

STATED MEETING.

TUESDAY, January 27, 1891, (

The Board met in room No. 16, City Hall.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

#### PETITIONS.

Petition of D. Noble Rowan and others for permission to erect and maintain glass and iron booths for the sale of newspapers and flowers in several of the public streets and places of this city.

And in connection therewith offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to D. Noble Rowan, of No. 50
Broadway, New York; W. Romeyne Vermilye, of No. 60 Broadway, New York; Charles H.
Stebbins, of No. 60 Broadway, New York, and Newton S. Finney, of No. 52 Broadway, New
York, their heirs and assignces, to erect and maintain at their own expense, and lease glass and
iron booths, for the sale of newspapers and flowers, at the places designated in the accompanying
schedule, and elsewhere as necessity may require, said permission being granted said parties for a
period of twenty years from date of the present resolution, under the following provisos:

First—That the sites designated and others to be chosen later be approved of by the Commissioner of Public Works.

Second—That the booths to be erected be in conformity in shape and built, with the designs

Second—That the booths to be erected be in conformity in shape and built with the designs and plans submitted to the Board, and not to exceed eleven feet in height and three feet six inches in

diameter.

Third—That the booths to be erected be kept in perfect order and cleanliness and not rented by the petitioners, their heirs and assignees at a rental not to exceed six dollars per annum.

Fourth—That preference be given, as far as practicable, by the petitioners, their heirs and assignees, for the renting of said booths to the newsdealers now doing business in the immediate vicinity of said booths.

Fifth—That the petitioners, their heirs and assignees, shall forfeit the privileges herein granted them if they ever run said booths themselves as newsdealers.

Sixth—That the petitioners, their heirs and assignees, shall pay the City Chamberlain, in quarterly installments in advance, a yearly fee of twenty-five (\$25) dollars for each and every one of the said booths, said fee or rental to the city to be due the city from the day of erection of each and every booth, and as long as said booth be maintained upon the public thoroughfares.

Seventh—That the petitioners, their heirs and assignees, shall keep said booths lighted up properly from nightfall to dawn, at their own personal expense.

The Commissioner of Public Works reports that this part of Cauldwell avenue is not yet legally opened. The city can, therefore, incur no expenditure for its improvement in placing public lamps or otherwise.

Hon. THEO. W. MYERS, Comptroller:

SIR-I would respectfully report that in accordance with your request I have made examination of the account of receipts and disbursements of the late Sheriff, Hon. D. E. Sickles, during his term of office, from March 31, 1890, to December 31, 1890, with reference to the requirements of sections 21 and 22, chapter 523, Laws 1890, and I find, after a careful examination of the records of the Sheriff's office, verified in part by the records of the Finance Department, that in the language of said act, the fees received by said Sheriff during his term of office are not "sufficient to allow him compensation at the rate of twenty-five thousand dollars per year and to pay all necessary expenses of his office," etc., the amount of the deficiency more fully appearing from the detailed statement hereinafter made.

Before giving such details I desire to call your attention to the fact that in the statement of fees received by the Sheriff, I have included those received from the United States Government, for the support of United States prisoners in the County Jail, as well as those received from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for the support of prisoners in said jail. I apprehend that under the broad language of said chapter 523, Laws of 1890, said fees are chargeable to the Sheriff in the adjustment provided for by section 22 of said act. Said matter is respectfully submitted for your consideration.

I desire also to call your attention to the fact that in the account, as presented by the Sheriff, he has charged hims: If with the same item twice, under the heads of "fees" and "poundage," the item so charged being for "poundage," etc., month of October, 1890, and amounting to \$1,659.42. Said error has been corrected in the appended statement.

I would also respectfully call your attention to the fact that there are many cases in the Sheriff's hands now pending and undetermined, and that the amount of poundage, etc.. to which the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty will be entitled, cannot be determined until collections in such cases shall have been made.

I find that among the items of necessary expenses of the Sheriff's office there has been included an item of \$2,450 ior office furniture, etc., purchased by the late Sheriff from ex-Sheriff Flack. Believing that said item is a proper one to be so included, the same appears in the statement of expenses of the Sheriff's office, although I have not had the time to make any detailed examination as to the question of value; the late Sheriff, however, having stated that said furniture, etc., was appraised by two experts before the purchase of the same. The matter is respectfully submitted for your consideration. your consideration.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by the southerly line of Fordham road easterly by the centre line of the block between Cedar avenue and Harlem River Terrace; southerly by the northerly line of Cedar avenue and a line at right angles to the westerly line of Cedar avenue at its junction with the westerly line of Harlem River Terrace, prolonged westerly at right angles to the easterly line of the lands of the New York and Northern Railroad Company, and westerly by the centre line of the block between Harlem River Terrace and a certain unnamed street adjoining the western boundary of the lands of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris R. R. Co., excepting from said area all the streets, avenues and roads, or portions thereof, heretofore legally opened, and all the unimproved land included within the lines of streets, avenues; roads, public squares and plazes shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by the "missioners of the Department of Public Parks, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1882, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aloresaid

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the 28th day of January, 1891, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
