Dear Sir:—The Department has given special attention to the sealing of water meters to prevent tampering or interference with the mechanism of the meter. The manufacturers of all of the water meters which are in use in this City have been consulted and a method of wiring and sealing meters has been agreed upon. It consists of placing a three-strand copper wire through a specially bored screw in the counter and a bored nut in the flange of the meter and running the wire through a lead disk, and using a heavy hand seal to tighten the wire into the lead disk.

By an arrangement with the meter companies, all new meters to be furnished hereafter will be provided with the bored screws and nuts, the Department wiring and sealing all such meters after they have been tested and before they are delivered to the plumbers. The Department proposes to purchase screws and flanged bolts for all the water meters now in use and in later wire and seal same. The water meters now in use have their number stamped upon the cover, and after a very short time it is found that these covers fall off or are removed, and it is quite difficult to identify the meter so that proper bills may be rendered. To avoid this confusion, the Department proposes to attach to each meter a lead tag, upon which will be stamped the number of the meter. Extra Inspectors and Laborers will necessarily have to be employed to do this work, and I give below a detailed statement of the cost and a segregation of the account:

Sir—In the matter of a communication from the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York, requesting the establishment of an additional grade of position of Clerk, with salary of \$1,000 per annum, which communication was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, I beg to report as follows:

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I ask that your Board request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to provide the necessary funds to pay the salaries of an additional force for the office of the Tenement House Branch of this Department for the remainder of the current year.

Attached hereto are copies of a letter from the Tenement House Commissioner to the Corporation Counsel, dated December 31, 1908; a letter dated January 4, 1909, from the Corporation Counsel to the Assistant in charge of the Tenement House Branch office asking for a report on the letter of the Tenement House Commissioner and a letter dated January 14, 1909, from the Assistant Corporation Counsel in charge of the Tenement House Branch office, containing a detailed report.

The explanation for the necessity of this request for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds is briefly as follows:

In the Budget for 1909, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment made provision for increasing the force in the Tenement House Department by the employment of about 140 additional persons, 90 of whom are inspectors, and the remaining 50 Clerks and Stenographers.

The Tenement House Commissioner, in his letter of December 31, 1908, states that there are at the present time on file in his Department approximately 80,000 violations; that because of the additional inspections to be made this number will be greatly increased in the near future, and that at the present time he is ready to forward to the Law Department for action about 60,000 cases. The Tenement House Branch office of this Department has not sufficient force at the present time to cope with the ordinary volume of business transmitted by the Tenement House Department and the various building bureaus.

During the years 1907 and 1908 over 30,000 violations were received each year from the Tenement House Department and over 4,000 from the various building bureaus. In about one-third of the Tenement House cases no action has been taken because of an insufficient office force.

Many of the 60,000 proceedings which the Tenement House Commissioner is about to turn over to the Law Department relate to "dark rooms," "safety sinks" and other matters concerning the health and safety of the public. In each of these cases the Tenement House Department has exhausted all the means at its command to compel enforcement of the law. Various orders have been sent to and notices have been served upon Tenement House owners, requesting them to comply with the law, and nothing remains to be done except to commence proceedings under the special laws relating to this subject.

The large increase in the force of the Tenement House Department could not have been foreseen at the time the provisional estimate of the Law Department for 1909 was prepared, and it is apparent that the present office force of the Tenement House Branch office of the Law Department must be greatly increased. If this volume of work, including the 60,000 cases now on file, is to be promptly disposed of.

My Assistant in charge of the Tenement House Branch office, after a careful study of the subject, is of the opinion that the following additional force is necessary to handle the business during the current year:

If the Tenement House Law is to be enforced, it is quite as necessary to increase the force of the Law Department as that of the Tenement House Department, for experience has shown that the only effective way of obtaining compliance with the law is by the commencement of actions and proceedings in Court.

I therefore ask that a bond issue amounting to \$39,850 be authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment upon the request of your Honorable Board.

I wish, however, to add in this request the following suggestion:

That if a part of the new force added to the Tenement House Department for the current year could be used by the Law Department to serve the necessary summonses and other processes, write the typewriting of the summonses and complaints and other similar papers and the additional clerical work involved in bringing so many new proceedings, we could get along for the remainder of the current year with the following addition to the force:

As I have already stated, the present office force of our Tenement House Branch office is insufficient to handle the current business, but with the additional positions just enumerated, I think that during the current year we could keep pace with the work to be done, if the Tenement House Commissioner would assist the Law Department as already indicated. In that event a bond issue for the smaller amount of \$11,100 will be sufficient for the year 1909.

Dear Sir—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has provided further facilities for this Department to cope with the rapidly increasing volume of work necessary to be performed in the enforcement of the Tenement House Law by making an additional appropriation for the employment of about 140 persons, 90 of whom are inspectors, and all of whom will be added to our staff in the early part of January, 1909.

There are at the present time on file in this Department approximately 80,000 violations. The additional inspections which will come by reason of the addition to the force will doubtless result in a large number of violations being added to those already on our records, so that it is manifest that the coming year will be an extremely busy one in this Department.

During the past year approximately 17,500 cases were forwarded to the Corporation Counsel's office for prosecution, and were we at the present time to forward all those cases in which every remedy so far as this Department is concerned has been ex-

hausted, we would transmit about 60,000 cases. Among these are included many violations which are serious in their character, so far as the public health and safety is concerned. They include the removal of school sinks, the placing of windows in dark rooms, the installation of skylights, the vacating of illegal basements, the concreting of cellars, the fireproofing of bakeries, the erection of fire escapes, the enlarging of scuttles, not to say anything of the many minor features of the Tenement House Law.

Where the violations involve a large expense to the owner, it is obvious that the enforcement of the law is not as easily expedited as in cases where a small expense is involved.

I call these matters to your attention so that in outlining your programme for the ensuing year you may take such steps as are necessary to render us every possible co-operation in the matter of the prosecution of such matters as are forwarded to your office. It is quite logical that if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have found it advisable and necessary to make such an unusual increase in the number of employees of this Department to carry on its work, a proportionate increase should be made in the staff of your office which is assigned to this particular class of work, so that the adequate support and co-operation may be had.

The preparation of opinions, the holding of conferences with this Department, the preparation of vacating orders, the handling of cases which we bring up in the police courts (these matters come up in Jefferson Market, Essex Market, West Fifty-fourth Street, East Fifty-seventh Street and Morrisania Police Courts on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, respectively, as well as in Brooklyn on two days of each week), the institution and prosecution of civil suits for the collection of penalties, the filing of lis pendens notices, the institution of actions in rem in the Supreme Court, the handling of injunctions and mandamus proceedings in the Supreme Court, as well as the other features of the legal work embodied in the enforcement of the Tenement House Law, will command a much larger force than is at present assigned to the Tenement House Bureau.

I trust, therefore, that you may find your way clear to make such additions to the staff of the Tenement House Bureau of your office during the coming year as will be necessary to handle the business assigned to it.

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith a copy of a letter from the Tenement House Commissioner, dated December 31, 1908, in relation to the work of your Bureau for the year 1909.

Will you make a careful investigation of the matters referred to in this letter and advise me to what extent it will be necessary to increase the office force of your Bureau.

You will understand that this request of the Tenement House Commissioner was not anticipated and could not have been foreseen at the time the Budget for 1909 was prepared, and that if any increase in force is needed it will be necessary to provide for the cost by requesting the Board of Aldermen and Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue Special Revenue Bonds.

I therefore desire that in formulating your request you keep it down to the lowest possible limit, and that you ask for nothing that is not absolutely necessary to carry on this work during the year 1909.

Please make your report as complete as possible so that it may be transmitted for the information of the Board of Aldermen.

Hon. FRANCIS K. PENDLETON, Corporation Counsel:

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of your letter of the 4th inst., transmitting a letter dated the 24th ult. and addressed to you by Hon. Edmund J. Butler, Tenement House Commissioner.

Complying with your request, I have gone carefully into the matters referred to in his letter, and I would advise that if it is at all possible under the conditions which obtain at the present time that the staff in this office be increased by providing the following in addition to those already employed in this Bureau:

First—Three Assistants, or Deputy or Junior Assistants.

Second—Five Senior Clerks and five Junior Clerks.

Third—Four Stenographers.

Fourth—Four Typewriting Copyists.

Fifth—Six Process Servers.

Sixth—Two Office Boys.

Seventh—An addition to the number of "Special Process Servers," paid \$1.15 for each summons served, and an increase in that appropriation to pay for the same.

In support of this request, there are several important features of our work for the coming year which I would call to your attention particularly. There are at present on file in the Tenement House Department approximately 80,000 violations. There is to be added during the current year to the employees of the Tenement House Department 140 persons, 90 of whom are inspectors. This addition to the force of the Tenement House Department will necessarily result in a very large increase over the normal increase of violations for the coming year. There were sent to us during the year 1908 for prosecution approximately 16,000 tenement house violations, not to say anything at this point about the Building Department violations, which also were forwarded to us for prosecution during said year. Each one of these cases in its progress through our Bureau to ultimate disposal of the violation involves far more work than is generally known. In each case there must be:

1. A record made of the case in our Bureau.

2. The assignment to an Assistant for prosecution.

3. The issuing of a typewritten summons and the filing of a lis pendens, with a description of the violation and a correct description of the property involved.

4. The answering of the case on the return day by the Assistant in charge of the same.

5. The adjournments of the case pending a reinspection and a removal of the violation on the part of the owner.

6. If the violation is not promptly removed the trial of the action, which necessitates the presence in Court of the Assistant in charge of the case, the Process Server, one Inspector, and, in some cases, two from the Tenement House Department, the Clerk who has served the notice of the Tenement House violation.

7. Before these cases are brought on for trial it is necessary to determine who the owner of the property is by securing a search card from a title company. In many instances it is found that title to the property has been conveyed after the violation has been committed, or after the summons has been served. The result is that in many instances some of the work of the Assistant is necessarily duplicated.

8. Where adjournments are made during the pendency of the suit on the promise of the owner to immediately comply, there are usually two or three visits at least on the part of the owner at this Bureau in reference to the same. Requests for re-inspections to the Tenement House Department must be made out, entered on our records, and, when returned, recorded again and distributed among the Assistants in whom they belong.

In connection with alteration violations, the institution of a suit usually results in the presentation on the part of the defendant of a proposed amendment to his plans to meet the requirements of the Tenement House Department. This involves the referring of the same to the Tenement House Department, their action upon it, and subsequently the doing of the work itself, which will bring the illegal alteration within the requirements of the Tenement House Law.

In connection with these cases difficulties often arise which require conferences between the heads of the Tenement House Department and the representatives of this office.

In police court proceedings the initiative is always taken by the Tenement House Department. The practice is, on the part of the Tenement House Department, to forward to this Bureau all police court cases two or three days before the same are returnable. The following is the calendar of this Bureau in police court matters in the Borough of Manhattan:

Monday Afternoons—Jefferson Market Police Court.
Tuesday Afternoons—Essex Market Police Court.
Wednesday Afternoons—West Fifty-fourth Street Police Court.
Thursday Afternoons—East Fifty-seventh Street Police Court.
Friday Afternoons—Bronx Police Court.

In Brooklyn police court cases are returnable on several days of the week. This police court work is distributed among the Assistants, so that the attendance of one Assistant at least is necessitated at the times above mentioned. This takes the Assistant away from the office for the larger portion of an afternoon. During the absence of the Assistant from the office people often call, sometimes in large numbers, in connection with cases in the hands of such Assistant. For the convenience of the public in such matters, Clerks in the office are obliged to make memorandum of said visits and take up the same with the Assistant upon his return to the office.

Where a defendant cannot be served with a summons after a diligent effort an action in rem in the Supreme Court is taken against the house. This involves some typewriting, the keeping of a calendar on the part of the Assistant and a good deal of the work outlined above in the actions brought in the Municipal Court.

Vacation Cases—All vacation cases in the Tenement House Department are forwarded to this Bureau in order that the vacation orders may be prepared and approved as to form before they are signed by the Tenement House Commissioner. In view of the drastic effect of these orders, great care is necessary on the part of this office in examining the papers in the case so as to carefully determine whether or not each case comes within the scope of the Charter provisions upon this subject.

Furthermore, it is necessary that this work be done promptly so that the orders may be returned to the Department for prompt action on their part. Frequently defects are found which necessitate our sending the papers back to the Department for correction and their being returned in corrected form for the preparation of the order by us.

Injunction and Mandamus Proceedings—These actions are frequently brought by owners of real property, architects and builders to compel the Department to approve of plans submitted or to grant final certificates for the occupation of new houses or to restrain the Department from doing things which it is contended the Department has no right under the law to do. These cases are in almost every instance of vital importance, both on account of the interests involved in the litigation and again for the reason that they bring up for the first time before the Supreme Court the interpretation of the construction of some section of the Tenement House Law. Such cases as *Moeschen vs. the Tenement House Department* (school-stink case), *Kiesel vs. Crain* (section 75, as to privacy), *Lee vs. Crain*, *Ungleich vs. Crain*, *Fox vs. Butler*, *Cohen vs. Butler* (involved occupation of rooms in basement and cellars), *Corman vs. Butler*, *Gabriel vs. Butler*, *Spatoli & Senger vs. Butler* (bathrooms) and *Krekeler vs. Butler* (interior rooms). It may be observed that this Bureau has won a victory in every Supreme Court action with two exceptions, in one of which the Appellate Division in the Second Department interpreted the law differently than it had already been construed by the Appellate Division in the First Department, and in the second of which the effect of the adverse decision by the Appellate Division in the Second Department was subsequently overcome by a favorable decision under another section of the Tenement House Law, which adequately met the difficulty involved.

Building Department Work—As has previously been remarked this Bureau now handles all of the litigation for each Borough of the Bureau of Buildings where the enforcement of the Building Code and plumbing rules and regulations is involved. This work includes Municipal Court actions similar to those above described in Tenement House cases, Police Court proceedings, Injunction and Mandamus proceedings in the Supreme Court and Unsafe Building proceedings which are brought in the Supreme Court. The latter are very important and on account of their pecuniary character must be given prompt as well as careful attention. Any error in these proceedings on the part of the Building Bureau not discovered by the Law Department in the preparation of papers and in the bringing on of the action in Court would result in the loss of much money to The City of New York under the present state of the law relating to emergency work. At the present time these Unsafe Building proceedings average one new case for every day of the week (viz., an average of two in Manhattan and four in Brooklyn). The assistant in whom these cases are assigned, in conjunction with his other work, must examine the papers, dictate the proposed findings and the precept and attend at the Supreme Court on the return day. This duty usually takes him away from the office for at least an hour and a half. Not infrequently owners of the property involved take issue with the City upon the question of the safety of the building, in which case the matter is usually referred to a referee. The last reference of this kind necessitated about eight sessions, covering a space of an hour to an hour and a half at the office of the referee.

This Bureau is charged with the duty of collecting moneys expended by the City in making unsafe or dangerous buildings safe. In a table, which is set forth farther on in this letter, a statement is made of the amounts of money collected during the past six years. The total amount collected during these six years is \$71,651.52. The Mandamus and Injunction proceedings brought by the Bureau of Buildings against the Bureau of Buildings usually involve a test case and an interpretation of some section of the Building Code. In most cases they are very important, not only with respect to the subject matter in the suit, or for the reason aforesaid, that an interpretation of the law is involved. The recent litigation involving the ordinance covering roof signs has covered a period of two years and has not yet reached the Court of Appeals. It was necessary to go to the Appellate Division three times before a decision was rendered upon the constitutionality of the ordinance in this matter. Meanwhile there are some 800 violation cases awaiting the result of this litigation.

Opinions—Requests for opinions are frequently made by the Tenement House Department and the Bureau of Buildings. It is unnecessary to dwell upon the importance of this feature of our work. Furthermore, frequent conferences are held between both the Tenement House Department and this Bureau as well as between the Bureau of Buildings of each Borough and this Bureau. The proximity of the Tenement House Department to our office makes it possible for these frequent conferences, which average three a week.

The following tables indicate something of the work done by this Bureau during the past six years. First, in Tenement House Department matters, and secondly, in matters relating to the Bureau of Buildings:

The following statement gives some details of the stenographic and typewriting work done in this Bureau. When this is considered in connection with the statements made above as to the work done in this Bureau, the reasonableness of our request for increase in the Stenographic Bureau is quite apparent.

Briefs—Appellate Division, Appellate Term, Supreme Court (information proceedings and mandamus proceedings), Court of Special Sessions, Magistrates' Courts, Municipal Courts.

Orders—Supreme Court, Court of Special Sessions, Municipal Court, Magistrates' Courts.

Orders to Show Cause—Supreme Court matters, Court of Special Sessions and Municipal Court matters.

Affidavits—Supreme Court matters, Municipal Court matters, Magistrates' Courts, Court of Special Sessions, Tenement House Inspectors' affidavits in old building cases, affidavits of service of Process Servers connected with this Bureau.

Complaints—Supreme Court matters, Magistrates' Courts, Court of Special Sessions and Municipal Courts.

Answers—Supreme Court matters, copies of pleadings in Supreme Court actions, Proposed Cases on Appeal—Paraphrasing testimony to be used in Courts of Appeals.

Summons—Supreme Court matters. Filing in name of defendant, date and endorsing summons.

Opinions—On all questions of law relating to provisions of Tenement House Act and Building Code. Seven copies of these opinions are always made.

Correspondence—This comprises letters to be written returning cases to Tenement House Department and Building Department, recommending discontinuance, answering inquiries of the public regarding violations on property within The City of New York on which violations have been placed, letters including cancellations of lis pendens filed by this office, letters to the main office and branch offices of this Department on official questions, filing in with violation number, precedes, name of defendant and address, a series of printed form letters used extensively by this Bureau; letters requesting appearance of Process Servers and Inspectors in different Courts as witnesses in trials.

Summons—Municipal Court. Typewriting of District in which Court is located, name of defendant, violations on which action is brought; numbers of sections of Building Code and Tenement House Act which have been violated, and location of Court to be designated by street and number.

Lis Pendens—Municipal Court. To be filed with all Municipal Court summons, containing Court description, sections violated and name of defendant (which is inserted four times), and a blocked description of the property which is obtained from diagram furnished with each case.

Unsafe Proceedings—This form of action consists of a precept, deposition of the Inspector reporting the unsafe condition of the premises, findings to be signed by the Court, and a copy of the notice of survey and summons which accompanies the set of papers from which this proceeding is made up. Although these forms are all printed, they involve a great deal of time in referring to the notices and reports of Inspectors by which the case can be completed. These cases only come from the Bureau of Buildings.

Copies of Orders Issued by the Tenement House Department and the Building Bureau—These copies are made for the convenience of the public who have mislaid copies furnished by the Department. There is also a copy of order made with every summons and lis pendens in cases brought by the Building Bureau.

Vacation Orders—These are printed forms filled in with date of issuance, premises to be vacated, reason for vacating said premises (which can be construction, as a tenement house, without obtaining certificate, a nuisance dangerous to life and health of inhabitants and apartments alone which are vacated for sanitary reasons), date by which time the house will be vacated summarily. These orders consist of a set of six papers to be served and of two papers to be filed by the Tenement House Commissioner.

Calendars—Calendars for each Assistant assigned to this Bureau of all the cases returnable, adjournment discontinued, etc., on the respective return days in Municipal Courts, and are written weekly.

Monthly Cash Statement Sent to Tenement House Commissioner—This is a statement of all moneys received for the collection of penalties imposed for violations of the Tenement House Act, and consists of three copies, and is sent to the Commissioner monthly.

Monthly Cash Statement Sent to the Superintendent of Buildings—This is a statement of all moneys received for the collection of penalties imposed for violations of the Building Code, same as above and sent monthly to the Superintendent of Buildings.

Quarterly Statement to Corporation Counsel—This is a statement sent every three months to the Corporation Counsel, containing list of every case sent to this office from the Tenement House Department and the Building Bureau, and of all work performed in the prosecution of said cases up to date of statement. Three copies are always made of this statement.

Annual Report to Corporation Counsel—This is a statement sent every year to the Corporation Counsel of all cases received at this Bureau during said twelve months, and of work performed in each case.

Blotter Work—A daily record of every case received at this Bureau from the Tenement House Department and the Building Bureau of each of the five Boroughs. This consists of violation numbers, premises, owners' names and nature of the violations, and same is then ready for entry in registers by Clerks. This also comprises a record of every summons served and by what Process Server same was served; re-inspections sent out, vacation cases served, memoranda of trials in Police Courts, memoranda of disposition of unsafe building proceedings, and a daily list of all orders filed in County Clerk's office, and also of vacation cases quashed. After the above typewritten work has been entered by Clerks in the registers, the same is used for indexing purposes and filed with each respective case in our filing cabinets.

Cases Against the House—These consist of free copies of forms to be filled in with premises and Borough and date on which action is brought; description of property, which is read from a diagram furnished with each case. The sections contain: nature of the violation; date of the order served by the Tenement House Department. This is an action brought by this Bureau against premises when all efforts of Process Servers have failed to locate the owner of property. There are five covers to be typewritten with violation numbers, location of premises and Borough in which premises are located.

Index Card—Cards typewritten when judgment is obtained, consisting of name of judgment debtor; judgment creditor; register number; folio number; Court; date of entry; amount of judgment; address; occupation, etc.; of judgment debtor and nature of action and disposition of same.

Decisions of Supreme Court Judges—Copies of all decisions affecting any case in this office, or any point of law involved, are always typewritten for office use.

Coping Testimony—This is typewriting which comprises copies of testimony in many cases brought by this office, when same are heard before a referee, and sometimes amounts to a couple of hundred pages.

In conclusion, I would call your attention to the importance of the work done by this Bureau. A great many of the violation cases sent us by the Department involve serious matters, such as fire escape cases, violations involving the fireproofing of bakeries, regress in case of fire, cases involving the removal of school sinks, the occupation of basements, the placing of windows in interior rooms, the providing of skylights, the removing of obstructions, the installation of new plumbing, the occupation contrary to law of new buildings where the certificate has not yet been issued. The Board of Estimate at the recent meeting where appropriations were made for the coming year, after lengthy discussion before them by representatives of various civic bodies representing such rules of the tenement house problem, saw fit to increase the appropriation of the Tenement House Department, which was already of no small amount, so that 140 additional persons are added to the payroll of that Department, 90 of whom are inspectors who will be immediately turned into the field. The health and lives of hundreds of thousands depend upon the proper enforcement of the Tenement House Law. This enforcement cannot be had without the cooperation of the Law Department. It is plain therefore, that the recent action of the Board of Estimate makes absolutely necessary an increase in the force of this Bureau. It may be said here that the additional appropriation made by the Board of Estimate for the year 1909 could hardly be anticipated by this Bureau since in the appropriation for 1908 the Board of Estimate had seen fit to not only decline to appropriate for said Department the amount which they requested for the year 1908, but even appropriated for said Department \$2,000 less than what was appropriated for said Department for the previous year (1907).

There are also many features about the work connected with the Bureau of Buildings of each Borough which are of great importance, viz.: fire escape cases, fireproofing cases, unsafe buildings, dangerous elevators, plumbing rules and regulations, faults and defective construction of new buildings.

We have been so crowded by the constantly increasing volume of work assigned to this Bureau during the last three or four years that we are unable to cope with the present work, which is rapidly falling into arrears.

To keep abreast with the work at present on hand (without regard to the thousands of cases which will shortly be sent to us), it is essential that we shall have added to our staff:

One Assistant Corporation Counsel, two Clerks, two Junior Clerks, two Office Boys, two Typewriting Copyists and two Stenographers.

Dear Sir—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals requests permission to purchase without public letting the necessary food supplies, etc., required for the various hospitals during the month of January, 1909. On account of the circular letter received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requiring that certain discount clauses be inserted in the specifications, the date for the opening of bids was delayed until January 15. Gentlemen—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals respectfully requests permission from the Board of Aldermen to buy fresh fruits and vegetables required by the hospitals of the Department during the year 1909, in an amount not to exceed \$11,200. The Trustees find it necessary to ask for an increased allowance this year on account of the new Nurses' Training School, with 145 Nurses and 30 servants. Hon. HENRY SMITH, Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond:

Sir—I am in receipt of your communication dated November 16, 1908, which reads as follows:

"Requests are made from time to time by different City departments for some slight amount of work peculiar to this Department to be performed on property of the departments referred to."

"I desire to co-operate with the other City departments and lend whatever aid is necessary for the best interests of the City, but before so doing, I would like to be advised if I am justified by law in performing the work and furnishing the material from this Department. With reference to material I refer, of course, to condemned articles. It has been the custom of this Department, for instance, to receive condemned fire hose for use in the parks from the Fire Department."

"Will you please advise me in this matter, and oblige?"

The subject of transferring from one department to another personal property was considered by Hon. George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, in an opinion rendered to the Fire Commissioner on April 22, 1903 (vol. 15, p. 594), wherein he said:

"Title of all City property is vested in The City of New York and not in the Commissioner or head of any department. It is only within the control of the heads of the respective departments, and when the department which controls it has no further use for it and it is needed by some other department, it is my opinion that such property may be transferred."

"Whether the property now within your control may be transferred to the Street Cleaning Department without the concurrence of any other agents of the City is a question which involves some doubt. In order that your right to lend or transfer the property to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning and his right to accept the same may be perfectly clear, I recommend that application be made to the Board of Aldermen for a resolution empowering such transfer."

The Street Cleaning Department at that time desired from the Fire Department a loan of hose which was no longer in condition to be used at fires.

I am constrained to advise you that the application must be made to the Board of Aldermen for a resolution empowering your Department to transfer material no longer needed in your department, to other departments.

As to that part of your communication referring to some slight amount of work peculiar to your department, to be performed on property of different City departments, I think it is advisable that more specific information be given as to the character of the work. While it appears from your communication that the matter is of little or no importance, yet a precedent might be established which would be prejudicial to the City.

My Dear Alderman—As you told me on Friday last, at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that a letter would suffice in lieu of personal appearance before the Finance Committee in matter now before it, viz., the contemplated issuance of \$15,000 Corporate Stock for our Topographical Bureau, would say that the following facts would seem to cover the case:

For the years 1902 and 1903 small sums were appropriated in the Budget for the topographical survey for the Borough of Richmond. Since then, due to special acts of the Legislature, Corporate Stock has been provided. There will be needed for the current year something over \$150,000 for this work, but the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a recent meeting took action upon just enough of a stock issue to cover the needs of the different Boroughs, say in the middle of February.

Our work has been progressing very satisfactorily in many respects. Two years more should see it practically finished, and already the benefit has been very great in enabling property owners to open up large and small tracts of land in accordance with consistent street schemes, and many public improvements have been authorized and carried in completion based on the data secured by the City. There was the greatest need for this information in the practically built up portions of the community, so that improvements needed at present could be carried out, but the whole Borough is gradually receiving the benefit.

The survey is conducted along lines of the most modern methods and with the highest degree of accuracy, so that it will serve all requirements of the future, as well as the present, and the street systems, boulevard lines, park areas, etc., are being studied so as to produce the most effective and satisfactory future development of the Borough.

I would ask, therefore, favorable and immediate action upon the present request and upon the following one that will shortly come before your Committee for action.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 458 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relative to the use of headlights and searchlights on automobiles while in use upon the streets, highways and thoroughfares of said City.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 458 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 458. Lights—Each and every vehicle using the public streets or highways of this City, except vehicles of licensed truckmen, shall show, between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, a light or lights, so placed as to be seen from the front and each side; if dash lamp is carried it shall be placed on the left-hand side; such light or lights to be of sufficient illuminating power to be visible at a distance of 200 feet; said light or lights shall show white in front, but may be colored on the sides, excepting licensed truckmen. Every automobile shall exhibit during the same period two lamps showing white lights visible at a distance of 300 feet in the direction toward which the automobile is proceeding, and shall also exhibit a red light visible in the reverse direction. The lamps shall be so placed as to be free from obstruction to light from other parts of said automobile. No operator of any automobile or other motor vehicle, while operating the same upon the public highway within the (City) Boroughs of Brooklyn or Manhattan shall use any acetylene, electric or other headlight of more than sixteen candle power. In the other Boroughs a higher candle power may be used when (unless) properly shaded so as not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway, or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon. In the Borough of The Bronx, excepting south of Tremont avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, east of Jerome avenue and west of the Bronx River, and in the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens, and in the Twenty-sixth, Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn, every car or other vehicle between said hours, while moving on, along or standing upon the portion of streets in said Boroughs or parts of Boroughs, shall also carry a light or

lights of such illuminating power as to be plainly visible 200 feet, both ahead and behind said car or vehicle.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(FINANCIAL AND FRANCHISE MATTERS.)

MINUTES MEETING OF BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, JANUARY 15, 1909.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; Patrick E. McGowan, President of the Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Bird S. Culer, President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Lawrence Gresser, President of the Borough of Queens, and George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

After disposing of the Public Improvements Calendar, the following financial and franchise matters were considered:

FRANCHISE MATTERS.

NEW YORK AND LONG ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANY.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Whereas, The New York and Long Island Railroad Company has built and completed a tunnel railroad equipped for the operation of street surface trolley cars, extending from the vicinity of East avenue and Fourth street, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, to Park avenue and Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, The Supreme Court of this State has held that the New York and Long Island Railroad Company has no lawful existence at the present time, and has no authority to operate cars in such tunnel; and

Whereas, Such tunnel and real estate necessary for the proper operation of said tunnel railroad is held by the directors of the former New York and Long Island Railroad Company, and trustees for the stockholders of said company; and

Whereas, Said tunnel can, within a short space of time, be put into operation, and thus directly connect the Boroughs of Queens and Manhattan; and

Whereas, Said tunnel constitutes a link in the comprehensive rapid transit system for the entire City; and

Whereas, The constitutional limitations will not permit the City at the present time to consider the purchase of said tunnel from the trustees of the New York and Long Island Railroad Company; and

Whereas, It would be for the best interests of the City of New York if said railroad were to be put into operation at as early a date as possible; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the trustees of the New York and Long Island Railroad Company be and are hereby requested to present an application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York for a franchise to operate said tunnel.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to forward a copy of these resolutions to said trustees.

Discussion ensued as to the advisability of making such a request, and also as to whether the request should be confined to the trustees of the New York and Long Island Railroad Company.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that, in order that there be no mistake as to the mind of the Board, the resolution be laid on the table.

Which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

Negative—The Comptroller—3.

FINANCIAL MATTERS.

The Comptroller presented the following resolution discharging the Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen from further consideration of all requests now pending before it for the establishment of positions and grades of positions, referred to said Committee at various meetings of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Resolved, That the Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President, Board of Aldermen, be and the same is hereby discharged from further consideration of all requests now pending before it for the establishment of positions and grades of positions, referred to said Committee at various meetings of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Which failed of adoption, receiving the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens—6.

Negative—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond—10.

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee appointed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to prepare and submit a method for keeping cost data relative to the maintenance of sewers, stating that the Committee has prepared and submits forms of daily reports, with the recommendation that they be approved by the Board and that the different Borough Presidents be requested to use same and to place the collection and compilation of data in charge of the Sewer Engineers of the different Boroughs, giving them the necessary assistants and facilities to do this work.

The President, Borough of Manhattan, presented, by unanimous consent, a communication in relation to said report, which was referred to above Committee, and the Secretary was directed to send copies of the communication to each member of the Board and to each member of the Select Committee. Consideration of the matter was thereupon laid over.

Subsequently, upon the request of the Comptroller, the matter was ordered on the Calendar for the next meeting.

(On January 8, 1909, the above matter was laid over for one week.)

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Change of Grade Commission, submitting statement of estimated expenses for the year 1909, amounting to \$18,300, together with report of the Comptroller, to whom this matter was referred

on December 4, 1908, recommending the issue of \$18,000 Corporate Stock, pursuant to chapter 537, Laws of 1893, as amended, for this purpose:

SIR:—In the matter of the report of the Change of Grade Damage Commission for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$18,000, to provide for expenses of said Commission during the year 1909, I beg to report as follows:

This request is made in pursuance of chapter 537, Laws of 1893, as amended, which provides that the expenses of the Commission shall be paid from the proceeds of bonds issued by the Comptroller.

These expenses are estimated by the Commission for the year 1909, as follows:

—and, as will be seen, consist chiefly of the salaries of the Commissioners and their Assistants, the former being fixed at these rates by the Statute and the latter by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the exception of that of the Messenger, which is now fixed at \$60 per annum, an application for the higher rate not having yet been granted and provision for which cannot, therefore, now be allowed.

The amount of this estimate is \$300 in excess of that submitted by the Commission for the year 1908, the excess being accounted for by the proposed increase in the salary of the Messenger.

In the report of this Bureau on the 1908 estimate it was stated that \$18,000 appeared to be somewhat in excess of the needs of the Commission, as shown by its expenditures in 1907, there being a prospective surplus of some \$2,000 in the account for that year which would be available for 1908 expenses, and it was, therefore, recommended that the bond issues for the year for this purpose should be limited to \$16,000.

The books of this Department show, however, that the surplus indicated early in November, the date of the report, was reduced by the close of the year to some \$1,300, but notwithstanding this, the amount recommended has proved sufficient, the indicated surplus for 1908 being some \$200.

It thus appears that the actual expenses of the Commission for the year 1908 will be in excess of \$17,000, and it is, therefore, recommended that an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$18,000 be authorized for the expenses of the Change of Grade Damage Commission during the year 1909.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Comptroller referring to a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated December 24, 1908, relative to the acquisition by The City of New York from the United States Government of certain property in the Borough of Richmond required for the widening of Stuyvesant place, from South street to the southerly line of Weber place, stating that at a meeting of the Board held May 29, 1903, a resolution was adopted authorizing the acquisition of title to the lands and premises required for the

opening, extending and widening of South street, from Stuyvesant place to the bulkhead line, etc., and authorizing the Comptroller to negotiate with the Secretary of Commerce and Labor for the purchase of same; that the Committee appointed by the Government has treated the City in a generous manner in its report, and he recommends that the City pay the full amount in question, namely, \$46,514.44, upon the receipt of a deed of the premises, which should provide that the Government build the retaining wall and make such repairs and removals as it may deem necessary and proper.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—The President of the Borough of Richmond, in a communication dated December 24, 1908, transmits a copy of a communication and report received from the Hon. Charles Earl, Solicitor of the Department of Commerce and Labor and Chairman of the Special Lighthouse Property Committee, representing the United States Government, which report recommends certain positive action by the Secretary of the Department of Commerce and Labor in the matter of the sale by the United States Government and acquisition on the part of The City of New York of certain property in the Borough of Richmond necessary for the widening of Stuyvesant place from South street to the southerly line of Weiner place.

The matter of the acquisition of this property for the use of the President of the Borough of Richmond for widening said street was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held May 29, 1903, at which time a resolution was adopted in accordance with the provisions of section 970 of the Greater New York Charter, authorizing that the title in the lands and premises required for the opening, extending and widening of South street, from Stuyvesant place to the bulkhead line; Hyatt street, from Central avenue to Stuyvesant place; Jay street, from Richmond terrace to South street; Stuyvesant place, from South street to the southerly line of Weiner place, should be acquired by The City of New York; that the Corporation Counsel was requested to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings to acquire such title wherever the same had not been heretofore acquired, and that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be borne and paid for by The City of New York.

At a meeting of said Board held April 14, 1905, on motion of the President of the Borough of Richmond, a resolution was adopted which stated that the Congress of the United States, with the approval of the President, on March 1, 1905, authorized the Secretary of Commerce and Labor to sell and convey to The City of New York such property owned by the Government, used at present for Lighthouse Board purposes, as is included in the map upon which the proceedings were initiated May 29, 1903, and the Comptroller was authorized to negotiate on such terms as may be possible with said Secretary of Commerce and Labor, and that payment therefor, together with the bills for services of appraisers who were necessarily employed in order to present the case to the Government, be made out of the Fund for Street and Park Openings.

The report of the Solicitor of the Department of Commerce and Labor, transmitted by the President of the Borough in his communication of December 24, 1908, recites the passage of the act of Congress, that it became a law March 1, 1905, and states that the Committee on behalf of the Government submitted a joint report, which, after a complete review of all the facts of the case, recommended the sale to The City of New York, Borough of Richmond, of the one acre of ground in question, which sale they said would not be prejudicial to the interests of the Government, provided that the purchase money should be made available by the terms of a bill at that time before Congress, to improve the lighthouse property at Tompkinsville. This report was made February 16, 1905.

The Committee states in substance that on account of the long delay in the matter of negotiations for the acquisition of this property, the governmental appropriation by which such proceeds were to be added ceased to exist, by reason of the lapse of time since the passage of the act. The proceeds of the sale could not now be applied to the improvement of the lighthouse property, but must be covered into the treasury to the credit of the surplus fund. The Committee does not regard the fact as a serious objection to the consummation of the sale for two reasons:

First—Because the City of New York is willing as a condition of the transfer, or as part of the consideration, to provide for the restoration of any lighthouse property damaged or destroyed, and for putting the property remaining to the Government in proper condition.

Second—Because it must be assumed that Congress in its yearly appropriations will provide any funds necessary for the maintenance and improvement of the lighthouse establishment at Tompkinsville.

The Committee then, in its report, gives three appraisals, namely:

Moffatt & Schwab,	\$30,000 00
Charles E. Griffin, Jr.,	30,404 50
H. G. Van Vechten,	32,000 00

—showing that the average was \$30,801 50.

The United States Government had three appraisals, namely:

Bernard Malila,	\$33,148 56
D. T. Campbell,	35,297 00
Cornelius H. Koff,	41,773 00

—averaging \$36,739.55.

That in view of the length of time that has elapsed since these appraisals were made, the Committee, upon inquiry, believes that there has been an enhancement in land values in Tompkinsville within the past three years averaging from 15 per cent. to 25 per cent.; that such an enhancement, so far as the lighthouse property is concerned, is wholly due to the public improvements made or in the course of being made by the Borough of Richmond, and under these circumstances the Committee believes that the price to be charged should be determined in accordance with the appraisements originally made when the City offered to buy, and when it would have bought had the governmental department been prepared to sell. The Committee does not deem it fair to add to the appraised valuation the increased value which has since accrued, and which is not only an unearned increment, so far as the department is concerned, but which is due to the great expenditures made by the City in furtherance of which the land in question is desired, and taking an average of the appraisals made for the Department, the Committee recommends the price for the land to be fixed at \$36,739.55.

The Committee further states that the necessity of restoring the remaining lighthouse property to its original condition, or repairing the damages caused by taking the property in question, makes it necessary to increase the price above mentioned by several items of expense, if the work of restoration is to be done by the Lighthouse Board. If, however, the City prefers to do this work, it should be made one of the terms and conditions of the transfer.

The items referred to are the building of a new retaining wall in place of the existing wall, in accordance with the plans and specifications of the Engineer of the Third Lighthouse District, at an estimated cost of	\$7,500 00
The building of a temporary fence and the removal of the old	600 00
The removal of the Engineer's chicken house and the erection of a wall to retain the same	300 00
The rebuilding of the Inspector's stable and chicken house	575 00
The rebuilding of the Inspector's greenhouse	900 00

Total (error in footing, to be original)

—and involving as above noted an additional charge of \$9,775. This sum, added to the valuation of the land above given, provided the Government is to do the work, makes an expenditure on the part of the City of \$46,514.55, which amount the Committee recommends to be accepted in full payment for the property and damages and rebuilding in question.

The President of the Borough of Richmond, in a letter to the Committee, dated August 8, 1908, states that he is inclined to think that the construction by the City of the retaining wall along and on the lighthouse property should be included as a part of the consideration in the purchase.

As to moving or rebuilding lighthouse property structures affected (meaning greenhouses, stables, etc.), while the cost would probably be included in the Com-

ptroller's estimate of damage, he does not think that the City could legally enter into a contract for the work itself, and that he would prefer even not to build the retaining wall.

The Committee, commenting on this, states that whether the work of restoration be done by the City in accordance with the plan and specifications of the Engineer of the Third Lighthouse District, or by the lighthouse establishment itself, would appear to be immaterial so far as the Department is concerned, except that if the work is done by the lighthouse establishment, it will be necessary to secure from Congress the necessary funds to reimburse the existing appropriation. If the matter of the retaining wall were attended to by the Borough of Richmond, involving an estimated expenditure of \$7,500, the drain on the current appropriation for repairs for the remaining items would not prove very severe, since that amount is estimated at only \$2,275.

In the latter event the purchase money would be correspondingly reduced by the estimated cost of the work of reconstruction undertaken by the City; that is to say, by the sum of \$7,500, which would fix the amount of the purchase price at \$39,014.55.

There are two propositions before the Board which the Lighthouse Board has put up to the City.

A. To pay to the Government the sum of \$46,514.55, which amount would cover the costs of acquisition of the property and the construction by the Government of the retaining wall, removal and replacement of all out-buildings.

B. The payment by the City of the sum of \$39,014.55 to the Government, which amount is the purchase price and \$2,275, the cost and expense of removal and replacement of the stables, greenhouses and chicken houses. The President of the Borough would then have to build the retaining wall.

In the event of the City paying the full amount, namely, \$46,514.55, the Government would do all the work. In the payment of the smaller amount, the City would do part of the work, the Government would do the remaining part, and the City would furnish a bond with sufficient security, guaranteeing the due performance within a reasonable time of the work of restoration, removal and rebuilding above mentioned.

I am of the opinion that the Committee, consisting of Charles Earl, Solicitor; A. Marx, Chairman of the Lighthouse Board, and Robert L. Campbell, Chief of the Division of Naturalization, have treated the City in a generous manner in their report to the Government; that the Government, on its part, in approving of the action of the Committee, is also entitled to consideration, and I believe that the City should pay to the Government the full amount of money in question, namely, \$46,514.55, upon the receipt of a deed of the premises, which should recite, in addition to the metes and bounds of the property to be conveyed, the fact that the Government will build the retaining wall and make such repairs and removals as it may deem necessary and proper, as expressed in the report of the said Committee to the Hon. Charles S. Strauss, Secretary of Commerce and Labor, dated December 9, 1908, and I so recommend.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, adopted a resolution authorizing the acquisition of the fee of the land and premises required for the opening, extending and widening of the following streets: South street, from Stuyvesant place to the bulkhead line; Hyatt street, from Central avenue to Stuyvesant place; Jay street, from Richmond terrace to South street; Stuyvesant place, from South street to the southerly line of Weiner place; unnamed street (an extension of Stuyvesant place), from the southerly line of Weiner place to its intersection with the easterly line of Griffin street, and Griffin street, from said intersection with unnamed street to the northerly line of Hannah street, in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York; and

Whereas, This Board, on April 14, 1905, adopted a resolution authorizing the Comptroller of The City of New York to negotiate with the Secretary of Commerce and Labor, representing the Congress of the United States, for the conveyance and sale to The City of New York of property owned by the Government, used at present for Lighthouse Board purposes, and included in the foregoing proceedings; and

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to this Board that the property hereinafter described may be acquired from the United States Government at a fair market value; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the Comptroller to enter into contracts for the acquisition of a strip of land, included within the premises occupied by the Lighthouse Board, situated at the southeast corner of South street and Stuyvesant place, Borough of Richmond, at a price not exceeding forty-six thousand five hundred and fourteen dollars and fifty-five cents (\$46,514.55) and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the southerly line of South street and the easterly line of Stuyvesant place; thence southerly along said easterly line of Stuyvesant place 417.75 feet to the southerly line of the lands of the United States Government; thence easterly deflecting 93 degrees 26 minutes 06 seconds to the left 50.00 feet; thence northerly parallel to the first course 104.62 feet; thence northerly and easterly curving to the right on the arc of a circle of 305.65 feet radius tangent to the preceding course 483.93 feet to the southerly line of South street; thence westerly along the southerly side of South street 359.50 feet to the point of beginning.

—said contracts to contain a clause that the United States Government agrees to build the retaining wall, in place of the existing wall, in accordance with the plans and specifications of the Engineer of the Third Lighthouse District, to build fences on its property, to remove and replace all outbuildings and make such other repairs as it may deem necessary and proper, and that same shall be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Secretary presented the following resolution of the Board of Aldermen, requesting an issue of \$65,600 Special Revenue Bonds (subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter) to meet deficits in appropriations for the year 1908, for the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, as set forth therein (referred to the Comptroller on November 13, 1908); communication from the President, Board of Trustees of said hospitals, requesting favorable action thereon (referred to the Comptroller on December 11, 1908), together with report of the Comptroller, recommending the issue as requested:

(On December 18, 1908, this matter was laid over.)

In the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of sixty-five thousand six hundred dollars (\$65,600), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the purpose of meeting deficits in several appropriations for the year 1908, as follows:

SIR—In regard to the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen October 20, 1908, requesting that the Comptroller be authorized to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$65,600, the proceeds to be used by the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals in meeting deficits in sundry appropriations made to said hospitals for the year 1908, referred to the Comptroller and by you to this Bureau for examination. I beg to report as follows:

The actual deficit of over \$60,000 in said appropriations has been reduced to \$65,600 by the transfer from appropriations for salaries of a surplus due chiefly to the employment of post-graduate and pupil nurses at \$300 and less per annum in place of graduate nurses at \$600 as had been anticipated.

Request was then made for the issue of bonds as recommended in said resolution to meet deficiencies of appropriations as follows:

SIR—In regard to the modification of the salary schedules supporting the Budget appropriations of the Department of Finance for 1909, in accordance with the provisions of a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of December 11, 1908, submitted by you for consideration to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, your Examiner respectfully reports:

The modified schedules attached to and part of this report affect such Bureaus or Divisions where changes in the personnel or amount to be disbursed are contemplated or already made under the resolution of December 11, 1908, previously referred to. The amount in total is identical and the transfer necessary to make the modifications operative are from salary accounts to salary accounts and are all within the appropriations available for salaries for the year.

The effect of the modified schedules herin submitted is the elimination of many Bureau or Division accounts and consolidation under those Divisions along the actual working lines of the Department with reference to its official head.

Under the modified schedules the Department is separated into seven principal divisions, under the Comptroller, as follows:

1. Main Division.
2. Auditing Bureau.
3. Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics.
4. Bureau for the Collection of Revenue.
5. Bureau for the Collection of Taxes.
6. Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears.
7. The Chamberlain.

The Main Division under this plan consists of the various Bureaus and Divisions of the Department, which work in close relation to the Comptroller, as follows: Executive, Chief Clerk, Bookkeeping, Awards, Charities, Stock and Bond, Real Estate, Contract.

The activities consolidated in the schedule of the Auditing Bureau are: Auditors, Inspectors, Engineers, Law and Adjustment Staff, Claims, City Paymaster.

The revised schedule of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics consists of all those employees of the Department who are engaged in statistical work or in the systematizing of accounts.

The revised schedule of the Bureau for the Collection of Taxes is a consolidation of schedules formerly separated by Boroughs. The same consolidation is made for the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears.

The schedule of the Bureau for the Collection of Revenue continues its present functions, as does the schedule of the Chamberlain's office.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President, Borough of Manhattan, relative to and report of the Comptroller, recommending modifications of the schedules of Salaries and Salaries and Wages accompanying the Budget for the year 1909, OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, involving a transfer of funds but no additional appropriation:

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In the Budget appropriation for the operation of this Department for the ensuing year I find several omissions that have been made, presumably through inadvertence, which should be rectified before the beginning of the year and provision made for employees who were actually employed in the service and whose names were on the June payroll, which was made the basis of the amount allowed.

In the Bureau of Incumbrances seven (7) Inspectors are now and have been employed since the June payroll, a vacancy having been filled that existed prior to that time. Six (6) Inspectors were allowed in the Budget, leaving one not provided for, undoubtedly due to the fact that only six Inspectors appeared on the June payroll. Provision is therefore requested for one Inspector at \$1,200 per annum. There are two (2) Laborers in this Bureau receiving \$2 each per day, who work 365 days, performing the duties of Watchmen on Sundays and holidays. The Budget provides wages for them at \$2.50 each per day for 313 days, which will make necessary the employment of an additional Watchman. I request that provision be made for their employment at 365 days each, or 52 additional days at \$2.50 each per day, \$260.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices—General Administration.

The transfer of one Clerk, at \$1,500 per annum, from the Maintenance Force to General Administration, was asked for in the departmental estimate. Through some error or oversight, no provision was made for the position in either schedule.

Maintenance of Public Buildings and Offices.

Five additional Engineers for the various public buildings were allowed for 1909, and three Firemen and Stokers were not provided for. This addition to the force is due to the Civil Service requirements prohibiting Firemen and Stokers from performing the duties of Engineers. The three Firemen should be provided for, as their services are necessary. The amount required for their employment will be \$3,285.

The amount allowed for Laborers is \$17,326.17 less than the June payroll called for, which means a reduction in the force of about twenty men. The care and maintenance of the large number of public buildings under the jurisdiction of this Department require the employment of the present force, and provision should be made for their retention.

Public Baths and Comfort Stations.

Ten additional Engineers were allowed for the public baths for next year, but eleven Firemen and Stokers were not provided for, which will seriously impair the force and interfere with the proper operation of the baths.

The present number employed is not excessive for the work required of them. If this reduction is made, the force remaining will be compelled, by overtime work, to perform the duties of the Firemen and Stokers not provided for. From an economic standpoint, the anticipated saving from the reduction of force is therefore not apparent. Provision should therefore be made for eleven Firemen and Stokers at \$3 each per day—\$12,045.

Bureau of Buildings—Administration.

Three additional Clerks at \$900 each per annum were appointed, for which Special Revenue Bonds were provided, subsequent to June, and presumably because of the failure of their names to appear on the June payroll, no provision was made for their continuance during 1909. I therefore request that sufficient funds amounting to \$2,700 be provided for their retention.

SIR—In regard to two communications from the President of the Borough of Manhattan to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated respectively December 10, 1908, and January 12, 1909, requesting that said Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of revised Supporting Schedules and Schedules of Salaries and Salaries and Wages. In the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan for the year 1909, which matter was referred to you by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration and report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 11, 1908, the President of the Borough of Manhattan requests certain modifications of the Salary and Salary and Wages schedules of that office, as set forth in the accompanying revised Supporting Schedules and Schedules of Salaries and Salaries and Wages.

The following changes may be specifically noted:

The addition of Storekeeper, at \$1,800 a year, in the schedule Maintenance of Public Buildings and Offices, is accounted for by the fact that a Foreman at \$5 a day was appointed Storekeeper subsequent to June 30, 1908, and the \$1,800 has been deducted from the item Foreman, \$24,580.

The addition of a Telephone Operator, at \$750, in the same schedule (1316), was made necessary by the addition of two Telephone Operators to the telephone company, and is also charged to the item Foreman.

In the Bureau of Sewers Administration, the salary of the Superintendent of Construction had been increased in October, 1908, from \$2,550 to \$3,000, to conform to salaries of similar positions in the Bureau.

In the Bureau of Buildings a number of changes are made among the different Inspectors, in order to secure a more effective distribution of the various functions.

The other changes are of a trifling character, and are designed to obtain a better adjustment of the Bureau staffs.

In the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices Administration a Clerk at \$1,500 per annum was inadvertently omitted from the Budget, and provision is made for the salary of the position by transfer.

In the application for revision of the schedules the Borough President keeps within the appropriation in the Budget for 1909 for salaries, and I therefore recommend that the request be granted.

SIR:—In regard to several communications of the President of the Borough of Richmond, under dates November 14, November 20 and December 28, 29 and 30, 1908, all referring to modifications of the Budget appropriations for 1909, and referred by you to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, your examiner submits the following report:

The total Budget appropriation for the President of the Borough for 1909 is \$776,069 60.

Under date of December 30, 1908, the President submitted a modification of the schedule of appropriations, under the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of December 11, 1908, which contemplates the expenditure of an identical amount, and, after consulting with the Acting Commissioner of Public Works with reference to some suggested changes, your examiner submits modified schedules which he respectfully recommends be substituted for the schedules as adopted in the Budget for 1909.

There appear to be no radical changes except as in the distribution of the appropriation Bureau of Engineering, Division for Making Maps for Street Openings, items Nos. 1454, 1455, 1456, 1457 and 1458 in the Budget for 1909. The Borough President has fully set forth his reason for desiring the transfer of this account to that of General Administration Account Nos. 1429 and 1430 in his communications to the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment previously referred to, and your examiner recommends that the sum of \$33,150 be transferred from the account Bureau of Engineering, Division for Making Maps for Street Openings (1454), Salary and Wages, to the account General Administration (1429), Salaries, making the modified total for salaries in the account \$80,510, as shown in the modified schedule which is a part of this report.

Your examiner recommends that the sum of \$1,400 be transferred from the account Bureau of Engineering, Division for Making Maps for Street Openings (1455), General Supplies, to the account General Administration (1430), Contingencies, the sum of \$250 from the same Bureau (1456) Repairs and Replacements by Contracts or Open Orders to the same account, the sum of \$1,250 from the same Bureau account (1457) Apparatus, Machinery, Vehicles, Horses, Equipment, Care and Storage of Same, to the same account previously referred to, and the sum of \$1,350 from the same Bureau account (1458) Contingencies to the above account (1430) Contingencies, making a total of \$7,800 as the modified total in the account (1430) Contingencies. Also \$2,350 from the account Bureau of Street Cleaning, Administration (1415), Salaries and Wages, to the account (1438) General Supplies; \$1,680 from the account (1436) Maintenance and Final Disposition to the account (1438) General Sup-

Sir—In regard to a communication presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Secretary of the Board of Health on December 31, 1908, transmitting copies of preambles and resolution adopted by said Board of Health on December 30, 1908, requesting the approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of revised "Supporting Schedules and Schedules of Salaries and Salaries and Wages" for the year 1909, which matter was referred to you by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration and report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, I beg to report as follows:

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making the Budget for 1909 took into consideration the estimate presented by the Department of Health, which was formulated on the lines of Departmental organization as they existed on June 30, 1908, in establishing Budgetary "Supporting Schedules and Schedules of Salaries and Salaries and Wages."

It appears that the Department of Health, subsequent to June 30, 1908, made certain changes in its organization, claimed to be necessary for the better management of the Department, and the administration of the Budget appropriation for 1909 became impracticable under the conditions imposed by its "Supporting Schedules."

Under the revised schedules presented the Department has eliminated the Borough administrative function included under the caption "Office of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent," the employees having been assigned mainly to the Division of District Medical Inspection, while the Assistant Sanitary Superintendents have been assigned under the immediate supervision of the Sanitary Superintendent.

The various divisions or offices of "Assistant Chief Clerks," "Assistant Registrars of Records," "Child Hygiene," "District Medical Inspection," "Communicable Diseases," "Sanitary Inspection," "Food Inspection" and "Sanitary Police," formerly supervised by an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent in each Borough, have each been placed under the direction of one "Chief of Bureau."

It is claimed by the Department of Health that because of its functions it should not be restricted in its privilege to assign to any Borough at any time as large or as small a force as may be required to avert emergent danger to the public health.

Further schedule consolidations are the amalgamation of the office of the Law Clerk with that of the Secretary, the office of the Superintendent of Hospitals with that of the Sanitary Superintendent, the Vaccine Laboratory with the Division of Communicable Diseases, the Vaccine Laboratory with the Research Laboratory, and the Hospital Clinic for Contagious Eye Diseases, Manhattan, with that of Brooklyn.

Following is a comparative statement showing the amounts included in the revised schedules submitted as contrasted with the amounts included in the 1907 Budget for the support of the same functions as originally adopted:

It would appear from the above that the Department proposes to apply the aggregate sum of \$36,241 estimated to be in excess of the requirements for the support of

certain functions included in the 1909 Budget to other activities for which it is claimed sufficient funds have been allowed.

The greatest deficiency appears to exist in the allowance made for sanitary inspection, \$29,190, which is met by diversion of funds allowed for the support of the offices of the Chief Clerk, Food Inspection, Riverside Hospital, Child Hygiene and District Medical Inspection.

The revised schedules submitted by the Board of Health provide for the allowance of \$4,800 for two Sanitary Engineers in the office of the Commissioner, who had been transferred from the office of the Sanitary Superintendent and are still on the payroll of the Department. Your Examiner has approved the restoration of these titles to the schedules on the statement of the Sanitary Superintendent of the Department that the services of employees under this title are required for the work of the Department of Health.

Attached hereto is a statement showing positions added to or eliminated from the schedules of Salaries and Salaries and Wages supporting the Budget for 1909 by the revised schedule submitted by the Board of Health.

Your Examiner is assured by the Sanitary Superintendent that there are no salary increases over the existing schedules provided for in the revised schedules, and that the schedules as revised represent an adequate permanent working force for the Department for the year, and that no added force will be asked for during the year unless for emergency work, and only for such period as such emergency may exist.

At a meeting of the Board of Health held on January 6, 1909, the revised Supporting Schedules and Schedules of Salaries and Salaries and Wages presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 31, 1908, being faulty as to form, were by resolution withdrawn, and the accompanying revised schedules, the form of which was suggested by your Examiner, were substituted.

In view of the changes in the organization of the Department of Health subsequent to June 30, 1908, and its close adherence to the amount appropriated for the support of each specific function in the Budget for 1909, I respectfully recommend that the revised schedules be accepted and the necessary Budget transfers be approved.

The transfer of the amount of \$5,605.60 provided for the compensation of Carpenters and Riveters to appropriation for such repairs and replacements as are done by contract or open order, is explained by the fact that it is contemplated by the Commissioner that certain repairs and replacements for which said Carpenters and Riveters were provided shall be done by the mechanics of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge force during 1909, as is the present custom. The requested transfer appears to be proper and its allowance is recommended. The proposed transfer from Laborers, \$1,800, to Bridge Keeper and Bridge Tender, \$1,800, in the appropriation made for Bridges in the Borough of Brooklyn, Salaries and Wages, is not a transfer from one appropriation to another appropriation, but simply a modification of the schedule supporting the appropriation with which such charges are proposed.

The following resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 11, 1908:

"Resolved, That the heads of the various departments, bureaus and offices of The City of New York and the Comptroller included therein, for the maintenance of which during 1909 items for Salaries, Salaries and Wages, or both were included in the Budget for 1909 (schedules supporting which were made a part of such Budgets by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment), be requested to submit to the Comptroller such modifications of said Salary and Salary and Wages schedule as they may deem necessary for the proper operation of their said departments, bureaus or offices during the ensuing year; that in the preparation of such schedules provision should be made for strict compliance with the Civil Service rules requiring that work or employment in all cases shall be limited to the performance of the appropriate duties of the Civil Service designation of the employees; and that this information be submitted in the Comptroller prior to January 1, 1909, bearing in mind that such modifications of organization must be within the Budget allowance for said department and the transfers must be made within Budget accounts existing in the Budget as adopted for the year 1909."

Upon receipt of this resolution examination was made of the Budget for 1909, Schedule No. 864, Special School Fund, Maintenance Bureau of Buildings, Division of Repairs of Buildings, Salaries and Wages, and it was found that the total appropriation aggregates \$190,286 21.

Taking the salaries of the persons now employed and also employed in June last, it is found that the amount granted is insufficient to meet the same by the sum of \$26,484 29.

This deficiency is due to the fact that during the month of June last a number of the Inspectors and Draughtsmen who for years have been employed on general repairs, etc., were for the time during the emergency employed upon and paid from the Fire Protection Account, which account is now practically exhausted.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—In the matter of sundry communications from several committees of the Board of Education, pursuant to the resolution passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 11, 1908, requesting the heads of the various Departments, Bureaus and offices of The City of New York to submit to the Comptroller such

modifications of the Salaries and Salaries and Wages schedules included in the Budget for 1909 as they may deem necessary for the proper operation of their said Departments, Bureaus and offices during the ensuing year, which communications have been referred in this Bureau by you, I beg to report as follows:

The Committee on Buildings requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to amend the Budget for 1909, Schedule No. 864, Special School Fund, Maintenance, Bureau of Buildings, Division of Repairs of Buildings, Salaries and Wages, so as to include the following positions and salaries:

The Budget allowance for 1909 for Salaries and Wages, Bureau of Buildings, Division of Repairs (No. 864), aggregates \$190,286.91. Said account includes all disbursements for salaries and wages for the corps of Inspectors, Draughtsmen, etc., employed in the general repair of school buildings and furniture. The salaries of said employees have hitherto been paid from the General Repairs and Furniture and Repairs of appropriations for the several Boroughs.

The Budget allowance for said account for 1909 was based upon figures showing total disbursements for the purposes thereof for the eighteen months preceding June 30, 1908, as furnished by the Auditor of the Department of Education and embodied in the Departmental estimate for 1909, which figures are as follows:

It appears from the above statement that the total disbursements from Budget appropriations for salaries and wages of said Inspectors, Draughtsmen, etc., in the Building Bureau for the six month period ending with June, 1907, aggregate \$76,410.95, which sum represents an annual expense basis of \$152,821.90. The corresponding expenditures for the six month period ending December 31, 1907, aggregate \$83,492.26, and represent an annual expense basis of \$166,984.52. Similar disbursements for the six month period ending June 30, 1908, aggregate \$58,994.83, and represent an annual expense basis of \$117,989.66.

In the light of the above figures, the Budget allowance for 1909 for the salaries and wages of Inspectors, Draughtsmen, etc., engaged in the work of the general repair of school buildings and furniture would appear to be sufficient for the purposes thereof, and your Examiner would, therefore, recommend that no increase therein be provided for at this time.

The Executive Committee on the Nautical School requests that Schedule No. 859, Salaries and Wages, Nautical School, be modified by striking therefrom the line "Blacksmith, \$600," and inserting in lieu thereof "Yeoman, \$600." Inasmuch as said modification is within the appropriation allowed it is recommended that said modification be made.

The Committee on Supplies makes sundry requests for modifications, all of which are within the appropriations allowed, except in the case of the appropriation for salaries in the office of the Supervisor of Lectures. The Chairman of said Committee states that in said office "two vacancies existed in June, 1908, and as the payroll of that month was taken for a Budget basis, the two positions were inadvertently excluded by your office when revising appropriation figures." It is, therefore, proposed to correct said omission by appointing one additional Clerk at \$750 and one Librarian at \$900. An examination of the Budget Salary Schedule for the Lecture Bureau for 1909 (No. 870), and a comparison of the same with the corresponding estimate submitted by the Board of Education (Departmental Estimate, p. 414), discloses some discrepancy of fact in the statement quoted above. The Board of Education requested provision to be made for six positions in said Lecture Bureau for 1909, all of which were provided for in the Budget, the only difference between said estimate for 1908 (\$6,550), and the corresponding Budget schedule (\$6,300) being that two requested increases, one of \$100 for a \$300 Clerk and one of \$150 for a \$1,050 Stenographer and Typewriter were not granted in the Budget.

In the office of the Auditor, the resignation of certain persons and the filling of their places by the promotion of other employees in said office, and the employment of others at minimum salaries, have reduced the expense basis to \$50,300 per year for 44 employees, as against \$53,170 for 45 employees in June, 1908. These changes have, in effect, lowered the efficiency of the staff as a whole, and thereby rendered necessary the obtaining of additional help of higher grade and larger experience. It is, therefore, proposed to add one Clerk at \$1,200 per annum, one Clerk at \$900, and one at \$600 to the present staff, all of which can be done within the appropriation allowed.

In the offices of the District Superintendents one Stenographer and Typewriter was promoted from \$750 to \$900, August 18, 1908; one from \$600 to \$750, November 1, 1908, and two from \$600 to \$750 on November 19. It is proposed to offset said increases aggregating \$600 per year by employing one less Stenographer and Typewriter at \$600 per year than was on the payroll of June, 1908.

In the office of the Superintendent of School Supplies one Clerk at \$900 and one Typewriter Copyist at \$750 have been transferred since June, 1908, and one Stenographer and Typewriter at \$1,175, and one Laborer at \$1,050 have died. Their places

have been filled by two Clerks at \$300, one Stenographer and Typewriter at \$900, one Cleaner at \$600, and one Typewriting Copyist, temporarily employed at \$1,050. In addition to the above changes, the salary of one Clerk has been increased from \$480 to \$600, and the title of a \$1,500 Clerk changed to Auto-truck Engineman and Mechanic. It is proposed to modify the Budget salary schedules accordingly.

In the office of the Superintendent of School Buildings, the title of one Clerk at \$750 has been changed to that of Stenographer and Typewriter, and one Typewriting Copyist at \$900 has resigned. It is proposed to employ one Typewriting Copyist at \$600, and one Clerk at \$300, in place of a Typewriting Copyist who resigned, and to modify the Budget schedules so as to provide for said change, together with the above mentioned change of title.

In view of the fact that all of the modifications proposed by the Committee on Supplies, with the exception of those in the office of the Supervisor of Lectures, are within the appropriations allowed, it is recommended that, with said exception, they be made, as requested, together with the one in the Nautical School schedule hereinafter recommended, according to the resolution attached hereto.

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to request the permission of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to advertise for bids and award a contract for furnishing and setting of lighting fixtures in the new Bellevue Hospital Training School for Women Nurses. The cost of the work is estimated at \$10,000, but no additional appropriation will be required therefor, inasmuch as there is a sufficient balance of authorized and unissued Corporate Stock in the fund against which the contract is drawn. The Training School is practically completed, and the only work remaining to be done is the installation of the lighting fixtures. It is essential that the building should be occupied as soon as practicable, inasmuch as the recent opening of Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital necessitated the appointment of a number of additional Nurses, and these have had to be accommodated temporarily in an empty ward. The Trustees were about to advertise the work when the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution directing that approval must first be obtained before new contracts payable from Corporate Stock are entered into.

Sir—Under date of January 4, 1909, the Hon. John W. Brannan, President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to modify the resolution adopted by the Board on December 18, 1908, so far as to permit the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to proceed with the contract for furnishing and setting new lighting fixtures in the new Bellevue Hospital Training School for Women Nurses, located in East Twenty-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, the cost of which is not to exceed \$10,000.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment made an appropriation for the erection and completion of this Training School on June 22, 1906, and the contract for its erection was awarded and the building is substantially completed and ready for occupancy.

Neither gas or electric fixtures were provided for in the original contract, and in order to equip the building for the purposes for which it was designed, it will be necessary to provide gas and electric fixtures.

I believe the wording of the original resolution adopted by the Board appropriating the money for this building can be construed to permit of the purchase of these electric fixtures, and inasmuch as there is sufficient balance remaining from that appropriation, it will not be necessary to make a further issue of Corporate Stock.

If the financial condition of the City permit, I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment modify the resolution of December 18, 1908, so far as to permit the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to proceed with the execution of the contract for lighting fixtures in the new Bellevue Hospital Training School for Women Nurses, Borough of Manhattan.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The East River Terminal Railroad has under date of January 15, 1909, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate railroad tracks by locomotive steam power upon Wythe avenue, Kent avenue and North Fourth street in the Borough of Brooklyn;

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905 provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants;

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on June 26, 1908, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as September 9, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and the "Brooklyn Daily Times" newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing and the notice bearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the East River Terminal Railroad and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; and therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the East River Terminal Railroad containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to-wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the East River Terminal Railroad the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, including all the terms and conditions including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained and that the Mayor of the City of New York be and he is hereby authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of the City of New York as follows to-wit:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate railroad tracks either at the grade of the surface of the streets and avenues or above or below the grade thereof, as shall be determined by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York, pursuant to law, for the purpose of conveying goods, wares and merchandise only, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, as follows:

(a) Four tracks beginning at the westerly side of Wythe avenue, thence across Wythe avenue to the easterly side thereof, all of such tracks to be situated in the portion of Wythe avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a line parallel thereto crossing Wythe avenue about sixty (60) feet southerly therefrom.

(b) Six tracks beginning at the westerly side line of Kent avenue, thence across Kent avenue to the easterly side thereof, all of such tracks to be situated in the portion of Kent avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and the line parallel thereto, and crossing Kent avenue about one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly therefrom.

(c) One track beginning at the westerly side line of Kent avenue, thence curving northerly and easterly across Kent avenue and North Fourth street to the southerly side line of North Fourth street at a point about one hundred and ten (110) feet easterly from the easterly side line of Kent avenue. Said tracks hereby authorized are shown upon a map entitled:

"Plan showing proposed tracks on North Fourth street, Kent avenue and Wythe avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, N. Y., to Accompany Application, dated January 15, 1909, of the East River Terminal Railroad to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

and signed by the East River Terminal Railroad Company, W. R. Duncan, Jr., President, and approved by H. O. Havemeyer, Jr., dated June 1908, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be substantially followed. Provided that deviations therefrom which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract, may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this right or privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The company in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the Company within one month after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within one month thereafter make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railroad ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation at such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time, not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the renewal shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year of the original contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City, the Board, or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, less in no case than the annual rate so fixed by the Board prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders chosen in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company, these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as arbitrators and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such arbitrators shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as arbitrators and not as assessors. They may take their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inspection and investigation, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers and agents. The arbitrators so appointed, fixed and determined shall be compensated upon both parties, but no amount shall be paid, nor shall the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. It is agreed that the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. Upon the Company shall pay the annual sum hereinafter provided until the time the rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and maintenance of the said tracks shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same is renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term or upon the termination of the second yearly granted for any other reason as upon the termination of the Company between such terminations, the tracks of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets, avenues and highways shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (or the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days notice from the Board, remove and all of the tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the end and expense of the Company.

Fourth—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first ten (10) years of this contract, beginning on the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, an annual sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450).

During the succeeding five (5) years of this contract an annual sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900).

Such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30, next preceding.

And all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner by the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to all other taxes of whatsoever kind as shall be levied by the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any change in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions in this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property

therein, pass in or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, entered under the provisions of the Statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, with or without the consent of the City, or by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The Company shall commence construction of the railroad hereby authorized, within two (2) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that said railroad ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City as heretofore provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each, and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be duly commenced by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to high until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other extension of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any information or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall in writing consent that the Board enter in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, any intervention in any such proceedings.

Eighth—The work of construction of the tracks hereby authorized shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street, avenue or highway as a public highway.

Ninth—The street surface passenger railway now operated upon Kent avenue shall have the right of way over the tracks or track operated upon the tracks hereby authorized.

Tenth—Cars may be operated upon said tracks by steam locomotives, which shall be owned or leased as to conform with the type commonly known as the dummy engine, or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the existing property owners in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York, provided, however, that the Board may, at its discretion, and upon one year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railroad upon the steam or any portion of the tracks hereby authorized by one system of motive power as may be designated by the Board, and the Company shall thereupon discontinue the use of steam locomotives from such tracks.

Eleventh—Rolling passenger car vehicles shall be provided for crossing the tracks hereby authorized by the operation of such tracks by cars or trains operated thereon, for a period not less than ten consecutive minutes at any time, and the approach of such trains shall not exceed one minute in any time between 7 o'clock a. m. and 7 o'clock p. m.

Twelfth—Should the Company be allowed to operate at the grade of streets and avenues, it shall erect, maintain and operate gates across Kent avenue at or near the southerly side line of North Fourth street, and at a point about one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly from the said southerly side line of North Fourth street, also gates across Wythe avenue at or near the southerly side line of North Fourth street, and at a point about one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly from the said southerly side line of North Fourth street. Such gates shall be closed so as to exclude pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks hereby authorized, when cars or trains are operated thereon. In addition to such gates, the Company shall station flagmen at the intersection of Kent avenue and North Fourth street for the protection of persons and vehicles using North Fourth street. Should it seem necessary, in the opinion of the Board, that gates other than those herein required should be maintained for the protection of persons or property, the Company shall erect, maintain and operate such gates upon thirty (30) days notice by the Board to the Company.

Thirteenth—As long as the said tracks, or any portion thereof, shall remain in the streets, avenues or highways, the Company shall set the curbs and pave the roadway and sidewalks, and keep the same in proper repair, under such portion of the surface of Kent avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a point one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly therefrom, that portion of Wythe avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a point sixty (60) feet southerly therefrom, and that portion of North Fourth street between the tracks of the tracks hereby authorized in that street, and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond such rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. The City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any such streets, avenues or highways, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such replacement or altered pavement.

Fourteenth—The Company shall at all times keep that portion of the surface of Kent avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a point one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly therefrom, that portion of Wythe avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a point sixty (60) feet southerly therefrom, and that portion of North Fourth street between the tracks of the tracks hereby authorized in that street, and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond such rails on either side thereof, free and clear from snow and ice, provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for such winter cleaning, or part thereof, to clear an specified amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Fifteenth—Should the grades or lines of any street, avenue or highway in which said tracks are hereby authorized be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of such public improvement upon such street, avenue or highway, the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appliances at

its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Sixteenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a railroad shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railroad in any way interfere with the construction of public work in the streets or avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly, or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall at its own expense protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in a manner as directed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Seventeenth—Any alteration in the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other substructure or to any surface structures in the streets, or removal on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eighteenth—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railroad equipment, including rolling stock and railroad appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements may be necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Nineteenth—Said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City. Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route, written permits shall be obtained from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which these officials may impose as a condition upon which such permits are granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which these officials have jurisdiction.

Twentieth—The rates for carrying property over the tracks hereby authorized shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board, and be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company, and hearing had thereon, and when so fixed, such rates shall be binding upon the Company, and no rate or excess of those fixed shall be charged for such service.

Twenty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, total miles in operation and the miles of railroad constructed and operated under this contract and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers and assets.

Twenty-second—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited to a full benefit for the Corporation Council, on either of ten (10) days of the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision in the effect that the railroad constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-third—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service or fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any details on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon failure of the Company to remedy same within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the defect or defect remains pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures which may affect the safety of the streets, avenues or highways shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make any needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railroad authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to pay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any act or default of the Company.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of the construction of the railroad; and in the case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to obstruction of traffic, the maintenance of gates and flagmen, the repair of pavements and removal of snow and ice, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its President, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any default made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-sixth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Twenty-seventh—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when aforesaid provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-eighth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officers or officers.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent hereto, and further, all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted, affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the said Railroad Law and the terms and conditions hereinbefore stated, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf, to conform to and comply with and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, hereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, hereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or in the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purposes, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 220 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
