Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, February 13, 1903, I would report as follows:

Rock excavation work was continued on the spillway extension. (The location of this work is shown in Photo No. 36, previously submitted.)

The flow in the river was heavy during the week, owing to thawing weather and rain.

On the core wall work of excavation progressed near its junction with the inlet masonry and Gate House No. 1.

Three hand gangs have been at work at earth excavation; one gang below Elevation 70± on the downstream side at the junction of the main dam with the core wall, one gang between Stations 1-|-50 and 3-|-00 on the downstream side, and one gang on the upstream side near Station 1-|-00.

The masonry work under the old Aqueduct, west side of the dam, at location of the proposed screen chamber, has been carried up nearly to the level proposed for the winter.

Excavation continued in the south bank at the south end with the steam shovel, both day and night, at Elevation 70±, on the downstream side of the core wall.

(The location of the above mentioned work of earth excavation and removal of core wall is shown in Photos Nos. 65, 66, 67 and 68, submitted with last report.)

The amount of excavation by the steam shovel was about 1,600 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of excavation by the hand gangs was about 2,500 cubic yards for the week. (This includes core wall excavation.)

The amount of spillway rock excavation was about 400 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of masonry laid was about 180 cubic yards for the week.

The average number of men employed was as follows:

Excavation at south end of dam.....	168
Masonry.....	44
Quarry and spawl yard.....	125
Spillway excavation.....	25
Miscellaneous.....	14

Total..... 376

For the week ending January 2, the average was 345 men.

For the week ending January 9, the average was 405 men.

For the week ending January 16, the average was 311 men.

For the week ending January 23, the average was 284 men.

For the week ending January 30, the average was 290 men.

For the week ending February 6, the average was 346 men.

For the week ending February 13, the average was 376 men.

A larger force should be employed. The small force and light amount of work done, however, is due to a considerable extent to the continued inclement weather.

NEW YORK, February 16, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Relating to the communication of the John J. Hart Company, dated December 10, 1901, transmitting a bill for 455 cubic yards of earth excavation and refill not allowed for at 59c., \$268.45, which you referred to me, I beg to report thereon as follows:

On April 1, 1901, the John J. Hart Company entered into an agreement with the Aqueduct Commissioners to construct a masonry conduit between the Old and New Croton Aqueduct at Dunwoodie, Yonkers, N. Y. The plans provide that the sides of the pit should be excavated in vertical lines, and the work was so ordered by Mr. F. W. Watkins, Division Engineer in charge of the work. The agreement provides that the price for earth excavation shall include bracing and supporting the sides of the pit and all necessary bailing and draining to keep the pit free from water. The contractors neglected to brace the sides of the pit, consequently about 300 yards of earth slid into it, which they were obliged to remove in order to complete the work. It is for the removal of this material that they ask payment.

The sections of the agreement above referred to are as follows:

"The excavation is to be made in accordance with the lines established by the Engineer and the materials are to be deposited in refilling over the conduit and at other places and in such form, grades and levels as the Engineer may direct.

"The compensation for earth excavation will be at the price bid therefor per cubic yard measure in earth excavation, which must include the cost of refilling and grading, bracing and supporting the sides of the pit and all necessary bailing and draining to keep the pit free from water, and all other labor and cost incidental thereto."

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, February 20, 1903, I would report as follows:

The work at the dam progressed as usual on Saturday, February 14, rock excavation, earth excavation and masonry work continuing as during the preceding week. Since then, however, owing to rain, snow and extremely cold weather, no work was done, excepting some drilling on the spillway rock excavation and on the river wall below the dam, in anticipation in this latter case of a possible flood and the advisability in such event of increasing the waterway at that point.

The amount of work done was as follows:

Meeting January 26, 1903, 4 p. m.

Present—President Cromwell, Alderman Maloy, Alderman Gillies, Alderman Shea.

The minutes of the meeting of January 19 were approved.

Westerleigh, Ward 1, paving.

President Cromwell made the following statement:

The original petitions, 25 in number, asking for brick pavement on a sand foundation on 25 different streets, were referred to the Commissioner of Public Works for investigation and report.

In some cases the estimated cost came very close to the legal limit of assessment, and resolutions were now in order to improve such streets as the Local Board, after this hearing, might decide on.

First—That we have completed our estimate and assessment, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby and having objections thereto, do present their said objections in writing, duly verified, to us at our office, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on or before the 13th day of March, 1903, and that we the said Commissioners

will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on the 17th day of March, 1903, at 1.30 o'clock p. m.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in said city, there to remain until the 23d day of March, 1903.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz:

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III., to be held in the County Courthouse, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 5th day of May, 1903, at the opening of the court on that day.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
