MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, May 19, 1881

In pursuance of the ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to prevent the danger of Hydrophobia to any of the inhabitants of the city of New York," approved April 30, 1877, as amended June 1, 1877, notice is hereby given that said ordinance will be enforced on and after the first day of June, 1881.

The dog pound at the foot of Sixteenth street, East river, is hereby designated as the place where dogs captured pursuant to said ordinance are to be delivered. The pound will be open from 8 A. M. to 5 P. M., daily, Sundays excepted.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the danger of hydrophobia to any of the inhabitants of the city of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose or at large in any of the public streets, lanes, alleys, highways, parks or places within the corporate limits of the city of New York, under a penalty of three dollars for each offense, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who knowingly harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad loose or at large: and the commissioners of police are hereby authorized and directed to cause complaint to be made to the corporation attorney against the owner or possessor of every dog permitted to go loose or at large within the corporate limits, as aforesaid, for the recovery of the penalties prescribed in this ordinance; such penalties and all license fees, when collected, to be accounted for semi-monthly, and paid to the comptroller of said city, and, upon the requisition of the mayor, to be applied towards the payment of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent any dog from going into any such street, lane, alley, highway, park or public place, provided such dog shall be held by such owner or other person securely by a cord or chain, to be not more than four feet long, fastened to a collar around the neck of the animal.

Sec. 2. Every owner, possessor, or person who harbors any dog, shall take out a permit for each dog, at the permit bureau, paying the sum of two dollars (\$2) for the same. All permits, and renewals of the same, shall be dated from the first day of May in each and every year, and shall be for one year from date, and all renewals shall be one dollar (\$1). Said permit shall have the name of the owner and the number of the permit or license on it. Any dog so licensed must have a collar around his neck, with a metal tag attached, having the number of the license on it. And any dog so licensed must, when in the street, be held by such owner, or other person, secured by a cord, rope, or chain, not more than four feet in length; but the owner, at his option, may use, instead of the above, a muzzle, constructed so as to prevent the dog from biting. Any dog that is not so secured, although he is licensed, shall be captured the same as if no license was granted. No dog having a collar and tag, with the number of his license on it, around his neck, that may be in a wagon or other vehicle belonging to its owner shall be captured. Any person appointed by his honor the mayor to capture dogs who shall permit any person to take one or more dogs from him for nothing, or for pay, shall be arrested and taken before a police justice, and upon the facts being proven, the judge shall impose a fine of not less than \$10, or more than \$50, for each offense. Any person may make a complaint of persons having dogs unlicensed at the police stations, and the officer in command shall entertain the same; and all policemen on patrol duty must report all violations of this ordinance the same as any other violation of a corporation ordinance. All such reports shall be transmitted to the corporation attorney, the same as for other violations of city ordinances, and in addition to the \$3 fine shall be added all costs of suits for the recovery of the same as for any other violation of the city ordinances. The provisions of this section, except those relating to leading and muzzling dogs, shall not apply to dogs owned by non-residents, in remaining temporarily or in passing through this city, or to dogs brought into this city and entered for exhibition at any dog show or annual exhibition of dogs.

Sec. 3. The mayor of the city of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance. All dogs found loose or at large, as aforesaid, shall be seized, captured, and delivered by such persons as the mayor shall designate, at a place to be provided and indicated by him, where such animals, if not within forty-eight hours thereafter claimed and redeemed by the owner or some other person, shall be killed and destroyed in such manner and by such persons as the mayor shall designate.

Sec. 4. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city; and any person who shall knowingly present any such dog, and claim payment for the capture thereof, which shall not be owned or captured within the corporate limits of this city, shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars.

Sec. 5. No person shall hinder or molest any person or persons so appointed by the Mayor while engaged in seizing or capturing and delivering any such dog as aforesaid, or any other person engaged in the performance of any duty enjoined by the provisions of this ordinance, under a penalty of not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars for every offense, to be sued for and recovered in the manner now provided by law or ordinance for the recovery of penalties for violation of the ordinances of the common council, on the complaint of the person so hindered or molested; the penalty, when recovered, to be accounted for, paid, and appropriated as provided in section one of this ordinance. The commissioners of police are hereby authorized and required to cause the persons so engaged in the performance of any of the duties prescribed by this ordinance, to be protected from hindrance or molestation.

Sec. 6. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 7, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,645, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 683 tenement-houses, 100 private dwellings, 68 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 23 slaughter-houses, 17 lodging-houses, 2 public sewers, 1 lime kiln, 4 lard rendering establishments, 25 sunken and vacant lots, 1 smoke-house, 1 gas-main, 68 yards, courts, and areas, 102 cellars and basements, 173 waste-pipes and drains, 241 privies and water-closets, 34 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 6 cesspools, 4 smoky chimneys, 7 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 639.

During the past week 237 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were granted to the consignees of 94 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

208 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 182 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 141 houses, 141 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

59 persons sick with contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 400 births, 52 still-births, 190 marriages, and 770 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 7, 1881; this shows a decrease of 48 births, 62 marriages, 44 deaths, and an increase of 5 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 62 births, and an increase of 5 still-births, 58 marriages, and 167 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 5; croup, 7; typhus fever, 11; puerperal diseases, 7; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; inanition, 3; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 17; pneumonia, 9; aneurism, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 12; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 3; scarlatina, 2; diphtheria, 11; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 6; malarial fevers, 2; rheumatism and gout, 3; bronchitis, 7; heart diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; apoplexy, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 5; suicide, 6; drowning, 3. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, alcoholism, and surgical operations was the same for the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 169 were in institutions, 405 in tenement-houses, 170 in houses containing three families or less, 12 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 130 on the first, 195 on the second, 132 on the third, 96 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 759 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 11 non-residents; 87 were stated to be single, 162 married, 96 widowed, and the condition of 425 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 770; still-births, 52; bodies in transitu, 33. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 85 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 400 births, 190 marriages, 52 still-births, 770 deaths, 33 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 54 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 10 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 32 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 7, 1881, was 53.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.164, the mean humidity was 77, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 912, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.84 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau or the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "The Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
