

#### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT

CITY AND COUNTY OF NEW YORK.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, NEW COUNTY COURT HOUSE, Thursday, January 15, 1874, 2:45 P. M. The Board met pursuant to the following call OFFICE OF THE MAYORALTY, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CITY HALL, New York, January 14, 1874.

One hundred thousand dollars . . . . . \$100,000 00 Said bonds to be designated "New York City Bonds for liquidation of Claims and Judgments,' and bear interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at such time within three years from the date thereof as the Comptroller may determine.

"If at any time hereafter the amount in the treasury of the City of New York derived from collection of assessments, shall be insufficient to meet and pay when they become due and payable, any bonds issued by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for expenditures incurred in public improvements payable in whole or in part from assessments, then it shall be lawful for the Comptroller, and he is hereby authorized to issue like bonds for an amount sufficient to pay, and from the proceeds thereof to pay, the bonds so falling due as afore-

Therefore Resolved, That the Comptroller be, and he is hereby authorized to issue, in pursuance of law, from time to time, in such amounts as may be required, and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "Assessment Bonds," to the amount of three hundred thousand dollars, payable within such period as he shall deem expedient, not exceeding five years, to pay from the proceeds thereof the assessment bonds of the City of New York, falling due in the month of January 20, and February 1, 1874.

WHEREAS, The Fire Department desires to procure three chemical fire engines, for the purposes of extinguishing fires, and, whereas, said engines are a patented article, and, whereas, said Department has made application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to prescribe the conditions to secure a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition in the purchase of said engines; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That under the provisions of section 115, of the charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby prescribe the following conditions of such purchase, to wit:

The said Department shall advertise, in the manner prescribed by section 91 of the charter, for three Chemical Fire Engines, for the use of said Department in the extinguishment of fires, by the application of water charged with carbonic acid gas.

The said Department shall award the contract for Chemical Engines, the quality, capacity and method of construction of which shall, in the complish the purposes for which they are desired, to the person who shall be the lowest bidder therefor.
