### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, July 1, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees, and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused: Messrs. Farley and O'Keefe.

The minutes of the meeting of June 17 were read and approved.

Bills, amounting to \$163,648.94, were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The efficiency of Bellevue Hospital would be increased very materially during the summer months by closing the Annex, Lusk Room and Townsend Cottage, the patients ordinarily cared for in these rooms being accommodated in the wards connected therewith. During the summer the census is usually low enough to make this possible. It would also make available for use throughout the hospital several Nurses who now must of necessity be assigned to these special rooms. This might also be done in one of the genito-urinary wards.

With the present assignment of the house staff at Gouverneur Hospital, on the first of July of each year the hospital is improperly covered so far as ambulance duty is concerned. With the short term of service and the vacancies occurring in regular appointments by reason of resignations, beginning to-day there are only two men eligible for ambulance duty, and their services are needed in the wards. It would seem desirable therefore to make some rearrangement of the length of service at Gouverneur, as has been done at Harlem, so that the hospital would not be crippled or embarrassed in this way during July of each year.

A request has been received from Miss Noyes for permission to promote Miss Mahlgren to the position of Acting Superintendent of Nurses at Harlem Hospital, Miss Tomlinson having tendered her resignation.

The present division of the surgical services at Fordham Hospital is unsatisfactory by reason of having one surgi-

cal ward divided, which involves two visiting staffs, so that practically all of the time of the Nurse in charge is occupied in making rounds with the visiting Surgeons. As there are four surgical wards, it would seem possible to arrange for an even assignment of the surgical service, which would overcome the above objection. The attention of the Medical Board of Fordham has been called to this matter, but as yet no action has been taken.

A request has been received from Dr. Norris, Director of Laboratories, for the appointment of Dr. B. L. Crawford as an Assistant Pathologist, without salary, to take the place of Dr. Youland, who resigned May 31.

A recommendation has been received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor for the transfer of \$14,000 within the appropriations for 1913.

The request for special revenue bonds now before the Board of Aldermen will have to be modified to meet the changed condition of the appropriations caused by these transfers.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to close for the summer months the Annex, Lusk Room and Townsend Cottage, as well as one of the genito-urinary wards at Bellevue Hospital.

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to bring to the attention of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital the need for a rearrangement of the house staff at that hospital, so that each interne will have a two year service.

The promotion of Miss Mahlgren to the position of Acting Superintendent of Nurses at Harlem Hospital was approved.

It was resolved to call the attention of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital to the unsatisfactory condition of the surgical service, and to insist upon a rearrangement of this service.

The appointment of Dr. B. L. Crawford as Resident Assistant Pathologist to Bellevue Hospital was approved.

It was resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve of the transfers within the appropriations for the year 1913 as recom-

mended by the Contract Clerk and Auditor.

### Reports of Committees.

The Conference Committee of the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. Clement C. Young as Assistant Gynaecologist to Out Patients, and Dr. Young was appointed accordingly.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Joseph E. Donnelly as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients; this report was approved, and Dr. Donnelly appointed accordingly.

The Committee of the Month at Harlem Hospital referred to the question of establishing night clinics for genito-urinary diseases at that hospital. A communication was also presented from one of the members of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School in regard to establishing night clinics at Bellevue Hospital. A committee composed of Mr. Paulding and Mr. Drummond was appointed to meet one from the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Medical Board, to discuss the subject of night clinics in the hospitals of the Department and to report at a future meeting.

### Communications.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital held on June 6, were presented. The recommendation that two Consulting Neurologists be appointed and the nomination of Drs. Byrne and Cornwell for these places were referred to the Conference Committee; the nominations for the position of Visiting Physician were referred to the Conference Committee, as was also the nomination of Dr. J. M. Sheridan as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, held on June 2, were presented. The recommendation that the hospital pay the fees for direct blood transfusion, instead of this being left to private subscription, was referred to the General Medical Superintendent, and the rule adopted by the Committee on Clinical Records, governing the method of making corrections to the clinical records, was approved.

The minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board, held on June 25, were presented. Three of the four applications received for the position of Assistant Physician to Out Patients (pediatrics), First Division, were referred to the Conference Committee, one candidate having withdrawn, the appointment of Dr. J. S. Meltzer as Interne on the Fourth Division for eighteen months from January 1, 1914, was cancelled, in view of his withdrawal.

A communication dated June 20, was presented from the State Board of Charities, enclosing a copy of a report of an inspection of the Fordham Hospital dispensary, which had been placed in Class One, as showing practically no defects.

A communication was presented from H. F. J. Porter, Industrial Engineer, in regard to his visits to the buildings of Bellevue Hospital, and stating that they can be made fireproof in accordance with his plans at very little expense, and that he would be willing to make an investigation and report on these buildings, similar to the investigation originally made for the Department of Public Charities, for a charge of \$250. After consideration, it was moved to employ Mr. Porter to make a report as suggested in his letter, at a charge not to exceed \$250.

A communication dated June 23, was received from Dr. S. S. Coldwater, expert on hospital construction, presenting an outline program for the new Sea Breeze Hospital at Rockaway, which was recently placed under the jurisdiction of the Department. This was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication from R. F. Almirall was presented, requesting authority for the omission of certain plumbing fixtures, due to the widening of the door of the roof ward at Fordham Hospital.

Resolved to approve of the omission of the fixtures enumerated by the architect.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital, held on June 24, were presented. The recommendation that diplomas be awarded to Dr. McKinley for twenty months' service, and to Dr. Lobsenz for one year's service, and that the other members of the house staff be advanced in the regular order, was approved.

A communication was presented from Daniel J. Ryan, contractor for the roof wards of Pavilions A and B, in reply to a letter from the Chairman of the Building Committee urging him to com-

plete his work, and stating that the delay has been caused by his inability to get the proper kind of brick. This communication was ordered placed on file.

Four copies of an assignment by the Charles L. Doran Contracting Co. of \$1,348 in favor of The Bronx National Bank, were presented. Consent was granted to this assignment, without guarantee as to amount and expressly subject to any claim, set-off or equity which The City of New York now has, or may hereafter have against the moneys or any part thereof covered by said assignment.

A communication dated June 17, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of two resolutions adopted on June 12, (1) approving of the transfer of \$403.51 within the appropriations of this Department for the year 1912, and (2) approving of the transfer of \$10,000 within the appropriations for 1913. This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on June 25, assigning to the Board of Inebriety two horses no longer required by this Department. This communication was placed on file.

A communication was presented from Dr. Edmond C. Linton, resigning from the place of Assistant Physician to Out Patients at Harlem Hospital. This resignation was accepted.

### Unfinished Business.

Consideration was given to the bids received on June 17, for soaps and laundry supplies, dry goods, gauze, x-ray plates and electric bulbs, and a communication in regard thereto dated June 23, was presented from the Contract Clerk and Auditor. In accordance with the recommendations contained therein, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To reject all bids received on lines 781 to 785, inclusive (x-ray plates); lines 792, 793, 794, 797, 799, 801 and 810 (soaps and laundry supplies), and lines 850 to 859, inclusive (electric bulbs), and to accept the lowest bids received on all other lines.

The President reported that the request of the Trustees for special revenue bonds in the amount of \$750, to pay the salaries of two Laboratory Assistants for the second half of the year 1913, had been placed on file by the Board of Aldermen, and that, as suggested by Dr. Biggs in a communication presented at last meeting, he had written to the Commissioner of Health to determine whether an arrangement could be made whereby the Department could secure some assistance from the funds which the Health Department has for the purpose of the diagnosis of venereal diseases. The action of the President was approved.

### New Business.

Mr. Sachs presented the question of engaging an expert in hospital organization to make a study, with view of suggesting a plan of reorganization for the medical administration of Bellevue Hospital, and moved that, in view of Mr. Pritchett in deferring this study, that he be empowered to confer in an informal and entirely unofficial manner with Dr. Abraham Flexner as to the probability of his accepting a proposition from the Trustees to undertake such a study. This motion was seconded and carried, Mr. Paulding and Dr. Brannan voting in the negative.

It was moved, seconded and carried, that the next meeting be held on Thursday, July 17, 1913.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

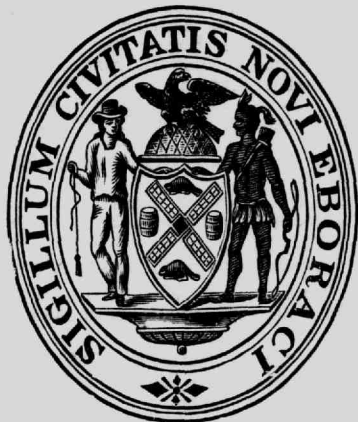

## Amendment to Rules.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held July 30, 1913, the following rules and regulations for the sale of dipped milk and cream in stores in The City of New York were adopted, to take effect on and after August 26, 1913:

1. Milk and cream shall not be stored, handled or sold in any stable, or in any room used for cooking or domestic purposes, or in any room which communicates directly with any such stable or room, or in any room in which there is a water-closet apartment or with which a water-closet apartment communicates, unless such apartment be enclosed by a vestibule, and both apartment and vestibule be properly ventilated to the external air.

2. The term "domestic purposes" shall be held to apply to rooms used for sleeping purposes or for cooking purposes other than the preparation of the midday meal.

3. Milk or cream shall not be handled or sold in any room which is unduly crowded.

4. Milk or cream shall not be dipped from cans stored in a room in which butter or cheese is manufactured.

5. Milk or cream may be stored in a cooling or refrigerating room, or ice chest, the construction of which has been approved by the Department.

6. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in a milk booth.

7. Milk shall be kept at a temperature of 50 degrees F., or below, at all times.

Equipment.

1. Rooms in which milk or cream is handled or sold shall be well lighted.

2. The floors, walls and ceilings shall be smooth, and must be kept clean and sanitary.

3. All windows and doors shall be properly screened.

4. An adequate supply of hot water shall be provided for the washing of utensils.

5. A sufficient number of properly constructed ice tubs, or other adequate refrigerating facilities, for cans of milk or cream shall be provided.

6. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be of the seamless sanitary type, heavily tinned.

Methods.

1. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in any room in which rubbish or dirty material is allowed to accumulate, or in which there are offensive odors.

2. All cans or other receptacles used for milk or cream shall be cleaned thoroughly upon emptying.

3. The cans from which milk or cream is dipped shall be packed in ice, and shall be kept covered at all times, except when the milk or cream is being actually dipped therefrom.

4. After each day's use all utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned with hot water and soda, and then with boiling water.

5. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be kept clean.

6. The ice tubs in which milk or cream is stored shall be painted inside and outside, and shall be kept clean at all times.

7. A separate dipper shall be provided for each can from which the supply is being served, and such dipper shall remain in the can between dipplings until all the milk in the can has been disposed of.

8. All goods sold in milk stores must be either in unbroken packages, or must be so placed, protected and handled that no dust or odors therefrom can injuriously affect the milk.

9. Dry sweeping and dusting in rooms in which milk or cream is dispensed is prohibited.

10. The tags on cans of milk or cream must be kept on file in the store for at least two months, for inspection by the Department of Health.

11. The attendants shall wear clean, washable outer clothing.

12. Only such persons shall be employed as are free from infectious disease which may be transmitted in the handling of milk.

Failure to comply with any of the above rules and regulations will be cause for prosecution.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held July 30, 1913, the following amendment to the rules and regulations of the Department of Health relating to the sale of milk, in so far as said amendment relates to Grade C, for cooking and manufacturing purposes only, was adopted, to take effect on and after August 26, 1913:

Definition.

Milk not conforming to the requirements of any of the subdivisions of Grade A or Grade B and which has been heated according to the rules and regulations of the Board of Health.

Requirements, Rules and Regulations.

Rules and regulations for the heating of Grade C milk:

No less than 160 degrees F. for at least 2 minutes; no less than 158 degrees F. for at least 3 minutes; no less than 155 degrees F. for at least 5 minutes; no less than 152 degrees F. for at least 10 minutes; no less than 148 degrees F. for at least 15 minutes; no less than 145 degrees F. for at least 18 minutes; no less than 140 degrees F. for at least 20 minutes.

The caps of all bottles containing milk of Grade C shall be white and shall contain in red the words "Grade C" in large type and "for cooking" in plainly visible type.

2. Cans containing milk of Grade C shall be painted red on necks or shall have properly sealed metal collar, painted red, on necks, and shall have affixed to them white tags with the words "Grade C, for cooking," printed thereon in red letters in large type.

All creameries handling milk of different grades will be required to demonstrate to the Department of Health that they are capable of keeping the grades separate, and must keep records satisfactory to the Department of Health concerning the amount of milk of each grade handled each day.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profit thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
