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# BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Monday, March 23, 1908, at 11.15 o'clock a. m.

Present-N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Sterling, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, and Lawson Purdy, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the reading of the minutes of the meeting of March 19, 1908, was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Sewers in Broadway, etc.

In matter of the assessment list for sewers and appurtenances in Broadway, from the city line to Riverdale avenue, thence through Exterior street to East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, and through East One Hundred and Ninety-second street to the Harlem River, the objections to which were heard at meeting of March 12, 1908, and decision reserved, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller stated that this Board had carefully considered the assessment, the objections raised, together with memorandums and briefs filed, transcript of testimony taken, etc., and that it was of the opinion that the assessment as reduced should be confirmed.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Assessors reported that they had made a reduction in the assessment of \$39,985.79, as determined by them at meeting of February 7, 1908; also of \$1,224.18, being the amount not assessable under the Laws of 1901.

The following communication and statement of the Board of Assessors in connection with the assessment were also presented:

To the Board of Revision of Assessments:

Gentlemen—We are transmitting to you herewith Assessment List No. 9465, for sewers in what is known as Drainage District No. 40, Map T, Borough of Brooklyn: This assessment involves 18,984 pieces of property, and the total amount is \$3,394,-

There were thirteen different contracts, covering various portions of the work, the first of which was let March 7, 1900, and the last May 18, 1906. The first contract to be completed was finished on May 31, 1902, and the last on August 20, 1906. The assessment list was received in this office from the Borough President August 26, 1907, was transmitted to the Comptroller August 27, 1907, and returned with interest certificate October 25, 1907. The list was advertised on November 22, 1907, and the first hearing had on December 23, 1907. Since that date many hearings have been had by this Board. Hearings were closed Jahuary 30, 1908, since which time the Board has had the matter under consideration, as a result of which certain changes have been made in the assessment to meet those objections which have impressed the Board as well founded. These changes are all in the nature of reductions in the assessment as against specified pieces of property as to which it was shown, either by objectors, or by the investigations of the Board, that certain deductions should in equity be made. These changes may be summarized as follows:

1. The charge for direct benefit, that is, for local sewers (or sewers actually constructed in front of the property charged) is \$3,38 per foot. This was laid against all property within the district in front of which any sewer was constructed, regardless of its size. In certain locations the big tunnel sewer is so deep in the ground that house connections cannot be made directly to it, and in those locations it is necessary that overhead sewers be built. In the assessment maps furnished to us these overhead sewers, either as proposed or as actually built, were indicated. Where they were built, under these contracts, of course the property was charged for direct benefit, but where they were yet to be built, the property was not assessed for direct benefit, because it will have to pay for the lateral or overhead sewers later on. In many places no such overhead sewer was indicated on the map, either as having been built or as being proposed. In such locations the property was assessed for direct benefit, on the ground that it could connect directly with the large tunnel sewer. After the assessment had been made up and advertised, however, it developed that in certain of these locations the plans had been changed, and that overhead sewers, not shown on the maps, would be hereafter constructed. It therefore became necessary to eliminate the line charge of \$3,38 per foot against the property so affected, and that has been done.

2. It has developed also that in certain streets old sewers had been taken up and replaced by new sewers. Upon inquiry we have learned that these old sewers were, for the most part, 12 and 15 inch pipe sewers, laid in 1895, 1897 and 1899, at a cost of from \$15,74 to \$36 per 20-foot lot. These old sewers provided for house drainage only,

It has been ascertained that in certain cases the amount of assessment im-l upon certain pieces of property exceeded one-half the fair value of such prop-and, as we are restricted by the Charter to an assessment not exceeding one-

half the value, we have in such cases reduced the assessment accordingly.

The extent of the reductions so made will be set out more in detail in the statement which will be prepared for the use of the Board of Revision at the hearings on this matter.

After having given the subject careful consideration, we have found that these are the only objections before us that are sufficiently well taken to justify us in modifying the assessment, and, having met them, we feel that the assessment has been changed as far as the equities of the case demand.

As stated, the line charge, or charge for direct benefit, was \$3.38 per front foot, in addition to which there was a charge for general benefit, placed equaly upon all the property within the sewerage district at the rate of \$1.90 per 100 square feet.

About one thousand objections have been received, the large majority of which are upon printed forms prepared by Taxpayers' Associations and other organizations and circulated throughout the district. These general objections go mainly to the proposition that the assessment is too high, and that it exceeds the benefit. We started fundamentally with the proposition that the City has expended the sum of \$3,394,108.97, which should be reimbursed to it through this assessment, and our apportionment, as between the charge for direct benefit and that for general benefit was as equitable as we could arrive at to produce the required amount. It is true that the assessment is somewhat high as compared with former assessments for sewers in Brooklyn, but no sewer at all comparable to this has been heretofore built. This sewerage district embraces a very large area, the greater part of which (including the Flatbush section on its easterly side) is flat land, with but little elevation above tide water. The problem of providing an efficient system of sewerage for this district has always been regarded as extremely difficult, and it was only after consolidation that the Engineers of the Sewer Department conceived the idea of tunneling under the ridge that lies between Flatbush and New York Bay, and constructing a large outlet sewer in that tunnel, of sufficient size to take care of all the territory within the district (approximately 79,000 lots). This sewer at its outlet is fifteen feet in diameter, and is said to be the largest in the world. The only other practicable outlet for the territory lying to the eastward of the ridge before mentioned, would have been into Jamaica Bay, and the law prohibits the emptying of sewage matter there, even had it been possible to have constructed a system emptying there that would have cared for this large and rapidly growing district. The necessity for constructing this long tunnel sewer led, of course, to considerable expense as compared with other sewers that are built near the surface, and a long period of time was required to complete the work. Furthermore, this tunnel sewer, for a long distance back from its outlet, being deep in the ground, afforded no opportunity to give house connections directly to it, and the overhead sewers here inbefore referred to had to be built. This, of course, operated further to increase the cost. All these things, however, were necessary under the circumstances, and there has been no contention before us that the Borough authorities have been unwise or extravagant in the prosecution of the work.

The only complaint made in that regard is to the effect that the Borough authorities should have certified to this Board the different contracts as they were completed, instead of holding them until the whole of the work covered by the assessment was completed, and that had this been done the charge for interest, which it is contended is excessive, would have been cut down. Had the suggested course been followed, it is true that the interest charge would have been somewhat smaller, been followed, it is true that the interest charge would have been somewhat smaller, but on the other hand, there would have been a continual overlapping of assessments that could not have been otherwise than distasteful to the property owners, and, in the end, the result would not have been as equitable as it is now—that is, the total cost of the completed work would not have been as evenly distributed throughout the district, and some portions of the territory would have profited at

the expense of others.

Included within the area of this assessment is a large amount of property owned by the City, principally in Prospect Park, the Parade Grounds and the East Side Lands. There are also two large cemetery properties which are exempt under the law from the collection of assessments, although this Board has the power to lay assessments upon them. In other words, this Board has authority to lay assessments are a contracted by the the law exempts them from payment so long as they are upon such property, but the law exempts them from payment so long as they are

used for cemetery purposes. In taking up this matter, we saw from the beginning that this improvement had been expensive, and that the expenses, particularly for interest, were rather high. Consequently, in apportioning the assessment we treated the park property upon the same basis as private property; that is, we assessed it for its solid area (so far as it lay within the drainage district), as if it had been private property improved with buildings, and with no deduction for the area of streets of which the same extent of territory in other parts of the district had the benefit. The assessment upon the City's property, as originally calculated, was approximately \$300,000. Reductions in the assessment as it affects certain properties (explained at the beginning of this letter) have been made aggregating approximately \$40,000, which must ning of this letter) have been made, aggregating approximately \$40,000, which must be borne by the City. The assessment upon the two cemetery properties, which is in effect borne by the City also, is about \$123,000. Therefore, about \$463,000, or nearly 14 per cent. of the whole cost is to be borne by the City under the assessment as it is transmitted to you.

The principal complaint as to this assessment has come from the section known as Flatbush (formerly the Twenty-ninth Ward of Brooklyn), and the principal ground of objection is that the section formerly had an adequate system of sewers for which the property paid. Our investigations have led us to the conclusion that the old system was not adequate, in that it provided for house drainage only, and formerly, after every heavy rain storm the streets were flooded.

Contractor and Address.

But the statements made by these objectors are inaccurate, for the old system, inadequate as it was, never was paid for by the property that used it. Bonds to the extent of \$595,000, upon which there will be an accumulation of twenty-five years' interest, were issued by the former Town of Flatbush to construct the outlet sewers they formerly used. The bonds, under the law, should have been a charge upon the territory comprising the former Town of Flatbush. The City of New York, however, has never collected any part of this obligation from the property liable for it, but is redeeming the bonds and paying the interest from its general funds. Thus, in effect, The City of New York has assumed the cost of building these old outlet sewers, and the property in Flatbush has used them for fifteen years without having paid a cent for them. The only thing paid for by the property in Flatbush was the cost of a 12-inch pipe sewer in the streets where sewers were laid, whatever their size, and that cost was officially determined at that time as \$28.03 per 20-foot lot. The excess cost of the system over the assumed cost of a 12-inch pipe was pro-

The excess cost of the system over the assumed cost of a 12-inch pipe was provided for by the bond issue referred to. This charge of \$28.03 for sewers actually built in front of the property assessed, was collected in ten annual instalments.

After having carefully considered all the matters brought before us in connection with this assessment, we are of the opinion that it should be confirmed without further alteration, inasmuch as we have provided, by the reductions we have made, for all those cases which have seemed to demand special consideration.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the bla

law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, draws to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates in the blank forms prepared and

or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
