

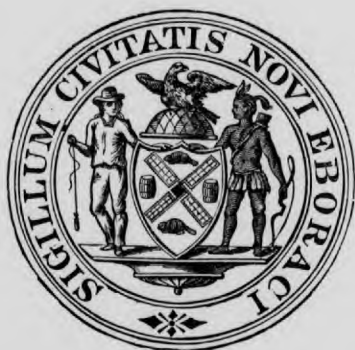

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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held October 6, 1886.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Koch.

The minutes of the meeting held September 29, 1886, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company—Enclosing revised plan of the contemplated improvements at the foot of West Twenty-third street, North river. Referred to Executive Session.

From New York, Catskill and Athens Steamboat Company (Limited)—Requesting permission to sub-let south side Pier, old 33, North river, to the Old Dominion Steamship Company. Referred to Executive Session.

From New York Floating Dry Dock Company—Requesting Department to postpone repairs ordered to Pier 49, East river. Referred to Executive Session.

From National Line of Steamships—Requesting use of Pier, new 43, North river, from October 21st to 27th instant, for steamship "America." Referred to Executive Session.

From Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company—Requesting permission to erect platforms in front of the bulkheads adjoining Pier 27, East river, and change paving in front of said bulkheads. Referred to Executive Session.

From James W. Colwell—Requesting permission to drive piles on the Harlem river, near Third avenue. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Company—Submitting plans for the erection of ferry-house and shed structures between Piers 2 and 3, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From John Nesbit's Sons—Requesting permission to repair bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting that the bulkhead between Piers 42 and 43, East river, requires rebuilding. Referred to Executive Session.

2d. Reference to contemplated improvements foot of Twenty-third street, North river, by the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company. Referred to Executive Session.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—Requesting information respecting claim against C. G. Horton, for violation of Rule 4. The Secretary directed to furnish the desired information.

From Hoboken Land and Improvement Company and the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company—Requesting that the time to dredge in front of ferry premises foot of Fourteenth street and in front of the bulkhead, between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river, respectively, be extended until the slips adjoining are dredged by the Department. Requests granted.

From New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting lease of east half Pier 51, Pier 51½ and the west-half of Pier 52, East river, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1888. The President authorized to advise that the Board is not at liberty to entertain their proposition.

From John Dwight—Submitting plans and specifications for the erection of bulkhead on the north side of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, Harlem river, and requesting permission to dredge at said bulkhead. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From A. A. Skillman and others, citizens of Harlem—Requesting the Board to rebuild Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare plans and specifications for building a new Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river.

From Schwarzschild & Sulzberger—In reference to wharfage for use of bulkhead between Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth streets, East river.

From A. Duryee—In reference to claim for wharfage against A. Geoghan, for use of Piers at Seventy-ninth and Ninety-sixth streets, North river. The President authorized to transmit said claim to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection, and request Mr. Duryee to call on the Commissioners.

From Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company—Accepting terms and conditions of resolution adopted September 29, 1886.

From H. A. Cram—Accepting terms and conditions of resolution adopted September 29, 1886.

From West Shore Railroad—Reporting that repairs are being made to the north side of Pier, old 33, North river.

From New York and New Haven Transportation Company—Requesting permission to replace piles and repair east side Pier 24, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Patrick J. Brady, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that he had served notices on the alleged owner or owners of the bulkhead, between Thirteenth and Twenty-third streets, North river, to dredge thereat.

2d. Reporting that the schooner "S. G. Hart," H. W. Loud & Co., agents, broke backing-log on the north side of Pier at Eighteenth street, North river, September 18, 1886. The action of the President in directing the agents to repair at once, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Eugene McCarthy, Dock Master—Reporting that deck of Pier 55, East river, is in need of patching.

From Joseph B. Erwin, Dock Master—Reporting several chocks loose and holes in deck of Pier at Fifty-fifth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

From John Simpson, Dock Master—Reporting hole in bulkhead, between Piers, old 35 and 36, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From John Callan, Dock Master—Reporting that on October 5th instant, he served notice on W. S. Middleton, Vice-President of the New York and Long Island Ferry Company, to remove forthwith platform, bridges, ferry-racks, etc., at foot of Ninety-ninth street, Harlem river.

From John M. Smith, Dock Master—In reference to the application of Munoz & Espriella, for temporary accommodations at some shedded pier on the North river.

Penalty of \$40 was imposed on John Cunningham and \$15 on Henry Crowley for violation of Rule 7, in using horses on Pier 37, East river, without a platform, and the President authorized to notify them to call and pay amounts to the Treasurer of this Department within ten days, or the claims will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending October 2, 1886.

3d. Reporting repairs required to Piers, new 20 and 21, North river. The President authorized to notify the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company, lessees, to commence to repair within ten days, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

4th. Reporting that four half-round oak fenders are broken and missing on the westerly side and a few require fastening on the easterly side of Pier 38, East river. The President authorized to notify Maine Steamship Company, lessees, to commence to repair in ten days, under the direction and supervision of Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

5th. Reporting that the bulkhead west of Corlears street and east of Pier 54 East river, requires repairing and cleaning. The President authorized to request the Department of Street Cleaning to clean said premises and notify the alleged owner or owners to make the repairs required thereat, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

6th. Reporting damage to building on Pier 44 East river, and recommending that same be sold at auction, to be removed by the purchaser within ten days, and that the piles and timbers on which it rests be removed by the Department.

On motion, the report was received, recommendation adopted, and the Secretary directed to make the necessary arrangements for selling the said building at public auction.

7th. Reporting that the New York and Long Island Ferry Company had not removed their property and structures placed on land under water foot Ninety-ninth street, East river, as ordered by the Board.

On motion, the time to remove said structures was postponed until Tuesday morning, October 12th instant.

8th. Reporting that the Iron Steamboat Company, lessees Pier, new 1, North river, have not repaired said pier, as ordered by the Board, August 13, 1886. The President authorized to notify them to repair at once, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

9th. Respecting the rebuilding of Pier, new 35, North river, and the erection of a shed thereon. The President authorized to notify the Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah, lessees of said pier, that they must commence the work of rebuilding said pier and shed thereon, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted by the Board, June 6, 1883.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5815, respecting damage to Pier 41, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report the cost of making such repairs to said pier as will keep it safe for commercial purposes for a period of six months.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5824, that the bulkhead north of Pier, new 45, North river, is in need of repair, and a new backing-log is required thereat. The President authorized to notify the Oceanic Steamship Company, lessees, to commence to repair within ten days, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5825, repairs required to cobble pavement on inner end of Pier at West Eleventh street, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair, as recommended in his report, at a cost of about \$20.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5826, that three top timbers and mooring-post on same require fastening, at the bulkhead south of and adjoining Pier at Bethune street, North river, and also reporting that ten half-round oak fenders are required thereat. The President authorized to notify A. T. Decker & Co., lessees, to do said work under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

14th. Submitting estimates for painting outside of shed on Pier, new 43, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare plans and specifications for doing said work.

15th. Submitting ground plan of premises in front of Hoboken Ferry, foot of Christopher street, North river, and sketches of timber waiting places or "islands" to assist women and children foot passengers in crossing the wide street in safety.

On motion, the plan was adopted, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to place three thereat as recommended in his report.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5716, that he had superintended repairing Pier 14, East river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5798, that he had superintended repairing ferry-racks at Eleventh street, East river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5747, that he had superintended repairing trestle work for hoisting coal on the bulkhead between Sixty-second and Sixty-third streets, East river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5780, that he had superintended driving piles at platform between Sixty-second and Sixty-third streets, East river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5265, that he had superintended cutting door in shed on Pier, new 43, North river, and the connection of a water meter with the water pipes thereat.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5376, that he had superintended repairing bulkhead foot of Thirty-fifth street, East river.

22d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5498, that the alteration and rebuilding of ferry-racks at Christopher street, North river, and the cutting away and rebuilding of the southeasterly corner of Pier, new 44, North river, has been done under his direction.

23d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5670, that he had superintended the repairing of bulkhead platform between Fourth and Fifth streets, East river.

24th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5793, that he had superintended repairing east half and repaired west half of Pier 19, East river.

25th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5797, that he had superintended driving piles at foot of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, Westchester side Harlem river.

26th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5801, that he had superintended repairing bulkhead between Piers 36 and 37, East river.

27th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5816, that he had repaired Pier 37, East river.

28th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5829, that he had repaired mooring-post on the outer and lower corner of Pier 44, East river.

29th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5827, that he had repaired hole in deck of Pier at Fortieth street, North river.

30th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5828, that he had repaired hole in deck of Pier at Forty-sixth street, North river.

31st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5830, that he had repaired mooring-posts, outer end, lower corner, Pier 19, East River.

32d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5831, that he had repaired sheathing on deck of Pier 41, East river.

33d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5847, that he had superintended repairing hole in bulkhead between Piers 49 and 50, East river.

The application of James J. Coogan, requesting permission to drive about thirty piles, and erect a temporary platform at the foot of Eighth avenue, Harlem River, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5796, ordered to be placed on file. Permission granted, provided the piles are driven within the limits of the water grant, and inside the bulkhead and pierhead lines established by the United States Engineers for the Harlem River canal, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The communication from the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, submitting plans and specifications for proposed extension of shed on Pier 2, North river, was,

On motion, taken from the table and ordered to be placed on file. Permission granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The President, Commissioner Stark, reported that he had accepted \$50 in settlement of the claim against C. J. Winant, for damage to Pier 46, East river.

On motion, his action was approved.

The communication from John Dwight, inclosing plans and specifications for building bulkhead north of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, Harlem River, and requesting permission to dredge at said bulkhead, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5851, ordered to be placed on file, and the President authorized to advise that the plans and specifications are approved, and that permission to dredge to ten feet of water alongside of the return or wing structure, has been granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, provided suitable precautions are taken not to injure the bulkhead already built along the southerly line of East One Hundred and Fourteenth street.

The application of the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, for permission to drive piles and extend ferry-racks at ferry premises foot of West Fourteenth street, North river, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5768, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution offered by Commissioner Matthews, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company be and hereby are permitted to make temporary extensions to the ferry-racks of the ferry landing at the foot of West Fourteenth street, as shown on a plan accompanying the report of the Engineer-in-Chief, Secretary's Order 5768, 20th September, 1886, and described in said report; provided, that this permit shall be revocable at the will and pleasure of the Board of Docks, and that all structures erected, and all piles placed thereunder shall be temporary only, and that the said company, previous to proceeding with any work under this permit, shall file with the said Board, satisfactory agreement setting forth that the said Company will, at any time when so ordered by the Board governing this Department, remove any or all structures or piles erected or placed under this permit within twenty days of the receipt of a written order, without further cost or expense to this Department or to the City of New York; and further, provided, that within five days after the receipt of this resolution the said Hoboken Land and Improvement Company shall file with this Board a consent in writing agreeing to accept the terms and conditions contained in said resolution.

On motion of President Stark it was unanimously

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the removal of the old pier at the foot of West Fortieth street, North River, and with the construction of a new pier with a temporary approach thereto within and upon the established lines for the same, at the foot of West Fortieth street, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as required by Section 714 of the Consolidation Act, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material and dredging necessary therefor not heretofore contracted for or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5818, submitting specifications and form of contract for dredging at south side of Pier, old 29, Pier, new 47 and Pier at West Fifty-eight street, North river, east side Pier 4, Piers 5 and 6, bulkhead between Piers 4 and 5, Piers 5 and 6 and Pier at Fifth street, east river, was taken from the table and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the specification and form of contract for dredging at south side Pier, old 29, at Pier, new 47 and Pier at West Fifty-eight street, North river, east side Pier 4, Piers 5 and 6, bulkhead between Piers 4 and 5 and 5 and 6, and Pier at Fifth street, East river, be and hereby are approved, subject to approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, No. 300 MULBERRY STREET,
BUREAU OF ELECTIONS, NEW YORK, October 4, 1886.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and by virtue of the authority therein conferred upon the Board of Police, the division of the several Assembly Districts in the City and County of New York into Election Districts, and the boundaries of said Election Districts are hereby fixed by said Board as follows:

First Assembly District.

The First Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-five election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beaver street, Old slip, East river, Whitehall street, and Broadway.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Broadway, Battery place, and Greenwich street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Greenwich street, Battery place, and Washington street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Washington street, Battery place, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Greenwich street, Morris street, and Washington street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Albany street, Greenwich street, Rector street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Albany street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Maiden lane, East river, Old slip, Hanover square, William street, Beaver street, and Broadway, including Franklin Market.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Maiden lane, and Gold street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Liberty street, Broadway, and Park row.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Dey street, Broadway, Liberty street, and Hudson or North river.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Barclay street, Broadway, Dey street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Barclay street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Franklin street, Broadway, Reade street, and Hudson street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harrison street, Hudson street, Reade street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within North Moore street, Hudson street, Harrison street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Hubert street, Hudson street, North Moore street, and Hudson or North river.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Varick street, North Moore street, West Broadway, Franklin street, and Hudson street.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Broadway, Franklin street, West Broadway, North Moore street, Varick street, Beach street, St. John's lane, and Lighthouse street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Lighthouse street, St. John's lane, Beach street, and Hudson street.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Desbrosses street, Greenwich street, Lighthouse street, Hudson street, Hubert street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Hudson street, Lighthouse street, and Greenwich street.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Greenwich street, Desbrosses street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Battery place, Bowling Green, Whitehall street, East river, Hudson or North river, Governor's Island, Bedloe's Island, and Ellis' Island.

Second Assembly District.

The Second Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-eight election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:
