

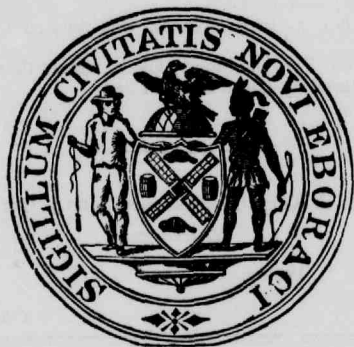

The motion that Chief Battalion Orr be tried upon charges preferred by Chief of Department (laid over on the 26th instant) was called up.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by the President:

Whereas, It appears from the report of an investigation made by the Chief of Department, that Chief of Battalion Gilbert J. Orr, lately in charge of the Repair Shops, received iron under a contract of a kind different from that specified therein, notwithstanding that the customary precautions were observed to hold the contractor rigidly to the terms of his contract; and

Whereas, It appears that charges were preferred by the Chief of Department against the said Chief of Battalion Orr under the misapprehension that he was directed so to do, regardless of the result of his investigation; and

Whereas, It appears that the iron complained of has been entirely replaced by iron of the kind and quality specified in the contract, and that no loss has been inflicted on the city thereby; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the forms of a trial upon the charges preferred against the said Chief of Battalion Gilbert J. Orr be dispensed with, but that in view of his failure to promptly report the delinquency of the contractor, he be summoned to appear before this Board at its next meeting for reprimand.

For all chemical engine companies, being Nos. 1 and 4, each one Foreman and three Firemen or Privates.

For hook and ladder companies located south of West Fifty-ninth street, east of Eighth avenue, and south of the Harlem river, being Nos. 1 to 14, inclusive, each one Foreman, one Assistant Foreman, and ten Firemen or Privates.

For hook and ladder companies located north of West Fifty-ninth street, and west of Eighth avenue, being Nos. 15 and 16, each one Foreman, one Assistant Foreman, and six Firemen or Privates.

For hook and ladder companies located north and east of the Harlem river, being Nos. 17 and 18, each one Foreman, one Assistant Foreman, and eight Firemen or Privates.

Resolved, That Chemical Engine Co. No. 3 be equipped as an engine company, to be known and designated as Engine Co. No. 45, and that the chemical engine now in its possession remain attached thereto.

Resolved, That the Chief of Department make all necessary assignments to duty required by the foregoing resolutions, and that the same take effect on the 1st proximo, or as soon thereafter as practicable.
