S.—The Equal Pay Teachers' Bill, which was said will increase \$3,000,000, is \$9,000,000 according to a report Albany, April 29, 1909, and states, by a vote of 107 to 14 the Teachers' Equal Salary bill the enactment of which it has been estimated would increase the cost of the Budget of The City of New York by something like \$9,000,000 passed the Assembly today, it was passed in the Senate on Monday night, and now goes to the Mayor, who vetoed a similar bill two years ago, the Governor also vetoed that bill in 1907.

Honorable Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Esteemed Gentlemen—I wish to protest to you, as a milk consumer, against the enforcement by the City to pasteurize all the milk supplied for the City, from the 1st of January, which, according from what Commissioner Lederle said, the law will take effect, which I consider an outrage to do, and will put the people in slavery to use pasteurized milk against their will, which would increase the price for milk, and add \$7,000,000 yearly to the Budget to enforce it, with the already heavy City debts of a billion of dollars, oppressing still more the already overburdened rent and tax payers to pay for such a crazy, unnecessary act. This is worse than slavery, no savage nation would attempt, which has been abolished, and is a milk monopoly for the control of the supply, to which the 5,000,000 people in our City should never submit. This idiotic sterilizing and pasteurizing scheme is condemning God's own work. He from the beginning of the world through the cow has so wonderfully supplied his great human family, for which we should be thankful and for her flesh as food, and not find fault and make her out that her milk is infected with germs and microbes, and contaminated with disease and carries contagion through the germs, microbes and bacteria by the millions in a cubic centimeter and spreads typhoid and other diseases by drinking it raw, all of which is a false theory. There is no truth in it, and high time for everybody to reject such theories and purify the minds of its agitators, and that all the useless inspections and injections of cattle with tuberculin and other poisonous serums be stopped, which injures the milk and makes the cow unhealthy unless that is done, the milk from such cows, and their meat when cut up by butchers for us to eat, is unfit to consume, which practice is also directly in opposition of the pure food law, and against vivisection which I condemn, torturing poor beasts and all kinds of animals, make them suffer, for the sake of experimenting finding a cure by fanatic theory leaders to inject into the human body, when nature has provided curative remedies for the ailments of the human race at their grasp, and not look to the animal world for a cure. No wonder people have become so wild and uncontrollable, to have culture injected serums, vaccines, virous, antitoxins, and other revolting dangerous poisonous animal extracts into their system, which should be abolished. Is it a wonder why so many people die of late years?

In regard to this ridiculous ordinance or law for pasteurizing the City milk supply for five million people with City money, which Mr. Lederle expects to take effect January 1, and says in a statement that all the milk, except certified milk and certain other special grades is going to be pasteurized, and has planned to classify all of New York's milk supply into three classes: Grade A milk, he says, suitable for infant food; Grade B, milk suitable for adults to drink, and Grade C milk for cooking and manufacturing purposes. What does he mean by certified and certain other special grades of milk? Who gets that? Who are the favored? Is it hospitals, sanitariums, themselves and institutions? Whose are the favored cows or farmers who produce that special grade and certified milk? Does Lederle think to label milk with a stamp of approval make it better? And fetch higher prices?

What right has he or anybody to make such a mandatory law, regulate the wants in our homes, to dictate us housewives in our households, without our consent? And compel us to use pasteurized milk in a land of the free, and divide New York's milk supply into three kinds, when the cows give only one kind of milk, which should be supplied and sold to everybody alike as it is, without tampering with it by meddlers, without discrimination and favoritism. Heretofore hospitals, homes, places, sanitariums and institutions had the best milk, and we householders had to take inferior skimmed milk, sold in cans by grocers and retailers. There should be only one price of milk for everybody and kept from conspiring monopolies. When I ask for milk and pay for milk, I want milk with the full cream in it, exactly as the cow produces it, so I can use it for whatever purpose, and not be compulsory compelled to buy three different kinds of milk to supply my wants and my family, and be compelled to pay three different prices for the various grades, for the personal gain of the promoters. Hands off from such a tyranny. The City has no right to go into the milk business and encourage a milk trust, and take the personal rights of the people away by such a mandatory law compelling them besides to pay higher prices for their milk, and ruin the quality of the milk by pasteurizing, rendering it unfit for use by sudden changes of the temperature from one extreme to another is bad which is an unnatural process. It also takes away the good flavor and taste of milk, and prevents the cream from rising, and sours quickly. Milk is a delicate article, and should be handled as little as possible, and should be kept free from professional meddlers, who are the cause for the scarcity of cattle, the increasing high prices for meat, milk, butter, cheese, bakery food stuff and everything milk is used, and the inferior quality of the milk today and has been for years so, ever since the agitating crusaders found fault with the milk, condemned cattle in large quantities with their tuberculosis agitations going on everywhere, injecting tuberculin made herds of cattle sick, all this made milk and meat dear for years, and has driven out many farmers out of business, and unless all this is stopped and proper steps are taken to protect the general and rent and tax payers from such unjust oppressions, and the City itself from the agitating, menacing influences, spread about by newspapers to increase their sale, and misleading literature, hard times, much poverty and misery will prevail. Nor has the City any right to give the hard-earned money from rent and tax payers for milk stations. This does not belong to the City government, to supply outside private organizations and institutions with 55 or 71 milk stations, and pay for so many places and stores, furnish the milk and pay for gas, coal, light, pay their rents, salaries and other expenses attached to it, that they may flourish at our expense and yours, the City expenses, and live from the fat of the land. This is all wrong and should not be tolerated, and when the City is in bankrupt condition, and hope you gentlemen will abolish it, and put a stop to it. Not one milk station should be allowed. All this health crusade about the white plague, infant mortality, contagious scare, germs and microbe theories are agitated to get the sympathy of the public to give liberal which has proved profitable, and received big appropriations to carry out their schemes. The agitators have filled the minds of the people with fear, wary over these microbe theories to carry infection became frightened, grieved over it, that some took their own lives, we often read about in newspapers. Lincoln said, you can fool once the people, but you cannot fool all the people all the time, and when consumption is positively not contagious, nor are germs and microbes in milk or anywhere else, the milk is pure if left alone and cattle free from injections, farmers are able to take care of their stock. Why should cattle and their milk be condemned in this 20th century for personal gain, when God from the beginning of the world has nourished us with it, we all drank milk and are here today, therefore hands off from God's own gift, many do not deserve, and please repeal this pasteurizing milk law, which would enslave all New Yorkers, and let us have the milk in its natural state and reduce the Budget instead increasing it seven million dollars every year. Many hospitals for consumptives have been established in this City and in the country by this agitation at great expense, which should be abolished and the property sold by the City. There should be no fear anyone contracting consumption as it is not contagious, people are ill, are in better care at home than in strange places in the hands of experimenters, which also robs regular qualified physicians of their practice.

I cannot imagine how the City can consent furnishing milk stations to the foreign elements come herein the guise of saving children, many of whom exiled from other countries for us to support them and their children with milk and in fact everything they agitate in their organized movements, who gave us so much trouble, State and City expenses, want to rule over us, pauperizing us Americans with the help of those in office and legislation, educating them at great expense, when they cannot get, they ask from us in their own countries, who would scorn them for their bold demands, it does not seem right.

We made repeated requests to have official change to day work. We may here state, on Commissioner Edwards' authority, that 400 men have left the employ since its inauguration.

We waited on Mayor Gaynor, with poor results.

We are in touch with thousands of men, but they are poor; yet they are part of our municipality. The noise is very objectionable. Citizens cannot sleep, and work cannot be performed as expeditiously, or as economically. It is positively dangerous; so many slippery sidewalks, dark basements, groping with a lantern, and no assistance to hoist cans often weighing 200 pounds or more.

Mayor Gaynor is anxious to help in many respects where a hindrance or hitch could be attributed to some opposing party influence, but in this case, which is absolutely within his grasp, he is obdurate.

You will notice the harshness of his determination that no man will ever return to work who has rebelled against the night work (forgetting to add, during his administration).

Corporation Counsel, City of New York, November 10, 1911.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—I am in receipt of copy of resolution adopted by your honorable body requesting that I advise you as to your power to prohibit by ordinance tobacco smoking by females in public places. Sections 43, 44 and 49 of the Charter contain provisions which confer upon your Board the power and duty of legislating by ordinance for the peace and good order of the community, the preservation of the public health and the suppression of vice and immorality. That is to say, your Board is vested with general authority to pass ordinances, in the exercise of the police power, provided that your enactments are not inconsistent with the Federal or State Constitutions or statutes prescribing safeguards against encroachments upon personal liberty and securing to all persons immunity from unjust or unreasonable discrimination under the law.

Under the authorities, in order to sustain an ordinance as a proper exercise of the police power, the purpose to be effected must bear a real or substantial relation to the public health, morals or safety, and the mere fact that an ordinance may be, in the opinion of the enacting body, promotive of public health, morals or safety will not preclude the Courts from a consideration of the ordinance to determine whether the necessary relation actually exists.

It may be said, therefore, that the validity of an ordinance such as you propose depends upon whether the Courts would consider such a prohibition to bear a real and substantial relation to the objects of the police power, and whether such a provision would constitute an unreasonable discrimination on the ground of sex. The question cannot be answered with absolute assurance at this time, because it is one, perhaps, as to which reasonable minds might differ. But I may call your attention to the fact that the prohibition would attempt to control personal conduct, which in no way encroaches upon the rights of others, and which many might consider to be not subversive of public order, health or morality. Personal conduct or habits which might be merely vulgar or indelicate, in the opinion of your Board, or involve bad taste, would not necessarily be sufficient to sustain the validity of a prohibitive ordinance.

My opinion is that the Courts would more likely hold an ordinance prohibiting public smoking by women to be void than valid.

It is possible, also, that such an ordinance might conflict with section 40 of the Civil Rights Law, providing that all persons shall be entitled to equal accommodations, advantages, facilities and privileges in inns, restaurants, hotels, etc. In case of such conflict, the ordinance would give way to the statute. Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, October 30, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Dear Sirs—I inclose herewith for your consideration a draft of a proposed resolution relating to the various funds of this Department for the defraying of minor and incidental expenses.

Under similar resolutions now in force, the main office of this Department is allowed to draw \$2,000 in advance from the contingent fund to meet the minor and incidental expenses of the Department. Payments are made on vouchers amounting to \$500 each and as each advance payment of \$500 must be accounted for before the next one can be made, there is never available more than \$1,500 for our contingent expenses. As a matter of fact there is seldom more than \$500 in the petty cash account of this office because there are usually two vouchers for \$500 each in the Comptroller's office in process of audit and payment. When there are unusual demands upon the appropriation caused by the trial of so many actions in which subpoena fees and traveling expenses of witnesses and other incidental disbursements must be paid, it frequently happens that the fund is exhausted and that some one in this office is obliged to advance money from their personal account to meet the necessary disbursements. I am, therefore, asking that the amount which may be advanced to the main office be increased from \$2,000 to \$2,500.

For similar reasons I am asking that the amount which may be advanced to the Bureau of Street Openings be increased from \$300 to \$600, to be accounted for in vouchers of not less than \$200 each, and that the amount advanced to the Brooklyn branch office be increased from \$300 to \$450, to be accounted for in vouchers of not less than \$150 each.

The provision now made for an advance of \$300 to the Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes is not necessary because the bills of that Bureau are now paid from the main office, and I have, therefore, provided for the repeal of that resolution.

The resolution as I recommend it provides for the repeal of all resolutions on this subject which have been adopted in the past.

I will be glad to appear before your Board at any time to explain in further detail the necessity for the proposed resolution.

The Corporation Counsel may in like manner renew the draft as often as may by him be deemed necessary to the extent of the appropriation set apart for the contingencies of the Law Department, office of the Corporation Counsel, but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Corporation Counsel, covering the expenditure of money paid thereon. Provided, however, that upon the receipt of vouchers showing the payment of moneys upon the said draft to the extent of five hundred dollars, the Comptroller may draw his warrant to the order of the Corporation Counsel for the sum of five hundred dollars in part disbursement of the advance of two thousand five hundred dollars;

Third: That for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Bureau of Street Openings of the Law Department, office of the Corporation Counsel, the Corporation Counsel may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding six hundred dollars. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On August 15, 1911, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested amendment of an authorization of corporate stock in the amount of \$180,000, for furnishing and laying a 30-inch distribution main to connect the water supply systems of the First and Third Wards, Borough of Queens. In connection therewith, we report as follows:

The resolution approving the appropriation, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911, provided for laying the "30-inch distribution main and appurtenances in and along Fresh Meadow road, North Hempstead turnpike, Jamaica ave. and Union ave." The amendment proposed is to provide for the laying of the main "in and along Fresh Meadow road and Union ave."

In reference to the old route, the Commissioner states the following:

"This route was selected, partly because the Department had anticipated erecting a pumping station about one mile west of the existing Flushing station. The Department also took into consideration the fact that the Citizens' Water Supply Company had a 36-inch main in Union ave., and it was thought inadvisable to parallel this main for any greater distance than was absolutely necessary. There is every indication that building operations will be more extensive along Fresh Meadow road than on Jamaica ave. It is, therefore, thought advisable to lay the proposed main along Union ave. and Fresh Meadow road, thus shortening the length of the proposed main."

The Deputy Chief Engineer states the following relative to the proposed change of route:

"Since the investigation for the main was made, a tarvia pavement has been laid on Jamaica ave. To lay the main in the original location proposed would require cutting this pavement for a length of about two miles. Under these conditions, an alternate route, through Fresh Meadow road and Union ave. will be less expensive, avoid cutting the new pavement, and serve a territory which will probably develop rapidly in the future. The estimated cost of \$180,000 may be reduced by about \$20,000 on account of change in alignment."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions providing for the rescindment of the \$180,000 authorization for the old route, and approving an authorization of the \$160,000 necessary for the new route.

Sir—Enclosed herewith is a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Health at its meeting held October 24, 1911, petitioning the Board of Aldermen to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$7,520 for the purpose of employing additional Medical Inspectors, Nurses, Nurses' Assistants, Cleaners and Clerks to man 22 infants' milk stations, which the Board of Health is desirous of taking over from the Committee for the Reduction of Infant Mortality of the New York Milk Committee, for the balance of the year 1911. The Committee in question has announced its intention of discontinuing its milk stations in the Borough of Manhattan on and after the first day of November, 1911. If a break in the supervision of and the educational work now being conducted by the Committee among five thousand mothers having babies registered at the milk stations in the Borough of Manhattan, is to be prevented, it will be necessary for the Department of Health to find some means to keep such stations going for the time specified.

The Budget for the year 1912 contains provision for the establishment of 22 additional infants' milk stations in the Borough of Manhattan, and in order to continue the work up to the time the new Budget becomes available, but \$7,520 will be needed. If the City will take over 22 stations on November 1, the Committee for the Reduction of Infant Mortality will place them, with all the equipment, at the disposal of the Department of Health until January 1, 1912, rent free.

It is believed that the provision of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, limiting the amount of special revenue bonds issued in any one year to \$2,000,000, has not been violated for this reason: On July 18 the Board of Health requested the Board of Aldermen to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$10,125 for the employment of additional help for three months from August 1, 1911. This was approved by the Board of Aldermen on July 31, but his Honor did not approve of it until August 30. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment did not act upon the request and the money was not, therefore, obtained. The \$7,520 could be taken from the above amount which now seems to be available for the purpose.

The bond issue above requested will have no connection whatever with the previous amount of money asked for, which was for emergency purposes for the stations already maintained by the Department of Health. It is essential that the appropriation be made in order to prevent undue loss of infant life and the immense waste of effort which would result from any lack of continuity in the work.

Dear Sir—A new system of bookkeeping was established by the Finance Department for the control of the accounts in the Bureau of Water Register, Borough of Manhattan. This system provided for the listing of all meter readings and other features necessitating a considerable amount of scheduling. The scheduling required could only be accomplished with the aid of adding machines. Several were purchased and have been in practical use for some months past and have demonstrated their usefulness. In fact, it would be a physical impossibility to accomplish the work if these schedules were to be prepared by hand.

Gentlemen—Confirming letter of the Commissioner of Public Works and Acting President of the Borough of Queens, dated August 15, 1911, addressed to the Honorable Francis P. Bent, Vice-President of the Board of Aldermen, City of New York, Manhattan, we now beg to renew our application for a resolution of authority to expend three thousand dollars (\$3,000) revenue bonds without public letting, and in connection therewith to submit the following:

On October 18, 1910, the Board of Aldermen, by resolution, authorized the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds for \$3,000, the proceeds whereof to be used by the President of the Borough of Queens for the purpose of abating a public nuisance, and to excavate a channel et al. at the mouth of the 5th ave. sewer, College Point, Third Ward, which became a law without the approval or disapproval of his Honor the Mayor on November 1, 1910, and which was concurred in by the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 16, 1911.

Pursuant therewith, this office solicited bids by advertisements in accordance with law, which we opened on May 11, 1911, and July 19, 1911; the result of both openings being negative.

The specifications handed to prospective bidders were duly approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on recommendation of the Comptroller.



Inasmuch as this work should be completed as early as possible, and is of such a nature as to preclude the ordinary contractor taking up, in consequence of machinery needed to do the work, we deem it for the interests of The City of New York that the same be awarded without public letting, and to that end I beg to enclose resolution for adoption by your honorable Board.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—This Department is charged with the duty of issuing permits authorizing the construction of all sub-surface work, except sewers, by companies or individuals holding franchises or other proper municipal authority. For the care and protection of the water mains and appurtenances under the immediate control of the Department, it becomes necessary that the Department supervise the construction of all conduits and tunnels and the laying of all mains and pipes of every description. There is in charge of this work an Assistant Engineer, who has under his immediate direction Inspectors assigned to the different locations where work is in progress, and it is his duty to visit daily all these locations. This necessitates traveling over practically the entire Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. The Assistant Engineer has the use of a horse and carriage, which is hired at a monthly rate, but he finds it almost impossible to cover the ground except at great inconvenience and loss of time. It is proposed to assign to the use of the Engineer an automobile.

There is also required an automobile truck for the distribution of supplies for the line stations on the Brooklyn watershed. All of the small supplies required for the proper operation and maintenance of these stations are stored at Ridgewood, and, at the present time are distributed from this point by means of horses and wagons. This method of transportation is expensive, and is at times slow, especially in the winter months. It is necessary, on certain occasions, that some of the fittings be delivered promptly in order to avoid any possible collapse of the engines, and with the aid of an automobile truck the Department could dispatch these supplies quickly and also transport the Machinists or other help required to put them in position.

As the Department in a previous application has explained how impracticable, if not impossible, it is to purchase automobiles by competitive bidding, I would ask the honorable Board of Aldermen for authority to purchase on open market orders the automobile required by the Assistant Engineer and the automobile truck to be used for the distribution of supplies in the Borough of Brooklyn. I therefore attach a form of resolution upon which I would ask favorable consideration.

## TENEMENT HOUSE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter Ending September 30, 1911.

New York, October 31, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor of the City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith summary statement of the work of the Tenement House Department for the period July 1 to September 30, 1911, inclusive, being the report for the third quarter of the year, as required by section 1544 of the Charter of the City of New York.

As was the case in the second quarterly report, the statistical statement of work done by the Department is given by two methods of classification, owing to the change in system of handling violations of law inaugurated at the beginning of the year. As explained in that report, this change consisted in giving up the violation or list of separate infractions of law found at one inspection, as a unit, and replacing it with a running account on each house, to which each separate infraction of the law was added as an item when found and subtracted as soon as that separate item was complied with.

This change at the close of the third quarter was completed in the Manhattan and Brooklyn offices, but had not as yet been inaugurated in The Bronx. The new method covers the so-called old building and alteration violations only. The new building violations for all Boroughs are still classified as violations, consequently, in the present report, tables showing violations and tables showing items will be found, which must be regarded as supplementary to each other and not as different methods of tabulating the same work.

Violations existing at the time the change was effected are being reduced as violations, consequently certain of the tables show violations dismissed and cancelled, but none filed. For the orders issued, tables of items must be consulted for the Manhattan and Brooklyn offices. Respectfully submitted,

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York.  
Held Wednesday, October 18, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present—President James Creelman and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President, James Creelman, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Classification by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Mayor's Office," the title Confidential Stenographer.

Robert W. Adamson, Secretary to the Mayor, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. Robert W. Belcher, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also appeared. There being no opposition, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The public hearing on the proposed amendment of the Classification by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Bureau of Public Works in each Borough," the title Consulting Engineer of Sewers, Manhattan—was adjourned for one week at the request of the Borough President.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Coroners," the position of Replevin Clerk for the Borough of Manhattan. Hon. Israel L. Feinberg and Hon. James E. Winterbottom, Coroners, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. The hearing was adjourned for one week in order to admit of a conference with the coroners of the other Boroughs for the purpose of having a uniform Classification.

Whenever there are less than three persons eligible for promotion to fill a vacancy in a graded position, an eligible nominated by the appointing officer may be promoted, with the consent of the Commission, to the grade next higher upon a statement of the facts to the Commission, and, on passing a non-competitive examination, similar in scope, subjects and preliminary conditions to such examination as would have been prescribed in case of competition."

There were no appearances.

Alfred J. Talley, Esq., Attorney and Counsellor-at-Law, appeared before the Commission relative to the appeal of Joseph Williams for a re-rating of his examination for promotion to Foreman in the Fire Department.

"Whenever there are less than three persons eligible for promotion to fill a vacancy in a graded position, an eligible nominated by the appointing officer may, with the consent of the Commission, be promoted to the grade next higher, upon a statement of the facts to the Commission, and on passing a non-competitive examination, similar in scope, subjects and preliminary conditions to such examination as would have been prescribed in case of competition."

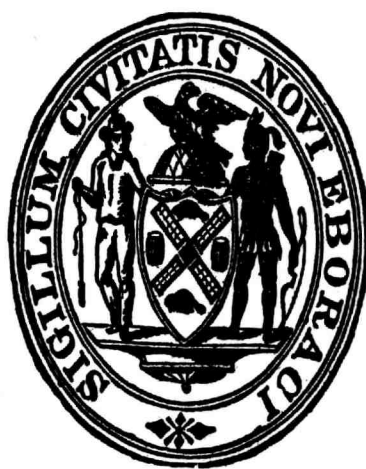

#### Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ 1911 by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The New York Magnaphone and Music Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right or privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in the conduits under the streets and avenues within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan and that part of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River; such wires to connect only the premises of subscribers with the central stations of the Company and to be used for the purpose of maintaining a system whereby music and information in relation to matters of general interest may be distributed electrically from the central stations of the Company to two or more subscribers simultaneously and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The rights and privileges herein granted shall not be construed to in any way give the Company the right or privilege to engage in a business permitting communication between subscribers and this contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto that the Company will not in any way engage in a business which will permit communication between its subscribers or claim the right so to do under this contract and the right and privilege herein and hereby granted and conferred; it being understood that this is not a grant to a telephone business within the general accepted meaning of the term.

Second—The said right to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, without any privilege of renewal thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts,

if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500).

Fifth—The right and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires, electrical conductors and other property of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires, electrical conductors and other property, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—Said wires, electrical conductors and other property shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction shall be commenced by the Company until written permission therefor has been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Eighth—All wires or other electrical conductors of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it sue. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan or the portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and electrical conductors in such subways, and the City agrees to lease to the Company during the term of this contract such space as may be required for the business herein authorized.

Ninth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish its service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half (½) mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Tenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly indicated the number of wires which are used by the Company on the 30th day of September next preceding, and the streets and avenues in which the same are located, and also those which were put in during the preceding year.

Eleventh—The Company shall commence the operation of its system of distribution of music and matters of general interest, as herein authorized, within six (6) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and shall have in operation the apparatus for the delivery of such service at one thousand (1,000) points upon subscriber's premises within five (5) years from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Twelfth—The Board may, by resolution, direct the Company to install its apparatus and neces-

sary appurtenances thereto in any or all of the free wards of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and in the assembly halls of any or all of the public schools within the portion of the City for which a franchise is hereby granted. Upon notice by the Board to the Company that any such resolution has been adopted the Company shall install such apparatus and the necessary appurtenances thereto, free of charge, and shall furnish service, as directed, at one-half the regular rates charged by the Company for similar service, provided that the Company shall not be required to extend its wires for the purpose of connecting with such hospitals or schools a distance greater in any case than one-half (½) mile.

Thirteenth—It is agreed that the Board shall have absolute power to regulate all charges or rates for services rendered by the Company to subscribers pursuant to this contract, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair, but the Company shall not at any time within the term of this contract charge more than twenty dollars (\$20) per month for an unlimited music service.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of the cost to it of apparatus leased or furnished to the subscriber on its premises, and of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills shall never be charged against property unless due from the owner thereof, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Fifteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those expressly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Seventeenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Eighteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at reasonable rates or at the rates herein fixed, or at the rates which may be hereafter fixed by the Board, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Nineteenth—If, for a period of any three (3) consecutive months after the commencement of the operation of the system proposed by the Company, as herein provided, such system shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of any six (6) months out of any consecutive twelve (12) months after the commencement of operation, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings in law or in equity.

Twentieth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of subscribers served by the Company.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-second—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or security, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed or at the rates which may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided, and in default of the payment of such annual charges, the City shall collect the same with interest from said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company. In case of failure by the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual state-

ments, the furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other Municipal officer, made pursuant to the terms of this contract or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such cases and in any of these events, the Company shall, except as herein otherwise provided, pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation, which sum or sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-third—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the wires and electrical conductors constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-fourth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-fifth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written

THE CITY OF NEW YORK, ACTING BY the Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called "the Commission") invites proposals to construct Section 9 of the Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the De-

partment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
