DEAR SIR—In conformity with the requirements of section 119 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, known as the Greater New York Charter, we transmit herewith the results of our "examination of the receipts and disbursements of the offices of the Comptroller and Chamberlain" for the first quarter of 1899.

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts on March 31, 1899, was \$17,429,946.70, which agrees with the balance as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date.

The rental reserved in said lease shall be at the rate of three thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department. The lessee shall have the privilege of a renewal for a further term of ten years from July 1, 1909, at an advance of five per cent. per annum on the rental for the first term.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to erect a shed on the bulkhead extending from the southerly side of Pier, new 31, North river, northerly to a point ninety-three feet north of the northerly side of said pier, and extending inshore a distance of fifty feet, said shed to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with the plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him; said shed to revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of said bulkhead.
