COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held December 4, 1879.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Nicholas Haughton, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Mayor submitted the following report of the Counsel to the Corporation, on the resolution of the Commissioners of Docks, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of plan for location of piers at the foot of Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth, and Sixty-fifth streets, North river, received and referred to the Counsel to the Corporation at the last meeting, viz.:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of the 2d instant, enclosing the following resolution, adopted at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held on that day.

"Resolved, That the accompanying communication from the Dock Department be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, with a request that he inform the Sinking Fund Commissioners, by Thursday next, whether subdivision 3 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, or other provisions of law, authorize this Board now to adopt the plan of proposed piers as specified thereon."

The communication referred to in the above resolution recites the granting of permission to the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company, by the Dock Department, on May 28, 1874, to reclaim certain lands under water between Sixtieth and Sixty-fifth street, North river, and to erect a bulkhead within the established line of 1868, with the privilege of building two piers, one at Sixty-third and the other at Sixty-fourth street, and the further application of said Company to extend said improvements northerly to Sixty-sixth street, and to erect another pier at Sixty-fifth street, and contains a resolution directing that the plan for the location of piers at the foot of Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth, and Sixty-fifth streets, as adopted by the Commissioners of Docks on November 13, 1879, be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval. Accompanying such communication is a tracing showing the location and size of the proposed piers.

Subdivision 3 of section 99 of chapter 137 of the Laws of 1870, as amended by section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, provides, among other things, as follows:

"Said Board of the Department of Docks shall meet and examine the plans prepared by them from time to time, and shall, on or before the first day of May, 1871, determine upon any one of said plans, for the whole or any part of said water front, send such plan or plans,

"said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the said Board shall send another plan in place thereof "to said Commissioners."

Under and pursuant to this authority, the Board of the Department of Docks, prior to May I, 1871, determined upon plans for the improvement of the entire water front of the city, and sent such plans, together with the other documents referred to in the statute, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, who approved said plans, so far as they related to the North river, as far up as Sixty-first street. The plans for that portion of the water front on the North river above Sixty-first street were never formally acted upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, but must, after the lapse of more than eight years, be regarded as having been virtually rejected by them.

There may be some question whether the Board of the Department of Docks had authority, under this law, to determine upon and submit original plans to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, after the first of May, 1871. There are quite a number of decisions of the courts, under which it might be considered that the provision requiring the plans to be determined upon and submitted on or before May 1st, 1871, was directing merely, and that the power of the Board to determine upon plans, and submit them to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, did not expire on that day. It is not necessary, however, for me, at the present time, to pass upon this question. It appears, as matter of fact, that plans for the district between Sixty-first and Sixty-sixth street, North river, were determined upon by said Board, and submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on or before May 1st, 1871. The law was therefore complied with, and no date is fixed by the law prior to which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund must act upon the plans. Either one of two views may be taken, under either of which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly act upon the plans at the present time. It may be considered that the power of the Commissio

in place thereof, I think the Board had authority to submit the plans above referred to, for the district between Sixty-first and Sixty-sixth street, North river, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have authority, in their discretion, to approve the same.

I am inclined to the opinion that the Board of the Department of Docks might, under pre-existing laws, authorize the improvement in question without the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, but as there may be some doubt upon that point, it seems to me advisable that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should take action in reference to the plans in question. The communication from the Dock Department and the accompanying tracing are herewith returned.

The subject of leasing the plot of ground occupied by Fulton Market, and laid over at the last meeting, was taken up for action; whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Mayor, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That Samuel C. Holmes be appointed to appraise the rental value of the property now occupied as Fulton Market, if leased for a term of twenty-one years, on the terms and conditions proposed at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held July 11, 1879, each date therein named being made six months later.
