From the Corporation Counsel (84841)—Returning, approved as to form, permit to Alexander Walker for the use of certain land under water belonging to the City between Two Hundred and Sixth and Two Hundred and Seventh streets, Harlem River, Borough of Manhattan. Filed.

From the Comptroller—

1 (84855). Submitting list of liens to be sold at Manhattan tax sale on February 2, 1910, and requesting to be informed as to whether any of the liens affect property owned by the City under the jurisdiction of this Department. Information furnished.

2 (84897). Submitting copy of report and chemical analysis on coal delivered under Class I. of Contract 1179. Filed.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1 (84761). Stating that before the increase in the salaries of Thomas Roberts and James Harrigan, Foremen Carpenters, can be approved, it will be necessary for the Department to certify that there are less than three persons eligible for promotion to this grade. Advised that the two men are the only Foremen Carpenters in the Department not paid at the rate of \$1,800 per annum.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From January 1 to January 15 inclusive, 73 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 26 at Gouverneur Hospital, 37 at Harlem Hospital and 32 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

Fire drills were held at Bellevue Hospital on January 7 and 13, at Gouverneur Hospital on January 6 and 11, and at Harlem and Fordham Hospitals on January 5 and 12.

Several special Nurses have been requested by members of the visiting staff and have been authorized. This was done only in such instances as seemed to warrant such action.

In sending out the medical and surgical reports, volumes 2 and 3, the list on file gives 183 libraries in the United States. It will cost 34 cents postage to supply each library, a total of \$46.25. Approval is asked for.

It is recommended that some competent person be employed to draw up specifications for painting the entire interior of Gouverneur Hospital and that the work be then advertised and the contract awarded.

Mr. Frank Knapp has been appointed temporarily as Egg Candler at a salary of \$1,000 a year; Mr. Paul Meyer as temporary Architectural Draftsman at \$1,500 a year, and Mr. William W. Leydecker as Plumber at \$5 a day. The position of Plumber is provided for in the Budget and the selection was made regularly from the Civil Service list.

It is recommended that the services of the Fuel Engineering Company for testing coal in this Department be continued for the year 1910 at the same rate of compensation as formerly.

There is a rule of many years' standing that all post-partum cases be assigned to the gynecological wards. Inasmuch as the obstetrical wards are now in the new hospital building, it seems unwarranted and undesirable to continue working in this rule. It is therefore recommended that the rule be changed and that all post-partum cases, unless they require gynecological treatment, be sent to the post-partum ward of the obstetrical service.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of special Nurses reported by the General Medical Superintendent was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To forward copies of the Medical and Surgical Reports, volumes 2 and 3, to each of the libraries in the regular mailing list.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To refer the question of the preparation of specifications for the painting of Gouverneur Hospital to the Building Committee.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the temporary appointment of Mr. Frank Knapp as Egg Candler at a salary of \$1,000 was approved, as was also the temporary appointment of Mr. Paul Meyer as Architectural Draftsman at \$1,500 per annum.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of Mr. William W. Leydecker as Plumber at \$5 a day was also approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved, To continue the services of the Fuel Engineering Company for the testing of coal during 1910 at the same rate of compensation as before.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved, To refer the recommendation in regard to the assignment of post-partum cases to the Medical Board for recommendation and report.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To continue the recommendations regarding the Mills Training School as a special order until the final report of the Medical Board is received.

Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported in regard to the ventilating systems and submitted a communication dated January 10 from Dr. S. S. Goldwater, expert in hospital construction, in regard to the ventilation of Pavilions I, K, L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To continue this matter with the Building Committee for further investigation.

Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building Committee, submitted a report as follows:

"Mr. J. S. Murphy, treasurer of Byrne & Murphy, was examined by the Chairman of the Building Committee at his office, in the presence of the Secretary to the President, in regard to the claim of that firm that no liquidated damages be collected on their contract for the plumbing work in Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital. They claim that the delay which accompanied their work was entirely due to the slow progress made by other contractors, particularly the contractors for masonry, tiling, marble and plaster work. They refer to letters which had been written to the architects in regard to delays at various times, copies of which are all on file in the office of the Board of Trustees. These communications are dated August 17, 1906; January 7, 1907; February 11, 1907; February 25, 1907, and November 11, 1907. In addition they were delayed by not receiving payment on account of their contract and had much trouble in getting their money from the Comptroller's office. Although their contract was signed on February 3, 1906, the work was not begun until November 1, 1906. This delay was caused by the slow progress on the piling work and construction of the building. Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, the architects, recommend that an extension of time claim be allowed, and Mr. Louis C. Frees, Inspector of Construction, states that he considers the claim justified."

After consideration, and upon the recommendation of the Building Committee, a resolution was adopted as follows:

Whereas, Byrne & Murphy, contractors for the plumbing work of Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, did not complete their contract within the specified time, and have urged for reasons given, that no liquidated damages be collected on account of the delay; and

Whereas, The representative of the said Byrne & Murphy has been examined by the Chairman of the Building Committee in support of this plea; and

Whereas, McKim, Mead & White, the architects, have certified in a letter dated January 18 that Byrne & Murphy were not responsible for the delays in their contract; and

Whereas, Mr. Louis C. Frees, Inspector of Construction, has also stated in a letter dated January 7 that he considers the extension of time is justified; be it and it is hereby

Resolved, To grant Byrne & Murphy an extension of time on their contract referred to, until the date of issue of the final certificate, and to issue a certificate under paragraph R of the contract accordingly.

The Building Committee recommended that the estimate amounting to \$534.50, received from the Bellevue Completion Company for additional electric work in the Pathological Department, be approved, the price having been certified as correct by the architects. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was adopted.

The Building Committee reported progress in regard to the communication received from Mr. R. F. Almirall as to the extension of the Fordham Hospital balconies, and a second letter received from Mr. Almirall, under date of January 18, in regard thereto, was referred to the Building Committee.

The Building Committee reported progress in its investigations concerning the proposed fire alarm system, and a report received from Mr. Ross, Fire Expert, dated January 17, in regard thereto, was referred to that committee.

The Building Committee also reported progress in connection with the recommendation that the stalls in Gouverneur Hospital stable be rearranged.

Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that he had investigated the complaint as to the nickel work in the new training school, and submitted a letter which he had received from Peck & Peck, manufacturers, and also stated that he had conferred with Byrne & Murphy, the subcontractors for the installation of the plumbing work. These parties both claimed that the nickel work was installed according to specifications, but that improper cleaning materials had been used. The Housekeeper of the training school admitted that this was no doubt partly responsible, although it appeared that the plating originally had been defective. However, inasmuch as the contractors have been fully paid, it was

Resolved, To take no further action in regard to this question at the present time.

Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that Messrs. Cooper & Evans, the contractors for the fence of the training school, refused to permit of

the modification of the plans and specifications unless they were paid an extra, and that the Assistant Chief Engineer of the Department of Finance declined to approve any extra for this work, and had recommended that the original plan and specifications be carried out. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To instruct the architects to proceed with the completion of the original plans and specifications of the fence at the Training School for Women Nurses, (which had been approved by the Building Department) without further delay.

Upon the recommendation of the Building Committee, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, Not to take any action in regard to the construction of an open air ward on the roof of Harlem Hospital.

Dr. Brannan and Mr. Sachs reported progress in their investigation in regard to the purchase of a motor ambulance and an automobile for the Department. A communication was submitted from Dr. Smith, suggesting that an effort be made to secure one of the machines which have been discarded by the Department of Finance. This communication was referred to the committee.

The Committee on Finance submitted a report as follows:

"Mr. Sachs and Mr. O'Keeffe, representing the Finance Committee, met on the afternoon of Monday, January 10, to consider the matters remitted to that committee at the last meeting of the Board of Trustees. After consideration, it was

"Resolved, To approve the transfers within the appropriations for 1909 recommended by the Contract Clerk and Auditor, as follows:

—"the same being in excess of the amounts required for the purposes thereof,

"Resolved, To approve the request of the Contract Clerk and Auditor, dated January 3, that a certificate be forwarded to the Department of Finance asking that a reduction be made in the reserve of the contracts named therein, amounting to \$18,979."

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Finance Committee was adopted.

The Committee on Officers and Employees submitted the following report:

"A meeting of the Committee on Officers and Employees was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on the afternoon of Monday, January 10.

"Present—Mr. Sachs and Mr. Paulding.

"Consideration was made of the increases in salaries recommended at last meeting of the Board of Trustees by the General Medical Superintendent, and it was decided to recommend that these be allowed inasmuch as they are provided for in the Budget for 1910, and it is believed that they are merited by efficiency and length of service. The list is as follows:

"The only increases included in this list are for the Trained Nurse, Stenographer, Butcher and Pathologists, and these are approved inasmuch as the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics has reported favorably upon the request of the Board for the establishment of these grades, the money has been allowed in the Budget for the purpose, and the increases are all well merited.

"It was also decided to recommend that the request for the establishment of the grade of Fire Expert at \$600, and General Inspector of Construction at \$2,400, be withdrawn.

"It was also resolved that in the modification of salaries and wages schedules authorized at last meeting, the amount appropriated for the place of Chief Bookkeeper, viz.: \$3,000, be used for the purpose of meeting the salary of Purchasing Agent at \$1,800 and Investigator at \$1,200, inasmuch as the last named two positions are essential and it is believed that the appointment of a Chief Bookkeeper is not required. Provision has been made in the Budget of 1910 for the appointment of an additional Clerk in the bookkeeping department, and this will probably meet all the additional assistance required, in view of the improved situation in that office since the Budget was prepared.

"Consideration was given to a comparison of the wages paid in private hospitals of the City with similar positions in this Department. While in almost every instance the amount allowed in City Departments is higher, it is recognized that the conditions are very different; that the Board must compete with the salaries and wages paid in other City Departments or else see their most efficient help transferred; that the delay in the payment of the wages is an important factor; and that in the lower grade employees the housing accommodations in this Department are much inferior to those in private hospitals. Special consideration was given to the difference in the salaries paid to Ambulance Drivers and Automobile Enginemen, and although the wages paid by the Board are considerably higher, it is recommended that they be continued, inasmuch as it is proved that the number of changes in that class of employees is considerably less in this Department than in private hospitals, and unquestionably a better grade of employee has been obtained. The importance of this is very essential when the responsibilities of these employees are considered. As an example of their efficiency, it was cited that on the evening of the recent heavy frost when the streets were like glass, twenty-six ambulance calls were answered between 6.30 and 12 at night (as many as nine calls being turned in at one time), without an accident of any kind whatsoever save the occasional skidding of the automobile ambulance.

Report of the New York City Reformatory for the Year Ending December 31, 1909.

New York City Reformatory of Misdemeanants,
Harts Island, New York, January 24, 1910.

Hon PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner, Department of Correction, New York City:

Dear Sir—I herewith most respectfully submit the fourth annual report of the New York City Reformatory for Misdemeanants for the year ending December 31, 1909.

The reformatory for the past year has had some rather trying experiences which have to some extent retarded the progress of the institution.

In the early part of the year, March 16, 1909, our industrial building, in which were operated by the inmates our two most important industries, was totally destroyed by fire, thus leaving us in very bad shape and causing much anxiety as to what to engage the large numbers at, which we then had on hand.

While at no time since the destruction of the building have the inmates been idle, we have been able to occupy the minds and hands of all at good, wholesome, outdoor labor, which has greatly benefited all engaged, as the general good health of all attests to.

Much, and I might add nearly all, of the labor outdoors has been accomplished by the inmates of the New York City Reformatory; to their efforts credit must be given for the many improvements made, that have been sadly needed on the island in the past.

Permit me to draw your attention to the excavating for the new dormitory, the new industrial building, our new electric subway and some 3,000 feet of cement sidewalk, all by the labor of this class.

These many outdoor improvements have enabled us to employ all, and I find that the same may be continued for some time to come, owing to the large field for improvement that the island has for some time afforded and does now.

While this is not exactly the instructive labor that the idea of this institution intended for its inmates, we must consider ourselves very fortunate to be able to keep occupied the large numbers we have had to care for and produce some good results for the inmates, the institution and its surroundings.

The minimum term of sentence being six months before release, for the past ten months the inmates have been taught that in order to obtain their release on parole, their conduct must be all that the rules call for and many who have relied upon a careless and negligent regard for rule and order have arrived at the conclusion that 1,800 merit marks, which constitute the requisite as an eligible for parole, endeavor to earn the same faithfully.

Owing to the greater vigilance that is now being exacted from the officers of the institution, I am pleased to say that order observed among the inmates is the best that can be maintained under the conditions here.

In order to realize and attain those good results that the law which created the New York City Reformatory intended, the term of detention must be made of a longer duration, and I have no hesitation in saying that the minimum term should not be less than one year and release then to be only, having earned it, by diligence in study, demeanor and proficiency in the trade or industry that the inmate has been occupied at during his incarceration. No industry, however simple it may be, established here, can be taught to the classes we have to deal with in less time than one year, and many in the mechanical lines, but the primitive branches can be taught in that time.

Now that we will have in a short time a substantial and commodious industrial building, steps should be at once taken to inaugurate classes with practical instructors in the many useful trades that may be taught; in addition to those already established, tinsmith and tinware, tailoring and painting and cement work, I would like very much to see classes in the following useful trades: Barber, bricklayer, carpenter, electrician, frescoer, horseshoer, machinist, plasterer, plumber, shoemaker, steamfitter and upholsterer. Any of the foregoing industries are useful in an institution and a benefit to those who would be taught them upon release.

The new dormitory, when completed, will certainly be a decided improvement on the present existing structure in which the inmates are housed, but it is not just what an institution of this kind calls for, to handle the class that are committed to our care; while the same will permit of a better classification than we now have, the only proper segregation that this class demand from every point they may be viewed from is by the cell system, thus affording to those in charge the opportunity to carry out the real intent that the act which created the New York City Reformatory intended: "To classify as far as practicable all of the criminal misdemeanor youthful offenders."

Considering the great difficulties under which we have labored for the past year, I am satisfied that much good has been accomplished both for the institution, the island and the inmates.

I feel indebted to all the officers, clergy of all denominations and the Honorable Commissioner of the Department for the hearty co-operation and assistance I have received from them and take this opportunity of expressing my thanks to all.

It is gratifying to state that the health of the inmates has been excellent. There have been no epidemics.

Spiritual Welfare.

Their spiritual welfare has been carefully cared for by the Catholic, Protestant and Hebrew Chaplains of the Department of Correction and attendance at religious services has been usually large though not compulsory.

Scholastic Education.

Daily average attendance, 25. In the school connected with the reformatory, there have been two sessions each day. The average attendance at each session was about 25, but as some of the inmates attend both in the morning and afternoon it makes the census more. The course of instruction is of an elementary character, and confined mostly to spelling, writing and arithmetic. Yet in addition to these subjects an effort has been made to teach grammar, composition, history, geography and drawing.

Shoemaking Industry.

The shoemaking industry ceased at the time of the destruction of the shop building on the night of March 16, 1909, the following is an account of the shoe industry from January 1, 1909, to March 16, 1909, which were shipped to the General Storekeeper of the Department for distribution throughout the institution:

On the following work an average of twenty inmates daily have been employed:

Excavated ground on west side of Catholic church 131 feet long 6 feet wide and 18 inches deep, to the amount of 1,179 cubic feet, for the purpose of laying concrete sidewalks, after which ashes were put in to the depth of 12 inches.

Laid concrete sidewalks on west side of Catholic church 131 feet long, 5 feet wide, total of 655 square feet.

Removed wooden flooring and beams from south end of first floor, Dormitory No. 4, excavated around steam pipes and built a 2-foot block wall on both sides of pipes, using 255 cement blocks. Filled in excavation with 18 inches of ashes and laid concrete flooring to the amount of 2,349 square feet.

Excavated ground to the amount of 570 cubic feet, and laid 52 feet of iron sewer pipe from Pavilion No. 4 to cesspool for use in floor drain.

Built a cesspool box under ground 30 inches by 4 feet by 4 feet deep, to receive roof draining and floor draining on south end of Pavilion No. 4.

Stock of cement was entirely consumed at the end of December.

MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF VAN CORTLANDT, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the members of the Local Board of Van Cortlandt, Twenty-fifth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, in the Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, on January 28, 1910, at 9.30 p. m.

All members present.

On motion, seconded, the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with and adopted as typewritten.

Hearings in Accordance With Advertisement in CITY RECORD of January 18, 1910.

President Miller announced that he had caused to be sent out to all the property owners' associations in The Bronx and to the local newspapers, a complete copy of all the calendars of the Local Boards in this Borough, informing them as to the petitions to be presented at the various meetings to be held here this evening, and that he had also caused to be presented by the Engineering Bureau, the average cost per foot frontage of each improvement as petitioned for, and that this course would be pursued in the future, so that property owners would know approximately the cost of the proposed work, and thus be able to tell whether they desire to have the work commenced or not. Property owners will consequently be given very opportunity to be heard for or against any improvement when presented for hearing before the Local Board, and if they are not heard, it will not be the fault of this office.

The work of defining the average cost per foot frontage of sewer improvements, President Miller explained, was a more difficult proposition than in the case of other improvements. The amount of assessment for sewer construction per foot frontage would depend entirely on the action to be taken by the Board of Assessors in reference to their decision as to the area benefited.

No. 5. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Jerome avenue and River avenue.

Petition signed by George H. Huber. No one appeared in opposition. Total estimated cost, \$20,000; assessed value of the real estate with improvements, included within the probable area of assessment, is \$438,000.

Based upon the foregoing approximate estimate of cost and judging from the methods employed by the Board of Assessors in apportioning the cost in somewhat similar matters, it is probable that the assessment for this work upon the property directly benefited thereby will not exceed \$300 per each twenty-five-foot lot. This is based upon the assumption that the Board of Assessors will assess the property indirectly benefited at \$37.50 per each twenty-five-foot lot.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for constructing a sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Jerome avenue and River avenue, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Unanimously adopted.

After the adoption of the foregoing resolution Mr. George Huber and other property owners appeared and asked for the reconsideration of petition No. 5, providing for sewer in East One Hundred and Sixty-second street.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board of Van Cortlandt, Twenty-fifth District, hereby consents to have the matter of constructing a sewer in East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Jerome avenue and River avenue, brought before this Board for reconsideration.

Unanimously adopted.

Mr. Huber explained that since the date of the petition, namely, December 22, 1909, the property owners have found that it would be advisable to have the construction of the One Hundred and Sixty-second street sewer extend as far as the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and he asked that the resolution adopted this evening be rescinded, and the property owners would then present a new petition for the larger work.

On motion, seconded, it was Resolved, That this Local Board hereby rescinds its resolution adopted on January 28, 1910, providing for a sewer in East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Jerome avenue and River avenue.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 6. Constructing sewers and appurtenances in West Two Hundred and Forty-second street, between Broadway and Waldo avenue; Waldo avenue, between West Two Hundred and Forty-second street and West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street; in West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street, between Waldo avenue and Spuyten Duyvil parkway; in Spuyten Duyvil parkway, between West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street and Riverdale avenue.

Petition signed by Delafield estate; duplicate petition signed by Jos. L. Ennis, Friedman Bros. & Co., and six others.

Estimated cost, \$61,150; assessed value of the real estate, with improvements, included within the probable area of assessment is \$602,000.

Title vested. Outlet built.

Based upon the foregoing approximate estimate of cost and judging from the methods employed by the Board of Assessors in apportioning the cost in somewhat similar matters, it is probable that the assessment for this work upon the property directly benefited thereby will not exceed \$187.50 per each twenty-five-foot lot. This is based upon the assumption that the Board of Assessors will assess the property indirectly benefited at \$12.50 per each twenty-five-foot lot.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for constructing sewers and appurtenances in West Two Hundred and Forty-second street, between Broadway and Waldo avenue; Waldo avenue, between West Two Hundred and Forty-second street and West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street; in West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street, between Waldo avenue and Spuyten Duyvil parkway; in Spuyten Duyvil parkway, between West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street and Riverdale avenue, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 7. Constructing sewers and appurtenances across the property of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, from the United States pier and bulkhead line of the Harlem River (Ship Canal) to Leyden avenue, at the unnamed street over the former right-of-way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company; and, in said unnamed street, between Leyden avenue and Spuyten Duyvil road, at West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street; and in Spuyten Duyvil road, between said unnamed street at West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and Riverdale avenue.

Petition signed by John Leffler, Friedman Brothers & Co., and fourteen others. No one appeared in opposition.

Total estimated cost, \$124,000; assessed value of the real estate, with improvements, included within the probable area of assessment, is \$1,656,500.

Proceedings have been begun for getting an easement to the property across the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company's land necessary for the construction of the sewer.

The unnamed street (old railroad right of way) has been ceded to the City by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

Sewer will be built within the lines of Riverdale avenue to which title is vested north of West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street.

Based upon the foregoing approximate estimate of cost and judging from the methods employed by the Board of Assessors in apportioning the cost in somewhat similar matters, it is probable that the assessment for this work upon the property directly benefited thereby will not exceed \$250 per each twenty-five-foot lot. This is based upon the assumption that the Board of Assessors will assess the property indirectly benefited at \$22 per each twenty-five-foot lot.

Mr. Pflughau, Assistant Engineer of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, appeared and stated that the location of the improvement through its lands was satisfactory and will be covered in the easement.

There being no opposition, it was regularly moved and seconded, that the following be adopted:

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for constructing sewers and appurtenances across the property of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, from the United States pier and bulkhead line of the Harlem River (Ship Canal) to Leyden avenue at the unnamed street over the former right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company; and in said unnamed street, between Leyden avenue and Spuyten Duyvil road, at West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street; and in Spuyten Duyvil road, between said unnamed street at West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and Riverdale avenue, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 8. Constructing sewers and appurtenances in Spuyten Duyvil road, between Riverdale avenue and West Two Hundred and Fortieth street; and in West Two Hundred and Fortieth street, between Spuyten Duyvil road and Broadway; and in Riverdale avenue, between Spuyten Duyvil road and the Spuyten Duyvil parkway.

Petition signed by John Leffler, Friedman Brothers & Co., and sixteen others.

Mr. John Ross Delafield and Mr. J. Bowie Dash appeared in favor of this improvement. No one appeared in opposition.

President Miller called attention to the fact that no owner had petitioned for constructing the sewer through Spuyten Duyvil road nor through Two Hundred and Fortieth street, and that no proceedings have been begun for acquiring title to these two streets.

Title vested in the City to Riverdale avenue.

Mr. Delafield stated that he did not think it necessary to have owners of land on Spuyten Duyvil road or on Two Hundred and Fortieth street to sign for the proposed improvement, as the owners who have signed the present petition would have to pay their pro rata share of the assessment.

Mr. Delafield suggested that the entire improvement might be delayed until the construction of a drain to take overflow water from the lake in Van Cortlandt Park to sewer already constructed in Broadway is constructed.

This is based upon the assumption that the Board of Assessors will assess the property indirectly benefited at \$22 per each 25-foot lot.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That the petition asking for sewer construction in Perry avenue, between Gun Hill road and East Two Hundred and Eleventh street and adjacent streets, be laid over until title is vested to the various streets wherein sewers are to be constructed.

Unanimously adopted.

"Sir—In reply to the communication of Mr. John E. McGeehan, No. 1731 Weeks avenue, this City, relative to the construction of a transverse road under the Concourse across East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, I beg to report as follows:

"On Section 14 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx, East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street is laid out at a width of eighty (80) feet, crossing under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse. Title to East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street is vested in the City, and the residents of East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street request that East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street be physically opened under the Concourse.

"The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 10, 1905, passed a resolution for the construction of transverse roads at Tremont avenue, Burnside avenue, Kingsbridge road, and on June 7, 1907, for East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, Burnside avenue and East Two Hundred and Fourth street, and provided the necessary appropriation.

"In the case of East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, the same procedure would have to be followed.

"In relation to the construction of granite steps in East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, between Clay avenue and Anthony avenue, I beg to state that the difference in the elevation between the two streets is 27.5 feet, and the distance in which this is to be overcome is about 123 feet, making a gradient over 22 feet in 100 feet.

"It is impossible, therefore, to construct a wagon road, and granite steps were substituted.

"The letter of Mr. McGeehan is herewith returned.

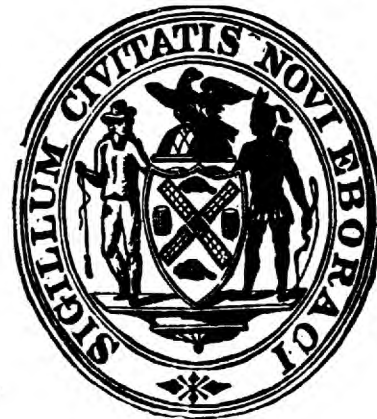
