 feet. Under the grades heretofore adopted for Chester street the fall provided is insufficient for drainage, and in a report about to be submitted to the Board a recommendation will be made for a change in the grade of the street by placing a summit near the north property line of the railroad. This change would fix the elevation of the street at its intersection with the centre line of the railroad as 16.53 feet, thus permitting of carrying the railroad over the street.

The construction of the crossing is not included in the work planned by the Commission and I believe that it is not necessary at the present time. Under the requirements of the Railroad Law, however, application will have to be made to the Public Service Commission to determine the character of the crossing, and I would recommend that in the application attention be called to the grade proposed for the street at the railroad and that they be asked to approve the same, with the understanding that the change in grade will be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the construction will not be asked for until some time in the future when the need for it shall arise.

The streets named are adjoining and parallel and I see no reason why the resolutions should not be combined and made the subject of one proceeding, the approval of which is recommended, with the understanding that it will not be advanced by the Corporation Counsel until after the character of the crossing has been determined by the Public Service Commission. I would also recommend that title to the streets be acquired in fee; that all of the cost of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited, and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Williamsburg District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on March 5, 1908, initiating proceedings



for the acquisition of title to a parcel of land bounded by Metropolitan avenue, Scott avenue and Meadow street, required "for sewer purposes."

The area described in this resolution was shown upon a map of a proposed public place, the inclusion of which upon the City map was made the subject of a hearing before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 6, 1907. In the report upon the map it was shown that the triangular area of reference had a frontage of about 53 feet on Meadow street, about 57 feet on Metropolitan avenue and about 21 feet on Scott avenue; that the property was unimproved, and that its valuation as given upon the books of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the year 1906 was only \$100. Action upon the map was deferred for the reason that no Local Board resolution had been presented providing for its acquisition, and the matter was referred to the Comptroller.

The plans which have been adopted for the Scott avenue sewer show that it is proposed to occupy the land for sewer construction, but it should be noted that the Local Board resolution for laying out the public place was presented prior to the date of the sewer map, clearly indicating that the original intent of acquiring this area was for its utilization as a public place and not for sewer construction.

The construction of the Scott avenue sewer, which crosses this public place, has been authorized, and until after it has been built there will be no outlet for a large sewer now under construction in the Borough of Queens; it is, therefore, evident that the opening proceeding which is made the subject of the resolution now presented should be advanced as rapidly as possible.

I think that there can be no question as to the power of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to initiate the opening proceeding treating the area to be acquired as a public place, this being the evident intent of the Local Board resolution, although the parcel of land affected is not so described.

Assuming that the presentation of this resolution will meet the objection originally raised to the inclusion of the area upon the City map as a public place, and that the map change will now be approved, I would recommend that proceedings be instituted for acquiring title to the land described. I would also recommend that title to the land be acquired in fee; that all of the cost of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating and grading, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

Beginning at a point on a line midway between Stagg street and Meadow street, where it is intersected by a line midway between Scott avenue and Gardner avenue, and running thence northwardly along the said line midway between Scott avenue and Gardner avenue and the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the centre line of Metropolitan avenue; thence westwardly along the said centre line of Metropolitan avenue to the intersection with the centre line of Ten Eyck street; thence eastwardly along the said centre line of Ten Eyck street and the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the line between the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; thence southwardly along the said Borough line to the intersection with a line midway between Meadow street and Stagg street; thence westwardly along the said line midway between Meadow street and Stagg street to the point or place of beginning.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution adopted on May 24, 1906, by the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, initiating proceedings for the acquisition of title to Third avenue as widened on its easterly side between Washington avenue and a point near Lorillard place.

On May 6, 1904, the widening of Third avenue, referred to by this resolution, was incorporated upon the City map for the purpose of including within the street system the lines of what was formerly the old Kingsbridge road, thereby affording the abutting property frontage upon a mapped street. It is believed that the land lying within the area has been dedicated to public use, but the opening proceeding is evidently desired for the purpose of removing any question as to the title.

I would recommend the approval of the resolution, that title to the land be acquired in fee, and that all of the costs of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited. A district of assessment is suggested which provides for placing the entire cost upon the land which will be given frontage upon the street, it being understood that the widening has been made simply for the benefit of this property, this district to comprise the following area:

SIR—Herewith are transmitted two resolutions of the Local Board of the Chester District, Borough of The Bronx, providing for the acquisition of title to the following streets:



Bronx Park East, as widened, between White Plains road and Bronx and Pelham Parkway.

White Plains road, between a point near the old Unionport road and a point near Thwaites place.

The former resolution was adopted on December 21, 1905, and the latter on March 1, 1906.

Bronx Park East, between White Plains road and Bronx and Pelham Parkway was originally laid out to coincide with White Plains road, having a width of 100 feet, and proceedings for acquiring title to it were confirmed in 1902. The street failed to include the old Bear Swamp road, which through a portion of its length adjoined it on its easterly side, and for the purpose of retaining it within the street system, the map was changed on January 26, 1906, by increasing the street width to 166 feet. The object of the resolution now presented is to acquire title to the additional 66 feet which has been added to the street width. The street as originally laid out has been graded, curbed and flagged and a few buildings have been erected upon the abutting property, some of them encroaching upon the land required for the widening, this affecting a total length of about 1,800 feet.

The new location of White Plains road is shown upon a map adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 16, 1906. It departs from the former lines between a point near the old Unionport road and a point near Thwaites place, a distance of a little less than one-half mile. The street has a width of 100 feet. It is not in use at the present time and buildings encroach upon its lines.

The streets are adjoining and I see no reason why the two resolutions should not be combined and made the subject of one proceeding, such treatment being recommended. It is also recommended that title to the land be acquired in fee; that all of the cost of the proceeding including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

#### OPENING HEBBARD AVENUE, QUEENS.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on February 14, 1908, a hearing was given in the matter of a proceeding for acquiring title to

Hebbard avenue, between Creek street and Fresh Pond road, excluding the land of the Long Island Railroad, in the Second Ward of the Borough of Queens.

In the report which was originally prepared upon this proceeding it was stated that the omission of the railroad was probably due to the uncertainty then existing as to the probable elevation of the tracks when grade crossings are discontinued in the vicinity, and it was then believed that it would not be possible to carry the street across the railroad. At the hearing an objection was raised to the inclusion in the proceeding of the block between the railroad and Flushing avenue, and for this reason the matter was referred to your Engineer for further investigation and report.

Information since received from the engineering department of the Long Island Railroad indicates that the changes which will ultimately be made in the grade of the railroad will probably permit of carrying it over the street without any change in the grade of the street as now established.

The owner of the property between the railroad and Flushing avenue bases his objection to the proceeding on the ground that the street is not required at the present time, and he informs me that he is prepared to cede this portion of the street to the City and to improve it when the growth of the section warrants such action.

A few changes in the street plan of this vicinity are shown upon a map recently submitted by the President of the Borough which has not yet been considered by the Board of Estimate; these include the discontinuance of the Hebbard avenue railroad crossing evidently for the reason that it would be located only about 150 feet from Flushing avenue, where a crossing will unquestionably be required. I see no reason why the crossing should not be retained, but its omission from the map cannot be considered as seriously objectionable as the grades will permit of restoring it at any time when it is required. The exclusion of the block of the street between the Long Island Railroad and Flushing avenue would not objectionably increase the break in continuity of the street if the railroad crossing is to be now omitted, and I can see no reason why the request made for its omission should not be favored.

It will be necessary, however, to secure an amended Local Board resolution before the proceeding can be authorized, and I would therefore recommend that the matter be referred to the President of the Borough of Queens for such purpose.

#### OPENING CENTRAL AVENUE AND CYPRESS AVENUE, QUEENS.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Queens was presented, and, on motion, was referred to the Chief Engineer:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—This Department is now engaged in the construction of a large trunk sewer in St. Nicholas avenue, from the Brooklyn Borough line to Myrtle avenue, and in Myrtle avenue, from St. Nicholas avenue to Tesla place, in the Second Ward of the Borough of Queens, at a cost of \$393,743.75.

This sewer is extremely important, and is valueless without the branch trunk sewers, which, combined, will drain the whole section of the south side of the Second Ward, when completed.

The sewer plan provides for branch trunk sewers in Cypress avenue and in Central avenue, and they cannot be authorized until the street opening proceedings on these streets are advanced. The maps for the condemnation proceedings are on file in the office of the Corporation Counsel, but Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment cannot be appointed, owing to the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 22, 1907, as follows:

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested not to advance any opening proceedings heretofore authorized, where Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have not been appointed, or any similar proceedings hereafter authorized, beyond having the necessary maps prepared, until otherwise instructed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

These sewers will drain a thickly populated section of the Borough, where the conditions are such as to be a menace to the health of the community. Owing to the volume of water, particularly on Cypress avenue, great damage is done to surrounding property by the cellars being flooded, and it is of greatest importance that these branch trunk sewers be advanced to a speedy completion, as without them no relief is obtained by the laying of the present trunk sewer and the one to be laid in the Borough of Brooklyn at a cost of about \$800,000.

I would, therefore, request that the Board adopt a resolution, copy of which is enclosed herewith, directing the Corporation Counsel to advance the opening proceedings in these two streets.

DEAR SIR—I transmit herewith maps showing change of plan for sewer in Coney Island, between Stillwell avenue and West Thirty-seventh street. This comprises nearly the whole of Coney Island. The former plan was recently sent forward by adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for sewers in this district between West Twenty-seventh street and West Thirty-seventh street. This plan is intended as a substitute for the former one, the changes made being as follows:

The former plan showed that house sewage was all collected at one point, nearly one mile away from the Disposal Works, was lifted by a battery of Shone ejectors—which are operated by compressed air—and after being delivered through a long force main was allowed to flow to the present works.

I am convinced that this would be an expensive system to maintain in operation, because in a line of this length, for the transmission of compressed air, the loss in efficiency would be surely as great as 50 per cent. and very probably more. These ejectors would need attention quite frequently, and would necessitate a trip by men who are located at the Disposal Works almost every day. It would be necessary also to build a large chamber to hold the ejectors, which would occupy nearly the whole street intersection and much of it would be located below tidewater. In place of this arrangement, the present plan provides a low level outlet sewer from the point where the ejectors were to have been located to the Disposal Works. It also provides a pump well at the Disposal Works and a set of centrifugal pumps to lift the sewage to a point where it can be treated. This places the machinery all in one building, and provides a low level sewer into which house sewers may empty for its whole length at a good grade, such as could not otherwise be obtained, and makes it impossible for anything to happen which would cause the sewage to back up into cellars, as might be the case if Shone ejectors were used.

The operation of this plant will be certainly much cheaper. Its first cost will be somewhat greater, but the area upon which it will be assessed will be much greater also. It will extend over the whole drainage district. Storm sewers have been left practically as they were shown in the main plan. The preparation of this new plan has caused some little delay, but it will be well worth it.

Mr. NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 277 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—You have asked me to give you an opinion regarding a plan that has been submitted by the Borough of Brooklyn for a modification of the former drainage plan of Coney Island District, Map "CC, District 49." You attach to your request a report presented to you by Mr. Arthur S. Tuttle, Engineer in Charge of the Division of Public Improvements, which explains the general features of the new plan and those wherein it differs from the former one.

I have examined the plan and there are a few of these features which I consider objectionable and which are herewith elaborated.

Due to the flatness of the territory it was natural to use the least possible grades so as to collect the sewage from the largest possible areas and with the least pumping.

The minimum grades which I consider will give a satisfactory velocity to carry sewage along are:

10-inch pipes, 0.30 per cent.  
12-inch pipes, 0.20 per cent.  
15-inch pipes, 0.15 per cent.  
18-inch pipes, 0.12 per cent.

The minimum grades given on the plan appear to be about as follows:

10-inch to 12-inch pipes, 0.20 per cent.  
15-inch to 18-inch pipes, 0.21 per cent.  
30-inch to 36-inch pipes, 0.08 per cent.

It will therefore be seen that for 10-inch pipe the grade which is given has 0.2 foot per hundred, or less than what I should consider a proper minimum slope. This reduction in slope will naturally give a slower velocity and cause a deposit of suspended matter.

On the plan the least size of sanitary sewer advocated is 10 inches in diameter, where but a few houses are connected. It appears that this diameter may have been selected so as to reduce the grade and apparently satisfy the conditions.

The common practice in the United States is to have a minimum diameter of 8 inches, although in many cases 6 inches is sufficiently large to take the maximum flow of sewage from the highest block of a sewer line. A smaller pipe when large enough to carry the flow is better because it concentrates the section and gives better scour. By adopting a 10-inch diameter there is a necessary flattening out of the section of a small flow and consequently greater friction, less velocity and more deposit.

The 10-inch pipes as planned would most probably become sewers of deposit with the grades as given, and even with flush tanks at the heads could not be as well flushed as a smaller pipe.

It is, therefore, my opinion that 8-inch pipe would be more serviceable for the district in the highest blocks of the system.

Putting in 8-inch pipes would mean that the grades would have to be greater and this would further mean one of two things, either that the main collecting sewers and the pump well would have to be deeper, or that an auxiliary pumping station would be required somewhere near the centre of the district for which the plan is made.

To make the pump well and the main sewers deeper would, I believe very greatly increase the ground water flow, and therefore, increase the amount of pumping at the station. The ground is sandy and it will be difficult to lay the pipes entirely water-tight. The deeper they are, the greater is the pressure of the water from the outside and the more readily will it enter even through the smallest apertures in the joints between the sewer pipe.

I am of the opinion that it would be more satisfactory in the end to have an auxiliary pumping station, which could be operated by electricity from the main station and require only an occasional visit.

It may appear that the operation of another pumping station, and particularly one that is expected to be automatic, would present undesirable complications. But this does not appear, from experience elsewhere, to be as objectionable as to have permanently a system of sewers laid down with such flat grades that there must be deposits and consequent decomposition and odors arising from the manholes. This condition seems to me to be particularly objectionable at the seaside, where people move with the expectation of having more pure air than in the interior of a densely built up city.

In view of these facts, I do not think the plan is the best that could be arranged for the District, so far as efficiency is concerned. Regarding economy I do not believe that the changes suggested by me would increase the total cost materially.

It is also asked whether the present method of disposal of the sewage should be perpetuated, as would be the case if the plan submitted were adopted.

I think that careful comparative estimates of cost should be made for the following two methods of disposal, thereby to ascertain which is preferable.

1. It is entirely feasible to effect a sufficient purification of the sewage near the proposed location of the pumping station, according to the method suggested to you in a report from me dated January 10, 1908, and referring to a plan to treat the sewage from Richmond Hill. The effluent could be discharged into the creek separating Coney Island from the main land.

2. It is also possible to pump the ordinary flow of sewage untreated through a force main and to discharge it into 30 feet of water off of the western point of the island. Floating matter would be held back by screens at the pumping station and no sewage would appear at the surface of the water where discharged as it would be at all times sufficiently dispersed so that it would completely disappear.

In one plan there would be the annual expense of treatment, besides the interest on the investment, depreciation, etc. In the other plan there would be an annual cost of pumping to a greater elevation, interest on the cost of the outfall pipe, depreciation, etc.

An examination of the present method of treatment does not make a favorable showing as regards economy and efficiency.

It is a mixing of lime with the sewage; about two barrels of lime are used per day. There is a chlorine gas generator at the plant, but it is rarely used. No information was obtainable regarding the frequency of its use. The plant should be remodeled as above suggested.

The average amount of sewage pumped and treated per day is about 2.25 million gallons. The extremes run from 2 to 3 million gallons and much of the water pumped is ground water and also storm water which now gets into the present sewers. There is a 2 million gallon and a 3½ million gallon pump installed at the station.

The effluent from the tanks is pumped into Gravesend Bay and the sludge from the tanks is pumped on to ground outside of the pumping station.

The plant has 4 pits and 2 pump wells. The first two pits are about 9 feet deep and the second two about 11 feet deep. The pump wells are 20 feet deep. The present sewer enters about 3 feet above the bottom of the first pair of pits.

The system as proposed on Map "CC, District 49," will mean a rebuilding and lowering of the pump wells, because the sewers will be much lower and be at an elevation of over 11 feet below mean high-water. By having an auxiliary electric pumping station this depth could be materially reduced.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Brooklyn, through his Secretary, bearing date of April 24, 1907, requesting the approval of a modification in the drainage plan of District C.C. 49.

The plan submitted affects that portion of Coney Island extending from Stillwell avenue to West Thirty-seventh street, the original plan for which was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 23, 1904. Under the latter plan storm water was to be delivered directly into the Atlantic Ocean on the south and Gravesend Bay on the north, while house drainage was to be carried to purification plant No. 2, where it was to be treated chemically before pumping it into



Gravesend Bay. Owing to the low elevations and flat surface, an auxiliary automatic pumping station, located near West Thirty-first street and Mermaid avenue, was to be provided, and it was intended to operate this from the main station, using the compressed air system of pumping.

For the purpose of locating this automatic station within the street system, thus avoiding the delay and expense which would otherwise be required for acquiring title to the original site, a change in plan was adopted on March 8, 1907, under which the station was to be placed within the lines of Mermaid avenue, at West Thirty-first street; at the same time further revisions were made in the grades and sizes of the sewers proposed for the adjoining area.

Under the plan now submitted the automatic pumping station is to be omitted and all of the house drainage is to be carried by gravity to the main pumping station. Very flat grades were shown for several of the sewers and many of them were to be carried to a great depth below tide level, for which reasons low velocity would obtain and there appeared to be a probability of admitting a large amount of ground water to the system.

To remove any doubt concerning the adequacy of these plans, the matter has been laid before Consulting Engineer Hering, and his views have also been requested as to the proposed use of the present purification system. His report, bearing date of January 15, is presented herewith. He advises that larger sizes for the sanitary sewers have been indicated on the map than are required, and evidently for the purpose of utilizing a flatter grade than would be considered proper for a smaller size of pipe; that the minimum grade shown for these sewers is flatter than required to give a satisfactory velocity; that the low elevations proposed would largely increase the ground water flow, all of which would have to be pumped; that the objections as to grade and sizes shown upon the plan could be removed by the introduction of automatically operated pumping stations; and that the untreated sewage might be discharged into deep water off the western end of the island or that the present purification plant could be converted into a sprinkling filter in a manner similar to the changes recommended by him in the Jamaica disposal plant, the report upon which was presented at the meeting of the Board held on January 31, 1908.

I would therefore recommend that the map be referred back to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn without approval, and that his attention be called to the report made by Engineer Hering concerning the objectionable features of the plan.

This is necessitated by the fact that the line of Washington Cemetery crosses Fifty-fourth street on this block at a sharp angle, and that the sewer shown on the old legal plan in the centre of the street would not provide drainage for the property on the northerly side of Fifty-fourth street, this street and others through Washington Cemetery not being open, and it being uncertain whether they ever will be opened.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Brooklyn, through his Secretary, bearing date of August 26, 1907, requesting the approval of a modification in the drainage plan of Map T, District 40.

This plan affects the sewers proposed for Fifty-fourth street, between Twentieth and Twenty-first avenues, and for Twentieth avenue, between Fifty-fourth street and Fifty-fifth street. Under the map heretofore adopted the sewer in Fifty-fourth street was to be connected with one proposed for Twenty-first avenue. The latter street falls within the limits of the Washington Cemetery, and it is believed that title to it cannot be acquired. The suggested amendment provides for reversing the direction of flow to connect with the Twentieth avenue sewer and for a correspondingly slight increase in the capacity of the latter.

The map appears to be a proper one and its approval is recommended.

#### DRAINAGE PLAN FOR SEWERAGE DISTRICT 30, QUEENS.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

LONG ISLAND CITY, October 10, 1907.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—Herewith I transmit for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment plan of drainage of Sewer District No. 40, situated in the Fourth Ward, between Metropolitan, Van Wyck, Liberty and Lefferts avenues, and plan of drainage of Sewerage District No. 30, situated in the Third Ward, between Murray street, Broadway, Prince street, Myrtle avenue, Brook street and Tulip avenue.

For Sewerage District No. 40 a separate system for house sewerage only is shown. In determining the sizes of the sewers a consumption of water of 150 gallons per day per head of population was assumed. The population was taken to be four heads per lot. Fifty per cent. of the daily flow was supposed to be discharged in eight hours to take care of maximum flow conditions. An allowance of 40,000 gallons per day per mile of sewer was made for ground water.

The outlet sewer in Rockaway road and Lincoln avenue is of sufficient size so as to carry any additional sewerage that may be delivered into it in the future, when the territory lying between Rockaway road and Liberty avenue should be developed.

The existing Jamaica Disposal Plant is of ample capacity to dispose of the additional sewerage to be delivered from this district.

Sewerage District No. 30 is that part of the former Village of Flushing in which the existing sewers are of inadequate capacity, in very bad condition and causing continuous damage and nuisance. A combined system of sewerage was designed for this section, based on an assumption of three inches of rainfall per hour and a run off of 60 per cent. The area is 325 acres and the trunk sewer in Myrtle avenue had to be designed of a size sufficiently large so as to be able to carry the run off

of this area at a flat grade with the invert below mean high water for a considerable distance.

The established grades are those established by the authorities of the former Village of Flushing. Most of the streets and roads are macadamized, curbed, etc.

Mr. NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 277 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—You have requested me to give you my opinion on a plan of drainage proposed for Sewerage District No. 30 of the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, dated September 28, 1907.

I have visited the location with you and have carefully considered the merits of the plan. The area covers 325 acres.

It is proposed to establish in this district a combined system and to run an outfall main sewer down Myrtle avenue to a branch of Flushing Creek, which is a tidal estuary. The diameter of this sewer at the outlet is 8 feet and the invert elevation is 4 feet below datum.

There are three small areas of a few blocks each where the established grades of the streets have been fixed so low that it is impossible to collect and discharge sewage into the proposed outfall sewer by gravity. Therefore, it is now suggested to insert electrically driven centrifugal pumps at each one of the low places and to discharge the collected sewage and rain water through force mains into the outfall sewer, as shown upon the plan.

The locations of the chambers, each of which contains two centrifugal pumps, are as follows:

1. Intersection of Bayside avenue and Brock street.
2. On Covert place, between Myrtle avenue and Park place.
3. At the intersection of Congress avenue and Park place.

At the two latter points there are pockets in the street grade, so that the surface water cannot be removed without entering the catch basins and thence the pump chamber and be pumped out.

While it is practicable and feasible to have such centrifugal pumps located in the street and operated by electricity, it is of course very much better, if not too expensive, to obviate the necessity of operating them, particularly if the street surfaces form a pocket, so that, in case the pumps should not operate, there would be a flooding of the street.

I would suggest that a calculation be made to ascertain the relative cost of two possible solutions of the problem. One, to capitalize the cost not only of pumping, but also of periodically inspecting the chambers and examining the pumps, particularly after every storm, and allowing for annual repairs and deterioration; another, to ascertain the cost of grading up the streets and paying whatever damages there might be in raising any private structures that have been already built. Where no structures exist the raising of the streets a few feet to prevent pockets and possible flooding at times, should be considered a benefit, and it is the endeavor of street departments generally to avoid such pockets wherever practicable for this reason. The raising of these grades would be advantageous even if the cost were reasonably higher, and pumps should be introduced only if the cost of raising the street surface is prohibitive, which does not appear to be the case.

I would therefore suggest that reconsideration be given to the street grading at these three points in order to determine whether, even at a greater but reasonable cost, it would be possible to establish such grades that will make these auxiliary pumps unnecessary.

If this regrading, for reasons at present unknown to me, is not practicable, then, if the design of the machinery is properly made and the pumps are properly cared for, kept in good condition and frequently examined, I see no reason why they could not answer the purpose.

Regarding the discharge of the sewage and storm water of this district at the present time into Flushing Creek, it is practicable and undoubtedly now the most economical solution for the drainage of this district. In the future, however, it will be necessary to place intercepting sewers on streets substantially parallel with the water courses so that the sewage can be kept out of them and carried to a point whence it can be pumped either into Flushing Bay or to an area for treatment.

Regarding the general run of sizes of the sewers they are in accordance with recent practices in the Borough and will be satisfactory for many years.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of October 10, 1907, requesting the adoption of a drainage plan for Sewerage District No. 30, located in the Third Ward, Borough of Queens.

The plan submitted affects the area bounded approximately by Broadway, Flushing Creek, Tulip avenue and Murray street, in the former Village of Flushing. The Borough President advises that the street grades shown on this map "are those established by the authorities of the former Village of Flushing," and the map is submitted as a permanent drainage plan. The records of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment show that none of the streets has yet been placed upon the map of the City, and this being the case, the map would necessarily have to be amended and treated as a temporary drainage plan in conformity with the provisions of section 394 of the Charter, or a grade map should be submitted for adoption prior to action upon the drainage plan.

The map affects an area of 325 acres and the sewers are intended to remove a rainfall at the rate of three inches an hour, assuming 60 per cent. of the area to be impervious. The street elevations shown upon this map in the vicinity of Flushing Creek generally range from about 1.6 feet to about 6 feet above mean high tide, and the plan indicates that at three low points back of the water-front the surface elevations are too low to permit of the use of gravity sewers, making it necessary to install pumping stations within the lines of the streets. It is evidently proposed to have these pumping stations operated automatically. The main outlet sewer is to have a diameter of 8 feet, and is to discharge into Flushing Creek at the foot of Myrtle avenue.

Believing that there was room for doubt as to the advisability of retaining the low street grades shown, and as to whether the location of the outlet sewer was a proper one, I have asked Consulting Engineer Hering to give the Board the benefit of his advice in these particulars. His report, which bears the date of February 15, is presented herewith and shows that it would be desirable to raise the street grades to such an elevation as would make the auxiliary pumping stations unnecessary if these changes can be made at a cost which is not prohibitive. He also advises that it is practicable at this time to discharge the sewage into Flushing Creek, but that the plan should be based on the ultimate diversion of the flow from this and adjacent drainage districts into a main intercepting sewer which would carry the flow either into Flushing Bay at a point where it could be discharged without creating a nuisance, or to a point where it could first be purified.

I would therefore recommend that this map be returned to the President of the Borough of Queens without approval, and that his attention be called to the desirability of amending the street grades for the entire section, having in view the removal of the pockets or low points shown upon the map, and also the establishment of grades at such an elevation above tide level as will permit of the construction of a gravity system of sewers.

GENTLEMEN—I send you herewith, for adoption, two prints, first showing the Stapleton watershed, designated as Sewerage District No. 3, in the Second and Fourth Wards, Borough of Richmond, and map or plan showing location, size and grades of a system of temporary sewers in Sewerage District 3-A, Borough of Richmond, the latter being the first portion needed for the extensive system of sewers that will ultimately be required in the Stapleton district.

I would ask that the earliest possible consideration be given to this matter, as the needs of the community are very great for the relief which will be given by the sewers in question.

It has taken years of labor to secure the necessary information for these designs, and there have been numerous petitions by property owners and residents, and representations by the Board of Health, which make it specially important for the earliest possible attention. There will follow at an early date the necessary Local Board resolution of initiation.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond, bearing date of November 23, 1907, requesting the approval of a map showing the boundary proposed for Sewerage District No. 3, located in the Second and Fourth Wards, and of a map showing the sewers proposed for District 3-A, located in the Second Ward.

The drainage plan for the entire district comprises an area of about 1,200 acres, extending southwestwardly from Stapleton about two miles, and having a width of about one mile. The boundary is evidently intended to conform approximately with the natural boundary of the drainage area which has an outlet at the foot of Water street, Stapleton. This map does not show the sewers which it is proposed to build, and its adoption is evidently desired for the purpose of fixing the boundary of the district which may properly be called upon to bear a portion of the cost of the Stapleton sewers.

The plan for District 3-A, which is also submitted, and which is designated as a temporary one, shows the details proposed for the main trunk sewer extending along Laurel avenue, Gordon street, Broad street, Canal street and Water street and also a number of the branches, the area comprised within the limits of the plan being bounded approximately by Canal street, Centre street, Laurel avenue, Richmond road, St. Pauls avenue, Stone street, Richmond road, Wright street, Water street and the bulkhead line.

From information furnished by the Borough authorities, it appears that the trunk sewer has been designed to meet the anticipated growth of this section of the borough during the next fifty years; that the impervious surface has been estimated to range from 50 per cent. to 90 per cent. and to average 58 per cent. of the area tributary to the system, taking into consideration the probable development of each portion contributing to the flow, and that the sizes provided are intended to be sufficient to remove what are designated as "second class" storms. The use of the old stone culvert which has been built in Canal street, between Broad street and Front street, is to be continued for removing storm water, and the plan shows a proposed extension of this culvert to meet the new bulkhead which is being built by the Department of Docks and Ferries. This culvert is also to be reinforced by a sewer having a diameter ranging from 8 feet 9 inches to about 9 feet 6 inches, the combined area of both the storm water sewers being equivalent to that of a single sewer having a diameter of a little less than 12 feet. The plan shows that the house drainage is to be discharged at the bulkhead line, and that it is proposed to utilize the sewers which have already been built at Stapleton in so far as such treatment is practicable. The map is described as a temporary one for the reason that very few of the streets shown have yet been incorporated upon the map of the City.

It should be noted that it is not the intention of this plan to provide a capacity sufficient to meet the conditions which obtain at very rare intervals when the rate of precipitation is abnormally high, such periods occurring at intervals ranging from, say, about ten to twenty years, for the reason that the sizes required to accomplish this would place what is believed to be an unnecessarily severe burden upon owners of property within the entire drainage district. This treatment is, in my judgment, one to be commended, but I believe that unless it is pointed out and accepted as a feature of the plan, the City might be held liable for damage occasioned to property owners during such periods when the capacity of the sewer was found to be inadequate.

In recommending the approval of both maps, I would also suggest that a note be added to the drainage plan for District 3-A, and also incorporated in the resolution of approval, clearly indicating this feature of the design.

Resolved, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, That the map submitted by the President of the Borough of Richmond, entitled "Map or plan showing location, size and grades of a system of temporary sewers in Sewerage District 3-A, in the Second Ward, Borough of Richmond," and bearing date of November 11, 1907, is hereby approved, with the understanding that the sizes and grades shown for the proposed sewers are not intended to provide a capacity sufficient for the removal of storm water when the rate of precipitation is abnormally high, and that the capacity of the system has been thus restricted for the purpose of keeping the

cost within limits which it is believed may be properly imposed upon the property benefited.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

278. Changing the grade of Denton place, between First street and Carroll street, Borough of Brooklyn.

279. Changing the grade of East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and the East River, Borough of The Bronx.

280. Changing the line of West Two Hundred and Thirty-first street, from Riverdale avenue to Kingsbridge avenue, and from Albany road to Bailey avenue; and changing the grades of West Two Hundred and Thirty-first street, between Riverdale avenue and Bailey avenue, and of the intersecting streets affected thereby.

#### "CATSKILL" AQUEDUCT.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

REPORT No. 5708.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,  
March 10, 1908.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Under date of March 9, 1908, the Secretary of the Board of Water Supply has forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an agreement, in triplicate, between the Wallkill Valley Railroad Company and The City of New York, which agreement grants to the City for a consideration of one dollar a permanent easement under the tracks and right-of-way of the said railroad company for the purpose of carrying the Catskill aqueduct under the same, this particular parcel being shown as Parcel No. 215 upon the map of Section 5 of the Northern Aqueduct Department, which map was approved by the Board of Estimate on October 11, 1907, and was filed in the office of the Clerk of Ulster County on October 14, 1907.

The agreement grants to the City the right in perpetuity to construct and maintain an aqueduct and its appurtenances, including pipe lines, to maintain above the surface telephone and electric power lines, and to enter upon the surface of the railroad company's property at any time to make necessary repairs to any of these structures. The agreement contains the usual provisions that the work shall not obstruct or impede the operation of the railroad, that during construction the City will protect the public and property of the company, that the work shall be done at the risk of the City and without expense to the company, and that in case of any repairs they shall be made in such manner as to interfere as little as possible with the property and business of the railroad company and at the cost of the City, etc. It also provides that should the railroad company wish at any time in the future to revise the grade of its railroad or acquire additional land for the construction of other tracks, the City will make any modification of its structures on the property of the railroad company which will permit these changes, and that it will grant to the company an easement for the construction of such additional tracks or sidings across the land immediately adjacent to Parcel No. 215.

The agreement seems to be an entirely proper one and has been approved by the Corporation Counsel as safeguarding the interests of the City, and it is, therefore, recommended that it be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 724, Laws of 1905, hereby approves the following agreement:

This agreement, made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of February, 1908, by and between the Wallkill Valley Railroad Company, hereinafter called the party of the first part, and The City of New York, acting by its Board of Water Supply, hereinafter called the party of the second part,

Witnesseth, That the party of the first part, in consideration of the sum of one dollar to it paid by the party of the second part, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, hereby grants to the party of the second part on the condition that the party of the second part faithfully keeps the covenants herein provided to be kept and performed, and not otherwise, the right in perpetuity to construct and maintain under said first party's railroad at the location known as Parcel No. 215, and shown upon a certain map entitled "Northern Aqueduct Department, Section No. 5, Board of Water Supply of The City of New York, map of real estate situated in the towns of Gardiner, Plattekill, Shawangunk, County of Ulster and State of New York, to be acquired by The City of New York, under the provisions of chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, as amended, for the construction of the Catskill Aqueduct and appurtenances from the vicinity of Libertyville to Orange County line, near St. Elmo," which map was filed in the office of the County Clerk of the County of Ulster, at Kingston, N. Y., on the 14th day of October, 1907, and which location is indicated in yellow tracing on the map attached hereto and made a part of this agreement, which map is a copy of part of the map last above referred to, an aqueduct and all appurtenances, including a pipe line or pipe lines, and to construct and maintain above the surface of said first party's railroad at the same location shown on the maps above referred to, telephone and electric power lines, and to enter upon the surface of said first party's railroad to repair any part of said aqueduct and appurtenances, including said telephone and power lines, all of which is hereinafter referred to as the "Work," upon the following terms and conditions, all of which the party of the second part agrees and covenants to keep, abide by and perform:

First—The work shall be done in such a manner as not to injure or damage the lands, structures, roadway, railroad or tracks of the party of the first part, and in such a manner as not to obstruct or impede the operation or use of its railroad, and after the doing of the said work the said lands, structures, roadway, railroad and tracks of the party of the first part shall be restored to the same or as good a condition as they were in prior to the commencement of the doing of the said work, and all rules and regulations in regard to the same which the Chief Engineer, for the time being, of the party of the first part, or such person as he may designate, may make in



order to properly protect the public and the property and traffic of the party of the first part, shall be strictly obeyed and conformed to by the party of the second part, and by the contractors, agents and servants of the party of the second part.

Second—All the work to be done by the party of the second part, or by the contractors, agents or servants of the party of the second part, in connection with the doing of the said work, or in connection with the repair, renewal or maintenance thereof, shall be done at the risk of the party of the second part, without expense to the party of the first part.

The construction of any false work or of any other work necessary for the support of the tracks or roadbed of the party of the first part shall be in manner approved by the Chief Engineer of said party of the first part, or such other person as he may designate.

And the party of the second part agrees to employ such watchman or watchmen who, in the judgment of the said Chief Engineer, for the time being, of the party of the first part, may be required during the performance of said work or in connection with the repair, renewal, maintenance or use thereof, for the proper and safe protection of the property, traffic and business of the said party of the second part; said watchman, or watchmen, to be subject to the instructions of the Chief Engineer, for the time being, of the party of the first part, or such person as he may designate.

Third—Whenever it may be necessary to make any repairs to or renewals of the said work in or upon the premises of the party of the first part, such repairs or renewals shall be made to the satisfaction of the said Chief Engineer, for the time being, of the party of the first part, or such person or persons as he may appoint for that purpose, at the sole expense of the party of the second part, in such a manner as to interfere as little as possible with the premises, property and business of the party of the first part; and the party of the second part shall, at the cost and expense of the party of the second part, restore the premises of the party of the first part to the same or as good a condition as they were in prior to the making of such repairs or renewals.

Fourth—The party of the second part covenants and agrees to keep, abide by and perform all the terms and provisions hereof, and shall and will at all times indemnify and save harmless the party of the first part of and from all loss and damage which may happen, or arise, or be done, incurred, or caused by reason of the construction, repair, renewal, maintenance or use of the said work.

Fifth—The party of the first part shall not in any case be liable to the party of the second part, or to the contractors, agents or servants of the party of the second part, or to the agents or servants of any such contractors, for any injury or damage to the person or property of the party of the second part, or to the person or property of any of the contractors, agents or servants of the party of the second part, or to the agents or servants of any such contractors, or to any other persons or properties, which may happen or be done or caused by, or by reason of the doing of the said work, or during the repair, renewal, maintenance or use thereof; and the said party of the second part shall and will assume, and does hereby assume, all responsibility and liability for any and all such injuries or damages.

Sixth—It is agreed that the party of the first part, in case of emergency, may protect, or cause to be protected, any overhead wires or cables on its right of way, at the point of crossing in accordance with standard methods, and at the expense of the party of the second part, and said party of the second part will pay direct to the parties installing and maintaining such protection the cost of constructing and maintaining the same, plus fifteen per cent.

It is further understood and agreed that if, in the future, the party of the first part deems it necessary to revise the grade of its railroad or to acquire additional land immediately adjacent to said Parcel No. 215, or to construct additional tracks or structures thereon, then, and in that event, the party of the second part will relay such of its structures as exist on the property of the party of the first part as interfere with the proposed new railroad plans, provided that in the opinion of the Chief Engineer, for the time being, of the party of the second part, same can be done so as not to interfere with the operation of the plant of the said party of the second part.

It is further understood and agreed that if said first party shall in future deem it necessary to construct additional tracks or sidings, the party of the second part hereby agrees as part of the consideration for the easement herein granted, to grant to said party of the first part an easement for the construction of such additional tracks or sidings across the right of way of the above-mentioned aqueduct and immediately adjacent to the said Parcel No. 215, herein.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part has caused its corporate name to be hereunto duly subscribed and its corporate seal to be hereunto duly affixed, and the Commissioners of the Board of Water Supply, in behalf of the party of the second part, and with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, given by resolution duly adopted \_\_\_\_\_, 1908, have duly subscribed their names hereto and have caused the seal of the Board of Water Supply to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written, in triplicate.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

GRADING SIXTY-EIGHTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

The Comptroller asked unanimous consent for the present consideration of a resolution to grade, curb and lay sidewalks on Sixty-eighth street, Brooklyn. No objection being made, the following resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

In the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District.

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same, and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To regulate, grade, set curb on concrete and lay cement sidewalks on Sixty-eighth street, between Third and Fourth avenues; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on July 15, 1907, initiating proceedings for grading, curbing and laying cement sidewalks on Sixty-eighth street, between Third and Fourth avenues.

This resolution affects a length of one block of Sixty-eighth street, title to which has been legally acquired. The street is not in use at the present time, and the abutting property is unimproved.

I see no reason why the resolution should not be approved, and would recommend such action. The work to be done comprises the following:

4,000 cubic yards grading.

1,520 linear feet curb.

7,600 square feet cement sidewalk.

The estimated cost of construction is \$4,900, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$49,300.

—and there having been presented to said Board of Estimate and Apportionment an estimate in writing, in such detail as the Board has directed, that the cost of the proposed work or improvement will be the sum of \$4,900; and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, to wit, the sum of \$49,300, having also been presented, it is

Resolved, That the said resolution of the said Local Board be and the same hereby is approved, and the local improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized. And this Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said local improvement.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
