The following is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 2, 1884:

The total number of inspections made during the week was 3,257; the total number of com-

plaints returned was 1,001.

During the past week 157 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the 39 permits were issued Health Officer of the Port.

47 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 62 premises where contagious diseases were reported, and have performed 60 disinfections and 18 fumigations.

To patients sick with contagious diseases were removed to the hospital.

Meat and Fish Inspectors have seized and condemned 4,540 pounds of meats and 1,600 The Milk Inspectors have examined 125 specimens of milk, made 4 analyses of same, and destroyed 10 quarts of adulterated milk.

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were fini-bed and water was again turned on by 4 F. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant.

While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all cuizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.
