

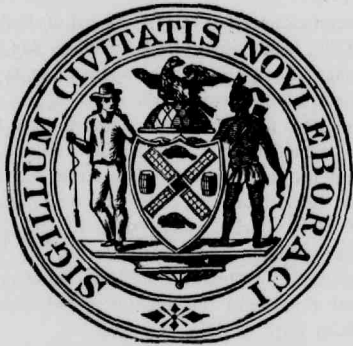

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, August 31, 1880.

The Comptroller of the City of New York herewith publishes in the CITY RECORD a full and detailed statement of the operations of the Finance Department during the year ending on the first day of August, 1880, pursuant to section 108 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, as follows:

"Section 108. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller to publish in the CITY RECORD, two months before the election of Charter officers, a full and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Corporation during the year ending on the first day of the month in which such publication is made, and the cash balance or surplus; and in every such statement the different sources of city revenue, and the amount received from each; the several appropriations made, the objects for which the same were made, and the amount of moneys expended under each; the moneys borrowed on the credit of the Corporation, the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which the same was obtained, shall be clearly and particularly specified."

A summary is presented below of the operations of the City Treasury; of "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," and of "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt."

The full and detailed statements required by the foregoing provision of law are published, together with Schedules annexed, designated "A," "B," and "C."

Schedule A exhibits "the moneys borrowed on the credit of the corporation, the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which the same was obtained," for the year ending August 1, 1880.

Schedule B exhibits "the several appropriations made (for 1880, and previous years as on August 1, 1879), the objects for which the same were made, the amount of moneys expended under each," as required by section 108 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the expenditures being for five months in 1879, and for seven months in 1880, comprising the year ending August 1, 1880.

Schedule C exhibits Payments from the City Treasury on account of State Taxes, and for each department and branch of the City Government, the Board of Education, Charitable Institutions, and all other objects and purposes, during the year ending August 1, 1880, under the several heads of Taxes, Proceeds of Stocks and Bonds, and Special and Trust Accounts, from which the moneys were paid.

#### THE CITY DEBT.

The bonded debt of the City of New York amounted fifty years ago to a very small sum, less than one million dollars. Within that period it increased, however, to an amount considerably more than one hundred millions; for the last three years it has been decreasing.

Previous to 1870, the bonded debt increased very slowly and steadily. For thirty years after 1830, with only trifling fluctuations, the yearly average increase of the amount of stocks and bonds of the corporation was but little more than half a million dollars. The exact amount at the beginning

of the year 1830, after deducting the Sinking Fund, was \$889,639.23; at the beginning of 1860 it was \$17,541,544.15.

At the beginning of 1870, the net debt was \$47,791,840.28, being an increase of \$30,250,296.13, during the preceding ten years, or an average increase yearly of \$3,000,000. The principal part of this increase, however, was after the year 1862, in consequence of the civil war expenditures and the enhanced prices and extravagance, public as well as private, growing out of the expansion of the currency of the country. In the year 1863, the net bonded debt increased from \$21,695,506.88, to \$26,185,190.26; and in 1869, from \$35,983,647.91 to \$47,791,840.28, or nearly twelve million dollars during the latter year.

In 1870 and 1871 the net debt increased from \$47,791,840.28 to \$88,369,386.90, principally through the corrupt and fraudulent acts of certain city officials, the history of which is well known to the public.

The gross bonded debt attained its maximum in 1877, but a large reduction was made in the net amount during that year, mainly through the operation of the Sinking Fund. Since that date both the gross and net debt have been largely reduced.

The amount of the gross debt, December 31, 1877, was \$148,821,057.54, and at the close of 1879 it was \$142,447,400.07, showing a decrease in the gross debt of \$6,373,657.47.

The amount of the net debt on December 31, 1876, was \$119,811,310.39, and on December 31, 1879, it was \$109,425,414.37, making a total decrease of \$10,385,896.02, the annual decrease being as follows:

NOTE.—The exhibit in the above table of a larger amount of bonded debt on the first of August of each year than is shown elsewhere to be outstanding on December 31st of each year, is accounted for by the issue of Revenue Bonds after the first of January, in anticipation of taxes, to be redeemed when they are collected at the close of the year.

The rate of interest on moneys borrowed during the same period has been from three and a half to four per cent. per annum on Revenue Bonds, issued in anticipation of taxes of the present year, and five per cent. on all other descriptions. The bonds were sold at a premium aggregating \$99,938.30.

#### REFUNDING THE BONDED DEBT.

An act (Chap. 552) was passed at the last session of the Legislature exempting future issues of stocks and bonds bearing interest not exceeding four and one-half per cent. per annum from municipal taxation, as follows:

Section 1. "The Commissioners of 'the Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt,' when duly authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, may, by concurrent resolution, direct that the bonds and stocks of said city, hereafter issued pursuant to law, shall be exempt from taxation by said city and by the county of New York, but not from taxation for



State purposes; and all bonds and stocks issued pursuant to such authority shall be exempt from taxation accordingly, provided that said bonds and stocks shall not bear interest exceeding the rate of four and one-half per cent. per annum."

Section 2. "The bonds and stocks of the City of New York, issued pursuant to the provisions of this statute, shall express upon their face the fact that they are exempt from taxation by the City and County of New York, but not from State taxation, and shall refer to this act, and to the ordinance of the Common Council, and the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing their issue."

Under the provisions of this law, the city will be enabled to issue bonds and stocks bearing a lower rate of interest than heretofore. On November 1, 1880, a portion of the bonded debt will mature, which may be refunded under the provisions of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, and the stocks so refunded will be issued under the act of 1880, exempt from taxation.

#### SINKING FUND INVESTMENTS IN STOCKS AND BONDS.

By the ordinance of the Common Council creating the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, the Commissioners are required "to give preference to the purchase of City Stocks if the same can be procured at a reasonable rate," and no other investments can be made, except in stocks of the State or the United States.

Statement No. IV. shows the stocks and bonds in detail held as investments in the Sinking Fund.

#### OPERATION OF THE SINKING FUND.

In the report of the Commissioners of Accounts, recently published in the CITY RECORD, of the transactions of the Finance Department for the year 1879, a table is appended showing the possible future working of the Sinking Fund, investments being made at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum. They say:

#### POSSIBLE FUTURE WORKINGS OF THE SINKING FUND.

"An elaborate calculation has been made in this office with the view of ascertaining the possible progressive annual increase of the Sinking Fund, and the time when it shall equal the amount of the present debt."

"This calculation, which excludes all contributions from taxation and from extraordinary sources, shows that the Sinking Fund will probably more than equal the debt, for the redemption of which it is now held, in the year 1902."

"Statement No. 2 shows the amount of stocks and bonds (excepting revenue bonds issued in anticipation of taxes) outstanding August 1, 1880, which fall due in each year of their maturity."

#### BONDS PAYABLE FROM TAXATION.

Stocks and bonds payable from taxation at their maturity by the laws authorizing them falling due and payable in 1880, amount to \$2,231,265 48.

The payment of these stocks and bonds is made wholly from the Sinking Fund without resort to taxation in the present year. Bonds amounting to \$746,265 48, have been redeemed prior to this date, and the remainder of the bonds (\$1,485,000) will be redeemed on November 1, 1880, when they fall due, from the revenues of the Sinking Fund.

#### INCREASE OF THE CITY DEBT.

Under several existing acts of the Legislature, the debt will be increased for various purposes, the principal of which will be briefly referred to.

#### ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY.

A large amount of bonds will be required to be issued to provide for building reservoirs to store water as a supplementary supply to the Croton water system, from the Bronx and Byram rivers, Westchester county.

The report of the Commissioner of Public Works for the second quarter of 1879 represents the estimated cost of these works, as follows:

As stated by the Commissioner of Public Works, the actual cost will probably exceed these estimates of the Engineers, which were based on a scale of prices for labor and supplies lower than those now prevailing.

A part of the lands have been recently purchased for the Bronx River Reservoir, and contracts have been entered into by the Department of Public Works for its construction, and the supply of water-pipes for some of its connections with the Croton water system.

#### STREET OPENINGS AND LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS IN THE ANNEXED DISTRICT.

By Chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks are authorized to lay out, survey and monument all streets, roads, avenues, and public squares and places in the annexed district, and to acquire title to all or any of the lands thereby required for the use of the public.

Chapter 436 of the Laws of 1874 amends that act and confers quite unlimited powers upon the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks to open any street, avenue or road, at their discretion, without consulting the wishes or interests of the property-holders affected by the street openings.

Under these provisions of law, Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed by the Supreme Court, on the application of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for opening more than twenty streets, avenues, and roads in the annexed district, comprising the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the city. These proceedings in some cases have been conducted against the urgent remonstrances of the property-owners and citizens of those wards.

The openings of some of the streets and avenues are opposed, because they are considered premature, and many years in advance of the needs of population.

Reports have been made by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in a few of these proceedings, involving costs for lands taken, surveys, and other expenses, of more than a million dollars, for the payment of which the issue of bonds will be required, one-half of which is a permanent charge upon the city instead of on property benefited.

These expenses of opening streets are only preliminary to expenditures far greater in amount needed for regulating, grading, paving, sewerage, etc., which should immediately follow the opening of streets when it is necessary that it should be done to promote the public interest. Measures have been taken by this Department to put a check upon such proceedings, and limit expenditures for such

purposes to a reasonable amount. By such means only can the property-owners in the annexed district be saved from untimely and ruinous assessments, and the city be protected against a heavy increase of the bonded debt.

#### BROOKLYN BRIDGE BONDS.

Chapter 105, Laws of 1880, authorizes a further issue of bonds by the City of New York, to the amount of \$750,000, "to be used fully to complete, fit up, and equip the said bridge as a public highway between the said cities, New York and Brooklyn." Bonds for \$250,000 have been issued and the proceeds thereof paid to the trustees of the bridge.

#### APPROPRIATIONS AND TAXES FOR 1880.

The total amount of Appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the Final Estimate for the year 1880, is \$29,667,991.98, including \$25,000 authorized by chapter 66, Laws of 1880, for the improvement of Tompkins Square, against \$30,247,750.20, in 1879, also including special appropriations under acts of the Legislature.

The sum of \$1,500,000 is deducted from the total appropriations for 1880, on account of the General Fund applied for the reduction of taxes, against \$2,500,000 in 1879. The surplus revenues of the "Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt" were transferred from the General Fund to the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt, by section 2 of chapter 383, Laws of 1878, which formerly went to the General Fund, and the amount available for this purpose in 1880 is thereby reduced \$1,000,000.

Reference is made to Comparative Statement No. VIII., showing details of appropriations, the amount deducted for the General Fund, and the amount added to supply deficiencies in the actual product of taxes in every year from 1876 to 1880, inclusive.

#### VALUATIONS AND TAXES FOR 1880.

The total amount of valuations of real and personal estate in the City of New York, according to the return of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for 1880, is \$1,143,765,727.09, against \$1,094,069,335, in 1879, making an increase of \$49,696,392.09.

The tax levy not having been confirmed at the date of this report, the exact amount is not yet determined.

Comparative Statement No. V. shows the valuations of real estate in each Ward, as assessed for 1879 and 1880, and also the valuation of each class of personal property.

Comparative Statement No. VI. shows the assessed valuation of real and personal estate, the rate of tax, and the amount of tax levied in each year from 1870 to 1880, inclusive.

The rate of tax on the assessed valuations for 1880, amounting to \$1,143,765,727.09, will probably be 2.53 per cent., against assessed valuations \$1,094,069,355, and tax rate, 2.58 per cent., in 1879.

An act was passed by the Legislature last winter exempting the capital stock of certain corporations from taxation for local and municipal purposes. It is estimated that the city may be deprived of assessed valuations of more than \$20,000,000 by this act, and lose over half a million dollars of its taxes for the present year.

Besides the contingent loss of taxes on this account, the city may suffer a much greater loss under a recent decision of the United States Supreme Court, relating to the method of assessment of the shareholders of banks.

Writs of certiorari, protests, etc., have been served upon the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments by various banks and other corporations, to have their capital stock exempted from taxation.

Statements Nos. IX. and X. show the amount of taxes on real and personal estate and of Croton water rents remaining unpaid for each year of their imposition.

The rate of interest chargeable on arrears of taxes, according to law, is 12 per cent. per annum, but under the provisions of chapter 123, Laws of 1880, tax-payers may pay the amount due, together with interest, at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, from the time the tax was imposed to the day of payment, on taxes imposed prior to the year 1877, before the first day of October, 1880, and on taxes for the years 1877, 1878, and 1879, until the first day of April, 1881, after which dates interest at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum will be charged on all arrears.

The large amount of personal taxes remaining unpaid are accumulations of arrears from the year 1852. A very small portion can ever be collected, and therefore should not be considered available assets of the corporation.

The rate of interest chargeable on unpaid assessments, according to law, is 12 per cent. per annum, but by an act of the Legislature, chapter 195, passed May 7, 1880, it was provided that the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, confirmed prior to the passage of said act, might be paid at the rate of 7 per cent. per annum until the first day of September, 1880, and after that date until the first day of December, 1880, at the rate of 9 per cent. per annum, from the date of confirmation to the date of payment, after which dates 12 per cent. per annum is chargeable on all arrears of assessments.



## ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

An act was passed at the last session of the Legislature (chapter 550) appointing Edward Cooper, John Kelly, Allan Campbell, together with John S. Lawrence (since deceased), George H. Andrews, and Daniel Lord, Jr., Commissioners to revise, vacate, and modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, confirmed by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments.

This Commission has been duly organized and has given notice by publication in the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register," as required by the law, to all persons affected by such assessments, that the notices required by said act must be filed before November 1, 1880, with the Comptroller of said city, and duplicates thereof with the Counsel to the Corporation. Reference is made for particulars to the notice of the Commissioners published in said papers.

The following statement shows the total amount of assessments for local improvements confirmed prior to the passage of the act (June 9, 1880), on which arrears are due; also the balance remaining unpaid on April 30, 1880, which is subject to the action of the Assessment Commission, viz.:

The object of the Assessment Commission previously referred to is, to revise and settle assessments for local improvements on a basis of justice and equity satisfactory to the owners of property, as well as the city, and thus avoid litigation and future vacations of assessments.

Statement No. II. shows the amount of the Funded Debt August 1, 1880, and the amount due in each year, payable from the Sinking Fund and from Taxation, and also the amount of Assessment Bonds outstanding at the same date, and the amount payable in each year.

Statement No. III. shows the amount of stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, under their respective titles, outstanding August 1, 1879, and August 1, 1880, the dates at which they fall due, and the amounts issued and redeemed during the year intervening between those dates, including the bonds of the annexed territory.

Statement No. IV. shows the amount of stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on August 1, 1880, as investments, in detail.

Statement No. V. shows the relative valuations of the real and personal estate in the City of New York, as assessed for 1879 and 1880, and of the real estate in each Ward.

Statement No. VI. shows the assessed valuation of real and personal estate, the rate of tax, and the amount of taxes, in each year from 1870 to 1880, inclusive.

Statement No. VII. shows the amount of the Departmental Estimates, the Provisional Estimates, the Provisional Estimates as rectified by the Board of Aldermen, and the amount of the Final Estimates made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in each year, from 1875 to 1880, inclusive.

Statement No. VIII. shows the annual appropriations for State Taxes and the Expenses of each Department of the City Government, and for general purposes made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; the amount of the revenues of the General Fund supplied for the reduction of taxes; the amount added to supply estimated deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes; and the amount of taxes imposed and levied by the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York, in each of the years 1876 to 1880, inclusive, the amount of taxes for the present year being estimated.

Statement No. IX. shows the amount of taxes on real estate, and of Croton water rents, remaining unpaid on August 1, 1880, and for each year from 1869 to 1879, inclusive.

Statement No. X. shows the amount of personal taxes remaining unpaid on August 1, 1880, and for each year from 1852 to 1879, inclusive.

A communication was received from the Health Department transmitting a resolution of the Board of Health, requesting that the slip between Piers 27 and 28, North river, be dredged, as the deposit from the sewers from Murray street and Park place has reached an amount that requires removal, and, being read, and the Secretary submitting the report of the Engineer-in-Chief as to the quantity of material necessary to be dredged to secure 15 feet of depth at mean low water,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the owner or owners of Piers 27 and 28, North river, and of the bulkhead between be and he is or they are hereby notified and directed to forthwith dredge the slip between the said piers, to such an extent as to secure a depth at mean low water of at least 15 feet, the Health Department having notified this Board that the present condition of said slip is dangerous to life and detrimental to health, and that the said owner or owners be informed that the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department estimates the quantity of material to be removed as about 10,000 cubic yards, and that the survey of the soundings can be seen upon application to that officer.

A communication was received from the Police Department, requesting that action be taken to set apart 220 feet of the southerly side of Pier old 42, North river, for the use of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, instead of only 175 feet, as appropriated 16th June last, and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board on June 16, 1880, whereby the bulkhead at Hoboken street, together with about 175 feet of the inner end of the southerly side of the adjacent Pier old 42, North river, was set apart and appropriated for a dumping-board for the uses and purposes of the Police Department, be and hereby is amended so as to read about 225 feet of the inner end of the southerly side of said pier instead of 175 feet, the additional 50 feet being necessary owing to the new scows of the said Department being larger than those now in use.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for  
local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in  
Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of Septem-  
ber, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable there-  
for may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same,  
the amount of any assessment for any local improvement  
in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now  
unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per  
centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the  
date of payment and at any time on or after said first day  
of September, and before the first day of December, 1880,  
any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine  
per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the  
date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any  
assessments have been paid under the provisions of chap-  
ter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred  
and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine  
of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of  
chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen  
hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assess-  
ment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within  
the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act  
and upon the same terms and conditions therein pre-  
scribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore  
provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be  
a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid,  
satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further  
interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assess-  
ments not having been paid within the time heretofore re-  
quired by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore re-

the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assess-  
ment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained  
shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assess-  
ment for the collection of which assessment the property  
has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

### CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New  
York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue  
bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in  
Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and  
before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and  
eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the  
City of New York the amount of any tax upon real prop-  
erty belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed  
and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon  
at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated  
from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such  
payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment  
may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed  
in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen  
hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred  
and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April,  
eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall  
make and deliver to the person making any such payment  
a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record  
of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and  
upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be  
a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully  
paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right  
to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax  
not having been paid within the time heretofore required  
by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the  
payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven  
per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipa-  
tion of the taxes in the first section specified which may  
fall due and become payable before said taxes are collect-  
ed, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in  
whole or in part, for such period as he may determine,  
not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
