When in accordance with the provisions of Section 79-b-1 of the Labor Law, a fire escape is accepted as a required means of exit on buildings erected prior to October 1, 1913, such fire escape shall conform to the following require-

(a) Fire escapes hereafter erected on buildings five stories or less in height constructed prior to October 1, 1913, will not furnish safe and adequate means of escape for the occupants in case of fire in buildings in which there are more than twenty-five persons employed above the second Kings County.

Passages between guard railings and projecting parts of the building shall be not less than four-teen inches in the clear. Connecting stairs and well-holes shall be not less than eighteen inches in the clear. Treads shall be flat, at least six inches in width, and substantially constructed. Fire escapes erected prior to October 1, 1913, on buildings five stories or less in height, in which there are less than twenty-six persons employed above the second floor shall comply

employed above the second floor shall comply with the provisions of Section 79.b-5 and windows must permit of an unobstructed opening of three feet wide by three feet high.

(c) On buildings five stories or less in height, erected prior to October 1, 1913, fire escapes which do not comply with the above requirements will not afford adequate and safe means of escape for the occupants of such buildings in case of fire, and will not be accepted as a required means of exit.

(d) Fire escapes hereafter erected on buildings in the complex of the

(d) Fire escapes hereafter erected or buildings six, seven, eight and nine stories in height, constructed prior to October 1, 1913, shall comply with the provisions of Section 79-b-4, and in addition thereto, with the following requirements: The balconies and stairs shall be screened on the outside to a height of at least five feet above the landings and the center of the treads. The screening may consist of No. 10 U. S. gauge wire with not more than one and one-half inch mesh, or bars at least one-half inch in diameter placed not more than six inches between centers, or with grille work; all to be substantially installed and brace.

(e) Fire escapes erected prior to October 1, 1913, on buildings six, seven, eight and nine stories in height shall comply with the provisions of Section 79-b-4, except that openings leading to balconies may be at or about window sill level; and except that balconies shall not be less than three feet wide and except that, if the building is not more than six stories high, the connecting stairs may be at an angle not to ex ceed 60 degrees from the horizontal. Steps shall be provided on the inside of the factory leading to openings. Balconies and stairs shall be screened as prescribed in subdivision "d" of

(f) Fire escapes will not be accepted as a required means of exit on buildings mere than nine stories in height. (g) Fire escapes serving as required means of exit shall be kept free from snow, ice and all obstructions. They shall be maintained structurally safe and kept well painted.

(h) If there be safe egress from the roof to an adjoining or nearby structure, the fire escapes shall be continued to the roof.

Permitting the employment of women in can-neries not more than sixty-six hours a week.

PURSUANT TO SUBDIVISION 3, SECTION 78 of the Labor Law, and upon application to be made by the employer to the Industrial Commission, women eighteen years of age and upwards may be employed or permitted to work in canning or preserving perishable products in fruit and canning establishments between the twenty-fifth day of June and the lifth day of August, nineteen hundred and sixteen, in excess of ten hours in any one day and sixty hours in any one week, but not in excess of twelve hours in any one day nor sixty-six hours in any one week nor six days in any one week, upon comoliance with the following regulations:

A woman may be so employed

1. At any process or part of the work which does not require continuous standing while at work, except that she shall not be so employed in the processes of labeling or packing cans;

2. Provided that every floor on which such woman is employed be drained free of liquids; but whenever any such floor cannot be kept en-tirely free from liquids, slat platforms shall also furnished upon which such woman may rest her feet while at work.

3. Permits granting exemption under these rules and regulations shall be revocable by the Industrial Commission for violation of any of the above regulations. Resolved, That the rules and regulations be dopted tentatively and submitted to the Indusadopted tentatively and shounted to the Industrial Council, and in the meantime proceed with the printing of same, holding the proof until action by the Industrial Council.



Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, whether during the original or renewal term thereof, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third-The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this con-tract, whether original or renewal, notwithstandng any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation

a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, hereinbefore described.

Fifth—At the termination or forfeiture of this grant, the City at the election of the Board, shall have the right to purchase all or any part of the property and plant of the Company used for the purpose of the operation of the stage or omnibus Section 1. Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents; and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignment beautiful to the part of the said assignment. of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or other-wise exemption from liability to perform each and

all of the conditions of this contract. The Comptroller shall have access to all books and records of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its of-

ficers and employees under oath.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall keep accurate books of the performance of different types of vehicles and the different services rendered and the cost thereof, and shall at any time furnish the Board, or its authorized representatives, such information with respect thereto as shall be

Twenty-seventh-In case of any violation of breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board or its authorized representatives, acting under the powers herein reserved, the right or privilege herein granted may be forfeited by resolution of said Board, without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Any false entry in the books of the Company or false statement in the reports to the Comptroller as to a material fact, knowingly made by the Company, shall constitute such a violation or breach or failure to comply with the provisions herein contained as to warrant the for-feiture of the franchise.

Nothing herein contained shall affect in any way the right of the Company to apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for review of any action of the Board forfeiting the franchise or consent herein granted.

I wenty-eighth-If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at rates not exceeding those herein fixed, or fail to maintain its equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or at the option of the Board, this contract may be forfeited upon ten

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the sums as fixed or liquidated damages in this contract shall be as follows:
