MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, October 14, 1903.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Wednesday, October 14, 1903.

There were present President Ogden and Commissioners Mason and Banta. The minutes of the meeting held October 7 were duly approved.

The Committee on Appeals (President Ogden acting for Commissioner Dykman and Examiners Conway and Collingwood) presented the following report upon appeals considered at a meeting held October 13:

Commissioner Banta reported that he had carefully examined the papers of William H. On motion, duly seconded, the recommendations of Commissioner Banta were adopted, the amended ratings increasing the candidate's general average in the mental examination to 70.15 per cent.

Commissioner Banta reported that he had carefully examined the papers of Mary E. Meagher, candidate for Attendance Officer, and recommended that the appeal be denied and that no change be made in the ratings.

On motion, duly seconded, the recommendation was adopted.

The Assistant Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Appeals for the months of July, August and September, 1903, showing that the Committee had disposed of 766 appeals.

The report was ordered filed.

The Secretary reported that John F. Manley, Temporary Clerk, had been absent from the office without leave since September 30, and had not presented any excuse for such absence.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That John F. Manley, Temporary Clerk, having been absent from the office without leave since September 30, 1903, and having failed to present any excuse for such absence, be and hereby is dismissed from the service of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the President be and he is hereby authorized to appoint two Office Boys, at a salary of \$300 per annum each, from the eligible list for that position.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the President be and he is hereby authorized to employ two Experts to mark the papers submitted by candidates for the position of tabulator.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the application of Joseph J. Guidetti for the position of Assistant Court Clerk be accepted, it appearing that he will be twenty-one years of age on November 12, 1903.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the application of Sidney G. Holborow for the position of Inspector of Plumbing, Light and Ventilation, presented subsequent to the date upon which the receipt of such applications closed, be accepted, it appearing that he believed he was eligible to appointment to the position in question from the eligible list for Chief Inspector of Plumbing, and that he was not officially informed that such an appointment could not be made from that list until the time for receiving applications for Inspector of Plumbing, Light and Ventilation had expired.

Mr. Ryan had not, however, presented himself for examination. The Secretary stated that the Commission had sustained the action of the Chief Examiner on August 11, and that a number of additional cases in which applications for Fireman and Patrolman had been rejected by the Chief Examiner for similar reasons had come to his attention.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

A letter was presented from the State Civil Service Commission informing the Municipal Commission that the next meeting will be held Friday, October 23. On motion, the letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Public Charities, requesting that an open competitive examination be held for the position of Morgue Keeper. On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby instructed to proceed with a special examination for the position of Morgue Keeper under the provisions of Rule 28, it appearing that the qualifications for that position have not been demonstrated in any examination held under a classified title.

The request of the Board of Examiners for non-competitive positions in the Nautical School, Department of Education, was approved and ordered filed.

DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY, GAS AND ELECTRICITY

Report for Quarter Ending March 31, 1903.

Commissioner's Office, City of New York, September 1, 1903.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor:

Sir—In compliance with section 1544 of the revised Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to present the following report of the operations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the three months which ended March 31, 1903:

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

Water Supply.

The rainfall in the Croton watershed was 4.39 inches in January, 4.88 inches in February, and 5.50 inches in March; total for the three months, 14.77 inches. In the Bronx and Byram watersheds it was 4.55 inches in January, 5.29 inches in February, and 4.21 inches in March; total for the three months, 14.05 inches.

The average daily flow of the Croton river at the old Croton dam was 835,700,000 gallons; the average daily supply passed through the aqueducts was 267,000,000 gallons, leaving an average daily surplus of 568,700,000 gallons flowing over the dam into the Hudson river.

The average daily supply received from the Bronx and Byram watersheds was 10,800,000 gallons, and from the successors of the New York and Westchester Water Company, 2,100,000 gallons; making a total daily supply of 279,900,000 gallons for Manhattan and The Bronx.

The consumption of water decreased during the quarter from 283,600,000 gallons per day in the cold weather of January to 274,500,000 gallons in the mild weather of March. The difference of 9,100,000 gallons represents the daily waste in houses from the old habit of keeping faucets open and running continuously to prevent freezing in the pipes.

The Watersheds.

The sanitary measures for removing and preventing causes of pollution consisted in cleaning up swamp lands, removing buildings from the lands recently acquired at and near Lake Mahopac, building a laboratory at Katonah for analyses of the water, and continuing the sanitary patrol along all the streams and bodies of water.

Contracts have been let for placing flashboards on the dams of the East Branch, West Branch and Middle Branch Reservoirs, which will increase their storage capacity by twelve hundred million gallons. A contract has also been prepared for the permanent repairs of the damage done at the dam and outlet of the East Branch Reservoir by the freshet of December, 1901.

The Aqueducts.

The aqueducts and their appurtenances and grounds have been maintained in good condition by the ordinary repairs, the character of which is shown in part by the following items of work done:

157 cubic yards dry masonry built.
124 cubic yards earth excavated.
228 cubic yards filling placed in embankments.
949 new fence posts set.
1,772 linear feet new fences built.
1,475 linear feet fences repaired.
4,909 linear feet fences painted.
103 cubic yards stone hauled.

Distribution System.

The laying of new water mains is each year suspended for the greater part of the first quarter in consequence of unfavorable weather. The two contracts for a line of water mains to and on Riker's island, through Hunt's Point road, Spofford avenue, Manida street and under the East river, and for replacing an old line on Briggs avenue, from One Hundred and Ninety-ninth street to the Southern Boulevard, have been completed. The total length of new water mains laid during the quarter is 10,218 linear feet, with 23 stopcocks and 18 fire hydrants.

The following are the principal items of work done by the repair force:

13 additional fire hydrants placed.
164 defective fire hydrants replaced by new ones.
2,237 fire hydrants repaired.
7 additional stopcocks placed.
6 defective stopcocks replaced by new ones.
304 stopcocks repaired.
202 leaks in water mains repaired.
267 taps in mains shut off on account of leaks.
263 new taps placed for house service.

High Service.

On March 21 one of the two new fifteen-million-gallon pumping engines for the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street high service station contracted for in February, 1901, was put in commission after lengthy and satisfactory tests. This affords great relief, not only in reinforcing the inadequate high service supply, but even more so in giving the long needed opportunity to repair some of the old pumps, which, by incessant use for years, at maximum capacity, had become much impaired. Of several contemplated improvements in the high service pumping plants, the installation of superheaters at the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street station, which will result in economy of fuel, has been contracted for.

Satisfactory progress has been made under the several contracts for buildings, pumps, boilers and a standpipe for the new high service station at Jerome Park.

The report of Mr. Nicholas S. Hill, Jr., Chief Engineer, for the quarter is hereto annexed and marked "Document I."

Lamps and Lighting.

The details of the work of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, during the quarter are given in the report of Charles F. Lacombe, Engineer of Surface Construction, hereto annexed, marked "Document II."

Electricity.

The work of the Electrical Bureau for the quarter is given in the report of Frank E. Brown, Chief Inspector, hereto attached and marked "Document III."

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

A complete and detailed account of the transactions of the Department for the three months in this borough is contained in the following reports, which are hereto annexed and marked respectively "Document IV," "Document V," "Document VI," "Document VII," "Document VIII" and "Document IX;" reports of the Chief Engineer, Water Registrar, Superintendent of Distribution and Repairs, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Electrical Bureau and Bureau of Supplies and Accounts.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Water Supply.

The average daily supply of water pumped at the City's pumping plants, and distributed in the First Ward (Long Island City) and the Third Ward (Flushing, College Point and Whitestone) was as follows:

Under the contract with the Citizens' Water Supply Company, a daily supply of 4,036,573 gallons was furnished for distribution in Long Island City.

A contract was made for additional water mains in a large number of streets in the First and Third Wards, which will greatly improve the circulation of the water and extend the service into new territory.

In the maintenance and repairs of the distribution system 16 leaks in water mains, 10 stopcocks and 96 fire hydrants were repaired, 1 new stopcock and 4 new fire hydrants were placed, and 67 new taps in mains for house services were driven.

Steady progress has been made in the repairs and improvement of the pumping plants, and contracts have been entered into for store houses, coal bins and weighing scales, so as to properly care for and keep an account of the fuel and other supplies.

The following districts were, during the quarter, supplied with light under contracts made prior to consolidation:

1. Former Town of Westchester outside of the former Village of Williamsbridge, supplied with gas to public buildings and with electric street lights and with electric current to public buildings by The Bronx Gas and Electric Company, under contract dated March 27, 1893, between the Town of Westchester and Edward M. Bliven, which contract was assigned to The Bronx Gas and Electric Company, and was duly ratified by contract made November 23, 1893, between said town and The Bronx Gas and Electric Company. Said contract expired March 27, 1903. The bid of that Company for 1903 was for the period from March 28 to December 31.

2. Former Town of New Utrecht, now the Thirtieth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, now supplied with gas street lights and gas to public buildings by the

Kings County Gas and Illuminating Company under contract made December 28, 1889, between that town and that company, which contract was stipulated to expire ten years from the commencement of the delivery of gas thereunder, and was attempted to be extended for the further period of fifteen years from such expiration by an agreement between said town and said company dated March 19, 1891. The validity of these agreements was thoroughly tested in the taxpayers' action of Parfitt against Ferguson, 159 N. Y., 115, and they were held to be binding obligations of the City of Brooklyn until at least December 28, 1914, although certain provisions of the agreements were declared by the Court of Appeals to be null and void. Of course The City of New York is liable upon all obligations of the City of Brooklyn which were valid and binding at the time of consolidation.

3. Former Town of Flatbush, now the Twenty-ninth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, supplied with electric street lights by the Flatbush Gas Company under contract dated October 3, 1893, between said town and the Knickerbocker Electric Light and Power Company, which contract will expire May 1, 1909, and was assigned to and assumed by the Flatbush Gas Company. The price of \$97.50 a year for a 1,200 candle-power electric arc light compares very favorably with the prices for similar lights bid by other companies for 1903 for other portions of the greater City.

4. Former Town of Jamaica (Woodhaven lighting district), now in the Fourth Ward, of the Borough of Queens, supplied with electric street lights under a contract dated December 18, 1896, between said town and the Jamaica Electric Light Company, which contract will expire January 1, 1907, and has been assigned to and assumed by the New York and Queens Electric Light and Power Company. The price of \$97.50 a year for a 1,200 candle-power electric arc light is provided by this contract also.

5. Former Town of Flushing (lighting district "A"), now in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, supplied with open flame naphtha lamps, under a contract between that town and Thomas J. McKenna, dated December 17, 1896, which contract was assigned to and assumed by Edwin Garcia, and by said Garcia was assigned to the New York and New Jersey Globe Gas Light Company, Limited, and assumed by that company. This contract expires January 1, 1907. The price of \$22 per year per light provided for by this contract is the same as that bid by the New York and New Jersey Globe Gas Light Company for similar lights for 1903 throughout Greater New York.

Prior to the opening of bids for public lighting for 1903, I had conferences with the representatives of all the lighting companies, and stated to them that with the funds allowed in the budget for 1903 it would be impossible without a reduction in prices for this Department to make material extensions of lights or provide for additional lighting to public buildings. The forms of contracts to be let after public bidding were submitted to the representatives of the various companies with requests for suggestions and criticisms. Many changes were suggested, especially in the form of electric lighting contract, and many of the suggestions made were adopted by this Department before the forms of contract were finally printed. The various companies were urged to materially reduce their prices to the City, so that the money available might be used for material extensions and improvements. A careful examination of the above tables of bids received will show how far my statements and requests were taken into consideration by the companies.

In March of this year I presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a report upon the subject of public lighting, and I recommended to that Board that all the bids received be rejected on account of the exorbitant prices bid by the various companies. The Board, upon motion of the Mayor, authorized the presentation to the Legislature of a bill empowering the City to erect, maintain and operate its own electric lighting plant, and authorized me to employ an expert to prepare detailed estimates and specifications of the cost of such plant. Mr. Carv T. Hutchinson was immediately employed by me as such expert, and immediately set to work upon the estimates and specifications desired. During the quarter the form of legislation authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was prepared, approved by the Corporation Counsel, and submitted to both the Assembly and Senate, in session at Albany.

(2) Water Waste Prevention.

The experiments and tests with the pitometer have progressed and measurements have been made in five new districts during the quarter, making a total of six sections now covered, with a total area of 1,087 acres. Reports having been made from time to time of the details of the work, further reference to it will be omitted here.

(3) County Division.

Croton Basin—Much work was done during the quarter in cleaning up the swamp lands and underbrush in this watershed. The laboratory at Katonah was also nearly completed at the close of the quarter. In my next report I will be able to give definite results from the new system of sanitary patrol.

Contracts for flash boards were let during the quarter, to be placed at East Branch, West Branch and Middle Branch Reservoirs. Placing these boards will increase the available storage by 1,200,000,000 gallons.

Nearly all the buildings situated on lands which were transferred to the City under the Cranberry Pond Condemnation Proceedings have been removed and the lands cleared. The awards for this property have all been made and the claims paid. The acquisition of these lands will remove a dangerous source of pollution at Mahopac Village, situated at the outlet of Cranberry pond. The contract for permanent repairs to the spillway and channelway at the East Branch Reservoir, which was injured during a freshet in December, 1901, has been prepared.

Bronx and Byram.

The Commission of Awards in The Bronx and Byram proceedings have been appointed and are now viewing the properties under condemnation. The following is a statement of work done along the aqueduct.

First Division—The work on this division has been cleaning out snow and ice from culverts on aqueduct, cleaning and repairing screens, cleaning up shores of lake, collecting samples of water for the Brooklyn Laboratory, repairing stone fences and painting iron fences, painting iron foot bridge over dam, cleaning gates and brass work in new gate house.

Second Division—The work on this division has been setting fence posts, removing snow and ice from crosswalks, gutters and culverts, cleaning and oiling iron work in gate house and cleaning up line of old aqueduct.

Third Division—The work on this division has been rebuilding retaining walls with all the tearing down of all wall excavation and filling in necessary for same. Hauling stone to be used in wall, all sidewalks, gutters, culverts kept clear of snow and ice, cleaning up the line of old aqueduct.

Fourth Division—The work on this division has been building, repairing and painting fences, filling and grading, cleaning up line of aqueduct.

Fifth Division—The work on this division has been rebuilding retaining walls, setting fence posts, fence gates, building, repairing and painting fences, painting at keeper's house, overhauling machinery at Dunwoodie, cleaning snow and ice from crosswalks, gutters and culverts.

Sixth Division—The work on this division has been painting at keeper's house and barn, repairs to road, cleaning machinery in gate house, raking leaves and cleaning up line of aqueduct, building and painting fences.

Seventh Division—The work on this division has been rebuilding retaining wall, repairs to boilers, laying track in fire room for coal cans, cleaning up line of aqueduct.

Eighth Division—The work on this division has been cleaning screens and chamber at north gate house, putting in glass at Ninety-eighth street, whitewashing pipes, cleaning chambers and screens in south gate house, making sash for south gate house, painting One Hundred and Thirtieth street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street gate houses, keeping surface of water clean, repairing fences, making boxes for the Chief of the General Inspection Division, Manhattan and The Bronx, removing ashes from Ninety-eighth street, removing snow, raking banks on old and new reservoirs.

(4) Pipes and Distribution.

Owing to delays in getting appropriations no new work in laying mains has been started. Estimates and plans for a number of streets have been prepared in contemplation of receiving the necessary funds later.

The repairs to the reticulation system have been followed up closely. Following is a statement of the work done during the quarter:

(5) Mechanical Division.

A new fifteen million gallon engine was installed at the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Pumping Station during the quarter, and started pumping March 21, 1903. Great delays have been encountered in obtaining this engine, owing to the tardiness of the contractors. It will afford great relief to the residents in the high service district so soon as the old engines are repaired. As the older pumps had reached the limit of their capacity they could not be shut down, and hence are in urgent need of repairs.

Numerous improvements are contemplated in this station, and contracts have already been let for the installation of a superheater, which would reduce the cost of operation.

The working force at this station, as well as at the other stations in Manhattan, has been reorganized, with a view to obtaining better efficiency.

At the Ninety-eighth Street Station preparations have been made to repair the ten million gallon engine now that the new pump is in operation at One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street. This machine has not received an overhauling for a number of years, and is in very poor condition.

The High Bridge Pumping Station has not been touched. This Station will be closed down as soon as a second fifteen million gallon engine has been installed at One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, which should not be later than September 1.

The work on Jerome Park Pumping Station has progressed nicely. The stand-pipe is well under way at the factory, and shipment is promised within a few days. The delivery of the engines is promised in July. If no unforeseen delays occur, the station should be well advanced in the early autumn.

(6) Complaints and Services.

(2) Mechanical Division.

The work of repairing the pumping stations has been carried on without intermission and a marked improvement can be noted. During the quarter contracts were let for scales, coal bins and storehouses for the several stations. Heretofore all coal was weighed by outsiders and no accurate account was kept at the stations, with the result that a large discrepancy was discovered between the amounts reported on hand and actually found. The coal was also dumped on the ground loosely, thereby inviting stealing. There was no provision whatever at several of the stations for storing supplies, and the storehouses will enable the Enginemen in charge to keep them under lock and key.

(C) BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

(1) Pipes and Distribution.

Survey has been commenced with a view to laying out the proposed line of pipe in the Amboy road, appropriation for which was made on February 20, and the contracts will be prepared as soon as this is completed.

(2) Mechanical.

Contracts are in preparation for installing new boilers and making other extensive improvement in the Tottenville pumping station.

Dear Sir—I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the quarter ending March 31, 1903.

In Exhibit "A" will be found a statement showing the amount expended in vouchers for the expenditures of the Bureau, and for a supply of electricity for lighting offices and public lamps. Owing to the fact that no contracts have been let for lighting public buildings and lamps for the year 1903, no vouchers have been drawn except where there were outstanding contracts, as in the case of The Bronx Gas and Electric Company, whose contract expired March 27, 1903.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for lamps and lighting, 1903, and this shows an expenditure during the quarter of sixteen thousand seven hundred and twenty dollars and ninety-one cents (\$16,720.91). There being no contracts to fix the prices to be paid for public lighting for 1903, no figures of outstanding liabilities are given. Approximately, at the prices paid for similar services in 1902 the liabilities for the lighting of public buildings for the first quarter (including public schools) would be one hundred and twenty-one thousand four hundred and twenty-six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$121,426.25), as per statement annexed to Exhibit "B"; and for lighting the public lamps, two hundred and ninety-two thousand nine hundred and seventy-six dollars and sixty-one cents (\$292,976.61), making approximately the liabilities of the first quarter for public lighting of all kinds, at the prices of 1902, four hundred and fourteen thousand four hundred and two dollars and eighty-six cents (\$414,402.86).

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the lamp account, showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted, and lamps discontinued by each gas and electric light company during the quarter. Fifty-eight new gas lamps and 38 new electric lamps have been relighted, 964 old gas lamps have been relighted, 762 gas lamps and 34 naphtha lamps have been discontinued during the quarter. The total number of public lamps lighted on March 31, 1903, was 24,014 gas, 1,440 naphtha, 853 Welsbach naphtha and 5,207 electric, making a total of 31,514 lamps.

Exhibit "D" is a statement showing the candle power of the gases supplied to the City by such of the gas companies as are within reach of our photometric stations.

The following statement shows the average amount of impurities found in the gases of such of the companies as have gas mains on the lines of our photometric stations, as determined by the analysis of Dr. E. G. Love, Ph. D., our gas examiner, in the laboratories of this Bureau:

The rainfall at the Hempstead Reservoir during the quarter was at the rate of 54.7 inches per annum, or 14 inches per annum above the average yearly rate. The precipitation was quite evenly distributed during the quarter.

General Condition of the Supply.

The storage in the reservoirs was increased by about 237,000,000 gallons, and the increase in the gravity supply allowed us to shut down some of the driven well stations on the old watershed and to overhaul and repair the plants. The completion of the additional pipe conduit enabled us to pump a much larger amount of water from the watershed east of Rockville Centre and to reduce the waste from the eastern ponds. The total amount wasted during the quarter from these ponds was 1,938,888,198 gallons. The storage on April 1 was about 18,000,000 gallons more than on the corresponding date last year. The average daily consumption during the quarter has averaged about 5,300,000 gallons more than for the corresponding quarter last year.

The condition of the tap water has been about normal, although, owing no doubt in a large measure to the heavy rains, the number of bacteria has been very high. The chlorine in the water is considerably below the average, a result probably due to the shutting down of some of the pumping stations. The Shetucket Driven Well Station, the waters of which contain a large amount of chlorine, has been shut down for a part of the quarter, and when running has only pumped eight hours each day.

The settling basin at the head of the storage reservoir has been emptied three times during the quarter. The contract, specifications and plans for the filter beds to utilize the flow of Horse Brook are nearly completed, and will probably be soon ready for the printer. We have also nearly ready the contract, specifications and plans for filter beds at Forest Stream in order to filter the waters from Simonson's Stream, which are dangerously exposed to pollution.

The water at Ridgewood Reservoir has been generally kept at a higher level than was possible during the last quarter, so that no special complaint has been received in regard to lack of pressure in the distribution system. A new map for the distribution system has been prepared, showing all mains, gates, hydrants, etc., and a detailed inspection is being made of all gates and hydrants to guard as far as possible against any errors in the recorded location of these gates and hydrants.

Extension of Distribution.

Contracts have been prepared and forwarded for a 48-inch distribution main from the Ridgewood Reservoir, and for a 48-inch force main from the Ridgewood engine house to Mt. Prospect. These mains are described in the Annual Report for 1902.

A number of petitions for water mains in various streets have been reported on favorably and a contract will shortly be prepared to cover these extensions. The method hitherto followed for laying these mains could be advantageously modified. Under the present system contracts are made only after a certain number of petitions have been reported on favorably, and the contract may not be signed until six months or more after the first petition is received, while a further period of two or more months will elapse before the first pipe is laid. It is obvious that under this plan building operations are retarded and much annoyance and considerable loss caused to those of our citizens who desire to build on streets through which water mains have not been laid. Much time could be saved if pipes, specials, gates and hydrants of the sizes more generally used were purchased under one contract and stored at the Gowanus Pipe Yard to be used as needed. Printed forms for laying water mains could be prepared, leaving blank spaces for the streets in which these mains are to be laid, and these blanks could be filled in as required and contracts let at small expense for laying short sections of mains. While it would probably cost slightly more to lay the mains under these contracts, the difference in cost would be more than offset by the advantage to be gained in facilitating building.

The work under the contract with John Hann, which was assigned by the latter to Isaac Harris, is nearly completed.

The pipes, gates, hydrants, etc., for the contract with Isaac Harris for laying additional water mains are being manufactured and the work of laying the mains will shortly be commenced.

Electrolysis of Water Pipes.

I beg to call attention to the recommendations made by me on this subject in the annual report of last year.

Replacing of Old Pipe.

Contracts have been prepared and submitted to you for the removal of existing mains and for replacing them with new and larger ones. The insufficient pressure in the borough is largely due to the lack of adequate service mains, say from 12 to 20 inches in diameter. The present appropriation of \$200,000 for replacing these mains and remedying existing conditions in the dry goods district will only provide for a small proportion of the work required to give adequate fire service.

PUMPING STATIONS.

Mt. Prospect.

The pumping at Mt. Prospect for this quarter, as compared with the corresponding quarter of last year, has been diminished by the following amounts:

This reduction has been due to the thorough inspection of the gates between the boundaries of the Mt. Prospect system and the Ridgewood system, which was carried on during the year 1902. While this has not reduced the consumption of water it has done away with the cost of unnecessary pumping.

The third boiler for this station has been completed and tested satisfactorily in the shop. The boiler has been shipped and will probably be completed and ready for testing during the coming quarter. As this station is to be eventually abandoned no other work will be done except as may be required to provide for the consumption.

Gravesend and New Utrecht.

Plans and specifications are in course of preparation for rebuilding the Gravesend Station and abandoning the New Utrecht plant. The consolidation of these two stations will increase the efficiency of the service and reduce the cost of operation, as detailed in the annual report for 1902.

New Lots.

The draft in the New Lots District was increased to such an extent during the cold weather that it was necessary to reduce considerably the area supplied. The consumption of this district is now normal and the area supplied can shortly be enlarged, thus utilizing the full yield of the station.

Ridgewood.

The increased draft due to cold weather made it necessary to run the three triple expansion engines practically continuously, and they now require overhauling. No. 3 beam engine has not been run during the quarter and has been thoroughly overhauled and relined. The necessary repairs have been made to the other engines and to the boilers. A contract has been prepared for retubing the ten Morris boilers put in under the Worthington contract in 1895, as an examination showed that they had been badly pitted.

Line Stations.

The shallow wells at the Oconee Station are now nearly completed and will be connected to the suction main during the coming quarter.

The usual work of repairing the engines and boilers and cleaning and redriving the wells has been carried on by our men at the various stations.

Coal.

Bids for the contracts for the supply of anthracite and semi-bituminous coal needed from January 1 to May 1, 1903, were not received until February 19, 1903, and the contract for the semi-bituminous coal was awarded to George D. Harris & Co. on February 26, 1903, the price bid being \$4.15 per gross ton. The contract for the anthracite coal was awarded on March 4, 1903, to Peter Clark, at prices varying from \$4.84 to \$5.54 per gross ton. In these contracts the coal contractor was to deliver the coal f. o. b. cars or boats at the nearest point to the Pumping Station, and a separate contract was made for hauling, storing and trimming the coal. By so dividing the work, the City was able to obtain much keener competition, as under the old system, where the coal was furnished, delivered and stored by the contractor, there were but few coal dealers who would bid, owing to the trouble entailed in looking after the hauling and delivering of the coal. The contract for hauling and delivering the coal was awarded to Peter Lynam on March 5, and this contract runs until December 31, 1903. New contracts will be made for furnishing coal from May 1, 1903, to May 1, 1904, at better prices should be obtained by letting the contracts in the spring of the year rather than in the winter.

Filter Plants at Baisleys and Springfield.

The work of reconstructing the Baisleys and Springfield filter plants has progressed fairly well, but the contractors will be unable to complete their work until the City furnishes the necessary controllers, as stipulated in the amended contract. As soon as the controllers are delivered the contractor can speedily complete his work and the test of the filter plants can be commenced.

Ponds, Conduits and Reservoirs.

The usual work of cleaning the ponds and streams has been continued, and the following schedule shows the closets and cesspools on the watershed cleaned during the quarter:

The cost of this work during the quarter was \$968.68.

The upper section of the conduit was emptied during March and thoroughly inspected from Smith's Pond to Valley Stream Gate House. At the east end quite a heavy growth was found on the sides and bottom of the conduits, but this diminished, so that at a distance of about 8,700 feet from Smith's Pond it had practically disappeared. At some points sand and mud were found to a depth of six inches, the area of these deposits being very limited. The walls of the conduit showed very few cracks and seemed to be in good condition. A portion of this section of the conduit has been cleaned, and the cleaning will be continued next quarter. The conduit can be emptied only for a short time, as the 48-inch mains cannot deliver sufficient water to provide for more than one-half the consumption.

Protection from Pollution.

The appropriation of \$50,000 made on February 20 for the purchase of lands to prevent pollution will be entirely inadequate to fully accomplish its purpose, and this money will therefore be applied to the purchase of those plots of land from which there is the greatest danger of pollution. A much larger appropriation will be required to secure all the land necessary to protect the streams, and, as already stated in previous reports, it often becomes difficult to determine whether it would be cheaper or better to prevent pollution by these purchases of land or to filter the water from these streams, as it is proposed to do with the waters of Horse Brook and Forest stream. While each particular case must be determined according to local conditions, it may, however, be generally stated that probably it will prove economical to filter the water of the streams west of Rockville Centre and to purchase land to secure protection along the streams east of Rockville Centre.

Water Analyses.

The systematic analysis of our water supply, both from individual sources, reservoirs and the City taps, has been continued. Five hundred and ninety-four samples of the Brooklyn supply were collected and analyzed. The condition of the water is shown by the following table:

Damage Suits.

The case of Hewlett Simonson against The City of New York was tried during February and resulted in a disagreement of the jury. In this suit Mr. Simonson claimed that his oyster business was ruined by the diversion of fresh water from Freeport creek, this creek being a tidal creek with an outlet into Hempstead bay. The Court held that he could not recover for lost profits, and that the maximum amount to be recovered would be limited to the cost of furnishing a drinking house for his oysters, as the bed of the creek was owned by the town and the plaintiff was only allowed to freshen his oysters in the creek under sufferance. Therefore, had the verdict been in favor of the plaintiff, it would have only been for a small amount, probably under \$300. This case is important, as it is a typical case of those brought by the oystermen against the City, the total amount of damages claimed amounting to several hundred thousand dollars.

The recent decision of the Court of Appeals reversing the decision of the lower court in the Reisert case will add to the difficulties in trying cases for damage to farmers from the diversion of the ground water.

Test Wells.

Test wells have been driven between Wantagh and Massapequa to enable an accurate record of the fluctuation in the ground-water level to be determined. These wells, together with those driven between Watts' pond and Smith's pond, will enable us to determine the fluctuations in the ground-water level due to natural causes and

those due to the construction of the infiltration galleries. While there have been driven in all about 200 test wells, these should be supplemented by further test wells covering the remainder of the territory where infiltration galleries are to be placed, as the records of the fluctuations of the ground-water level are valuable both for general information and for use in any damage suits for lowering the ground-water level. Additional test wells have also been driven at the Clear Stream Pumping Station to determine the slope of the ground-water level under the influences of the driven well station and weekly readings are taken at these wells.

Wells have been driven to determine the velocity of flow of the underground water above the clay bed, and the results show that the velocity is between 30 and 40 feet per day, except in one instance, where the velocity was found to be 100 feet per day. This was probably due to a very thin bed of gravel, as the velocity immediately above and below this point was not above normal. Additional determinations will be made of the velocity under varying conditions of rainfall, as these results are of general interest, although they have comparatively little bearing on the question of determining the yield of the watershed.

Contracts.

During the quarter the following contracts have been prepared and forwarded for approval, printing and advertising:

For furnishing, delivering and laying a 36-inch cast-iron main, including all the necessary appurtenances, on Atlantic avenue, between Carlton and Flatbush avenues. For furnishing and delivering controllers for Springfield and Jameco filters. For furnishing and delivering semi-bituminous and anthracite coal in the following amounts:

Section 1. 22,800 gross tons of semi-bituminous coal.

Section 2. 43,700 gross tons of anthracite coal.

For furnishing, delivering and laying a 48-inch cast-iron force main, together with all appurtenances complete, from the Ridgewood Pumping Station, along Atlantic avenue, East New York avenue and Eastern parkway to the Mt. Prospect High Service Tower.

For furnishing, delivering and laying a 48-inch water main at the Ridgewood Reservoir in Cypress Hills, Myrtle avenue and Broadway.

For remodeling and extending the Wantagh Pumping Station, near Wantagh, L. I., including pumping plant, pump well, etc.

Rapid Transit and Atlantic Avenue Improvement Work.

The contract for replacing a portion of the 48-inch main on Atlantic avenue is now in the hands of the printer and will probably be shortly advertised. This is the only extensive change in the water mains that will be made necessary by the Atlantic avenue improvement. The work of disconnecting and reconnecting the smaller mains crossing Atlantic avenue has been done by the men at the Pipe Yards as required. On Fulton street, along the line of the Rapid Transit tunnel, it will be necessary to change the location of the water pipes, and it may be necessary to entirely remove the 30-inch main on Fulton street, between DeKalb avenue and Willoughby avenue.

Sewer Crossing at Oconee.

The crossing of the Jamaica outlet sewer under the conduit at the Oconee Pumping Station has been completed and the sewer is in operation. This work was inspected by our men and was completed without any serious accident. A cast-iron flanged pipe, 36 inches outside diameter and 32 inches inside diameter, was forced under the conduit by means of hydraulic jacks. The pressure required to force this pipe varied from 650 pounds to 970 pounds per square foot of outside surface.

Consolidation of Pumping Stations.

This subject was discussed at some length in the last Annual Report, and its importance demands pre-eminent consideration in view of the large saving in expenses to be secured by reducing the number of pumping stations. In the design of the infiltration galleries we have had in view ultimate consolidation, as already outlined, and the work of perfecting the necessary details will be prosecuted as actively as possible. An important step in this direction has been made by securing an appropriation for the force main from Ridgewood to Mt. Prospect Station, which is preliminary to the abandonment of the latter and the concentration of the high and low service at Ridgewood.

Development of Underground Supply.

Additional measurements of the velocity of the underground flow were made, the results of which have already been given, and the contract for the infiltration gallery at Wantagh, with the necessary plans and specifications, was completed. Work on the contracts for the other infiltration galleries is in progress.

Soil Studies.

In connection with the development of the underground supply, it was important to determine the purifying effect of the soil on the percolating water. Numerous experiments have, therefore, been made to ascertain the number of bacteria at different depths in the soil, and also the number of bacteria present in the water at corresponding depths. These experiments are continued and will be tabulated and detailed at a later date.

City of New York, Borough of Brooklyn, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Bureau of Water Rates, Municipal Building, Rooms 7, 8 and 9, Brooklyn, March 31, 1903.

Mr. ROBERT VAN IDERSTINE, Deputy Commissioner:

Dear Sir—Herewith I submit a report of the work of this Bureau during the first quarter of the year 1903.

On taking office on January 9, 1903, I found Mr. M. J. O'Donoghue, Cashier, acting as Registrar, having very creditably discharged the duties of that office during the incapacity of the late incumbent, Major Augustus C. Tate.

Cash Division.

The receipts of the Bureau for the quarter ending March 31 were \$172,381.79, being an increase of \$27,695.49 over 1902 for the corresponding period, as shown in Exhibit "A," hereto attached. For further details of the financial transactions of the Bureau see exhibits as follows:

"B." Water rates collected during first quarter of 1903, compared with those collected during the same period of 1902.

"C." Water rates collected in Bureau of Assessments and Arrears.

"D." Water rates collected in Department of Taxes and Assessments.

"E." Amount of refunds and cancellations of arrears.

Naturally, the cash office and its proper operation is one of the greatest concerns of the rate-paying public. Here much fault has been found in the past because of long lines of waiting citizens, which became a by-word and reproach during the busy periods of the year. I believe this lamentable condition was very largely due to the bad system in use in the cash division, caused not by any negligence or incompetence on the part of the very efficient Cashier, but to the desire of prior administrations to create highly paid, useless positions in the public service for favored persons. It was the practice to compel the rate-payer to put his bill in at one window, pass slowly to another window, through which the money was handed to the Cashier, and then to a third, where the receipted bill was passed out. At the first window was stationed an Assistant Cashier, who entered the amount on the Cashier's blotter and then passed the bill to the Cashier, who by this time—if the police officer was attentive—had received the currency or check for that particular bill. The Cashier counted the money, compared the bill with the stub attached thereto and, if the money and the amount of the bill agreed, stamped the bill and the stub, writing his own name below, tore off the stub and passed the bill to other assistants standing at his right. These latter assistants entered the details of the section or ward, block, lot, name on bill and amount, in the several columns of the cash book, passing the bill to another Clerk to be copied on a sheet for the Comptroller, then passing the bill out of the third window to the rate-payer. This system led to long delays, caused confusion and difficulty in reaching a balance and often consumed from fifteen to twenty minutes after the bill had been placed in the first window. In addition to the time actually required to pay the bill, the rate-payer was very frequently compelled to wait on the line for several hours; in fact, instances are known when women with children in arms have had to return to the office three days in succession before payment could be made.

The Assistant Cashier who entered on the blotter also had charge of another book, in which account was kept of all payments made by plumbers, builders and others who had secured permits for taps, etc.

As now constituted, the cash system provides that the rate-payer shall put his bill and money together through the window directly in front of the Cashier. The latter compares the bill and the attached stub to see that they agree, counts the money, and if the amount is correct, stamps the bill and stub with a new form of stamp, which makes it unnecessary to sign or stamp his name separately, as heretofore, passes the bill out of the window and the stub to an assistant at his right, by whom is entered the section or ward, block, lot and amount on the cash book, all of which is done in less time than it takes to describe the operation. No entry is now made of the name on bill, as it is not essential, the names more often than not being other than the present owner of the property, and, therefore, simply confusing. During the busy season I expect to have an adding machine in use, to secure a mechanically accurate check on the cash book entries.

Under the new system the long line is done away with and the rate-payer receives the bill back receipted in a quarter of a minute, instead of fifteen or twenty minutes. This expedition in getting the public away from the cash window prevents the formation of long lines. That the change is appreciated by those doing business with the office is evident from the remarks constantly heard.

In place of the several books formerly used in the cash office, there is now but one, and in this all entries of whatever nature are made. This requires less work, in addition to keeping the cash account in compact form, as well as reducing stationery expenditure.

On January 1, 1903, the cash division force consisted of a Cashier at \$2,250, an Assistant Cashier (senior) at \$1,500 and an Assistant Cashier (junior) at \$1,800. Before the enactment of the Salary Readjustment Act of 1902 the Cashier received \$2,500, the Assistant (senior) \$1,800 and the Assistant (junior) \$2,500.

I recommend the restoration of the Cashier's salary to what is the present grade of \$2,550, and that of the senior Financial Clerk to \$1,800.

During the quarter just ended I recommended that the Assistant Cashiers, whose office was created solely for political purposes to evade the Civil Service Law, have their titles changed to Financial Clerks, which more nearly describes their proper duties, permitting their legal assignment to other than work solely in the cash room, in which during certain dull periods of the year work is almost at a standstill. This change you ordered early in February.

Rate Division.

A majority of the clerical force is engaged on the rate books, and I found that the Clerk detailed as chief of the entire office force devoted his energies very largely to the rate division, to the necessary neglect of other important duties. This was particularly noticeable because of the Registrar's having no Deputy, therefore being compelled to use the Chief Clerk as such as far as possible. It was one of my first aims to get this division properly organized, so that at present it can conduct its own special business, with no great attention to its details by either myself or the Chief Clerk. To accomplish this purpose a Clerk has been placed in charge who is familiar with the work and has executive ability enough to handle the body of Clerks without friction.

For some unexplained reason the rate books had never been footed or balanced, and this was ordered to be done, but after the most careful calculation, an effort to strike a balance was unsuccessful by some twenty-five thousand dollars on the books of 1901. This was largely caused by the fact that the books are kept in an improper manner, and that the system itself is radically wrong. I hope at a future date to submit to you a plan for changes and readjustments, by which a business-like and comprehensive record may be kept.

The crying need of this office is enlarged room, the present cramped quarters obstructing business and compelling the Clerks to labor under artificial light throughout the greater part of the day. Room can be economized by a rearrangement of stationary desks, requisition having been made for such alteration. These alterations will also do away with the necessity for the use of artificial light in ordinary weather.

Time-serving indolence, insubordination and discourtesy to the public I found to be characteristic of quite a large percentage of both the clerical and inspection forces. Smoking, lolling about, newspaper reading and general conversation in the office were prevalent. Laxity of discipline seemed to have become a habit hard to break. Measures found very useful in correcting this state of affairs were the promulgation of a set of office rules, a copy of which is appended as Exhibit F, and the suggestion to the Clerks and Inspectors that each force elect a committee of five to consult with the Registrar from time to time. Discontinuance of the use of a time clock which was in the Registrar's private office had a salutary effect, it being my opinion that such devices are usually demoralizing rather than otherwise, it being found impossible in practice to prevent one Clerk or Inspector "ringing up" for another. This may not be equally true in a private concern, but it certainly is in a public office. This being the case, its records are worse than valueless, giving those in authority and not in actual touch with conditions a false impression as to the discipline maintained.

On December 31, 1902, the clerical force consisted of three Clerks (one detailed as Chief Clerk) at \$1,350, three Clerks (one detailed as Clerk in charge of Meter Division) at \$1,200, one Stenographer at \$1,050, thirteen Clerks at \$1,050, one Clerk at \$1,000, seven Clerks at \$900, and five Junior Clerks at \$600 per annum. I recommend that the minimum salary for Clerks and Stenographers be \$1,200, with an additional allowance of \$400 to the one detailed to act as Chief Clerk, an additional \$300 to the Clerk acting as Chief of Meter Division, and \$200 extra to the detailed position of Plumber's Clerk. Such additional allowance should attach only to the positions named, and not to the individuals holding them for the time being. If these recommendations are carried out, a much better spirit of emulation will pervade the force. It seems to me that a minimum salary of \$1,200 is small enough for first-class Clerks and Stenographers, if a high standard of efficiency is demanded.

The size of rate bills has been reduced to an easily handled form, one-half the size of that formerly used.

Inspection Division.

During the year 1902 a general resurvey of the Borough was commenced and one Ward (the Twenty-eighth), was completed. This work corrected inaccuracies on the books and added approximately \$4,000 to the rates for that ward. The manner in which the resurvey inspection work was done showed large room for improvement, there seemingly being no system pursued by which the inspection force could be kept constantly at their work, and by which efficiency could be secured. Shirking and false reporting has evidently been a common occurrence; in fact, the absolute reliability of the resurvey in the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth Wards (the former completed early in January), is open to question. From what I have learned I believe it would be economical to have another resurvey made, covering the ground already gone over before the 1st of January, 1902.

On taking office I found that the inspectors had not been instructed regarding the proper definition of a story. It is my opinion that a basement, the major part of which is above the surface of the ground, and the top floor of a house which is habitable should be rated as stories. Such rating has not been practiced in any of the boroughs, consequently it has resulted in inequitable charging, the burden of which falls most heavily on poorer people who own small, old-fashioned frame dwellings without a high stoop.

If charges are made on the basis to which reference is made, either a largely increased revenue will result, or the frontage rates may, with justice, be reduced without a diminution of the City's income.

On January 31, 1903, there was an inspection force of twenty-six men, entitled Inspectors of Meters and Water Consumption. Twelve of these received \$1,000 each, and fourteen received \$900 each per annum, the older men in the service in almost every instance receiving the lesser salary. One of these men is detailed as Chief Inspector. During 1902 he was employed in drawing resurvey maps, preparing work for inspectors and making assignments, though the principal part of his labor was purely clerical. It was the custom up to February 23 for all Inspectors to report at this office daily, at about 9 a. m., to receive their assignments from the Chief Inspector and to leave the Municipal Building and go to their work without supervision of any kind, not reporting until the following day. On February 23 the Chief Inspector's duties were changed, and all Inspectors on resurvey are now met by him at a rendezvous on the scene of their work daily at 9 a. m. He makes the rounds of the resurvey district until 4.30 p. m., and then again meets the men at an appointed place, receiving their reports and waiting until all have been completely written up and signed. A junior clerk has been assigned to do the clerical work formerly done by the Chief Inspector, and which was not properly part of his duties.

The area of Brooklyn being nearly forty-three square miles and Manhattan less than twenty, the necessity of a large force of inspectors is apparent. To the end that all resurvey and special inspection work may be expeditiously and economically accomplished, I recommend an immediate increase of eighty over the present allowance. If even improperly supervised work, such as that done in the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth wards can increase the ratable property on the books to such a large extent as is shown by the addition of \$4,000 in the Twenty-eighth Ward, I feel that with a different system and a better spirit among the men more thorough and more profitable work can be done; and with an increased force, such as I ask for, all that is properly ratable may be placed upon the books prior to May 1, 1903.

On taking office, I was surprised to find that carfare vouchers were usually delayed in payment for many months, though in every case the full amount sworn to as having been expended was always paid eventually. Inquiry and observation revealed the fact that excessive, unexpended carfares charged against the City were regarded as a perquisite of an Inspector, and that it excited much displeasure when fares admittedly fraudulently charged for in a sworn statement were disallowed. A system of checking and certification by supervising officers has been instituted, resulting in a very great decrease in fares, though an Inspector now receives the money due him almost immediately upon presenting his affidavit of expenditure.

As a means by which householders may more readily identify the Inspectors and to secure easier access to houses, as well as to cause a greater circumspection in regard to behavior, I strongly recommend the adoption of a uniform at the commencement of Spring, and until Spring opens, the wearing of a uniform cap, of similar design to the one already submitted for your approval.

It is my recommendation that inspectors should receive a salary of \$1,200 per annum, with an additional \$300 to the one detailed as Chief Inspector. The additional allowance to the person detailed for the time being to act as Chief Inspector, I think, is fully warranted by the character of the work to be done, the efficiency of the force, and accuracy and speed of the work very largely depending upon him.

Meter Division.

Almost one-third of the revenue of this bureau is derived from metered water. This portion of the business is handled by a clerical force of three, and an inspection or meter-reading force of six, together with one man engaged in serving meter installation notices and two laborers assisting meter inspectors, making a total complement of twelve men, being a very much smaller force in proportion than that required on regular rate work.

The importance of the work of the Meter Division is apparent, a very large opportunity being open in this branch for corrupt influences. It is partly for that reason I have recommended an increase in the salary of the Clerk acting as chief of this division, his responsibility being very great.

In the early part of January it was evident that there was an understanding among the Inspectors detailed to read meters that twenty to twenty-five readings should constitute a day's work, whereas thirty-five to forty appear to be a reasonable requirement. A radical reorganization of the inspection personnel has resulted in a much higher average number of readings daily.

This regrettable condition I had hoped to shortly remedy by a system of districting instead of the present plan of irregular routes and by instituting a system of supervision and correction. A different system of supervision and correction has been instituted, but I found that districting would be a long and difficult process, and the new work which fell upon me being so heavy I have been, as yet, unable to accomplish my purpose in that respect.

A meter reader's carfares should be very few, yet it has happened month after month, as appears from the records, that between four and five dollars have been certified by these men as having been expended while on duty; in fact, the meter reading force, being without proper supervision of anyone having authority, I find to have become thoroughly demoralized. As in the case of other inspectors' carfares, they are now but a small fraction of their former size.

That there should be no discrimination made in favor of meter users as against regular ratepayers in the matter of penalties for non-payment, I think is a reasonable presumption, but such is not the case, however, and to remedy this I suggest that the same penalty as is applied to the regular rates when delinquent should also be placed on overdue meter accounts.

Among the large users of water, saloons and laundries predominate, and require a special effort to secure a proper revenue for the Department. In connection with the metering of saloons I would call your attention to the fact that it seems to have been the practice in the past in many cases to report a saloon as fully metered when a seldom-used faucet at the bar was the only fixture covered by the meter. Where this has been detected the Bureau has been compelled in most cases to make the proper connections and charge it to the consumer's account.

The number of saloons on March 31, 1903, was 3,309, and the number metered approximately 1,145.

The number of laundries on March 31, 1903, was 823, and the number metered 78.

See Exhibit I, entitled "Statement of Meters in Use and Set from January 1, 1903, to March 31, 1903."

During the first quarter the number of meter installation notices sent out was approximately 3,074, causing the installation of approximately 254 meters.

During the quarter, at your suggestion, I made no effort at metering, pending action by the Legislature on the bill introduced at the suggestion of the Department for the purpose of allowing the City to pay for the cost of meters and their installation. That this bill was equitable and necessary was apparent on its face, and, pending action, it was but fair that no forced installations at the cost of the consumer should be made. That the bill failed to get beyond the State Senate was not due to any lack of effort by any one connected with the Department.

The number of meters in use on January 1, 1903, was 4,512.

The number of meters in use on March 31, 1903, was 4,916, being an increase of 404.

See Exhibit J, entitled "Statement of Settings, Discontinuances and Meters in Use at End of First Quarter of 1903."

Because of the unregulated use of water in schools and public buildings, and in fact in all exempt classes of structures, I recommend that meters be installed therein to assist in checking the present great waste of water.

Many of the meters in use are in execrable locations, not only difficult of access but actually dangerous to meter readers and repairers. During the present year I shall ask you to remedy this evil to a very great extent by compelling resettings or the use of elevated or extended dials.

I would call your attention to the fact that of the authorized meters, to wit: Worthington, Crown, Thomson, Trident, Nash, Standard and Hersey (disc and rotary), only one—the Worthington—cannot be reversed in its action. I would recommend that all authorized meters be compelled to have an attachment, which I understand can be very easily arranged, whereby they will come under the head of non-reversible.

I would also recommend that there be a change in the system of authorization, and that all types of meters should pass a clogging test, the object being that where a meter is out of order and not registering, that no water will pass through the instrument. This is the case, I believe, in but two or possibly three of the meters which are now authorized. The result of not having this test is apparent now by the small readings in many cases where it is known that the consumption of water is far in excess of the index readings.

As this Bureau is responsible for the accuracy of meters, I would recommend that the present method of testing be changed so that the registrar may have control of the testing apparatus and its use. The present apparatus now operated at the Western District Yard is not calculated to make other than an approximate test. It is practically valueless.

It was formerly the practice that a considerable part of one day each week of all laborers detailed to this Bureau for heavy work in the meter division was lost to the City by reason of their being compelled to receive their wages at the Western District Yard. This formerly wasted time is now saved by an arrangement with the City Paymaster, who now sends the wages of the detailed men direct to this office.

Permits.

At present there is a division of authority between the Registrar's Bureau and that of the Superintendent of Repairs, inasmuch as in several instances permits are

issued and the money received in this office while the inspection is done by the repair bureau, for whose work in that respect the Registrar seems to be responsible. This applies to permits for building purposes, taps, connections, repairs to services and shipping. Either the functions now discharged by this Bureau should be transferred to the Bureau of Distribution and Repairs or the power of inspection now vested in the latter office ought to be placed here. As it is, the system leads to inconvenience and greatly increases the probability of loss of revenue to the Department.

In the work of issuing permits, in addition to the unsatisfactory conditions engendered by a division of authority, I found that numerous builders failed to pay any heed to the Bureau, and either did not take out permits at all, or more frequently secured a permit for one or more buildings and then erected a much greater number.

The issuing of these permits was formerly largely done in connection with other work, and I gave full charge of the entire matter to one trustworthy clerk, devising a method by which constant co-operation is had with the Bureau of the Superintendent of Buildings in the borough administration, thus enabling the permit clerk to know at once if a builder attempts to do more work than his water permit allows. This system has already exposed the devious ways of many builders, who are rapidly realizing that their former practices can no longer prevail. From the time the new method was used—from the middle of February to March 31—it is estimated that the increase was in the neighborhood of one thousand dollars, or approximately at the rate of eight thousand dollars per annum.

New books have been prepared for the proper recording and tracing of builders' operations, thus systematizing and rendering the work of the plumbers', or permit clerk, less difficult than formerly.

EXHIBIT "F."

Office Rules.

Brooklyn, January 19, 1903.

These rules are issued, not to impose petty restrictions on the employees of this Bureau, but to put and keep the office on a strictly business basis, in which preference shall be shown to none.

1. Business hours are from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., except on Saturdays, when they are from 9 a. m. to 12 m.

An interval of one hour is allowed for lunch, and may be taken either between 12 and 1 or 1 and 2 o'clock.

Heads of divisions shall keep a list of employees' preferences as to time of their lunch hour and arrange to always have a good working force on duty.

2. The Cashier, Chief Clerk, Meter Clerk and Chief Inspector shall be directly responsible for the punctuality, conduct and the quantity and quality of work performed in their several divisions.

3. Excuses for absence and applications for leave shall be made in writing directly to the Registrar, and must bear written approval or disapproval of the head of division over his signature.

4. Employees will not smoke, or drink alcoholic liquors during business hours.

5. Visitors to employees shall not be allowed behind the partitions.

6. The public must be treated with the utmost courtesy, especial attention being given to ladies and those evidently unaccustomed to business methods.

7. The only entrance to the offices shall be through the gate at the Registrar's office. All other doors must be kept locked.

8. The time clock will not be used, except by employees who fall below a fair standard of punctuality.

9. All employees having outdoor work to perform, such as inspectors and detailed laborers, must not be in the office unnecessarily. All of the outdoor force who remain within the office or about the halls at 9.20 a. m. shall report directly to the Registrar at that hour.

Dear Sir—The following report will show the expenditures and receipts of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the Borough of Brooklyn, during the months of January, February and March, 1903.

The first division of the report will show the expenditures actual, that is to say, by bills and payrolls, and estimated, viz., through contracts and requisitions, for which the bills have not yet been sent in. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
