DEAR SIR—I herewith respectfully transmit quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor during the quarter ending March 31, 1901, to wit:

CARPENTER'S WORK.

At Fourth District Prison—By unpaid labor: Construction and hanging of new door on vegetable house in yard, putting in three new window frames in cells, male prison, new ash cord on 2 windows, prison kitchen; material used: 9 four-inch pine boards, 2 pounds eight-penny nails, 15 1/4-inch screws, 25 feet sash cord, 3 new window frames and 3 panes of glass 10 inches by 14 inches.

PLUMBING AND TINSMITHING.

At Second District Prison—Putting in new firepot on "16 Veto" stove and laying in front of fireplace new tin; material used: 4 sheets of XX charcoal bright tin, 14 inches by 20 inches.

At Fourth District Prison—By unpaid labor: Putting in 1 set of rings and covers on Duparque Range No. 8, 3 new rubber washers on water closets in cells of male prison, 1 new rubber washer on water-closet, female prison; putting in new grate and grate rest and swivel in stove in hall of male prison, 3 new 1/2-inch brass faucets on sink in hall of male prison, 5 new 1/2-inch brass faucets in cells of male prison, repairing lock on office door.

At Fifth District Prison—By unpaid labor: Putting in a full set (3) cross pieces on "Mott's Defiance Range No. 9," putting in three new washers on faucets of bath-room and ten-day house, putting in four new washers on faucets of wash-tubs, laundry, cleaning trap of washing-basin and removing obstructions from waste pipe leading to sewer in Matron's room. By paid labor: Putting in and furnishing one new faucet on hydrant in carriage-house, putting in and furnishing a new combination (hot and cold water) faucet on bath tub, repair of hot water faucet in basin in Matron's room, putting in and furnishing new self-closing basin faucet, one in ten-day house and one in dining room; removing obstructions from water-closet and soil line, also repairing two faucets in laundry tubs.

At Seventh District Prison—By paid labor: Putting in and furnishing new basin, ground floor; removing obstruction in supply pipe, cell No. 6, also on top tier cell No. 8; repairing burst and leak of valve, male prison; removing obstruction in wash-basin, Keeper's room, and putting in and furnishing new wash-basin in Matron's room; repairing leak in supply pipe, bath-room.

MISCELLANEOUS WORK.

At Fifth District Prison, Warden's office—By paid labor: Repairing and overhauling "Remington Typewriter No. 2," machine No. 92968; material used: exchanging cylinder, 1 new shift rail, 6 screws, 2 springs, new ribbon latch, 7 new types and new type bar.

PAINTER'S WORK.

At Second District Prison: Whitewashing engine room, corridor and kitchen; material used: 1 barrel whitewash lime, 10 pounds U. M. blue, 5 pounds common glue and one new whitewash brush.

At Fourth District Prison—Painting new door of vegetable house in yard, giving same three coats of paint, also painting roof of same two coats of paint, painting ceiling of prison kitchen, also sink and stationary wash-tubs, giving same two coats of paint; painting roof of closet in yard two coats of paint, and calcimining ceiling of female prison; material used: 60 pounds white lead, 2 gallons raw oil, 1 gallon turpentine, 1/2 gallon liquid dryers and 10 pounds primers metallic.

At Fifth District Prison—Varnishing, painting and graining of ice box, painting "dado" on male tier, whitewashing bread room; material used: 1 30 pounds color, 1/2 gallon "Valentine" inside varnish, 1/2 barrel whitewash lime and 1/2 pound U. M. blue.

The prisons were entirely cleaned of roaches, water-bugs, etc., by the services rendered of the P. M. Frank Insect Exterminating Company.

The usual amount of laundrying, cooking, cleaning and general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXTRACT FROM the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held Tuesday, February 12, 1901:

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, February 13, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GREENBACKS.—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its

consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1890, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt. In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

This report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Because a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature, Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1915;
JULY 1, 1925;
JULY 1, 1935;
JULY 1, 1945, and
JULY 1, 1955.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1901, at the rate of three and one-half (3½) per cent. per annum, payable, also, in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to apportion the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt, the proposal first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms. The stock which is to be extended in accordance with the terms of this circular must be delivered to the Comptroller upon demand, when the certificates will be stamped across their face with the terms of the extension, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, provided, however, that such stock now outstanding in coupon form when presented for extension will be extended in the form of registered stock. Thereafter transfers may be made of such stock on the books of the Corporation in accordance with the general provisions of law and the rules of the Department of Finance in regard thereto. The right to discontinue the offer contained in this circular at any time without further notice is expressly reserved.
