Six—There were 674 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 20, 1886, which is a decrease of 62, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 87 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending February 13, 1886, was 721, which is 13.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.34 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,423,305.
