The weekly reports of the Assistant Sanitary Engineers, on the plumbing and drainage of new houses, were received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the two weeks ending April 21, 1883:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,780, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 756 tenement-houses, 120 private dwellings, 61 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 27 stores and warehouses, 50 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 2 lodging-houses, 1 gas-main, 28 sunken and vacant lots, 75 yards, courts, and areas, 77 cellars and basements, 260 waste pipes and drains, 205 privies and water-closets, 17 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 18 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, and 10 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 549.

During the past week 195 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

98 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

164 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 127 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 115 houses, 115 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

16 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 540 births, 56 still-births, 250 marriages, and 676 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 21, 1883. This shows a decrease of 82 births and 45 deaths, and an increase of 6 still-births and 16 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1882, there was an increase of 45 births, 2 still-births, and 46 marriages, and a decrease of 22 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 2; croup, 11; whooping cough, 5; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 22; pneumonia, 30; aneurism, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 6; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 12; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 2; premature and preterm births, 10; surgical operations, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 9; diphtheria, 6; typhoid fever, 2; malarial diseases, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; cancer, 7; bronchitis, 1; heart diseases, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; suicide, 2. The number of deaths from erysipelas and puerperal diseases was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 141 were in institutions, 356 in tenement-houses, 162 in houses containing three families or less, 12 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 169 on the second, 120 on the third, 71 on the fourth, 42 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 661 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 15 non-residents; 93 were stated to be single, 179 married, 79 widowed, and the condition of 325 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 676; still-births, 56; bodies in transit, 14; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 540 burials; 250 marriages; 56 still-births; 676 deaths; 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 98 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 11 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 38 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 21, 1883, was 51.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.855, the mean humidity was 66, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,158, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.45 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 616 deaths and still-births, or 84.15 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 13; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 254; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 75; Greenwood (undenominational), 44; Lutheran, (undenominational), 109; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 19; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 13; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 7; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 8; Washington (undenominational), 9.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending April 14, 1883, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 1; Third, 7; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 17; Seventh, 19; Eighth, 23; Ninth, 28; Tenth, 14; Eleventh, 32; Twelfth, 64; Thirteenth, 19; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 19; Seventeenth, 35; Eighteenth, 40; Nineteenth, 122; Twentieth, 48; Twenty-first, 52; Twenty-second, 68; Twenty-third, 8; Twenty-fourth, 11.

The actual mortality for the week ending April 14, 1883, was 679; this is 147 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1882, and 37.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.96 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,309,581.

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1883.

CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT relating to the proof of instruments in writing.

Passed April 6, 1883.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Except in the case of written instruments to the validity of which a subscribing witness, or subscribing witnesses, is, or are necessary, whenever, upon the trial of any action, civil or criminal, or upon the hearing of any judicial proceeding a written instrument is offered in evidence, to which there is a subscribing witness, it shall not be necessary to call such subscribing witness, but such instrument may be proved in the same manner as it might be proved if there were no subscribing witness thereto.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 229.

AN ACT to amend the Code of Civil Procedure.

Passed April 15, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision eleven of section thirty-three hundred and forty-seven of the Code of Civil Procedure is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

11. So much of chapters fourteen, fifteen, sixteen, seventeen, eighteen, nineteen and twentieth as regulate the proceedings to be taken in an action or special proceeding and the effect thereof applies only to an action or a special proceeding, commenced on or after the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty. And all appeals taken from any order, sentence, decree or determination of a surrogate's court, made or entered in such court on or after the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, in any matter or proceeding pending or undetermined in such court, on the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty; and all appeals to the court of appeals from any order or judgment of the supreme court, affirming, reversing or modifying any such order, sentence, decree or determination of a surrogate's court, shall be taken and perfected, heard and decided in conformity to the laws and practice regulating appeals from orders, sentences and decrees of surrogate's court, and the hearing and decision thereof, in force in this state on the thirtieth day of April, eighteen hundred and seventy-seven; and all appeals from any order, sentence, decree or determination of such court, brought in conformity thereto since the first of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, are hereby declared to be valid and effectual, except that sections one thousand six hundred and seventy to one thousand six hundred and eighty-five, both inclusive, apply also to the proceedings therein specified, taken, after that date, in an action theretofore commenced, or upon a judgment theretofore rendered, and section one thousand six hundred and seventy-four applies to a notice of pendency of action theretofore or thereafter filed; sections one thousand eight hundred and eighty to one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, both inclusive, do not apply to an action upon any bond therein specified, where an order, allowing any person to prosecute the bond in the name of the people, has been duly made before that date and is then in force, in which case future actions upon the same bond are regulated by the laws in force on the day before that date, notwithstanding the repeal thereof; sections two thousand one hundred and eighty-one to two thousand one hundred and eighty-seven, both inclusive, two thousand one hundred and ninety-seven to two thousand one hundred and ninety-nine, both inclusive, and two thousand two hundred and thirteen to two thousand two hundred and eighteen, both inclusive, apply also to a case where a discharge is there-after granted; and sections two thousand two hundred and twenty-eight to two thousand two hundred and thirty, both inclusive, apply also to trustees theretofore or thereafter appointed in proceedings taken under any statute superseded by the title containing those sections, sections two thousand two hundred and fifty-three to two thousand two hundred and sixty-five, both inclusive, apply also where a final determination has been made before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, in proceedings taken under any statute superseded by the title containing those sections, and to the process issued thereupon; sections two thousand three hundred and twenty to two thousand three hundred and forty-four, both inclusive, apply also to proceedings taken, before that date, under any statute, superseded by the title containing them, whether a committee has or has not been appointed; section two thousand five hundred and thirty-seven applies also to every payment or deposit therein specified, made on or after the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty; and sections two thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight to two thousand eight hundred and one, both inclusive, apply also to a case where a decree for the sale or other disposition of the real property of a decedent has been duly made before that date, in a surrogate's court.

CHAPTER 232.

AN ACT to amend section three of chapter forty of the laws of eighteen hundred and forty-eight, entitled "An act to authorize the formation of corporations for manufacturing, mining, mechanical, chemical, agricultural, horticultural, medical or curative, mercantile or commercial purposes," as subsequently modified and amended.

Passed April 16, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section three of chapter forty of the laws of eighteen hundred and forty-eight, entitled "An act to authorize the formation of corporations for manufacturing, mining, mechanical, chemical, agricultural, horticultural, medical or curative, mercantile or commercial purposes," as heretofore amended and modified, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 3. The stock, property, and concerns of such company shall be managed by not less than three nor more than thirteen trustees, who shall respectively be stockholders in such company, and a majority of whom shall be citizens and residents of this state, who shall, except the first year, be annually elected by the stockholders at such time and place as shall be directed by the by-laws of the company; and public notice of the time and place of holding such election shall be published not less than ten days previous thereto, in the newspaper printed nearest to the place where the operations of the said company shall be carried on; and the election shall be made by such of the stockholders as shall attend for that purpose, either in person or by proxy. All elections shall be by ballot, and each stockholder shall be entitled to as many votes as he owns shares of stock in the said company, and the persons receiving the greatest number of votes shall be trustees; and when any vacancy shall happen among the trustees by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be filled for the remainder of the year in such manner as may be provided for by by-laws of the said company.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 253.

AN ACT for the appointment of commissioners to select and locate lands for public parks in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth wards of the city of New York and in the vicinity thereof.

Passed April 19, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The mayor of the city of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to nominate and, subject to confirmation by the Board of Aldermen, appoint a commission, to consist of seven citizens, whose duty it shall be to select and locate such lands in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth wards of the city of New York and in the vicinity thereof, as may, in their opinion, be proper and desirable to be preserved and set apart for one or more public parks for said city; and they shall report such selection and location to the legislature at the earliest day practicable.

Sec. 2. The said commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services under this act, but they are hereby authorized to procure maps and plans of the lands selected and located by them, and to employ surveyors for that purpose at an expense of not exceeding one thousand dollars, and the same shall be a charge upon said city and shall be paid as other city charges are paid.

Sec. 3. The said commissioners shall make such selection and location as they may deem desirable in view of the present condition and future growth and wants of said city. The first meeting of the commissioners shall be held within thirty days after the passage of this act at such time and place as the majority of said commissioners shall designate.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

APPROVED PAPERS.

Whereas, Permission has heretofore been given to various corporations to use the streets in the City of New York for laying electrical conductors underground, and it is desirable that the corporation hereinafter named be enabled and required to relieve the thoroughfare of the city of as many of their wires as can be advantageously replaced by pneumatic tubes and other necessary fixtures, to be placed underground and used for transmission and delivery of messages from and to the Company's offices and stations within the city, and to lay underground as many of the Company's other wires as can be efficiently there worked;

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the Western Union Telegraph Company to use the streets within the City of New York for the purpose of constructing and laying lines of electrical conductors underground, from time to time, in tubes or otherwise, and for constructing, maintaining, and using in such streets, from time to time, upon and below the surface of the ground, boxes, vaults, or other fixtures suitable for distributing and testing, from time to time, the wires and insulators of said lines and for access thereto, and for laying, maintaining, and using, underground in said streets, the pneumatic tubes necessary or proper to be used in transmission of communications between the Company's several offices or stations, or in making delivery of communications received by the Company by telegraph. All excavations in streets, removals and replacements of pavements or sidewalks, shall be done under and according to the directions of the Commissioner of Public Works. The said Company, in acting under this permission, shall be subject to so much of the provisions of Article XLII of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 as requires that one wire in each route shall be reserved for the use of the police and one for the fire-alarm telegraph, without charge to the City and County of New York. For each street opened and used by the Company, under this permission, for the purpose of laying therein its lines of electrical conductors or pneumatic tubes, it shall pay to the City a sum equal to one cent for each lineal foot of such street occupied.

Resolved, That said Company be and hereby is required and directed to proceed as rapidly and promptly as may be found practicable in the work of actually laying pneumatic tubes and electrical conductors as aforesaid.
