Which were referred to the Joint Committees on Finance.

Councilman Goodwin offered the following report of the Joint Committees on Finance:

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly:

The Committees on Finance of the Council and the Board of Aldermen, to whom were referred the assessment-rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York for the year 1900, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 21, 1900, transmitting the Budget for the year 1900, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts of the appropriations authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1900, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submit the following

#### REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1900 is ninety million seven hundred and seventy-eight thousand nine hundred and seventy-two dollars and forty-eight cents (\$90,778,972.48), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating eleven million five hundred and seventy-seven thousand two hundred and nine dollars and twenty-two cents (\$11,577,209.22).

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from city purposes. Compliance with this provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

#### AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY PURPOSES BY ONE GENERAL RATE.

The following statement shows, therefore, the proportion of the budget which is to be raised by taxation at an uniform rate throughout the whole city:

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#### Percentage to be added for deficiencies in collection.

Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the Municipal Assembly to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your Committees have conferred with the Department of Finance in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1900, and have concluded to recommend that two per centum (2%) of the amounts to be collected by taxation be added to and included in the tax levy for this purpose, this being the same percentage adopted last year and also at exactly the figure which, having prevailed in The City of New York prior to consolidation for over twenty years, has been found by experience to offset with substantial accuracy the deficiencies in the product of the tax resulting from vacant and modified assessments, uncollectible personal taxes, etc., etc.

#### COUNTY CHARGES AND EXPENSES: THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

The County charges and expenses included in the budget are as follows:

It is to be noted that included in these amounts is the quota of State taxes due from each of the respective counties. Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896, as follows:

"Section 202. The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for State purposes if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

The provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estate of corporations which are exempt from local taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for county purposes.

On the other hand, in the County of Kings certain property of the Pratt Institute is exempt from local taxation by chapter 398 of the Laws of 1887, but not exempt from taxation for State purposes. This makes it necessary to fix a rate of tax on the assessment of this institution (\$1,148,500) which will produce only its proportionate share of State taxes.

The assessment-rolls for the year, transmitted to the Municipal Assembly on July 2, 1900, show the following valuations by counties:

The county lines correspond with the borough lines in all the boroughs except Manhattan and The Bronx, which, together, constitute New York County, and, as the rate of taxation in these two boroughs happens to be the same, it will be convenient in dealing with the assessed valuations to use the county classification.

The assessed valuation of the personal estate of corporations, joint stock companies or associations which have been found to be exempt under section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896 from taxation for State purposes in the year 1900, as appears by a detailed statement thereof on file in the Department of Finance, is as follows:

Your committee recommend that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$428.93 in the whole tax levy of \$82,542,173.76.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax-rolls of the city and county rates, your committee recommend that the aggregate thereof, or in other words, the total tax rates in each borough, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1900. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Municipal Assembly.

First—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Lots); and

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended.

Fourth—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for flagging improvements in the Thirtieth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Utrecht).

The amount to be raised for the payment of interest on the New Lots bonds is twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is thirty-four thousand eight hundred and eighty-four dollars and twenty-three cents (\$34,884.23); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is forty-two thousand one hundred and seventy-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$42,176.23).



and the amount of the Thirtieth Ward flagging tax is fourteen thousand one hundred and twenty dollars and ninety-three cents (\$14,120.93).  
Your committees recommend that these assessments and installments be confirmed in the tax levy ordinance and levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the Government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the state taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1900.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows :

Section 1. There shall be and is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of sixty nine millions three hundred and forty-six thousand four hundred and ninety dollars and fifty-five cents (\$69,346,490.55), to pay the expenses included in the budget for the year 1900 for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the city debt, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the budget for the year 1900, amounting in the aggregate to ninety millions seven hundred and seventy-eight thousand nine hundred and seventy-two dollars and forty-eight cents (\$90,778,972.48), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of eleven millions five hundred and seventy-seven thousand two hundred and nine dollars and twenty-two cents (\$11,577,209.22), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, including the state taxes due from said counties, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of nine millions eight hundred and fifty-five thousand two hundred and seventy-two dollars and seventy-one cents (\$9,855,272.71), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated May 31, 1900, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the budget for the year 1900, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said budget are as follows :

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,  
May 31, 1900.

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly :

Section 247 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows :

"It shall be the duty of the comptroller of said the city of New York to prepare and submit to the municipal assembly, at least four weeks before their annual meeting, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement, setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, or for city purposes within said city, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts by the city treasury during the then current year, from all the sources of revenue of said general fund, including surplus revenues from the sinking fund, available in accordance with law, other than surplus revenues of the sinking fund for the payment of the city debt, and the said municipal assembly are hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, they are required to order, and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised, by tax only, the balance of said aggregate amount, after making such deduction."

Section 902 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows :

"In the statement submitted by the comptroller to the municipal assembly as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings and Richmond, respectively, and the sum or sums which should be paid for like purposes by that part of Queens county included within the city; and the municipal assembly is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties and part of county, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county or part of county; to the end that each of said counties and said part of Queens county shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county or part of county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statements as follows :

1. The Budget in detail for the year 1900.

2. The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said budget, and to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by said section 902 of the Charter.

In this connection your attention is called to the fact that since the enactment of the Charter the County of Queens has been so divided that the whole of said county as now existing lies within the territorial limits of The City of New York.

3. The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation the following are the items of my estimate :

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows :

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the municipal assembly to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes

authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 909 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the Assessment Rolls, and also to the provisions of section 911 of the same act, designating the first day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said city.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:  
1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept as to show the receipts and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep a correct record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for annually recurring expenses of care, support and maintenance.  
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be in the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimates and Appropriations for a resolution to withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. No payment shall be made by inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution.

In addition to the sum of sixty-nine millions three hundred and forty-six thousand four hundred and ninety dollars and fifty-five cents (\$69,346,400.55) imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon said estates, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, two per cent. of said sum, or one million three hundred and eighty-six thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine dollars and eighty-one cents (\$1,386,929.81), the said amount being necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by the first section of this ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 3. There shall be and is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum of eight millions three hundred and ninety-one thousand three hundred and thirty-two dollars and sixteen cents (\$8,391,332.16), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1900, including the quota of State taxes due from said county and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or one hundred and sixty-seven thousand eight hundred and twenty-six dollars and sixty-four cents (\$167,826.64), which last stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making the total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, eight millions five hundred and fifty-nine thousand one hundred and fifty-eight dollars and eighty cents (\$8,559,158.80).

II.—In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.00729 per centum; on the estates not subject to local taxation, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 398 of the Laws of 1887, 2.2384 per centum; and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.32115 per centum.

III.—In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.15875 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.34216 per centum.

IV.—In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.00385 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.22972 per centum.

Sec. 9. In addition to the sums mentioned in preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lot) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 101 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of thirty-four thousand eight hundred and eighty-four dollars and twenty-three cents (\$34,884.23), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successors; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements, for which the annual assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892 and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of forty-two thousand one hundred and seventy-five dollars and twenty-three cents (\$42,176.23), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirtieth Ward (late Town of New Utrecht), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, under authority of chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purpose, the sum of fourteen thousand one hundred and twenty dollars and ninety-three cents (\$14,120.93), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land situated in the flagging districts established by the Flagging Commissioners of said town.

The Vice-President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the report be received, laid over for one week, and printed in full in the CITY RECORD.

**LAYING OFF APPROACH TO PARK AVENUE AT ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FOURTH STREET, THE BRONX.**

In the matter of laying out an approach for pedestrians from Brook avenue to Park avenue, opposite One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, Borough of The Bronx, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the laying out of the proposed approach, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 14th day of July, 1900, resolutions were adopted, proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out an approach for pedestrians from Brook avenue, opposite One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, to Park avenue across the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 1st day of August, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out an approach for pedestrians from Brook avenue, opposite One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, to Park avenue across the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, and to lay out the aforesaid approach as follows:

**PARALLEL A. M.**

The centre line of the proposed approach to be from Brook avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to the Madison avenue viaduct to be in the eastern prolongation of the centre line of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, from Teller avenue to Park avenue.

**PARALLEL B. M.**

The centre line of the proposed approach from Brook avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to the Madison avenue viaduct to be in the western prolongation of the centre line of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, from Washington avenue to Brook avenue.

The width of the proposed approach to be 30 feet.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolutions approving of the above-named proposed change to the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out an approach to Park avenue, Bronx, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade in Nichols avenue, from Etna street to Jamaica avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, and to change the grade in the aforesaid avenue as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Nichols avenue and Etna street, the elevation to be 38.56 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore:

1st. Thence northerly to the intersection of Nichols avenue and Wood street, the elevation to be 41.4 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Nichols avenue and Condit street, the elevation to be 43 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Nichols avenue and Jamaica avenue, the elevation to be 52.55 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

All elevations are referred to the mean high-water datum as established by the Department of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

**CHANGE OF GRADE IN WINTHROP AVENUE, QUEENS.**

The following report from the Topographical Engineer was read:

**TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, July 30, 1900.**

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

Sir—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring, for report, a communication from the Astoria Silk Works and others, requesting that the grades of Winthrop avenue, between Barclay street and De Bevoise avenue, in the First Ward, formerly Long Island City, Borough of Queens, be altered in order to permit the use of said Winthrop avenue by loaded trucks, I have to state that a survey and study of the grades was made, resulting in the preparation of the accompanying map, which is herewith submitted for a public hearing and adoption by the Board.

The title of the map is "Plan and profile, showing the change of grades in Winthrop avenue, between the East river and De Bevoise avenue, in the First Ward (formerly Long Island City), Borough of Queens."

The technical description in triplicate is also submitted, and the papers in the matter returned.

1. Beginning at the intersection of the United States pier and bulkhead-line of the East river and Winthrop avenue, the elevation to be 6.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

2. Thence easterly to the intersection with the Boulevard, the elevation to be 8.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

3. Thence easterly to the intersection with Barclay street, the elevation to be 10.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

4. Thence easterly to the intersection with Van Alst avenue, the elevation to be 24.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

5. Thence easterly to the intersection with Hallett street, the elevation to be 32.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

6. Thence easterly to the intersection with Howland street, the elevation to be 42.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

7. Thence easterly to the intersection of the block between Howland street and Crescent, the elevation to be 44.5 feet above mean high-water datum;

8. Thence easterly to the intersection with Crescent, the elevation to be 45.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

9. Thence easterly to the intersection with Merchant street, the elevation to be 37.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

10. Thence easterly to the intersection with Goodrich street, the elevation to be 34.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

11. Thence easterly to the intersection with Broadway street, the elevation to be 25.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

12. Thence easterly to the intersection with Lawrence street, the elevation to be 18.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

13. Thence easterly to the intersection with De Bevoise avenue, the elevation to be 15.0 feet above mean high-water datum.

All elevations refer to the mean high-water datum in use in the Department of Highways, in the Borough of Queens.

Resolved, That the President of this Board cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans, for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change of grades of the above-named avenue and the location of the immediate adjacent or intersecting open or established public streets, avenues, roads, squares or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change of grades of the above-named avenue at a meeting of this Board, to be held in the office of this Board, on the 5th day of September, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions, and a notice to all persons affected thereby, that the proposed change of grades of the above-named avenue will be considered at a meeting of this Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 5th day of September, 1900.

**REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT FOR OPENING EAST ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINTH STREET, BRONX.**

The following report from the Topographical Engineer was read:

**TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, July 30, 1900.**

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

Sir—In relation to the application of Clara L. Fairchild, and two others by Hawk & Flannery, attorneys, for petitioners for reduction of the assessment for the opening of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, from Webster avenue to Third avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and referred for report to the Board of Public Improvements, I have to state as follows:

East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, from Webster avenue to Third avenue, was laid out by a special act, chapter 211 of the Laws of 1897, after the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, now Borough of The Bronx, had been filed and declared final by chapter 712 of the Laws of 1896. The fact that this street was not laid out on the final map seems to show that the claim of the petitioners that East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street was not absolutely a necessity seems to be valid; on the other hand, it can be ascertained that some street would soon become necessary in order to cross the New Haven and Hartford Railroad, because between East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street and Pelham avenue, a distance of 1,200 feet, no opportunity exists for vehicles to cross.

East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street is 80 feet in width, and forms with Fordham road a direct connection between Third avenue and the Harlem river at Fordham Heights.

I recommend that a public hearing be given to all those interested in the matter, in order to determine whether any or what amount of the cost for opening East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, from Third avenue to Webster avenue, shall be assumed by the City.

The letter of the petitioners is herewith returned.

DEAR SIR:—At the meeting on May 2, 1900, your Board adopted a resolution to authorize the issuance of permits by the Commissioner of Water Supply and the Commissioner of Highways to the Jamaica Water Supply Company, to lay water-mains in Maure street, between Mill street and Liberty avenue, Borough of Queens, and to place one fire-hydrant thereon.

The requisite permits were issued to the company accordingly.

The company declined to avail itself of the permits, for the reason that the resolution called for the laying of mains for a distance of 1,050 feet, with only one fire-hydrant, and for the further reason that to lay the mains for a distance of 500 feet from the terminus of the present main would cover only the purposes of the applicants for the main.

I have had a conference on the subject with the President of the Borough of Queens and Mr. Van Velsdonk and the chairman of the company that a main for a distance of 500 feet is sufficient for all purposes, and will furnish water supply to the original applicant for the main, Mr. Claude Livingston, and his neighbors, who are the only owners and residents interested in the matter.

I now respectfully recommend that the resolution of May 2 be amended, in accordance with the foregoing facts, which provided for a main in Maure street, between Mill street and Liberty avenue, for a distance of 500 feet from the terminus of the present main, with one fire-hydrant thereon.

DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS, July 26, 1900.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR:—The Municipal Corporation of the Village of Whitestone, Queens County, on December 31, 1897, entered into a contract with J. M. Waddle for macadamizing Twenty-third street, from Eighth to Eleventh avenue; laying macadam sidewalks on both sides of Eight avenue, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets; paving and guttering east side of Sixth avenue, between Eighteenth and Twenty-second streets; paving the north side of Eighteenth street, from Fourth to Third avenue, in said Village of Whitestone, now part of the Borough of Queens.

The estimated cost of the work to be done under this contract is \$1,610, while the unexpended balance of the fund from which the work must be paid for is only \$1,081.89, showing a deficiency of \$528.11, an amount of which the work under the contract has not been ordered on.

The contract was assigned by J. M. Waddle to Laurence Collins on June 21, 1900, and the assignment has been duly approved by me.

Acting on the suggestion of this Department the assignee has filed with me a written agreement to the modification of the contract so as to bring the amount of work to be done within the sum available to pay for it.

Under these circumstances I recommend that authority be granted to modify the contract so as to provide only for the macadamizing of Twenty-third street, between Eighth and Eleventh avenues, and, paving the north side of Eighteenth street, from Fourth to Third avenue, the estimated cost of these improvements, including engineering and inspection, being \$1,074, or \$7.89 less than the balance of the fund, \$1,081.89.

DEAR SIR:—In acknowledgment of a letter dated June 28 from the Secretary of the Board with a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Nineteenth District, Borough of Manhattan, recommending that One Hundred and Sixtieth street, from Edgecombe avenue to St. Nicholas avenue, be paved with granite blocks on a concrete foundation, to support the estimated cost of paving with asphalt the lot on concrete foundation, the roadway of One Hundred and Sixtieth street, from St. Nicholas avenue to Edgecombe avenue, including five years' maintenance by the contractor, is \$4,000, and that the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of pavement is \$12,000.

This street is very busy, the traffic being 1 per cent. from St. Nicholas avenue to Canal street, and 11.4 per cent. from Canal street to Edgecombe avenue. On this account it is necessary to pave the street with granite blocks on a concrete foundation. The estimated cost of paving with granite, including one year's maintenance for the contractor, is \$4,000, and the assessed value of the property affected is \$12,000.

I would respectfully recommend that the matter be referred back to the Local Board of the district, with the recommendation that a concrete foundation be used on concrete foundations be used instead of asphalt blocks on concrete foundations.

DEAR SIR—On May 7, 1897, the Board of Street Openings of The City of New York directed the Corporation Counsel to proceed to acquire title for East Two Hundred and Tenth street, extending from the Bronx river to Webster avenue. Thereafter the Corporation Counsel

presented a petition to the Supreme Court and Commissioners were appointed and several hearings have been had before the Commissioners. Title to the street does not rest until the confirmation of the report, and the Commission is still engaged in taking evidence, and no report has as yet been presented to the Court. This street commences at the established grade of Lowmead street and extends at a grade of 6 feet in the hundred to Station place, at which point it is some 5 feet above the surface. From there the grade is a bit steeper until it reaches the eastern side of the Harlem Railroad, where it is 18 feet above the tracks and at the level it crosses to Webster avenue. The Board of Public Improvements, at its meeting on January 31, 1900, passed a resolution and prepared the form for an ordinance changing the width of East Two Hundred and Tenth street, from Station place to Webster avenue to a foot bridge 20 feet in width at the same grade that it crosses the railroad tracks, namely, 18 feet above the surface. At Station place there were to be steps leading from that foot bridge and from Station place to the Bronx river. The grade was to correspond to the surface, and the grade of Station place was changed so that at its junction with Two Hundred and Tenth street it was on the same level as the foot of the stairs leading from the foot bridge.

The Municipal Assembly passed the ordinance as proposed by the Board of Public Improvements and yesterday his Honor the Mayor vetoed the ordinance upon the ground that there was no necessity for the existence of the street. The reason why the Local Board and the Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly passed the ordinance changing the width and grade of East Two Hundred and Tenth street across the Harlem Railroad track was because it destroyed the Williamsbridge yard, the grade of the street being such that even though a bridge was constructed across the company's property, neither car nor locomotive could go under the bridge at any point 8 or 10 feet east of the main line tracks; and under no circumstances would the railroad have the right to cross, since the land would belong to the City as soon as the title vests; and the destruction of the yard would entail an enormous increase of expense for acquiring title to this street. I have never been able to ascertain that there was any demand for opening East Two Hundred and Tenth street, certainly none for that portion crossing the New York and Harlem Company's tracks.

Under the circumstances, therefore, the New York and Harlem Company asks that the resolution of May 7, 1897, authorizing the opening of this street shall be rescinded and that the Corporation Counsel be asked to discontinue the proceedings for acquiring title to the street.
