We acknowledge the receipt of a communication from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund transmitting to us a copy of the resolution adopted by said Commissioners, referring to us the bids received for the construction of a new court-house for the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the First Department, with a request that we recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund one of said bids for acceptance before Wednesday, the 22d inst., at twelve o'clock noon, together with the bids received.

The contract for the erection of this building was prepared under the direction of chapter 196 of the Laws of 1897, by the Corporation Counsel and approved by the Justices of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in this Department. Under the statute, that contract as it stands must be executed by the contractor whose bid is accepted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the contract leaves the determination as to the marble to be used upon the building with the architect. Several of the bids received are conditioned upon the marble from a particular quarry named being used in the construction of the building. A bid which names marble from a particular quarry would not be a bid to construct the building according to contract, and we do not think that the Commissioners would be justified in accepting a bid which varied the terms of the contract. This applies to the bids of Messrs. Norcross Brothers, Mr. James Baker Smith and Mahony Brothers. The lowest bidder to do the work unconditionally for one specific sum as proposed by the contract and specifications is Mr. Charles T. Wills. His bid we think in all respects regular and in compliance with the statute, and we have instituted inquiries as to the responsibility and ability of Mr. Wills to complete the work, and are entirely satisfied that he is, in all respects, a competent person.

By section 2 of the act in question (Chap. 196 of the Laws of 1897) it is provided that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund "may thereupon, with the approval of the said Justices of the Appellate Division, or a majority of them, accept the said bid or bids, the acceptance of which will, in their judgment, best secure the prompt and proper erection of the said building according to said plans and specifications approved as aforesaid." In pursuance of the request of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, contained in their resolution of December 20, 1897, and in pursuance of the provisions above cited, the acceptance of the bid of Mr. Charles T. Wills will, in our judgment, best secure the prompt and proper erection of the said building according to the said plans and specifications, approved as provided for by the said act, and we hereby approve of the acceptance by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the bid of the said Charles T. Wills to do the work referred to in the contract and specifications, approved as aforesaid, for the sum of \$638,963.

38. $\frac{1}{4}$ " x 1" and $\frac{3}{4}$ " Wrought-iron Screw-bolts and Nuts, and Lag-screws, about 3,459 pounds.

39. Wrought-iron Washers for $\frac{1}{4}$ " and $\frac{3}{4}$ " Screw-bolts and Lag-screws, about 205 pounds.

All parties and persons, owners, lessees or other persons interested in the real estate above described and to be taken for the purposes of said public park, or any part thereof, or affected by the proceedings had under or authorized by said act, chapter 224 of the Laws of 1895, as amended by chapter 70 of the Laws of 1897, and having any claim or demand on account thereof, are required to present the same to us, duly verified, with such affidavits or other proof in support thereof as the said owner or claimant may desire, within sixty days after the date of this notice (November 8, 1897), at our office, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, ninth floor, in the City of New York.

And we, the said Commissioners, will be in attendance at our said office on the 18th day of January, 1898, at twelve o'clock noon of that day, to hear the said parties and persons in relation thereto, and in case any such person or claimant shall desire at such time and place to offer further and additional proofs or testimony, such person or claimant will be heard or said proofs or testimony will be received by us.

And at such time and place, or at such further or other time and place as we may appoint, we will hear the proofs and allegations of any owner, lessee or other person in any way entitled to or interested in such real estate, or any part or parcel thereof, and also such proofs and allegations as may be then offered on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.
