Whereas, His lifework and attainments as a man, his loyalty to the claims of friendship, his devotion to the interests of his family, and his glowing faith in the rights and elevation of humanity, formed a character which made him worthy of the honor conferred upon him by his fellow-citizens when they elected him to fill one of the highest positions in the gift of the people, and

Whereas, The citizens of New York sympathize with the citizens of the State of New Jersey in the loss that has been sustained through the death of such a distinguished public servant, whose success in life has reflected glory upon the history of their State; now therefore be it
